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

HORSES.

CLYDESDALE MALES.

Mr. John Macdonald, Dee Why, Manly, N.S.W. (Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 84.)

The any age class contained some typical specimens of the breed. Those in the prize list being bred quite on the lines of the modern Clydesdale horse, but, I understand, some good animals entered were unable to be present. This was much to be regretted.

The prize-winning 3-year-old colts were also of outstanding merit, showing plenty of quality. They were certainly bred on the right lines.

Two-year-old colts, in my opinion, were not quite up to expectations, and the quality was only moderate, although I understand some of the good colts did not come forward.

Yearling colts and family groups provided the most promising classes of all, which says a lot for the prospects of the breed. The former contained some fine quality colts that would do credit to any show-yard. Other colts in the class, in my opinion, were over-fed. This is a great mistake when bringing out young stock for the show-yards.

The groups of colts and fillies were indeed very promising, and

contained quite a lot of animals of outstanding merit.


Taking all classes of Clydesdales, I think the Society has every reason to be pleased with the class of stock on exhibition. The breeders are undoubtedly working on the right lines.

CLYDESDALE FEMALES.

There was a fairly good ring of brood mares exhibited, but the first stood out very prominently as a typical Clydesdale mare in every way. The second and third were of a stronger type, although both very useful.

Dry mares were very well represented. The first was a very evenly. balanced mare, with plenty of size and quality, and splendidly set on her legs. The second and third were also two very good mares, but not so evenly balanced as the first prize mare.

The winner in the Filly Class was very well grown, showing lots of substance and quality, and standing on a splendid set of legs. She should furnish into a first class mare. The second and third were also good


fillies, but not so classy as the winner.

There was a very strong ring of exhibits in the two-year-old Filly class. The first was a very well balanced filly, showing a lot of quality and character. The second was much bigger, but not so evenly made. The third was a very nice quality filly, with a good set of legs, but rather slack in places.

There was a very large ring of good yearling fillies. The first was very well grown, with plenty of substance and quality, and a lot of character. The second and third were both very good indeed, but hardly so well developed as the first prize filly.

I awarded the Champion Ribbon to the first prize brood mare, she, in my opinion, being the best female exhibited in the Clydesdale section.

The Reserve Championship fell to the winning dry mare, as I considered her next best to the broad mare.

There were only two classes out of the eight that were at all well represented, and only a few exhibits in each of these classes up to the standard of a few years ago. I think it would be wise to cut this section out altogether on account of it being so poorly patronised by breeders.

The classes for cavalry and artillery horses were most disappointing, both as regards numbers and quality. This is hard to understand, as I believe the Indian shippers have a large number of horses on hand, and it is to their interest to encourage the breeding of this class of horse, and to show the public what is required.

HACKNEYS, HARNESS HORSES, AND PONIES.

In the Hackney Class for stallions, only two competed, but they were well up to the standard. In the class for females, with the exception of the first prize-winner, they were not so good, and I withheld the third prize altogether.

The classes for pair of cobs and pair of buggy horses had only single entries, but these were of fair quality.


In the single bugor horse classes, both light and heavy, the exhibits were good, and the same remark would apply to the gig horses and the ponies, with the exception of the class for pair of phaeton ponies (12 hands 2 inches and not over 13 hands 2 inches), where the second and third prize pairs were hardly up to Royal Show standard. Taking the ponies on the whole, they were a very good lot, and in many of the classes competition was very close. The heavy and light delivery horses and also the business turnouts were good, and would do credit to any show yard.






Champion Arab Stallien, "Royal" Show, 1918. "BADAWEEN," exhibited by Mr. B. Folliott Sandford,




Champion Thoroughbred Stallion, "Royal" Show, 1918, "MALTAGE," exhibited by Mr. E. A. Reid,




Champion Trotting Stallion, "Royal" Show, 1918. "BONNIE VOYAGE," exhibited by Belmont Stud Farm.








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
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ARENA EVENTS.

I have the honour to report on the following events, which I judged at the recent Royal Show.

Gentlemen's Bending Race.—There were sixteen competitors in this event, and it was keenly contested, and seemed to be appreciated by the public.

Girls' Riding Competition.—The riding in this event was very fair, but the winner stood out from the others, and gave a perfect exhibition. There were eight competitors.

Boys' Riding Competition.—There were six competitors in this class, and a fair exhibition of riding was given.

Ladies' Flag Race.—Sixteen competitors provided a well contested event. Great keenness was shown, and the event seemed interesting to the public.

Ladies' Riding Competition (Astride).—A very even class, all the seventeen competitors showed proficiency in riding.

The Ladies' Bending Race.—The eighteen competitors showed great keepness. It was a good display, and was appreciated by the public.

The "Kodak" High Jump.—The seven competitors gave a splendid exhibition of jumping. "Musician" and "Butterfly" divided after clearing 7ft. 1½in. This event attracted great interest.

The "Craig, Williamson" Water Jump.—The three competitors in this event gave a rather poor display. The ground under the water was very boggy, and the horses seemed frightened to jump on the second occasion. One horse fell on landing.

Ladies' Riding Competition (Side-saddle).—The riding was good, but there were only two competitors.

Flag Race. — Eighteen competitors provided a good display. Much interest was shown in this event, which was very keenly contested.

High Jump.—A rather poor display of jumping was given by the dozen competitors in this event, only 6ft. 5½in. being cleared. Most of the horses appeared to be sore.

CATTLE.

SHORTHORNS.

This year's Show will be remembered by the high merit of many of the bulls exhibited, but, in my opinion, the females generally were not up to the very high standard of previous years. The first prize aged bull, who stood out in his class, and was also Champion of the Show, is a very lengthy, thick-fleshed animal, showing great quality and a robust constitution. There was an excellent display in the 2-year old class, including several young bulls of high standard. The first prize went to a "Clifton" bred bull that shows promise of developing into a future champion. The second prize animal in this class also showed great character and quality. Numerically, and in regard to quality, the yearling class was, as usual, the strongest brought into the ring, the first three prize-takers being youngsters of exceptional quality and style, and likely to catch the eye of judges later on.

If the first prize youngster in the bull calf class develops as he promises, he should be an acquisition in the future to one of our studs.

The female Champion is a useful, stylish cow, but, in my opinion, not quite up to the high standard of previous Shows.

The 2-year-old class did not fill as well this year as usual, the first prize going to a nice quality, even-fleshed heifer, who was also Reserve Champion.

The yearling class was well filled with a very even lot of youngsters, showing plenty of breeding and quality.

Only a few were brought out in the calf class, the first prize going to a nice white heifer of beautiful quality.

The various groups were quite the most interesting exhibit in the whole section, and the Society is to be thanked for the encouragement being given to these classes.

