

NOTE.—When forwarding poultry by rail, exhibitors are particularly requested to mark clearly in each compartment of the coop the exhibit number of the bird that was sent therein, so that the same arrangement of birds may be made for the return journey.

Tags bearing the pen numbers will be forwarded to exhibitors. together with entry tickets. These tags must be securely fastened to the legs of the birds in accordance with the exhibit numbers on the entry tickets.

### RULES.

1. Cockerel, Pullet, Young Drake or Young Duck shall mean a bird hatched on or after 1st July in previous year.

2. Labels and despatch slips will be sent for each pen, when the exhibitor is not a resident of Melbourne or suburbs, on the reverse side of the labels exhibitors will be required to write their names. addresses, and instructions for the return journey. Country and Interstate exhibitors must inform the Secretary by post or telegram. of the despatch of their exhibits, giving all particulars, in order that arrangements may be made for receiving them. Several birds may be sent in one hamper or box if it be properly divided, and pen numbers attached to each division. When the exhibitor resides in or near Melbourne, "Entry Tickets" only will be sent, the corresponding numbers being affixed to the exhibition pens by the Society.

3. The greatest care will be taken of the exhibits: but the Society will not be responsible for any accident, mistake, loss, or damage from whatever cause arising, the exhibits being at the sole risk of the Exhibitor. In case of the death of any exhibit, the same shall be certified by the Veterinary Surgeon, or his deputy.

4. Birds wearing leg bands or rings, other than those attached outside the Commonwealth, will be disqualified from receiving a prize.

5. Birds that have been tampered with or improperly dealt with in any way shall be disqualified, and entry fees paid therefor shall be forfeited. The Exhibitor shall also be liable to disqualification, and, if a member, to explusion from the Society.

Grand Championship Government Certificates will be awarded for Poultry as under:-

1. Light breeds (bantams excepted), best bird, any age or sex.

2. Heavy breeds, best bird, any age or sex.

3. Best Duck or Drake.

4. Best Pair of Birds (pure bred or cross), adapted for export.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS.

1. No certificate will be granted in any one of the above classes unless there are at least (6) competitors.

2. Any bird having previously been awarded a Government gold medal or champion certificate is not eligible to compete again.

3. Competition will be confined to birds which are the property of, and have been bred by the competitor.

Societies under whose auspices the certificates are awarded shall obtain and forward to the Director of Agriculture, when applying for the certificates to be prepared, statutory declarations from the exhibitors that the winning bird has not previously won a Government gold medal or champion certificate, and that the exhibitor is the breeder, as required in condition (3) above.

5. The bird winning the certificate in any class shall, immediately upon such award being made, have two holes punched in the inside web of the left foot. The markings shall be done by or under the supervision of the judge (in the presence of a member of the Committee of the Society) of the Section in which the award is made, who shall not certify to such award unless and until such marking has been carried out.

6. The Department will supply to the Secretary of the Society a punch for use by the judge. This punch must be returned by registered post to the Director of Agriculture immediately after the Show.

Labels will be sent for each pen when the Exhibitor is not seresident of Melbourne or suburbs, on the reverse side of which the Exhibitors will be required to write their names, addresses, and instructions for the return journey. Country and Interstate Exhibitore must inform the Secretary by post or telegram of the despatch of their exhibits, giving all particulars, in order that arrangements may be made for receiving them. Several birds may be sent in one hamper or box, if it be properly divided and pen numbers attached to each division. When the Exhibitor resides in or near Melbourne, "Entry Tickets" only will be sent, the corresponding numbers being affixed to the coops or cages by the Society.

In Utility and Fancy Varieties, all young birds must be rung with 1926-27 C.O.A., A.P.S. or C.P.E. ring or any other recognised club ring of correct size. In Homer Classes, all young birds must be rung with a recognised Club ring. Birds wearing other than recognised rings will not be allowed to compete.

The greatest care will be taken of the exhibits; but the Society will not be responsible for any accident, mistake, loss or damage from whatever cause arising, the exhibits being at the sole risk of the Exhibitor. In case of the death of any exhibit, the same shall be certified by the Veterinary Surgeon or his deputy.

Birds that have been tampered with or improperly dealt with in any way shall be disqualified, and entry fees paid therefor shall be forfeited. The exhibitor shall also be liable to disqualification, and, if member, to expulsion from the Society.

Dogs will be received and benched, fed and attended to, and despatched free of charge to Exhibitors, subject to the provisions of Regulations 43 and 45.

