PRIME LAMB CARCASE AWARDS

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COMPETITION OVERVIEW

The Prime Lamb Carcase Awards were introduced by The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria in 2002 to recognise excellence in prime lamb production within the commercial sector. The objectives of the program are as follows:

- To identify and reward commercial prime lamb producers who demonstrate excellence within the sheep meat industry and meet export market specifications.
- To stimulate interest and encourage production systems which improve prime lamb production.
- To utilise technology that provides informative feedback to producers on prime lamb carcase quality and yield.
- To provide prime lamb producers with the opportunity to benchmark their flock within the industry.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Entry to the competition requires consignments to be at least 200 lambs and within the 20-30kg carcase weight range. These consignments are processed at Castricum Brothers abattoir in Dandenong and assessed using the Australian-developed electronic carcase evaluation system, VIAscan.

JUDGING PROCESS

The VIAscan evaluation system is utilised in objective prime lamb carcase assessment and feedback systems and enables the distinction between lambs with comparatively more meat than lambs of the same weight that are fattier and lower yielding. Measurements are achieved through assessing the lean meat yield based on carcase weight, loin content, estimated fat depth and distribution through video image analysis. Outstanding carcases will achieve both high carcase weight and lean meat yield and are rewarded due to the high processing efficiency they present.

Using a grid system which incorporates Carcase Weight, Lean Meat Yield (%) and adjustments for above average Meat Yield scores, carcases are either determined to be discount, at par value or premium. Discounts and premiums are kept constant and issued at plus or minus \$0.20/kg based on par value. Par value is not a fixed price and can vary depending on the time of year or season.

After all carcases in a consignment have been categorised as discount, par value or premium the average price per carcase is determined. This average price per carcase is then compared with the standard 'Over the Hooks' payment and is referred to as the 'Over the Hooks Comparison'. The difference between these two values is the total premium return per carcase.

The consignment achieving the highest total premium return per carcase will be determined the winner of the RASV Prime Lamb Carcase Awards.



RESULTS

CARCASE WEIGHT AND LEAN MEAT YIELD



The correlation between Carcase Weight (kg) and Lean Meat Yield (%) is evident. As Carcase Weight increases the percentage of Lean Meat Yield tends to decrease, due to carcases generally becoming fattier with increased weight.

The winning consignment attained the highest Lean Meat Yield percentage relative to its Carcase Weight and was therefore rewarded by the grid system which awards premiums over par value based on heavier Carcase Weights and higher Lean Meat Yield (%).

CARCASE WEIGHT AND PREMIUM




Figure 2. Carcase Weight (kg) vs. Premium (c/kg)

CARCASE LEAN MEAT YIELD (%) AND PREMIUM (C/KG)




Figure 3. Lean Meat Yield (%) vs. Premium (c/kg)

CARCASE LEAN MEAT YIELD (KG) AND PREMIUM (C/KG)




Figure 4. Lean Meat Yield (kg) vs. Premium (c/kg)

The figures demonstrate that there is little to no correlation directly between Carcase Weight (kg) and the Premium (c/kg) assigned to the consignments. It is a misconception that heavier carcases will always attract a higher c/kg premium and the wide data spread supports this. As carcases get heavier they may also be fattier which reduces their value on a c/kg basis, as fat has to be trimmed resulting in discounts from par value. The winning consignment exhibits a premium much greater than others within the same weight range, indicating that although it is heavier it is comprised of a greater percentage of lean meat.

A strong correlation is apparent between Lean Meat Yield (%) and the Premium (c/kg) obtained. Consequently high-yielding carcases are financially awarded per unit of carcase weight.

The winning consignment consisted of lambs with a high Lean Meat Yield (%) and Carcase Weight resulting in the consignment achieving the highest average premium per carcase (\$4.43).

The winning consignment received a premium of 18 c/kg and a Lean Meat Yield of 14.4 kg. It bettered the premiums received by other consignments because it was comparatively higher yielding. The consignments below the trend line attained a lower premium as the percentage of Lean Meat Yield per kilogram of Carcase Weight was relatively low.

The above table shows the averages and winning results for the past four years of the Prime Lamb Carcase Awards. The 2008 average carcase weight has slightly decreased from 2007, however the average lean meat yield percentage has increased. The combination of the carcase weight and the lean meat yield percentage for 2008 has seen the premium paid per kilo increase in comparison to previous years, consequently rewarding producers with higher premiums per carcase.