HEREFORDS.

It is six years since I visited the Melbourne Royal Show, and I was very much struck with the improvements made in that time. I must also congratulate the Society on its stock parade, which was carried out in first-class style, the best I have seen at any of the Royal Shows of the Commonwealth.

The Hereford classes which I judged would hold their own in any show yard in Australia. I had the pleasure of seeing the Herefords at the last Sydney, and also at the recent Brisbane Shows, and though the Melbourne entries were not so numerous, they would have held their own with them.


I think I may make a suggestion that in cases where the classes are so strong that after first, second and third prizes are awarded, commended and highly commended cards should be added.

In class for bull three years old and over, "Bundoran Eclipse" won the first prize and championship. He is a very massive, heavy fleshed animal, with a good coat of hair and very nicely marked. The second and third were also very nice animals.


The two-year-old bull, "Lloyd George," first prize and reserve champion, is a very fine evenly-fleshed bull, but lacking the substance and coat of the champion. The second and third were both worthy animals.

In the one-year-old class, Mr. J. A. Beattie showed a remarkably fine yearling, which gained the first prize—a bull with a good future ahead of him, a real typical Hereford. Mr. Yelland's second prize bull is also a fine animal.




Champion Shorthorn Bull, "Royal" Show, 1918.

Mr. Yelland showed a particularly handsome heifer in the yearling class. She appears to be a coming champion.

Victoria may indeed be very proud of its Herefords.

MILKING SHORTHORNS AND RED POLLED CATTLE.

The males in the milking shorthorn section were hardly up to the general standard, but the bulls placed 1st and 2nd in the aged class were of good quality, though somewhat heavily fleshed.

Fourteen two-year-olds of good quality came forward, but they were mixed so far as size was concerned.

There was a large entry in the one-year-old class, and as the exhibits were uniformly good, they were rather hard to place.

Only six five-year-old cows came forward, the one I placed first being of good dairy type, though somewhat on the aged side.

The two-year-old heifers were not up to the general standard, the one-year-olds being much better. Five particularly good yearlings were shown.

Practically all of the Red Polled bulls were of very good quality. The same remark applies to the cows and heifers.

JERSEYS.



The females in the Jersey section were really excellent, but the bulls were not as good as some that I had seen in Melbourne previously. This condition is in keeping with Jersey stock throughout Australia, females invariably being better than males.


I would like to draw attention to the disabilities experienced by judges on account of the break in judging overnight. I think this innovation was very unwise. The whole of the judging should be confined to one day.

Owing to the ring being dismantled during the second day of the judging, a reasonable focus of the cattle was not obtainable. This added to the difficulties of judging.

I also think that the utility points in the type and utility classes should be withheld from the judge until the type points are awarded.

In the Guernsey section, there were few competitors, generally only a couple of entries in each class, and these were not up to R.A.S. standard, except the aged bull, which was a very fine specimen of the breed, being good in colour, type, and constitution.


In the Holstein-Friesian section, I would recommend cutting out the name "Holstein," as nearly all Herd Societies have decided that "Friesian" is the proper designation of these fine producers. This breed, also, were few in numbers, except in the yearling class. The aged bull was a fine specimen of the breed, his only weakness being a little coarseness in the head. There were 3 or 4 fine yearlings showing quality, type and milk production. The aged cow was a very fine animal, and showed a very fine balanced vessel of great size and evenness for a cow of her age. The other representative of the breed that "stood out" was the 2-year-old heifer—a heifer of good type, great quality, and very even all over—in fact, one very hard to fault.

There were plenty of competitors, but if the prize-winners were taken out and one or two more, they were surely not a good representation of the dairy cattle of Victoria, and if it be decided to carry on this section I would recomend debarring all cattle entered in a stud book or eligible for entry, as these cattle are catered for in the pure-breed sections.


All the entries, except one—a Guernsey—were pure Ayrshires or Ayrshire grades. It might be as well to try a class or two for Ayrshire grades and a class or two for other grades, to see if it would induce other breeds to be represented.


Champion Ayrshire Cow. "Royal" Show, 1918.

CHAMPION BUTTER FAT TEST.

Messrs. P. Rankin Scott and R. T. Archer, Melbourne. (The awards in this Class will be found on page 110.)

Prejudice or apathy on the part of the dairy stock owner is gradually becoming less apparent, resulting in an increase in the number of competitors in this class. Herd-testing has long since passed the experimental stage, and become a necessity as far as the up-to-date breeder of dairy cows is concerned. Good fat producers should be the aim of the breeder. A competitive test, such as this one, should tend to promote a healthy rivalry, and assist in developing added interest towards the attainment of that object. The result of the test was on the whole satisfactory. Eleven cows competed, consisting of six Jerseys and five Ayrshires. Three Jerseys gained 1st, 2nd and 3rd places, with an Ayrshire close up, in yield of fat, to the 3rd Jersey cow. This test demonstrated that it is possible to combine both fat producing capabilities and show characteristics in the same animal, the winning cow of the test being also a champion in the show ring.

A few words of comment might be given as regards the actual result of the test in order to illustrate the fact that the yields of fat were of a fairly high grade, four of the cows producing an average fat yield of 2.42, 2.32, 2.08, and 2.05 lbs. per day. The four cows coming next in order of merit producing an average fat yield of 1.909, 1.903, 1.903, and 1.900 lbs. per day. Yields of butter fat of over 2 lbs. per day would be welcomed by the average dairy farmer.

The results of the test were higher on the average than those obtained last year.

Anything that can be done to increase interest in this phase of dairying should be done, and this butter fat competition at the Royal Agricultural Show brings the question prominently under the notice of many breeders who would not be otherwise interested.

FAT CATTLE.

The exhibits of Fat cattle at the recent Royal Agricultural Show were very numerous, and of excellent quality. Shorthorns predominating. This splendid breed of beef cattle is very hard to beat in the show ring,

especially from a butcher's point of view. The Shorthorns, if not overfat, weigh so well in the most valuable parts.

In my opinion, there were two exhibits that stood right out from the others, namely, the first prize single ox in the open class, and the first prize winner in the class for the single cow or heifer. Both these cattle were of exceptional quality, and weighed very heavily.

The following are the authenticated weights of some of the fat cattle exhibited:—Class 272—Pair of fat oxen, any age, 1st prize pair averaged 1464 lbs. Class 273—Pair of fat oxen, bred by exhibitor, any age, 1st prize pair averaged 1260 lbs. Class 276—Fat ox, 1596 lbs. Class 281—Fat cow or heifer: 1st prize heifer, 1344 lbs.; 2nd prize heifer, 1150 lbs.


SHEEP.

LINCOLN RAMS.

