


HORSES.

CLYDESDALES (MALES).

Mr. John Bell, Kangaroo Ground.

A large number of sires was exhibited in Class 1. My first choice fell upon Dalmore on account of his symmetry, style and action. He won easily, and also scored the award for championship. The second prize





horse, Invermay, has good bone and hair of the right sort for a Clydesdale, and he also has splendid feet. His action is good, but was not quite as good as when I first judged him at the Royal Show in 1916. The third horse, Bucklyvie's Choice, is, in my opinion, a good sound horse, with good feet and legs. He is thick set and evenly made, but his action was rather faulty. Scotland's Viceroy showed more Clydesdale points than most of the others. He is a good quality horse, with bone and hair of the right quality, but, in my opinion, was rather small compared with the others placed before him. Several other horses were worthy of note,

and probably would find favor in other judges' eyes, but, to my mind, the horses that secured the prizes were the best that came before me. The ring in which these horses were exhibited was much too small. I would therefore suggest that in future more room be made for these important classes.

Of the three-year-old colts, Marshal Foch, by Baron Everest, gained first place. He is a good, well-grown, active colt, with a good Clydesdale appearance. I feel that I was justified in giving him the Reserve Champion Ribbon. Peter Pan is also a good colt, with fine action, and, being well grown, will probably become a champion later on. I placed Craigie-burn Premier third, but I considered the first and second colts stood out by themselves in this class.

The two-year-old colts were a good class, but I thought some of them would have shown to more advantage in an open draught class. My first choice was Baron May, a nice evenly balanced colt by Invermay, showing a lot of Clydesdale breeding. I understand he was placed first

in the yearling colts last year. Real Scotch, who secured the second award, is a fine upstanding colt, with good quality feet, legs and hair. He is also a good topped colt. Earl Belmont, by Baron Belmont, is a good colt of the right quality, and I placed him third in the class. I felt inclined to place him second, but his having a wall eye induced me to alter my opinion. I feel sure if the prize-winning colts receive proper attention more will be heard of them later on.

In the yearling class there were 42 entries, and most of these colts entered the ring, which was much too small for such a large number, and it was hardly possible to do justice to them. In fact, I have since been told by a man who has the reputation of being a Clydesdale judge that the first colt I put out of the ring should have taken the second prize.


That is not my opinion at present, but if I find later on that I made a mistake, I would not be afraid to admit my error if it should prove to be such. I had no hesitation in placing Over Newton, by Craigwillie of Bolobek, first, and, for all-round quality and appearance, I do not think I ever saw a nicer colt at the age. Quatta's Gem is also a good well-grown colt, by Baron Belmont, and is the making of a good horse. Dromana, by the champion, Dalmore, the third colt, although not so taking in general appearance at present as the other two placed before him, is a good weighty colt, and with age should develop into a good horse later on, as his sire has done.

SHIRES, FARM AND LORRY HORSES, AND SUFFOLK PUNCHES.


In the Shire Section competition was weak, as only one male and one female came forward. They were true to type and splendid animals, and both would show up well in big competitions. Two splendid four-horse

teams were exhibited. They were a credit to their owners, and would be hard to beat in any part of the world. In lorry pairs competition was good, and the quality of the animals and the matching of the pairs left nothing to be desired. Some useful horses were also exhibited in the single lorry class, but farm pairs were not nearly as good as one would expect to see at a Royal Show. The class for farm mares brought out

some useful mares, but the first prize mare stood out from her competitors, and had an easy win. In dray horses the whole field was almost useless in the britching. This is a quality that is essential for that class of work. In Suffolk Punches only one male and one female came out. They were not up to standard, and I did not award champion prizes.

DRAUGHTS.

Mr. S. J. Lynn, Fairleigh, Orbost.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 96.) The entries in the Draught Section this year were small. This may be on account of the greater encouragement and larger prizes given in the Clydesdale Section. There is no doubt about the merits of the pure Clydesdale, but after studying draught horses in many countries, I am of the opinion that Clydesdales are not the only horses which should be encouraged by the Society. The tendency in Scotland at the present time is to breed them too light for general utility. The first prize in stallions was a very solid, good-proportioned horse, with good action, and showing just a trace of Shire. The second prize was a good quality horse, showing Clydesdale breeding, but he is on the light side.