#### SPECIAL REGULATIONS.

1. All dogs must be registered with the Victorian Poultry and Kennel Club, the Victorian Kennel Association, the Sporting Dog Club of Victoria, the British Bull Dog Club of Victoria, or any other Club or Association recognised by this Society. Registration can be effected at the Society's office at time of entry for the Show.

2. All dogs must have double swivel chains and collars, without names, attached, to enable them to be taken out if required.

3. Any dog wearing a collar with its owner's name thereon will be disqualified from receiving a prize.

4. When being judged, dogs must wear exhibit numbers, which will be supplied by the Society.

5. Exhibitors will, on personal application to one of the Stewards, be permitted to loose their dogs for a short time each day-in the morning, prior to the opening, and in the evening, after the closing of the Exhibition; but they will on no account be permitted to remove their dogs from the yards without a written order from the Superintendent, and without leaving a deposit of £2. (See General Regulation, 39).

6. Dogs will be subjected to veterinary inspection, and those considered by the Stewards or the Veterinary Surgeon unfit for exhibition. either from disease, the effects of disease, vice, or other causes, will not be received; or removed if found necessary.

7. Labels will be sent for each dog when the exhibitor is not a resident of Melbourne or suburbs, on the reverse side of which Exhibitors will be required to write their names, addresses, and instructions for the return journey. Country and Interstate Exhibitors must inform the Secretary by post or telegram of the despatch of their exhibits, giving all particulars, in order that arrangements may be made for receiving them. Two or more dogs may be sent in one hamper or box if it be properly divided and labelled.

Note.-The Society's postal and telegraphic address at Show time is Show Grounds, Ascot Vale.

#### DOGS.

8. The Society will be most anxious for the care and safety of the Dogs sent for exhibition, or any other property entrusted to them, but it must be distinctly understood by Exhibitors, and all other persons, that the Society will not be responsible for the loss, detention of, or damage to any Dogs or other property, whether arising from accident or other cause whatever, or from any act or omission of themselves, their officers, agents, servants, or others.

9. The Society will engage a thoroughly practical man to feed and take charge of the dogs during the day, and also a night watch-DAD.

10. In order to prevent the non-exhibition of Dogs which have been entered for the Show, thus causing unnecessary preparation, expense and disarrangement of the Show benches, any person making any entry will be subject to a fine of 10/- for each and every entry of Dogs not exhibited, unless a certificate under the hand of the Exhibitor or his authorised agent be lodged with the Secretary of the Society before the day of the exhibition, certifying that such non-exhibition is caused either by (1) the death of the Dog or Dogs; or (2) contagious or infectious disease (confirmed by the explanatory certificate of . veterinary surgeon); or (3) by the Dog or Dogs becoming ineligible for the Class in which they have been entered, or other reasonable cause. The non-payment of such fines to debar all persons owing them from exhibiting at future exhibitions of the Society.

11. No dog shall be eligible to compete if it be proved to the satisfaction of the Council:—(a) That any dye, colouring, whitening or darkening matter have been used and remain on any part of the dog. (b) That any preparation, chemical or otherwise, has been used, which remains on the coat during the time of exhibition, for the purpose of altering its texture. (c) That any oil, greasy or sticky substance has been used and remains in the coat during the time of exhibition. (d) That any part of a dog's coat or hair has been cut, clipped, singed or rasped down by any substance. (e) That the new or fast coat has been removed by pulling or plucking in any manner. (Note.—The coat may be brushed and combed so that old or shedding coat and loose hairs may be removed. No comb must be used that has a cut-ting or rasping edge.) (f) That if any cutting, piercing, breaking by force, or any kind of operation or act which destroys tissues of the ears or alters their natural formation or carriage or shortens the tail, or alters the natural formation of a dog, or any part thereof, has been practised, or any other thing has been done calculated to deceive. except in cases of necessary operation certified to the satisfaction of the Council. (g) That the lining membrane of the mouth has been

cut or mutilated in any way. EXCEPTIONS.—Shortening the tails of dogs of the following breeds will not render them liable to disqualification:—Spaniels (ex-cept Irish Water), Fox Terriers, Irish Terriers, Welsh Terriers, Aire-dale Terriers, Old English Sheepdogs, Poodles, Toy Spaniels, York-this Terriers Siller Terriers and Australian Terriers and such shire Terriers, Silky Terriers and Australian Terriers, and such varieties of foreign dogs as may from time to time be determined. Dogs of the following breeds may have their coats clipped:—Poodles. Pomeranians may have their ears and feet judiciously trimmed. Dewclaws may be removed in any breed.

#### DOGS.

12. Should any dispute arise in this Section for which no specific rule has been laid down, the decision of the Council shall be accepted as final and without appeal.