The Lincoln rams which were included in the prize list were a good all-round lot, many being typical sheep, with a number of very good sheep

just behind them; a good many of the rest were entered more with the idea of selling than getting into the prize list in competition such is usual at a Royal Show. The winner in the 3-year-old class, which was subsequently awarded the championship, was a ram of great substance, with

good constitution, and carrying a weighty even fleece of good sire's wool, The second and third prize rams were well and evenly covered with good wool, but were a little short in the leg, and were lacking in size and length of frame.

The 2-year-old class was a large one. The winner was a big, well-shaped sheep, showing good constitution, with a fleece of good wool well put on. He was awarded the reserve championship. Some of the others mentioned carried very good character fleeces, but had not the frame and constitution of the winner.

The first prize-takers in the class for pair of 2-year-old rams had a splendid character of Lincoln wool, weighty and well put on, but they lacked somewhat in frame. This was a large class, and contained some

good sheep, but they were generally on the small side.

The winners of the Sires' Memorial Cup were well developed, and carried beautiful fleeces. The ram should ultimately turn out well.

The yearling class was also a large one; those securing prizes were of good size, and some of them should develop into very good rams.


The first prize yearling rams in the pair class were very big sheep, and carried even fleeces of very nice wool.

I desire to record my appreciation of the work of the stewards and exhibitors, which enabled the judging to be finished in the afternoon. I was a little sorry the judging could not be commenced in the morning.

LINCOLN EWES.

The Lincoln ewes, taken as a whole, were fair, but in previous years I have seen better, although some of them were very good. Richardson

Bros.' champion ewe was near to perfection. She was a very symmetrical. sheep, with a well-sprung rib, short neck, good head, and good bone, with a bright, lustrous fleece, broad lock of great density, and had she been a little better on point of shoulder and under the brisket, I would say she was the best ewe I had ever judged. Taken all round, Richardson's sheep were very fine. Mr. Walter Oliver also exhibited some really good sheep; some of them were really better than they looked at the Royal Show, because they had been exhibited at previous shows, and had lost their bloom. Mr. Hermiston's ewes, in the class with lambs at foot, were really good, considering they were rearing a lamb. The Christies were well represented with some good sheep, and although they were not amongst the first prize-winners, they were not disgraced. Some of the other competitors penned some good sheep, but there were a good many exhibits that were not up to the standard one would expect to find at the Some breeders run a long way too much after wool, and neglect the carcase, and if they will be advised by me, they will never use a sire unless he has a good carcase. A good many of the sheep I handled were too long in the neck, and flat sided, therefore weak in constitution, The breeders themselves know that what I am writing is correct, therefore they should cull heavily, and use only sires that have a well-sprung rib, good loin, short neck, a masculine head (but not too big), and be sure he has good bone. When all these points have been fulfilled, attention may then be paid to the wool, but it is no use piling on wool when you have no carcase underneath. A sire's wool should be stronger than a ewe's wool. He should have a broad, even lock, nicely serrated from the skin right out to the tip. He should not be too coarse on the thigh, nor yet too soft on the shoulder, under the brisket, and under the jaws. He should have a good forelock of sound wool; his legs should be well set on, and he should have good carriage. If all our breeders paid attention to the points I have mentioned, a big improvement would soon be found in the Lincolns at the "Royal."




In the class for ram, 2½ years old and over, there were sheep of exceptional merit. Both champion and reserve champion being first and second in this class. The winning ram was, in my opinion, a true specimen of the breed, having a neat sire's head, with a nice tinge of blue, denoting good constitution, broad shoulders, a deep chest, a good loin and rump coming well out. He was covered with a fleece of really typical English Leicester wool, of good length, showing character and lustre. The second and reserve champion was a sheep of great weight, with a good fleece, but his head was too pale, and large, resembling a Romney Marsh.

In the class for ram, under $2\frac{1}{2}$ years, the winning ram—a South Australian sheep—was of exceptional length, which is a thing to be aimed at in breeding. I find that in most cases English Leicesters are a bit short. The second prize winner was a good sheep, but his fleece was rather thin. The remainder were fair sheep, but on the small side.

The strongest class of the section was for ram under 1½ years, and this gave me more thought than all the rest. The winners were well-grown, and decidedly of one type, showing that breeders are alive to the type now in demand. They showed a blue head and had no rust on the legs.


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The pens of 2 rams provided another strong class of good breedy sheep, but in some cases not too well matched, having one well grown and another small sheep. The main thing in pairs is evenness and type.

The same may be said of the ewes. The champion was selected from the "ewe, any age," class, with a lamb at foot. She was a ewe of great length, with a perfect head, nice forelock, and blue tinge, with typical Leicester wool. The reserve champion was selected from the ewe over 2½ years. Both champions were South Australian sheep.

Ewes under 11/2 also provided a strong class, and may be described

as were the rams of the same age.

BORDER LEICESTERS.

Mr. D. Porter, "Riverlea," Tallarook.

In all the classes, with two exceptions, the competition was strong, more especially amongst the young sheep, and many good sheep did not get a card. I found some difficulty in placing some of the exhibits, owing to differences in type of wool. I found at least three distinct types, throughout the section.

In the aged ram class, the winner, which also secured the reserve championship, was a very solid handling sheep all over, having good quality wool, but perhaps a little faulty in the head. The second and

third were also good sheep.


In the four-tooth class the first ram stood out over the others. He is The competia stylish breedy sheep, and was awarded the championship. tion in the two-tooth class was very keen, and there was very little to choose between the placed sheep. The pairs of two-tooth rams were also a strong lot, both in regard to type and wool. Entries in the shorn class were not numerous, but the quality was right. The first prize aged ewe was a big solid handling sheep, with a good fleece. She secured the championship. The second ewe was also a good typical ewe. four-tooth class the placed sheep were all good—the winner especially so. She is a very breedy ewe, and later in the day annexed the reserve championship. The two-tooth ewes were a lot of very fine sheep. prize ewe was very even, both in regard to carcase and fleece. petition in the class for pairs of ewes was strong, the first three places were filled with very fine breedy sheep. The ewes with lambs at foot were perhaps not quite up to the standard of some of the other classes. The winners were an even lot. As amongst the rams, the shorn ewe class did not fill well. Three ewes were shown. The winner, which was an easy first, was a nice typical ewe.

ROMNEY MARSH.



The first and second prize sheep and some which secured only a third prize could not be surpassed anywhere, and were shown in good order


There were two classes that were hard to judge under the conditions imposed. These were the classes that specified that exhibits must have been close and evenly shorn at last shearing, and that the date of shearing must be stated. No judge can tell this unless he was present when the sheep were shorn. Some of the sheep were shorn before others had been born. This condition arose owing to the difference in time of lambing in different parts of the Commonwealth. I gave the prize to what I considered the best sheep. I have seen a good deal of this "fairly shorn" business in Riverina amongst merinos.