The three-year-old colts were not a good lot. The mares were a fair average lot, mostly bred on Clydesdale lines. The same remarks would

apply to the young stock, which was not numerous.







opinion, neither of them was high class, and could easily have been beaten

if there had been any competition.

Only two exhibits came into the ring in the Arab Mare Class. The first prize winner was a neat little mare, very sound, and with good free action. The second was a nice mare, much better in size and conformation than the first, but it was impossible to get her out of a walking pace (owing to her being sore in her front feet), so I had no option but to place her second. Had she been free in her action, I would have placed her first.

Headwind, which won the Defence Department's Thoroughbred prize, came before me for the Champion Thoroughbred Stallion prize. I consider him a horse of very high class, showing plenty of quality and strength. He stands very true on his legs, and has good, free and straight action when moving. Taken altogether, he is a very nice horse, and fully deserved the Champion Thoroughbred Stallion prize which I awarded him.

There was only one thoroughbred mare exhibited, but she was a beautiful animal of very high class and breeding. She would take a lot of beating, even had there been keen competition. I therefore had no hesitation in giving her first and champion prizes.


In the classes for Welsh cobs and pony stallions there were a splendid lot of animals, but in the female classes a very moderate lot were shown, with the exception of two mares named Queenie and Sylvia, the first-named being much superior to anything shown against her, although Sylvia is a nice stamp of mare, except for being too thick across her withers. I placed Hafren Sensation (Welsh cob stallion) first in his class, and also awarded him the championship. He is a great pony, with splendid conformation and remarkably good action. He won very easily. Amongst the other pony entries I judged were Grif Bangor, Glyn Trustful, Maldon and Young Rysharold Each won in his respective class. They are an exceptionally good lot, and any of them should win in their class at any show.






Champion Cob Stallion, "Royal" Show, 1919.

SHORTHORNS.

The Shorthorns that were exhibited were decidedly good, clearly indicating that Victoria—the home of Shorthorns in Australia—is maintaining the high standard its breeders have attained for many years. A very noticeable feature was the evenness of quality in many classes, especially amongst the younger animals of both sexes. The champions were selected from the three and four years classes, and formed a quartette that would attract the attention of judges in any show ring in the world, being thoroughly typical of the breed, stylish in appearance, with good flesh, carried evenly on well-balanced bodies. They also


possessed the unique distinction of all being sired by the same bull, which

should constitute a record for Australia at least.


A tendency to early maturity was also shown by many of the younger exhibits, and it is a feature which should receive much consideration and encouragement, as it is the source from which the economic production of beef must spring and the achievement of which by Shorthorn breeders will do much to retain the position of this breed when competing with other beef breeds for pride of place.

The number of entries was satisfactory, showing that most breeders of Shorthorns have animals in their studs that have a good prospect of securing prizes in their respective classes. The margin between prizewinners and those unplaced, in some instances, was little more than a


matter of opinion, so even was the general quality.




Champion Shorthorn Cow, "Royal" Show, 1919. "CORNFLOWER 2nd," exhibited by Mr. Harry L. Austin.




Champion Hereford Bull, "Royal" Show, 1919.


Champion Hereford Cow, "Royal" Show, 1919. "BUICK BELL," exhibited by Mr. John A. Beattie.




Champion Milking Shorthorn Bull, "Royal" Show, 1919.




Champion Red Polled Bull, "Royal" Show, 1919. "LONGFORD MAJOR (imp.), exhibited by Department of Agriculture.







JERSEYS.

The entries, though more numerous in the aggregate, were hardly up to the usual number in classes for mature cows, probably some seasonal condition preventing them from coming in in time for the Show. The winners in each class were very good specimens and typical of the breed, and, in many cases, there was very little to choose between the competitors.

In the class for aged cows in milk, the winner was a beautiful animal, but showing a little age. Amongst the dry cows, the first and second

exhibits were both very good.

The three-year-old in milk class was headed by an exceptionally good heifer, which afterwards was awarded the Champion Prize.

In the type and utility class for cows, the winner is a very typical animal, and carries a very good vessel, and, although not too well got up in appearance, she afterwards received the Reserve Champion Prize.

Yearling heifers provided a very strong class, the placed heifers

being particularly good.