#### DEFINITION OF CLASSES.

Novice Classes .- For Dogs or Bitches over 6 months old on the first day of the Show which have not won a first prize **before** the morning of the first day of the Show. at any Show

Puppy Classes .- For Dogs or Bitches over 6 months and not exceeding twelve months on first day of Show.

Australian Bred Classes .- For all Dogs or Bitches over 6 months

old on the first day of the Show and bred in Australasia. Limit Classes.—For Dogs or Bitches over 6 months old on the first day of the Show which have not won four First Prizes in Aus-tralian Bred, Limit or Open Classes at any Shows or Championship Parades before the morning of the first day of the Show.

Open Classes.—Open to all over 6 months old on the first day of the Show. No prize winner is debarred from competing, but subject to cases in which the Class is limited by height or weight.

SPECIAL NOTIFICATION.—No Dog will be allowed to be benched or be admitted to the Judging Ring unless in possession of the Society's Veterinary Certificate for the current year.

The Society's Veterinary Surgeon will be in attendance from 8 a.m. till 9.30 a.m. on Thursday, 15th September, and again on Thursday, 22nd September, at the same time, for the purpose of examining the dogs.

In each Class the prizes are:-First prize, £1; second prize 10/-; third prize, Card.

A Blue Ribbon and Card will be awarded to all Challenge Prizewinners.

#### **GENERAL FARM PRODUCE.**

Exhibits in this Section must be staged before 9 a.m. on Thursday, 15th September, but in order to avoid disappointment, exhibitors are advised to forward their produce earlier in the week.

Exhibitors must lodge a statutory declaration when making their entries that exhibits of Wheat, Oats, Barley and Maize represent a quantity of not less than 150 bushels, that exhibits of Chaff and Hay represent a quantity of not less than 10 tons, and that they were produced by the exhibitor during the preceding 12 months. (See back of entry form.)

Exhibitors in this Section will not be allowed to take more than one prize with the same variety of produce in any one class.

2. Societies may compete in all the subdivisions mentioned in the scale of points at the foot hereof, or may, at their discretion, delete any part or parts carrying points not exceeding 100. All Societies must, however, compete in Section 13—Effective Arrangement. No Society will partake in the distribution of the prize money unless its exhibits are awarded 450 points or over. A list of the deleted sections or subsections (if any) to be delivered to the Society's office on the Show Grounds at least 48 hours before the judging is timed to commence. Prize money will be divided on the basis that the percentage of points actually scored bears to the number of points competed for.

3. Exhibits entered for the Agricultural Societies' Competitiona are not eligible to compete in the general classes. Exhibitors wishing to compete in open classes must forward a separate exhibit.

4. Each exhibit will be allowed from 850 to 1000 square feet of floor space.







2. Should the Judge deem fit, he may order fresh sheep at any time during the trial.

3. Each dog to be allowed a maximum time of Fifteen Minutes from ringing of bell after sheep have been turned out.

4. The owner, with his dog, shall stand at a flag, indicated by the Stewards, and shall not release his dog until directed by them.

5. The owner shall not be allowed to assist his dog, either in driving, putting through hurdles, or yarding the sheep, except by signal or word of mouth.

6. During the trial, should owner or dog break any of these Rules, or should the work be so inferior as to demand such a course, or should the dog snap, bite, or attempt to bite, or in any way injure the sheep, the Judge shall cause a bell to be rung, which will note the expiration of the time of the trial, and at the ringing of such bell, the owner shall at once take his sheep to the yarding pen.

7. Any person or persons bringing dogs on the ground and allowing them to run loose, either by mistake or otherwise, except when directed by the Stewards, may be fined the sum of £1.

8. If any owner ill-use his dog, he will be fined  $\pounds 1$ .

9. In the event of any person or persons refusing to pay any fine or fines, they shall be turned off the ground, and shall be disqualified from working a dog at any future Show of this Society.

10. In the above rules, the word "Owner" shall mean the person working a dog.

11. The Judge's decision shall be final.

12. The trial shall take place over such a course as the Council may determine, and any additional tests shall be over the whole or such portion of the said course as they may decide upon.

13. Scale of Points:-Under Command, 20; Steadiness, 10; General Working, 20; Negotiating Obstacles, 30; Style (Cast, 8; Approach, 5; Command of Sheep, 7), 20; Total, 100.


14. In the event of any question or situation arising not provided for in these Rules, the matter in question will be dealt with by the Council, and their decision shall be final and without appeal.