Champion Border Leicester Ram, "Royal" Show, 1918. "ROSS," exhibited by Mr. H. Hødge, Mansfield.




Champion Border Leicester Ewe, "Royal" Show, 1918, Exhibited by Mr. H. Hodge, Mansfield.




Champion Romney Marsh Ram, "Royal" Show, 1918. "WILLEROO No. 46" exhibited by Mr. Pat Osborne.





I do not think I can add much to my last year's report, unless it is to say that I feel more impressed with the breed as utility sheep, and have no doubt but that they will become popular, especially with farmers, on account of their having large frames, good constitution, and an excellent class of wool to recommend them.

SHROPSHIRES.

Mr. Thomas J. Burbury, Park Farm, Jericho, Tasmania. (Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 118.)

Competition in this section has fallen off considerably in recent years, and the entry at the 1918 show was a small one. There was an absence of the interstate rivalry, which was so much in evidence a few years ago, only one Tasmanian breeder sending sheep forward. This is accounted for, in some instances, by the fact that many of the flock-owners' sons are away at the front "doing their bit," and without their assistance owners have not been able to prepare their exhibits for show.

For the first time since the prize was instituted, the Memorial Cuphas been won by a Victorian flock, viz., that of Messrs. Hawkins and Sons, Shepparton, who exhibited a very well matched trio.

Although the classes were small, some very typical specimens of this splendid mutton breed were penned, notably in the 4-tooth sheep; both the ram and the ewe championships were won by sheep of this age, and in each case were owned by Messrs. Hawkins and Sons. The champion ewe is a particularly neat one, and eventually she won Messrs. Peck and Sons' special prize for the animal showing the truest symmetry in the Shrop-shire classes.


There can be no doubt that when the war is over, and conditions in the frozen meat trade are normal, that the Shropshire will be as much sought after as ever for the production of export fat lambs, for which it is so eminently suitable, and just here it is very satisfactory to note that while some of the older flocks have been dispersed, others are being formed to take their places. These young breeders cannot be too strongly urged to keep a careful record of the breeding of their flocks, and to use none but registered sires.




Champion Shropshire Ram. "Royal" Show, 1918 Exhibited by Messrs. C. H. Hawkins and Sons.




Champion Shropshire Ewe, "Royal" Show, 1918. Exhibited by Messrs. C. H. Hawkins and Sons.




Champion Merino Ram, "Royal" Show, 1918. Exhibited by Mr. Robert Hing.

FLEECES.

A record number of entries was received for this important Section, and although they did not all come to hand in time for judging, 46 entries were staged, comprising 91 fleeces, as against 35 entries and 70 fleeces staged last year.

The Open Merino classes were again the most popular, six entries being received in both ram and ewe classes. The fleeces in these two classes were again exceptionally good, the first prize in both classes going to big, bulky fleeces of robust type, showing splendid staple, good character and condition. In the Merino Rams' fleeces (Class 382), No. 2375, two fleeces weighing 36lbs. 90z. were valued at £3/4/0½d., and secured first prize, second prize going to two fleeces of finer quality, No. 2380, weighing 28lbs. 110z., valued at £2/16/6. In Class 383, Merino Ewes' fleeces, No. 2382 secured first with two fleeces weighing 27lbs. 90z., valued at £2/10/7¾d., the second prize again going to a finer quality wool, No. 2381, two fleeces weighing 22lbs. 30z., valued at £2/2/8¾d.

For the two most valuable Merino Rams' fleeces for owners of less than 3000 sheep, only three entries were received, and five entries in the Merino Ewes' fleece class.

The first prize in the Ram's class (384) went to No. 2389, two very attractive, fine quality fleeces, weighing 21lbs. 10z., valued at £2/4/03/4d., whilst No. 2391 secured first honors in Ewes, with two nice quality, bright fleeces, weighing 17lbs. 70z., valued at £1/18/1d.

In British breeds the most attractive fleeces and most valuable were in the Lincoln classes. Unfortunately the entries were small, two in Rams' class (386), and three in Ewes' class (387). The first prize for Rams went to No. 2397, two heavy cutting fleeces showing good lustre and character, weighing 52lbs. 10z., valued at £2/16/11/4d. The other exhibit in this class, No. 2395, also showed good lustre and character, weighing 41lbs. 110z., valued at £2/5/51/4d. Two very good fleeces in the Ewes' class, No. 2398, showed deep staple and good lustre, secured first prize, weighing 34lbs. 60z., valued at £1/19/101/2d., the second prize going to No. 2401, two fleeces weighing 36lbs. 70z., valued at £1/17/111/2d.

Five entries competed in each of the Leicester classes. In the Rams' class (388) two fleeces, No. 2407, showing deep staple and fairly strong quality, with good character, weighing 34lbs. 110z., and valued at £1/16/10¼, received first prize. These two fleeces were a long way ahead in weight and total value. The second prize fleeces, No. 2403, although showing extra long staple and finer quality, only weighed 28lbs. 150z., and were valued at £1/12/11½. The Ewes' fleeces in class 389 were a fair average lot; first prize was awarded to No. 2409, weighing 25lbs. 50z., and valued at £1/8/4½. The second prize fleeces weighed 22lbs. 40z., valued at £1/6/1¼.

In the Romney Rams' Class (390) No. 2414 was the only exhibit, but prize could be given, as only one fleece was received.

Romney Ewes' Class (391) had three exhibits, first prize going to No. 2418, for two very bright and attractive fleeces, weighing 27lbs. 10z., valued at £1/14/4. No. 2421 running them very close with 25lbs. 120z., valued at £1/13/9½.

The Down classes, Nos. 392 and 393, were represented by two exhibits in each class. No. 2423 secured first prize in rams—weight, 29lbs. 80z. (exceptionally good weight), valued at £1/16/3. In the Ewes, No. 2425 was placed first with 27lbs. of good wool, valued at £1/14/81/4.

Class 394 (two most valuable Crossbred Ewe or Wether fleeces) and Class 395 (two most valuable Crossbred Ewe or Wether fleeces) for owners with less than 3000 sheep were most disappointing, as regards entries, only one exhibit being staged in Class 395, and two in Class 394. Considering the great number of high class crossbred flocks in Victoria, it is rather surprising that more entries are not received in these classes, which would be of great interest to breeders, especially if exhibitors were asked to give the particular cross their exhibit represented.

In the open class, first prize was given to No. 2429 for two very attractive fleeces of half bred quality, weighing 24lbs. 30z., and valued at $£2/1/9\frac{1}{2}$.