Amongst the bulls, the aged class was headed by two very good animals, with little to choose between them, the winner being rather better in quality, whilst the second bull was of a beautiful rich colour. These bulls were afterwards awarded the Champion and Reserve Champion Prizes respectively.

Three very good three-year-old bulls were shown. The winner in

the two-year-old class should develop into a very good bull.

There was a very strong class of good yearling bulls, the first and second prize winners being exceptionally good.

AYRSHIRES.

Though the classes were well filled there were some very poor specimens of the true Ayrshire type. But taken on the whole some very fine cattle were exhibited. So many were entered in some of the classes that it was very difficult to pick out the winners.

In the aged bull class it was easy to pick the winner, which was

afterwards awarded the championship.

The second and third exhibits were not in such nice show condition. The 3-year-olds were a very good lot, with the prize winners standing out.

Amongst the 2-year old bull, there were some of the best I have ever seen at a Royal Show. It was very easy to pick out 6 or 8, but somewhat of a task to select the prize winners. I was very much inclined to give the first prize bull in this class the reserve championship.

Amongst the one-year-olds there were a few very good ones, but a lot of them were not in show condition. Still the prize winners were

very good and should be heard of again.

In the aged cow class there was a very fine display in both the dry and milk classes. The first prize cow in milk was afterwards awarded the championship. She is a very typical cow, but a bit small. She has a well set on bag with good teats.

The 3-year-olds were the best lot of heifers I ever judged, and I

don't think I ever saw a better lot in a Royal Show before.

In the 2-year-old and yearling classes there were some very fine exhibits. A few were rough and out of condition, but the prize winners were very good. Taken as a whole the females were a very fine lot, most of them having very good teats.

GUERNSEYS.

I again had the honour of judging the Guernseys at the Show, and beg to state that, taking the section as a whole, I found an improvement, although, as I have said before, there was not the competition one would like to see. The Champion Bull is a very fine specimen of the breed, and some of the younger bulls showed promise. In the female classes the Champion Cow showed great quality, and should be a milk and butter producer.




Some very fine Friesians were shown in both the male and female classes. I was agreeably surprised to see such a fine lot, especially the cows in milk. They were as fine a lot as I have ever seen together. The first prize cow is fit to go to any show in Australia, as was also the winner of the second prize. There was not much between the two, but I considered the first cow truer to type, and carried a better vessel. The winning dry cow was a very nice animal, and very little between her and the champion. She was, however, a little plain in the head. The two-year-old and yearling heifers were also good, but the first prize winner in each class stood out from the others. The winning bull in the aged class was a good dairy bull, but not so true to the Friesian type; but the two-year-old bull is a very fine animal. I would have awarded him the championship only that I considered him too young for that award. He certainly will be hard to beat wherever he goes.

The yearlings were very nice, and the first and second prize-winners

particularly should develop into good bulls.

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
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
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

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CHAMPION BUTTER FAT TEST.

Messrs. R. T. Archer and P. Rankin Scott, Department of Agriculture, Melbourne.

At the Show this year five cows competed, viz., three Ayrshires and two Jerseys. For the first time since this test was inaugurated an Ayrshire won. It is interesting to note that this test is not won by cows of one breed.

The success of "Maggie of Gleneira" was a well-deserved win, as Mr. Buchanan has competed every year, and has been very close up on each occasion. This year the results were not up to the high standard of former years, but were good, the winning cow returning 6.07 lbs. of butter fat, or a fraction over 2 lbs. of butter fat per day. A yield of 2 lbs. of fat per day must be considered good. The question here naturally arises—would the cow keep up as good a record for a lengthy period? If so, she would be highly profitable. The standard herd test conducted by the Department of Agriculture would assist towards determining that point, as the test extends over nine months (273 days).

The milk is weighed night and morning, and recorded on a chart during that period. Once a month an officer of the Department visits the farm, checks the weights, takes samples of the morning and evening milk, which is afterwards tested as to its fat content. This system, showing the gallons of milk and the pounds of fat produced per cow, and the yield of milk on the last day of the test, affords an excellent method of arriving at the true value of the cow from a productive point of view.




The flesh of the aged bullocks is not suitable for the retail trade. The younger cattle were very good, with the exception of a two-year-old, which deteriorated owing to fretting.

The cows, as a whole, were good. The first prize pair showed signs of the journey. The single cow was a very fine specimen.