4. If a sheaf touches the cross-bar and goes over, it is to be counted as a successful throw. A sheaf that goes over the bar without touching beats one that touches.

5. The limit man throws first, and other competitors follow on in rotation, after the bar has been raised in accordance with their handicaps.

6. Competitors must state on the entry form their last two years' performances. In the event of a protest against the winner on account of incorrect performances, he must lodge a declaration, signed before a Justice of the Peace, as to the correctness of his performances as set out on the entry form.

7. No entry will be received unless accompanied by fees.

## Special Regulations re Champion Prizes of Australia

(The Gift of the Government of Victoria through the Department of Agriculture).

1. All exhibits to be the *bona fide* property of exhibitors. and produce to be grown or made by the Exhibitor.

2. For Champion Awards to be made, three exhibits must be entered (at least two of which must be duly shown), unless the judge reports that an exhibit (even though alone) is of exceptional merit and worthy of such award. If, however, in the opinion of the judge, none of the exhibits are of sufficient merit, he may withhold the prize altogether.

3. Stallions over 2 years of age must be registered under the Horse Breeding Act, 1919.

4. The prizes to be awarded by judges appointed by the Society.

5. In any case where, in the opinion of the Director of Agriculture, any misstatement has been made regarding any exhibit, the prize shall not be awarded.

6. All exhibits to be subject to General Regulations.

NOTE.—Separate entries are not required for Champion Prizes of Australia.

## **GENERAL REGULATIONS.**

#### ENTRIES.

(Also see Special Notes in Each Section.)

1. Entries will only be received subject to the rules and regulations of the Society, and all exhibits must be the *bona fide property* of the Exhibitor at time of entry, and produce, which must be the growth of the preceding 12 months, must be produced, grown or made by the Exhibitor. except in the case of Agricultural Societies being Exhibitors.

2. No exhibit may be entered in more than one class, except for a sweepstake and a special or champion prize. Where any exhibit has, through oversight, been allowed to compete in more than one class (not being one of the exceptions abovementioned), such exhibit shall, whether awarded a prize or not, be deemed to be ineligible to compete, or to have competed, in any class other than the first in which its name or particulars appear in the Show Catalogue.

3. The Council reserves the right to reject at any time any entry submitted for this exhibition. No disqualified animal shall be allowed to compete for a prize.

4. When a Special Prize is not in a numbered class, a separate entry is not required. No entry can be changed after entries close.

#### CLOSING DATES OF ENTRIES.

5. Applications for stands for harness and saddlery, machinery, and implements, single exhibits, or goods for exhibition only (section 56), must be made (by ordinary letter) on or before Saturday. 2nd July,

After the applications close, positions will be allotted, and a charge will be made for the space granted. Entries of this description of exhibits must afterwards be duly made by letter before Saturday, 13th, August, 1927, at 12 o'clock noon.

6. Entries (Arena events excepted) must be made in writing on forms supplied by the Society, and (including those by post) must be in the hands of the Secretary, at his office, Temple Court, 422 Collinsstreet, Melbourne, on or before Saturday, 13th August, 1927, at 12 o'clock noon. Entries for Arena Contests and Judging Wool-Classing and Milking Competitions, will be received on or before Saturday, 27th August, at 12 o'clock noon. Entry fees must accompany each entry. Entries for competitions are limited to three exhibits in Cattle and two exhibits in Sheep and Swine (except where specified otherwise), which exhibits must be brought before the judge.

#### AGE OF EXHIBITS.

7. The date of birth of live stock must be set forth in each entry. Any infringement of this rule will disqualify the exhibit. The Society's Veterinary Surgeon's decision to be final on all matters regarding age.

8. The breeding year dates from 1st August in each year for horses, and 1st July in each year for cattle. Australasian bred shall mean bred in any of the Australian States or New Zealand.

#### QUALIFICATIONS FOR ENTRY.

9. All male animals competing in the breeding classes must be visibly entire, and any marks of spaying on females shall disqualify them from competing in such classes.

10. All sheep over 18 months old, except where otherwise specified, must have been shorn since 1st July in the preceding year. The date on which sheep were shorn to be stated on entry form. Any sheep infested with ticks or lice are liable to disqualification. The month and year of lambing of all sheep under  $2\frac{1}{2}$  years old must also be stated.