The arrangements for handling the fleeces were splendid, and every assistance was given the judges by the Secretary, Stewards and their staff, which enabled them to have the fleeces skirted and valued, and all prize tickets on by 12 o'clock noon on the first day of the Show. The new Government building with its splendid light is an ideal place for showing the fleeces, and it is to be hoped that this exhibit will be placed in this building at future shows.

In addition to the Society's exhibit, the Central Wool Committee kindly sent along a very interesting collection of fleeces, representing the various grades of crossbreds in super and average wools.

The thanks of the Society are due to Goldsbrough, Mort & Co. Ltd., and Australian Mercantile Land & Finance Co. Ltd., who kindly lent expert assistance for skirting and arranging the fleeces, and to Dalgety & Co. Ltd., for supplying skirting tables, also to the following Government Appraisers who came out and helped to value the fleeces:—Messrs. I. Biggin, E. M. Pearce, F. Bennett, F. Purnell and R. Green.

MOST TYPICAL LONGWOOL FLEECE.

Mr. W. J. McCarthy, "Berea," 5 Grandview-grove, Hawthorn.

I interpreted the intention of the donors as meaning the most perfect fleece from a breeder's standpoint, and I made the award accordingly.

The fleece which I placed first (one of two ewe fleeces in exhibit No. 2401) was a splendid fleece of true Lincoln type, very even and full in the lock, showing no sign of stringiness or weakness at the points, and in every respect a very breedy wool. Nos. 2395 (Ram's fleece) and 2398 (Ewe's fleece) in the same class, were also good specimens of the same type as the winning fleece. They showed great lustre, and were only deficient to the winning exhibit in evenness.

Nos. 2375 and 2382, Merino Rams' and Merino Ewes' fleeces respectively, were two excellent exhibits—deep, sound shafty fleeces. No. 2385, Merino Ewes' fleece, commended by me in this class, showed very choice breeding quality and attractive character.

No. 2409, Leicester Ewes' fleece (commended), was a good, bulky, well bred fleece of true Leicester type.

In Romney fleeces, Nos. 2414 (Ram) and 2421 (Ewe) stood out. The latter (commended) particularly being a very true, sound exhibit.

In Downs, Nos. 2423, Rams (commended) and 2425, Ewes, both filled the eye as bold, bulky fleeces of their type, the former being somewhat the truer of the two.

On account of No. 2429 being an exhibit of crossbred fleeces—thoughmagnificent specimens of their class—they could not—under my interpretation of the donor's intention—come under my purview in this competition, and were therefore not considered in the award.


SWINE.

BERKSHIRE PIGS.

The entries in the Berkshire classes were the largest ever seen at a Royal Show, and taking them on the whole, they were probably of better




Champion Berkshire Boar. "Royal" Show, 1918.

quality than formerly. The quality of the boars 15 months and over was much more even than usual, and there was not much between the first and second pigs. The feet of the second boar were rather faulty, but the three prize winners were certainly very creditable boars. The class for boars under 15 months provided the champion. He was almost a perfect boar in every way and was shown in splendid condition. He was very closely followed by the second pig, but the latter was somewhat effeminate in appearance, and did not show himself to the best advantage. He was however a pig that would win almost anywhere else.

The class for boars under 6 months provided one of the biggest classes in the Show and took a long time to judge. The first and second prize winners being pigs well developed for their age. The third pig was a bit younger, and did not carry so much condition, but I think he will be heard of later.

In the sow with litter classes breeders would do well to remember that they get their young pigs too near the maximum age, and then they don't suckle. I had to pass the best sow and litter for this reason, and naturally the owner was very disappointed, until I gave him the reason. The first prize went to a very creditable litter of twelve. This entry was followed very closely by a litter smaller in number, but with a better sow.

In the class for sows 15 months and over, I never saw so many good sows at a Melbourne show before. It was the hardest Class in the Section to judge. There were twenty that would win anywhere else, but the sow placed first was I believe last year's champion, she was followed very closely by the second and third. In the 15 months old and under class there were two in a pen. This congestion made it very difficult to judge, as it did also in the next class where four and five exhibits were often in a single pen. The champion sow was of rare quality and exceptionally good all round. She was exhibited just a little on the fat side. The second and third prize winners were very good sows, but not up to the standard to secure the Reserve Championship from the winning sow in the class for 15 months and over.

In the class for sows under 6 months, I found the winner in a pen in which there were three other exhibits. The three placed sows in this class were very worthy of their prizes.


YORKSHIRES AND TAMWORTHS.



A good percentage of the Yorkshires were very good, and I had a hard task to separate them in some of the classes. There is great difficulty in judging in this class of stock, as one cannot arrange say, six or eight of the best exhibits side by side. And it entails much walking and trying to keep the different exhibits in one's eye. There were many exhibits that should never have been at the show, and I think that there must have been some new breeders exhibiting, and nothing but experience will teach them that it will not pay to exhibit inferior stock. In my opinion the condition of some of the stock was perfection. As I understand the entry fee is already high. I cannot see how you could prevent the poor class of stock being exhibited. I do not approve of two exhibits being placed in one pen, because if one of them should be awarded a prize, there is nothing to show the public which is the prize winner.

The Tamworth pigs being poorly represented shows plainly that they are not favourites, but the specimens exhibited were fairly good.

POULTRY.

UTILITY POULTRY.

Mr. Sidney Buscomb, 39 Katawa-grove, Brunswick; and Mr. J. E. Bradley, South-road, Moorabbin.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 126.)

Black Orpington Cocks were below average quality, two birds (cock and hen), placed third and second, had their legs blackened with ink to hide a rather ugly scale (the lazy man's disease), but as this was not any detriment to a ulility bird it was passed over. Had there been comment cards the owner would have been given a pretty strong hint regarding his future exhibits. In Black Orpington Cockerels the class was fairly representative of the breed, three being exceptionally fine specimens.

Hens were only of average quality except the winner, which was about an 80 per cent. point bird. Pullets showed the best all round qualities, the winner being the best Black Orpington pullet seen in a Utility class this year. This bird was put up for the Government certificate as the best bird in the show, she being almost a facsimile of the original Orpington, and combining egg laying qualities. We were, however, outvoted by the exhibition judges.

The Rhode Island Reds were of good quality, especially the females, and in our opinion quite justified the outlay in giving them an exclusive class.