I consider that the suggestion made during the Show to improve the fat cattle pens is a step in the right direction.


SHEEP.

LINCOLN RAMS.

Mr. G. Tomlinson, Diggers' Rest.

I had the honour of judging at the Royal Agricultural Society's Show in September last, and consider that the exhibits would compare favourably with those at any previous Show I have seen. The Champion Ram, Reserve Champion and several others of the prizetakers, including the winning ram of Captain Payne's special for combination of wool and

Show. There is no need on the part of any writers to deplore want of size in the Lincolns, as I hold (after a few years' experience as a breeder and a spectator at most of the leading shows in Victoria) that the best examples of the breed to-day are quite equal in size, symmetry, constitution, wool and adaptability to fatten to anything we have had in the past. I noticed a few beautifully woolled sheep, but I did not award any of them a ticket on account of their being too small.


LINCOLN EWES.

Mr. E. W. Oliver, Chudleigh, Tasmania.

In submitting my report of the Lincoln sheep, I would like to preface my remarks by stating that I am an enthusiast on Lincoln sheep, and during recent years have had opportunities of inspecting many of the best flocks of the breed in Lincolnshire, New Zealand, and throughout the Commonwealth of Australia.

I always contend that there are certain fixed laws that govern sheep-breeding, which may be modified, or bent, but must not be broken altogether. If disregarded by the breeder, there is a sure penalty to pay sooner or later. It has been quite an interesting study to note how these laws are observed in different countries. Take, for instance, Lincoln sheep coming from England. Fully 95 per cent. of them are very deficient in the leg of mutton, simply because breeders after the craze for even flesh have heaped too much flesh on the backs of the sheep at the expense of the leg of mutton.

These remarks really apply to nearly all the different breeds of sheep coming from Great Britain to-day. Every breeder of sheep, whether Lincolns, Merinos, or any other breed, knows the strongest wool in the fleece will always be found on the thigh, and a sheep with extremely fine wool on the thigh will have little wool on the belly and points. This has happened in New Zealand—a craze having set in for fine wool on the thighs of the Lincolns.

Coming to the Commonwealth of Australia, the trend a few years back was to try and pack too much wool on the sheep, with the result that the frames and constitutions started to give out in a way similar to

the old Tasmanian Merinos, with wool and wrinkles packed on. The result was a low percentage of lambs, bad mothers, and many other troubles. Breeders of Lincoln sheep should aim at improving both frame and fleece without going to extremes.

In Australia we require a sheep with plenty of bone, shorter in the leg than the English type, covered with broad locks of flakey, serrated, lustrous wool, and any ram showing a tendency to cob up in the fleece should be discarded. Apart from my criticism, there were some of the finest specimens of Lincoln sheep in the pens at the Royal Show to be found in the whole world, and I say, without fear of contradiction, that Lincoln sheep have improved a great deal during the last 25 years. The Champion Ewe at the Show might be chosen as a model of the breed.

ENGLISH LEICESTERS.

Mr. A. H. Blake, Leicester, Alfriston-street, St. Kilda.

The English Leicesters at the late Show, though not numerous, had amongst them some sheep of high standard, although variety of types was still in evidence. The aged ram class was a strong one. The first and second prize takers stood out in their class, although they were sheep of different types. The Champion Ram was certainly hard to beat. The younger classes were not up to the standard of the aged class. The ewe classes showed a falling off as compared with previous years. The championship, I regret to say, had to go to a dry ewe, and, judging by appearances, a doubtful breeder. I consider all sheep eligible for championship honours should show evidence of being breeders.

It has been mooted among breeders, with a view to overcome the difference in type, to appoint the same judge for a term of years. Theoretically this appears a solution to the problem, provided the right man is secured. But who is to decide which is the right type? Every breeder will unconsciously lean to his own type.

BORDER LEICESTERS.



The sheep in most classes were of a high standard, this being especially the case with the younger exhibits. They showed more of the true Border type than any I have seen at previous Shows in Australia.

The Champion Ram and the Champion Ewe were both of a very high class, especially the latter. Pairs of rams and ewes under 1½ years were exceptionally good, both as regards quality as well as in numbers. Many very fine sheep failed through lacking the carriage and smartness so essential to the breed.