#### VETERINARY CERTIFICATES.

11. All Stallions over 2 years of age must be registered under the Horse Breeding Act, 1919. All Mares, 3 years old or over, entered in Sections 1 to 10 inclusive, must first have obtained a certificate of soundness from a Government Veterinary Officer. Government Veterinary Officer will stamp all Entry Tickets for Stallions and Mares "Pass to Ring." These stamped tickets must be produced to the Steward before entering the Arena. Stallions and Mares will be examined by Government Veterinary Officers on the Show Grounds on Wednesday, 14th September, commencing at 10 a.m. Judges are particularly requested to satisfy themselves, as far as possible, regarding the soundness of all other horses, before awarding the prize, and to avoid giving prizes to animals showing symptoms of hereditary diseases. A Judge may consult the Society's Veterinary Surgeon if he deem it expedient: / No protests on veterinary grounds will be received.

#### THE EXHIBITION.

12. The Exhibition will be open to the public daily from 9 a.m.; admission, 2/-. Admission to main grand stand, 3/- extra; "Chirnside" and "Cliff" grand stands, 2/- extra; and to the seated reserves, 1/- extra.

The charge for admission to the grounds for children is 6d.

13. Members, on presentation of their badges, and members' ladies, on presentation of their tickets, will be admitted free to the grounds and grandstands subject to such regulations as the Council may make.

Children of Members, up to 14 years of age, will be permitted to enter the Jubilee grand stand on payment of 1/- each.

#### ENTRY TICKETS.

14. Entry tickets w be issued about a week before the Show opens. The entry ticket of each exhibit shall state the number of its box, stall, pen, or stand, as the case may be, which shall correspond with its number in the official catalogue, and if the Jox, stall or pen be not occupied by such exhibit by noon on the first day of the Show, the accommodation reverts to the Society. The entry ticket must be produced at the gate, when it will admit the exhibit and attendant to the grounds. It must be retained, and again produced when the exhibit leaves the yards. Attendants' passes will be issued by the Secretary at the Show Grounds after 10 a.m. on Wednesday, 14th September, 1927.

#### PENALTY FOR NON-EXHIBITION.

15. In order to prevent the non-exhibition of animals which have been entered for the Show, thus causing unnecessary preparations, expense and disarrangement of the Show Yard, any person making an entry will be subject to a fine of  $\pounds 2$  for each horse entry not exhibited, of  $\pounds 1$ for each entry of cattle not exhibited, and 10/- for each entry of sheep or pigs not exhibited, unless a certificate under the hand of the Exhibitor or his authorised agent be lodged with the Secretary of the Society before the day of the Exhibition, certifying that such non-exhibition is caused either by—(1) The death of the animal or animals; or (2) contagious or infectious diseases (confirmed by the explanatory certificate of a veterinary surgeon); or (3) by its becoming ineligible for the class in which it has been entered, or other reasonable cause. The non-payment of such fines to debar entrants from taking part in any future Exhibitions of the Society.

#### EXHIBITS DUE AT SHOW GROUNDS.

16. Wheat exhibits must be lodged at the Show Grounds on or before Monday, 8th August, at 5 p.m. Wine exhibits must be lodged at the Show Grounds on or before Saturday, 20th August, 1927, at 5 p.m. Fleeces and Skins on or before Saturday, 3rd September, 1927, at 5 p.m. Cows entered for the Butter Fat Test must be in their places before 4 p.m. on Sunday, 11th September. Cows entered for the Special Production Prize (Class 259) must be in their places before noon on Thursday, 8th September. Exhibits of Women's Work must be lodged at the Grounds before 2 p.m. on Tuesday, 13th September. Machinery, Implements and Miscellaneous Exhibits (Section 56) must be in their places before 6 p.m. on Wednesday, 14th Sep-tember. Carriages, etc. (Section 45), must be in their places in the yards before 9 a.m. on Thursday, 15th September. 1927. Table Vegetables must be benched before 10 a.m. on Friday, 16th September. Business Turnouts to be in the grounds before 10 a.m. on Friday, 16th September. Horses entered for Arena events will only be required to be in the yards on the day or days on which they perform. (If a request be made on the entry form, the Society will endeavour to provide boxes for horses entered for contests.) Poultry, Pigeons and Cage Birds must be in their places in the yards before 9 p.m. on Tuesday, 20th September, 1927. Dogs entered in Division "A" must

be benched before 9.30 a.m. on Thursday, 15th September; those en-tered in Division "B" before 9.30 a.m. on Thursday, 22nd September. Cats must be benched before 9.30 a.m. on Tuesday, 20th September. Sheep must be penned before 9 a.m. on Monday, 19th September. All other exhibits must be in their places in the yards by 9 a.m. on Thursday, 15th September, 1927.

17. Exhibits will not be received in the yards after the date and hour specified. No exhibit, whether for competition or not, will be admitted to the Show Grounds unless duly entered as an exhibit.