In the A.O.V. heavy breeds the quality was very varied, the malesbeing very moderate, but three exceedingly good hens were amongst thefemales. The barred Rock was a particularly fine specimen of its breed. White Leghorn Cocks were below average as egg getters, but three very fine Cockerels took their cards in their class—the winner being an easy first, although badly shown. Females were of good quality—both hens and pullets, half a dozen in each class, being of the best it would be possible to-find. The Blue Ribbon winning hen being an exceptionally high quality bird. The A.O.V. light breed males were very moderate, but the females were of the best. A particularly fine lot of Brown Leghorns being in the class, also a top quality Ancona, making the class a difficult one to judge. These were probably the best lot of females seen in the A.O.V. classes since the inclusion of Utility classes. Birds being crated late on the day of judging kept us back in our work, and we would recommend that all birds be in pens the night before, and also that double decking of pens be avoided—it being difficult to get birds out of the top tier, and also to see them in their true light. It would also be advisable to bench all the Utility birds in the one building if possible.

TURKEYS, GEESE AND DUCKS.

Mr. H. V. Hawkins, Queen's Walk, Melbourne.

My section included the whole of the ducks, geese and turkeys, no mean task, as I understand the number of birds exceeded all previous shows held under the Royal Society. The quality of the stock shown was the most typical that has ever come under my notice, particularly in the classes for Runners, Muscovy (or crested ducks), Pekin and Aylesbury, Noted winners hailed from N.S.W. and Victoria, whilst in the classes devoted to turkeys and geese some magnificent specimens were staged—notably in the former classes, the evenness of type and colour (not forgetting the condition they were in) made my task difficult.

NON-SPORTING DOGS (OTHER THAN TERRIERS).

Mr. W. Beilby, 13 Darling-street, South Yarra.

I regret that the majority of the exhibits did not merit high praise. I followed my usual practice of withholding challenge prizes, where I did not consider the exhibits of sufficiently high merit, and in each instance pointed out my reasons to my courteous and able steward.

The Great Dane dogs provided the best class I ever judged in this breed. I cannot call to mind any dog in my experience with such bone and so sound all round with it as the winner in this class. The second dog is a fine upstanding "Harlequin," also of great merit, and unfortunate in meeting such a dog as Mr. Lithgow's "Prince."

Only one bitch was shown, but again such a splendid one. She is a nice coloured Harlequin, with the desired shade in eyes, a little large in ears and feet; otherwise a well balanced, good sized all round bitch. It was a close run between her and the dog Prince for the Challenge Certificate.

The Bull dogs were a nice lot.

The winning (rough coated) Collie dog is a rare headed quality animal, with a profuse coat and nicely turned body, good legs and feet, and a free mover. Only one light weedy puppy was shown, whilst the winning bitch was scarcely up to her kennel standard.

The Smooth Collies were a poor lot. A very fair collection of

kelpies was exhibited.

Cattle dogs were a very mixed and unsatisfactory lot to judge, asthere is no definite standard to go by. The English classes in thisnamed variety are for Smithfields, an unknown quantity in Victoria, consequently one has to go entirely on his own ideas, and pick out a usetul sort of working dog, which may be to all appearances a brother, a sister, a father or a mother of a winner in the Smooth Collie classes.

A very nice pair of Old English sheep dogs were shown. They were English standardised animals, the dog gaining the Challenge prize for Mr.

A. L. Nichol,

Only one poodle dog was exhibited. It was a good sized black with rare curl and shown in splendid condition. Toy Poodles provided a satisfactory entry numerically, and they were also in excellent condition. They were a nice lot of pretty, little, white, fluffy dogs, but as for "Curl of Coat," which is all that is typical in Poodles, it was conspicuous by its The only two with any pretensions to a curly coat were the winners in the dog and bitch classes. I very reluctantly awarded challenge prizes in these classes. I am fully aware that several of the exhibits are now fully recognised, as the best obtainable in Victoria, and are increasing in popularity, and I trust that with encouragement they will soon improve in coats.

The Pekinese is another of the ladies' pets that is fast coming intopopularity, and some excellent specimens were exhibited. This is accounted for by the fact, that most of those present were only the early removes from imported stock, and as recent importations have been announced, it may be worth the Council's consideration to divide the classes into colours. This I respectfully suggest.

The Pomeranian is another variety that is on the up grade, thanks to the recent year's importations, and again I would suggest a slight modification in the classes. In the chocolate or browns the competition was

very limited and poor.

The puppy class contained a rather promising pair. The "Any Colour" bitch brought out the best Pom. present in Mrs. E. Comer's 'Erinvil Peggie," a lovely black, nice size, good in coat, head, eyes, and ears, splendid legs and feet, and a grand shower. She eas Challenge for the best bitch. The winning puppy came second. She easily won the

Pug dogs provided a good class as pugs go, and the best winners of other shows were present, but there was not a really high class specimen. exhibited. The bitches were scarcely equal to the dogs, and there was little between the prize winners. This is another variety whose classification might be considered. The blacks have become more popular, and deservedly so, on account of the introduction into the several States of a better class animal, which appears to be frightening the fawns and apricots from the benches, and as the Royal Show caters for thousands of visitors from the country, whose only opportunity occurs here for seeing the various recognised pure breeds of dogs, it is a pity not to try and keep the collection as complete as possible, and unless the blacks are kept to themselves I am afraid the other colours will soon fade away.

SHEEP DOG TRIALS.

Mr. J. Quinn, Cootamundra, N.S.W.

(The awards in this Class will be found on page 159.)

I was very much disappointed at the small number of dogs competing, . . as the prize seems to be worthy of better support from Trial Dog owners. generally, and more particularly from those of the other States. Taking all the conditions into consideration the work done was of good quality I regret to say there was an absence of what may be called first-class show workers. Several of the dogs were in the hands of men who were novices at the game. Therefore, the dogs were handicapped to a great

extent, and in a number of cases the work done was not up to the usual standard of show workers.

The course was rendered difficult owing to obstructions, such as hunters' fences, woodchoppers' logs, etc., all of which were much against the dogs showing the keenness and good general work the public so loves to see. The course was a reasonable and not difficult one to negotiate. I would suggest that in future all obstacles for Dog trials be placed as far as possible from all obstructions. Then much better work will be done.

PRODUCE.

WHEAT.

MAIZE.

Mr. James Fisher, Orbost.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 160.)

There were some very fine exhibits in the Maize section, more especially in yellow dent varieties, the prizes awarded in this class being very closely contested. Although the exhibits of yellow flint maize were not so numerous, the one which obtained first prize was exceedingly attractive. Some of the white maize showed signs of cross fertilisation with yellow, but the grain exhibit in this class which obtained first prize was a very fine sample.

TABLE VEGETABLES.

Mr. Thomas Marriott, McGuinness-road, Bentleigh. (Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 162.)

I wish to congratulate the Society on the magnificent room given for the staging of the Table Vegetables. The public has a chance of seeing, and the judge has a chance of examining, the produce when it has plenty of room instead of being huddled together. I have been judge at a number of shows, and I never saw better accommodation given. The prizes offered are admirable, and they should have the effect of inducing much larger competition. The vegetables in many instances were of a very fine quality, and in looking over the schedule I fail to see anything that can be improved upon. I think the display at the last Show should guarantee an even better display next year.