Though firstly a mutton breed, it is, without doubt, wise to pay some attention to wool, and I was very pleased with the character and covering of many of the exhibits, the great majority being sound underneath, and roughness or hairiness on the breech seldom being found. A tendency of some exhibits to weak necks, with wool too far back from the ears, is a fault that needs careful watching.

The offering of a special prize, to be judged by the English standard, is, I think, a mistake in this country. At least, the scale of points does not apply. Ten points for wool is, in my opinion, far too few.



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
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
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
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

ROMNEY MARSH.

Mr. G. Doyle, Cardington Hall, Molong, N.S.W.

The Romney Marsh section was well filled with many sheep of outstanding merit. The aged ram class brought forward six exhibits, only three of which evidenced the points essential to the qualifications of sires of high standard. These were Elham Challenger (Dalry 48 of 1916), Dalry 20 of 1915, and Payne's 27 of 1915.

In the class for rams judged on points according to the English standard, only five competed for the prizes. The merit of the competing rams was a distinct disappointment, only two sheep scoring a high percentage of points, namely, Elham Challenger (Dalry 48 of 1916,) with 78 points, and Payne's No. 26 of 1914, with 73 points.


I would like to point out that, under this system of judging on points, as they were allotted on this occasion, it is quite possible that the worst sheep in the section, from the point of view of a typical Romney, could win the first prize, as a ram might be perfect in every other respect, and have a head like a donkey, which would condemn him in any competent breeder's hands as a sire. I would therefore throw out the suggestion that 15 points be allotted for head, and 10 points be allotted for trueness to type, as without these characteristics I consider a sheep quite deficient in the qualifications of his breed, the head being the index of any breed.

In the class for rams 1½ and under 2½ years, Dalry 32 of 1917 calls for special mention. In the shorn class, for rams 1½ and under 2½ years, closely shorn, Payne's 123 of 1917 demands special commendation for type, bone, symmetry, and length of carcase.


In the ewe classes, Payne's 67 of 1917, which won first prize in her class, 1½ and under 2½ years, and champion of the Show, was a particularly good sheep. I consider this ewe the best specimen of the Romney Marsh breed I have ever seen, and is a credit to the breeder. The winners of the first and second prizes in the ewe classes were splendid specimens of the breed, and stood out for trueness to type, evenness of fleeces, good bone, and long, symmetrical carcases, with level backs.

The hogget classes, both rams and ewes, were a special feature of the section, proving, as they did, the early maturing characteristics of the breed. In these classes, the ram hogget, Payne's 178 of 1918, won the first prize in his class, and champion of the Show, and stands out as a grand specimen of the breed. Amongst the ewe hoggets, Payne's 83 of 1918 won first prize in class and Reserve Champion of the Show. This is a wonderful ewe, of which more should be heard in the near future.

It is doubtful if, in any part of the world, Romneys of such uniform and outstanding type and physical perfection could be seen as the winners of the first prizes right throughout this section.

I have only to report that a greater interest is now taken in this class of sheep than ever before. No doubt they are becoming very favorably looked upon, on account of their suitability for dual purposes. They have the further advantage that they can be kept on any class of land with satisfactory results. With some other breeds this could not be done.

SHROPSHIRES.



In the open classes for Shropshires, although competition was not keen, the animals exhibited were of good quality and typical of the breed, although many were of the small type and too well covered in the head, which, to a certain extent, spoils their utility for this country. In the aged class the winner was a typical Tasmanian-bred ram, lengthy, well sprung in the rib, a good handler, carrying an even fleece of good length. This sheep was particularly clean in the skin, and also on the head, and free from black wool. The second prize sheep was a fine ram of excellent constitution, having a very well sprung rib, and deep in heart room. He was very dumpy, and his wool was much out of condition, as well as being light.


In the class for rams 1½ years old and under 2½ years, the winner, which was the property of W. Kirkham, stood out on his own amongst the rams. He was of great length and character, and not over-covered in the head, yet of masculine appearance. He carried an exceptionally good fleece and bright skin. He was also a good handler, and stood well on his legs. This was a typical Shropshire, and the kind that should be encouraged. This ram also easily gained the championship. The second prize winner in this class was of nice quality and good character, but on the small side, and his fleece was coarse and out of condition.

Only two sheep competed in the young class, and neither was of great merit. The winner showed more quality, also better wool and skin. The second prize ram had a very plain head and spotted ears.