18. All exhibits must be placed where directed by the Secretary, and (except live stock, in accordance with Regulation 39) must not be removed from their classes during the Exhibition without the written consent of the Secretary being first obtained.

#### REMOVAL OF DISAPPROVED EXHIBITS.

19. The Owner or Exhibitor of any exhibit or stand of exhibits dis-approved of as an exhibit by the Council of the Society, must, immediately upon notice to that effect, remove such exhibit or stand of exhibits from the Society's Grounds. The Council reserves the right to decline to receive entries in future years from any person who exhibits stock that is not up to a satisfactory standard, that is not exhibited in reasonable Show condition, or that is not given proper attention during the Show.

#### PRECAUTIONS RE MACHINERY.

20. All machinery in motion shall either be securely fenced or be in such position or of such construction as to be equally safe to every person as it would be if it were securely fenced.

#### PASSES FOR ATTENDANTS.

21. As many men as the Council may deem necessary will be allowed into the yards free to take charge of exhibits, and passes will be issued to all such on application to the Secretary.

#### RUGGING OF EXHIBITS.

22. Exhibits must not be rugged during the hours the Show is open to the public, and horse-boxes must not be locked during those hours. Exhibitors will be liable to a fine of ten shillings for every infringement of this regulation.

#### CLEANING OF STALLS.

23. Exhibitors must keep the stalls allotted to their animals clean and give proper attention to their stock right through the Show.

Any Exhibitor or his employee putting manure out of a box, stall, or pen, or putting out a trough, or cleaning out an alley way after 8.30 a.m. on a Show day shall be liable to a fine of ten shillings. No advertisement or notice (except ordinary sale notice) is permitted

on any stall or building.

25

#### PARADES.

24. When ordered by the Stewards, all prize-taking horses and cattle must be taken out on parade in accordance with the printed programme. Exhibitors shall be subject to a fine of ten shillings in each case in which the order of the Stewards to parade is not obeyed, and shall be liable

to forfeit any prize awarded to their exhibit or exhibits. All horses and cattle parading must wear exhibit numbers. No ribbons will be permitted on exhibits except those won during the show.

#### AWARDING OF PRIZES.

25. It shall be the duty of the Stewards to prevent any person interfering with the Judge, and, if necessary, to order the removal of such offender from the yards. Persons in charge must on no account leave their respective exhibits, or address the Judge, unless authorised by the Stewards of the section<sup>\*</sup> in which they are competing. Competitors not ready at the appointed time of adjudication will be liable to disqualification.

26. The Judge may award a second or third prize, instead of a first one, or may withhold a prize altogether, where the exhibits are not of sufficient merit.

27. The Judge is requested to make a reserve number of the exhibit next in merit beyond those to which the prizes are awarded in every class where the number of the entries exceeds the number of prizes offered, if, in his opinion, the exhibit is of sufficient merit to deserve a prize; he is also requested to give commendations when deserved.

28. The Judge shall award Reserve Champion Rosettes in all Horse, Cattle, Sheep and Swine Sections in which Champion awards are made, and the animal second in the class to the Champion shall be allowed to compete for the Reserve Championship.

29. Any Exhibitor or Attendant refusing to attach the Prize Card to any exhibit to which a prize is awarded, and keep the same on the exhibit during the hours of exhibition, or any exhibitor or attendant altering a Prize Card in any way, will, on proof thereof to the Council, forfeit all prizes awarded to such exhibit during the Show, and may be disqualified from again competing, and no exhibitor will be allowed to display any Ribbon or Prize Card on his exhibit, stall, or stand, in addition to those issued by the Society for the year. One Prize Card only is issued for each prize won.

30. Stock exhibits wearing bridles or head stalls with their names or the names of their owners displayed thereon are liable to disqualification.

31. The Council may withhold any prize when fraudulent or erroneous statements have been made regarding an exhibit, or when exhibits have been tampered with or improperly dealt with, and may also withhold all prizes awarded to Exhibitors who have been guilty of false statements in relation to any of their exhibits; and Exhibitors guilty of false entries or statements, or found guilty of tampering with or improperly dealing with their exhibits, may be debarred from again exhibiting, and, if Members, shall be liable to expulsion from the Society. Exhibitors must, if required by the Council, make a statutory declaration regarding their entries.

32. Any person insulting or interfering with a Judge during the Show will be subject to removal from the yards; and the prizes, if any, awarded to such person may be forfeited.

33. Cheques for prizes at the Show will be passed for payment at the Council meeting on Tuesday, 18th October, 1927, one week after which date they will be payable.