STATE SCHOOL COMPETITIONS.

FODDER CROPS, GRAIN AND POTATOES.

Mr. J. H. Refshauge, Agricultural High School, Ballarat. (Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 164.)

Taking the exhibits as a whole, they were superior to those of 1917. In Wheats and Potatoes, exhibits were in several cases wrongly named. Probably the wrong naming of varieties is due to the fact that some seedsmen are not as careful as could be desired, or it may be that the seedsmen are imposed upon by the producers. For show purposes, it is essential that varieties be correctly named.

The staging of exhibits was effectively done and the work of judging was thereby rendered an easy task. The stewards carried out their duties well and gave all the necessary assistance.

STATE SCHOOL COMPETITIONS.

FORESTRY, FRUIT TREES AND VEGETABLES.

Mr. W. H. Callister, Agricultural High School, Shepparton. (Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 164.)

The exhibit in Forestry, Fruit and Vegetables was an improvement on that of the previous year, and appeared to indicate that interest in the work is reviving. But the number of schools taking part is small, and there is still very little competition in the various classes.

The comparison between the exhibit now, when left mainly to individual effort, and formerly, when it was a district exhibit, is most marked. The appointment of an organiser in each inspectorial district would have a stimulating effect. Generally in each district there is some teacher noted for his skill and success in agricultural work, whose services might be made available.

The collection of fruits is always small, because very few school grounds possess an orchard, the general practice being to grow shade and shelter trees. A school ground was never the best place for birds to build or fruit to grow. Perhaps the competition could be made more educational by including collections of budded and grafted stocks, and of orchard pests, with name, date and locality.

Cabbages, cauliflowers, and lettuces should be included in the syllabus under vegetables. Fine specimens were formerly shown in this section.

In the Forestry section some good seedlings were shown. To make this section true to name, an exhibit in addition to the present classes in forestry should be shown consisting of bark, wood, leaves, flowers and fruit, mounted and named, of at least six native forest trees. Collection of tree and timber pests with names, dates, and localities should also be included. This would be of high educational value.

STATE SCHOOL COMPETITIONS.

FORAGE AND ROOTS, GRASSES, CLOVER, HONEY AND FLAX.

Mr. J. P. McLennan, School of Horticulture, Burnley.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 166).

Amongst the exhibits of Forage and Roots a fair number of specimensin mangels were shown. Some of these were of good quality and well grown. The carrots and turnips made a poor display, but the sugar beet, though few in number, was of fair quality.

There were good entries in the classes for Grasses and Clovers. The specimens of grasses (native and introduced) were very good; several exhibitors, however, showed introduced grasses as native plants. The correct classification of clovers, lucernes and similar plants is not well known.

The entries and specimens of flax were poor. Only one competitor had specimens showing different stages of treatment.

Only one decent specimen of honey was exhibited.

On the whole there was an improvement on the display made in 1917. As it is likely that soon there will again be some activity displayed in school agriculture, largely as a result of Mr. Richardson's visit to America, I am hoping to see a much better display from the schools next year. I would suggest that, unless there is some strong reason for beginning the judging in the afternoon, in some sections, at any rate, judges be allowed to commence at 10 o'clock.

CHEESE

Mr. G. C. Sawers, Stock and Dairy Supervision Branch, Spring-street, Melbourne.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 167.)

In the class for Cheese over six months old all of the exhibits with the exception of three were very inferior in quality, the principal faults being unclean in flavour, body and texture, weak and soft, whilst one entry was deficient in salt. As second and third prize exhibits belonged tothe same competitor only first and second prizes were awarded.

The competition was keen for Cheese under four months old, and also in the export class there were several good exhibits containing the characteristic flavour, body and texture found in well made cheese, the prize taking exhibits being exceptionally finely made.

The Loaf exhibits, except those that secured the prizes, were, on the whole, not too clean in flavour, and one exhibit showed signs of discolouration.

Throughout the section there was a great improvement in the "get up" and finish of the cheese, and makers deserve the highest praise for their workmanship.

BUTTER.

Mr. W. Herkes, Customs and Excise Office, Launceston, Tasmania.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 167.)

The various classes in the section were poorly filled, though the quality of the exhibits shown was, on the whole, excellent. In the export class the three placed butters were all of excellent quality, scoring as follows:—Milawa, 95½; Warrnambool, 94½; and Dungog, N.S.W., 94 points. Though Milawa showed free moisture, it was well ahead in flavour, and it is to be noted that Milawa is probably the only factory in Victoria that is supplied exclusively with whole milk.

Regarding the exhibits from Warrnambool and Dungog factories, it is to be noted that these two exhibits scored the same for flavour, but as the Dungog exhibit showed greasy texture, caused by being made at a rather high temperature, and slightly overworked, the Warrnambool exhibit, which showed slight excessive moisture was given an extra ½ point and was placed second.

In the class for Box of Print with three entries, the Warrnambool factory, with an excellent exhibit both regarding quality and neatness of package, was placed first.

The Penshurst exhibit, placed second, showed open texture and greasiness, the latter fault due to overworking.

Milawa, placed third in this class, was of equal flavour with Penshurst, but the packing and package was faulty, being loosely packed with soiled wrapping papers, which spoiled the appearance for market purposes.

For Powdered Butter, suitable for local sale, the Warrnambool factory showed a fine exhibit, flavour and finish being all that could be desired, though the texture was a little greasy.

Milawa, placed second in this class, was greasy in texture, and too highly salted for local requirements.

The third prize went to Penshurst factory with an exhibit showing open texture and free moisture, for which it was penalised 2 points.

Almost all the prize butters were pasteurized, and I would like to emphasise the necessity of all factories making butter by this system.

It seems desirable that Victorian factories be asked to make the Royal Show more representative of the State, as from what I know of them, there are at least 50 factories that would have a chance of winning in this exhibition.

BACON, HAM, LARD AND EGGS.

Mr. Thomas Main, Parklea, via Blacktown, N.S.W.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 168.)

Numerically the section was not so strong as last year, and the quality, as a whole, was not so high with the exception of the first and second prize winners—Mr. George Farmer, and the Gippsland Co-Operative Co. The latter has greatly improved on last year's exhibit. In fact, the "get up" was almost perfect, the exhibit only lost a few points on

flavour. In the collection of hams, bacon, and lard, the winner stood right out, the hams and lard being very choice, the lard being the best I have ever judged at the Melbourne Show. Some of the exhibits were very disappointing. They were poor in "get up" and quality of cure, and in some cases they were tainted. The Lard exhibited by one Company was the worst I have judged at any Show, and had the Bacon and Hams been ever so good in the collection, this exhibit would have lost on the Lard. In the class for farm-cured Hams and Bacon, the first prize taker had a very creditable exhibit, in fact in cure it was far better than the losers in the open classes.

