Justin Corbitt Head Brewer, Hawkers Beer (Australian Brewers Guild)



With a background in finance and international business, Justin's first taste of the beer industry was in 2013 volunteering at the Paulaner Brauhaus in Singapore, where he was based for work. A year and half later he took the reigns as President of the Singapore Craft Brew Club. Justin relocated to Melbourne in 2015 with his wife Erica, an Aussie. Having enjoyed his experience in Singapore's beer industry so thoroughly, he was keen to get involved in the thriving Melbourne scene.

Justin became part of the Hawkers team in September 2015 starting out on the packaging line, shifting to the brew decks only five months later. He has gone on to excel in brewery operations, including leading the development of Hawkers's bourbon barrel ageing program – one of Australia's largest. Testament to Justin's commitment to continuing to learn and grow, he is currently undertaking his Masters in Brewing and

Distilling with Heriot Watt University, Edinburgh. His capacity for innovation and creation led him to be titled 'Champion of continuous improvement and process implementation' within the Hawkers team.

Dr Sherrie Lee Chiropractor – Whittlesea Specialist Centre



Since being named the 2015 Victorian Rural Ambassador, Sherrie has been actively working alongside VAS Ltd to develop and implement new strategies to encourage youth participation in agriculture whether it be at a competition or administration level. Particular to her area of specialty, Sherrie has managed to cultivate a program aimed at increasing the amount of show horse judges between the ages of 18-30 years; as of 1st January 2016 there were only two judges matching this criteria- Sherrie and her younger sister Tamara. The success was overwhelming, growing the youth panel to over 15. From here Sherrie aims to expand the program not only in numbers in Victoria, but nationally over the next 2-3 years and expand the scope of the program to engage the 12-18 years bracket. Sherrie has also been invited to attend many agricultural show openings and speak at agricultural events for mentoring and leadership advice. In 2017, Sherrie became the Next Generation Chairperson- a youth program

designed to get more youth involved and engaged with agricultural shows across Victoria.

Sherrie graduated from her Masters in Clinical Chiropractic with Distinction Honours and has since opened up her own "Whittlesea Spine and Soft Tissue" clinic within the Whittlesea Specialist Centre. She is also extending her scope of practice to include animals- particularly horses, and hopes to one day pursue the line of research that will provide evidence for Chiropractic care and its ability to help the agricultural industry by improving meat, product and offspring yields.

Sherrie still competes with her show horses at local, state and national level and will again take the stage at the Grand National Saddle Horse Championships in March next year.

Message from Sherrie: When you find yourself in a situation where everyone looks at each other, its time for you to lead. You're a leader when you decide to become one. There's no initiation or a title. Just a decision.

Sherrie has put her ELVA bursary towards her postgraduate study in Animal Biomechanical Medicine. The course will take place over 2 years and will assist Sherrie in furthering her chiropractic education to enable her to expand her business to also include animal practice.

Showing sheep at Agricultural Shows was a key focus during her school years and in her final year, she registered her own stud Corriedale stud, with which she now competes at agricultural shows across Victoria.

Grace mentors young people from urban backgrounds who are considering careers in agriculture and support them to make the transition to university and beyond. She also works with a number of schools to assist them in setting up Corriedale studs, and provide technical information and advice to students and staff. In recognition of her efforts, Grace was named the 2015 Australian Corriedale Ambassador.

During the Royal Melbourne Show, Grace assists the RASV with the coordination of the Sheep Schools and Youth Competition, and stewarding at the Sheep Fleece Competition. She also exhibits her own Corriedale sheep at the Show.

Grace will focus on her professional development and sheep enterprise with the assistance from the ELVA bursary, with a 2 week beginner shearing and woolhandling course through SCAA scheduled and also looking into other equipment to support her business including a portable shearing handpiece and a self-feeder for her stock.