34. Any prize or prizes awarded at this Show, and left unclaimed for six months, may be forfeited and cancelled by the Finance Committee of the Society.

#### PROTESTS.

35. Protests against awards must be lodged with the Secretary, in writing, before 12 noon on the day after such awards are made, with a deposit of £1 sterling, which will be forfeited to the Society if the protest be found, on due consideration, to be unfounded or frivolous.

36. Should any exhibit, having gained a prize, be disqualified, the next on the list does not necessarily obtain the same prize. The Council, with or without the advice of the Judge, shall decide the question.

37. All persons exhibiting shall accept the decision of the Judge appointed by the Society as to the merits of their exhibits, and in the case of protests, alleging infringement of the regulations, the decision, of the Council shall be accepted as final and without appeal.

#### REMOVAL OF EXHIBITS.

38. No exhibit (except Live Stock, in accordance with Regulation 39) shall be removed from the Exhibition until 5 p.m. on Saturday, 24th September, when all exhibits may be removed. Horses, Cattle, Sheep and Swine may be removed from the grounds on Friday, 23rd September, after 5 p.m.

39. Any exhibit of Horses or Cattle may be removed from the yards each day of the Exhibition after 5 p.m. on depositing with the Secretary an approved cheque for £10 (or for any exhibit of Dogs, £2), as a guarantee that the animal will be returned to the yards next morning before 10 a.m. In the event of the animal not being returned before the time specified, the deposit, together with all the prize money (if any) it has won, will be liable to forfeiture; but on the animal's return each day the cheque will be refunded to the Exhibitor.

#### WATER AND FORAGE.

40. Water will be provided in the yards for Live Stock and for the working of machinery, but exhibitors using gas engines, suction gas plants and refrigerators must provide water storage tanks on their stands, and not permit water to run to waste. Exhibitors of stock will be required to provide their own forage (which can be purchased in the yards at Melbourne prices), but no feed must be stacked in any of the Stock Pavilions. Exhibitors of machinery will be required to provide their own fuel (which must be coke or wood, no coal being allowed), and materials necessary to enable them to comply with the regulations.

#### PRIVILEGES.

41. The successful tenderers for the privilege of photographing exhibits have the exclusive right thereto, with the reservation that the Council may allow the Press to take photographs of exhibits for the purposes of illustration.

42. The privilege of distributing trade lists, advertisements, or other documents is restricted exclusively to Exhibitors at their respective stands. Any person infringing this regulation will incur expulsion from the yards. Any Exhibitor desiring to distribute trade lists, &c., must lodge a deposit of f1 with the Secretary before the Show opens, to be returned after the Show is closed if this regulation has been complied with, and to be forfeited if it has not.

#### CARE OF EXHIBITS.

43. Every reasonable care will be taken of exhibits, but no responsibility will be incurred by the Society.

#### USE OF PENS AND STALLS.

44. All exhibits of Live Stock, for which boxes, stalls, or pens are provided, have the use of such accommodation free for one week (and in the case of oversea exhibits, for a fortnight) before the Show opens, but they must be removed from the grounds within one week after the hast day of sales, or a charge will be made.

#### EXHIBITS AT SHOW GROUNDS.

45. The Society's carter will receive competitive exhibits of produce, poultry, dogs, &c., that are addressed to the Show Grounds Siding, and place the entries in their respective sections. The greatest care will be taken of the exhibits; but the Society will not be responsible for any accident, mistake, loss or damage from whatever cause arising, the exhibits being at the sole risk of the Exhibitor. For the carting of stock feed and non-competitive exhibits, &c., to any part of the ground the following charges will be made, for which receipts will be given:—Up to 1 cwt., 6d.; up to 3 cwt., 1/-; up to 6 cwt., 1/6; up to 10 cwt., 2/-; up to 15 cwt., 2/6; and each additional 5 cwt., 6d.

46. In order to facilitate the unloading and loading of Stock at the Show Grounds Siding, the grounds will be lighted at night, and the Society will engage a corps of stock assistants, who will meet every stock train.

All stock assistants will be numbered, and will not approach the trucks unless requested by exhibitors.

They will be permitted to charge Exhibitors not more than 9d. for each "lead" (one or more animals) of stock between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m., nor more than 1/- for each "lead" between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m.

#### VEHICLES OTHER THAN EXHIBITS.

47. Vehicles and motors other than listed exhibits will not be permitted to enter the grounds.

A paddock for parking motor-cars and other vehicles is provided. Charges-Motors or Vehicles, 2/-.

Vehicles and motors are not permitted to be driven indiscriminately about the grounds, but must proceed directly to their destinations.