The Eggs were good and in some cases were equal as regards uniformity of size and colour of shell, but the deciding factor was the richness of the yolk. This depends largely on the feeding. For instance, feeding on pollard and wheat and no green stuff will produce a pale yolk and a light custard, and pollard and plenty of green stuff and maize at night will produce a very rich yolk, and will give credit to the cook.

I would like to suggest that at some future Show the judging of hams be conducted in the following manner:—One of the three hams entered should be judged on the following points:—Texture and Firmness, 10 points; Smoking (not too dark), 10 points; Butchering and Finish, 10 points.

The other ham of each exhibit to be delivered at the Show ground a few days before the Show; a number or mark could be fixed on each ham by the Secretary. One ham from each entry to be cooked together on the ground the day before judging day and judged on the following points:— Flavour, 45; Colour, 15; Porportion of Fat and Lean, 10 points. The points of the cooked ham to be added to the points of the raw ham, making a total of 100 points in all. It would then be unnecessary to cut the raw ham. Hams, unlike bacon, should always be judged for boiling and not frying. I make this suggestion, as there are some who think judges cannot tell the flavour of an uncooked ham. The size of ham should be about 14 to 15 lbs.

FRUIT.

Mr. F. W. Vear, Burwood.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 170.)

I consider that as far as fruit is concerned everything was satisfactory and the arrangements good. The only suggestions I would make would be to have the District exhibits set out continuously, instead of as they were this year on four different sides. Also that instead of having classes for the best two cases of apples, I would substitute one case, which would, I consider, bring in many more entries and add to the attractiveness of the Show.

HORTICULTURE.

Mr. G. Cooper, Alexandra Gardens, Melbourne.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 173.)

The stagings of plants in pots, at the recent Show, were not as numerous as might have been expected. For the purpose of inducing

keener competition I would suggest that in future the various metropolitan and country horticultural societies should be specially communicated with two or three months in advance of the date for closing entries.

An appeal on these lines might induce growers to make the display more representative of this important branch of horticulture.

In justice to the exhibitors it is only fair to state that the varieties presented, on the occasion under notice, were well grown. Some of the specimens shown by Messrs. Paton and Sons, the principal prize winners, were exceptionally attractive. They were worthy of a full number of points. Palms, and aspidistras reflected the most careful cultural attention. Window box and hanging basket exhibits could not fail to command attention in any collection:

Although the rhododendrons were not in bloom they gave promise, by the condition of healthy buds, of being florally attractive at a later date.

Generally, it may be said that the display contained many meritorious features. If wider interest can be induced this section of the show should be one of the main features of this well-arranged agricultural hall.

APICULTURE.

Mr. F. Barnes, Burnley.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 174.)

The honey exhibited was very good, but entries were very small, several being absent. The beeswax entries were also very small.

I was informed that the failure of this exhibit was due to the fact that exhibitors could not get suitable jars in which to put their honey.

Other possible exhibitors evidently sold all their honey, so they could not compete.

WOMEN'S INDUSTRIES.

PLAIN AND FANCY NEEDLEWORK.

Mrs. Harvey Smith, Upper Beaconsfield.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 174.

The work on the whole was of quite as high a standard as at the previous show, and I believe there were considerably more entries. The freshness of the work was also very noticeable.

In the much favoured class for a crochet teacloth there were 27 exhibits, and the majority were of good work and handsome design.

Some very dainty work was shown in camisoles.

Buttonholes were of good workmanship.

The hand-embroidered photo, frames were not up to the standard of previous years. I also noticed an almost entire absence of hand-made lace. This might be due to women being so much taken up with war work, for lace making takes so much time.

I was glad to see such a good response in plain skirt, shirt blouse, and lady's coat and skirt. Good style and good work were shown here, and in these times, when women's clothing is such an expensive item, it is very praiseworthy to see such good work done by amateurs.

One piece of work deserves special mention—that is a table centre in Mount Mellick. It was carried out in many beautiful stitches, most accurately done, and of very handsome design.

I am sorry there was no competition in the "One Woman's Work" class, and hope when the war is ended we shall see a better response in this class.

RED CROSS EXHIBITS.

Mrs. D. A. Skene, 58 Caroline Street, South Yarra.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 179.)

The soldier's set of flannel underclothing was most excellent work, all garments in the four sets entered being beautifully made, but in each set one article was not quite correct in detail. The first prize in this class was of a very high order.

The Tussore Shirts were very fair specimens of good handiwork.

The cotton and flannel shirts which were placed first could hardly have been improved upon, they were such perfect samples, both in shape and finish.

The cholera belts and underpants were very fine specimens. Flannel pyjamas, three in number, were all very well made.

There was only one sweater exhibited, but the specimen of work would have been hard to beat, the finishing and texture being almost as even as machine knitting.

Mrs. Meek's helmet, made of scraps, was most neatly put together. Mrs. Ada Cane's work being of most harmoniously blended scraps of wool, neatly joined.

There was a large number of entries in the class for knitted Balaclava caps, most of which were well made, but many were not made from the Red Cross pattern.

In plain round invalids' caps, Miss May Denario's sample was most evenly worked, soft and comfortable, as was also the second prize winner.

The plain straight mufflers were so good that it was hard to decide for the first prize, but Miss Mary L. Percival had worked with remarkable evenness all through, and Miss Smith's work was almost as good. Miss A. Dunlop's work being excellent, and was highly commended, although a trifle loose.

Mrs. Hocking's slippers, made from scraps, were very ingeniously modelled.

The knitting was very good, indeed, the bed socks, with one exception, being remarkably well made. The jointing together of scraps for

bed socks left nothing to be desired in the way of comfort and neatness. Miss M. Kinna's work again showing its excellence, as was the case in the classes for soldiers' set of underclothing and cholera belts.

There was a great number of sock entries, and the competition was so keen in socks made of 4-ply wool, with French heels, that it was difficult to single out a first and second prize, all the exhibits being remarkably good work; while in the socks (4-ply), with Dutch heels, there was only one pair fit for a prize, every other pair having some bad fault, which made the awarding of a second prize impossible.

Again in the thick socks there was keen competition, with many excellent exhibits, the first prize being accurately made of a heavy wool which had been well managed, the second prize being hardly less perfect.

Dutch heel socks of thick wool were all of a very good quality.

The mittens, knitted gloves, and stretcher bearers' gloves were very excellent work in all cases.

Generally, the work in this section showed a marked improvement, and was of a very high order; indeed, the knitting left little to be desired, except in the one class indicated.

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