## **Railway Regulations.**

IMPORTANT NOTICE .- Exhibitors desiring to have their stock conveyed by rail from the Show Grounds on Friday evening must order their trucks through the Show Grounds Station-master before 12 noon on Wednesday, 21st September.

(Exhibits are consigned direct to Show Siding at Society's Grounds, and Exhibitors are particularly requested to send in their applications for trucks at once to the local Station-master, or to the Live Stock Agent. Railway Department, Melbourne, or through their own selling agents.)

1. The undermentioned conditions shall be applicable in respect of agricultural machines and implements, machinery, produce, live stock (including dogs, poultry and other birds), buggies, motor-cars, drays, waggons, and other goods of a like nature, sent for exhibition to Agricultural Shows.

They may also, by special arrangement with the General Passenger and Freight Agent, be made operative in respect of :--

Agricultural machinery, sent for field trials.

Ploughs, sent for ploughing matches. Horses, sent for horse parades.

2. The exhibits will, in the ordinary course, be carried in goods or cattle trucks, by goods or mixed trains; but valuable animals may, if it be convenient to the Commissioners, be carried in horse boxes by passenger trains, and charged the same as if loaded in cattle trucks and forwarded by goods trains. Each 3 stalls in "F" or "FF" to be regarded as equivalent to one full cattle truck.

3. When the exhibits are consigned on the forward journey, the consignor will require to declare, on the consignment note therefor, that they are for exhibition, specifying the Show for which they are intended, and the waybill must be endorsed accordingly.

The original freight charges shall be imposed and prepaid in respect of the forward journey in all cases, except that valuable animals carried by passenger trains in accordance with clause 2 will be charged goods train rates, whether loaded in horse boxes or cattle trucks.

4. On the return journey any exhibits, or portion thereof, which are certified by the Secretary of the Show as having been exhibited, and not sold, will be carried "free" to the station whence they were forwarded, provided the journey is completed at any time within one month from the date of despatch on the forward journey. A certificate in the approved form must be handed in when the exhibits are consigned, and such certificate must be attached to the waybill.

If a greater number of vehicles be used for the carriage of exhibits on the return journey than was used on the forward journey, ordinary freight charges will be imposed in respect of exhibits carried in the additional vehicles.

All exhibits, or part thereof, which have been sold, or are not accompanied by the aforesaid certificate, will be subject to the ordinary freight charges on the return journey, and such charges shall, in all cases, be made "to pay."

#### RAILWAY REGULATIONS.

5. Exhibits, accompanied by the aforesaid certificate, may be forwarded on from one Show to another, subject to the freight charges, as prescribed in clause 3 of this division, being prepaid, and when the final destination is reached, they may be returned "free" to the original despatching station, conditionally on the observance of the provisions of clause 4 of this division. If, however, in proceeding to another Show, such exhibits be returned over any portion of the line in respect of which the full freight charges have been paid on the forward journey, the exhibits may be sent free over such portion of the line.

6. All exhibits are carried solely at the risk of the owner, and must be loaded and unloaded by or at the expense of the consignors or consignees.

7. Owners of stock going to or returning from Shows may be allowed free carriage of fodder, as specified hereunder, if it be loaded in the trucks with the animals :--

> 1 cwt. for each horse or head of cattle each way. 20 lbs for each pig or sheep each way.

8. Exhibits from the Department of Agriculture—viz., wheat, straw in bulk, olive oil, wine, honey, &c., fruit (preserved), charts, &c., fibres, including flax, hemp (dressed and undressed), willows, manures, vegetable oil, eggs, also the necessary marquees, poles, and pegs, tables, trestles, and fittings forwarded to the various Agricultural Shows in the State, shall be forwarded free.

9. Consignors should give not less than four (4) days' notice to the station-master of the number and description of live-stock trucks, and 48 hours for other trucks, &c., required to load exhibits.

10. Judges appointed to act at Agricultural Shows will, on production of an approved certificate, be granted return tickets at Holiday Excursion Fares.

11. If a full sheep-truck load of sheep, or a full cattle-truck load of horses, cattle, or pigs has been paid for on the forward journey, and the whole of the stock has been returned "free," in accordance with the provisions of clause 4 of this division, one stock attendant in respect of each truck will be granted a refund of the return fare paid by him. He must

travel in the truck or in the van of a goods train with the stock, and must provide himself with a copy of Form P69, duly completed by the station-masters at the forwarding and returning stations respectively. A receipt for the refund must be given on the certificate by the attendant, after which it must be forwarded to the Auditor of Receipts as a voucher.