In the class for sheep not to have been trimmed or touched up with the shears, two exhibits were disqualified, as, to my mind, it appeared that since last shearing they had been cut with shears to a small degree. The other entry I did not consider worthy of a prize.

In the class for ewe with lamb, the winner was a very showy little ewe, with a good head, and handled better than her pen mate.

The winning aged ewe was of exceptionally good quality, with perhaps too much covering on her head, but she was very lengthy and a good handler, with well sprung ribs. The winner of the second prize was a ewe of good merit, but did not handle as well as her pen mate.

The winner in the class for ewes over 1½ years and under 2½ years, was a lengthy ewe, of good head and character, but her wool was out of condition. The second prize winner fell away badly in the brisket.

The winning ewe in the young class was of good type and full of quality. In the untrimmed class, two of the entries were disqualified on account of having been touched up with shears since last shearing.

SOUTHDOWNS, SUFFOLKS, AND DORSET HORNS.

Mr. F. W. Bedwell, c/o. Victorian Producers' Co. Ltd., Shepparton.

There were some very fine sheep exhibited in all the above breeds, and some very poor ones, both as regards breeding and condition, in the Southdown classes. Tick-infested sheep should not be allowed to enter the show pens. This is contrary to the Dipping Act, and detrimental to other breeders whose sheep are clean. I would recommend the Society to take a firm stand in this matter. There are prizes given in the Southdown section for untrimmed sheep. These, I think, should be cut out, and a breeders' class substituted, viz., one ram and two ewes bred by the exhibitor, and by the same sire. I am sure that people, seeing the untrimmed classes at this year's Show, will say they were far from being up to show condition.

The prize winners in the Southdown classes were equal to anything I have seen at the "Royal" for many years. The champion ram and ewe were exceptionally good sheep.

Some very fine sheep were shown in the Suffolk classes, particularly the champion ram. He was true to type, and had a good shoulder and back, which was lacking in his opponents.

The Dorset Horns were a very light class, and rather out of show condition.


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
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
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
Champion Shropshire Ram, "Royal" Show, 1919, exhibited by Mr. William Kirkham.



Champion Shropshire Ewe, "Royal" Show, 1919, exhibited by Messrs. C. H. Eawkins & Sons.




Champion Southdown Ram, "Royal" Show, 1919. exhibited by Messrs. Le Boux Bros.




Champion Southdown Ewe, "Royal" Show, 1919, exhibited by Messrs. Le Roux Bros.




Champion Suffolk Ram, "Royal" Show, 1919. "No. 201," exhibited by Mr. Fred. Thonemann.

FLEECES.

Messrs. H. Denison, Australian Mercantile, Land and Finance Co., Melbourne; and E. P. Carter, c/o. Goldsbrough, Mort and Co., Melbourne.

The 1019 exhibit of fleeces was one of the best so far staged, the entries totalling 47, as against 46 last year. If the Merino section was a little disappointing as regards numbers (only 18 entries being received, compared with 20 last year), this was more than compensated for by the general excellence of the fleeces exhibited, and the increased weight and money value of the exhibits.

The open class in Merino rams' fleeces attracted six entries, five from Victoria and one from South Australia. First prize was awarded to two big, bulky fleeces, of robust type, exceptional length, and good character. The two fleeces weighed 52lbs. 140zs., and were valued at £3/14/3\frac{1}{4}. One of them also received the special prize for being nearest to perfection of its type. Last year the two first prize fleeces weighed 36lbs. 90zs., and were valued at £3/4/0\frac{1}{2}. The second prize in this class was awarded to two typical Victorian Western District fleeces, weighing 37lbs. 110zs., and valued at £3/12/6\frac{1}{4}.

In the open class for Merino ewes' fleeces, four entries were received, all being from Victoria. First prize was awarded to two magnificent fleeces, tull of quality and character, weighing 22lbs. 7ozs., and valued at £2/10/11 $\frac{1}{4}$. Second prize went to two very nice fleeces of more robust type, weighing 24lbs. 3ozs., and valued at £2/10/1 $\frac{1}{4}$.

For most valuable Merino rams' fleeces, for owners of less than 3000 sheep, four entries were received, two Victorian and two South Australian, the latter again carrying off the first prize with an exhibit of very strong, robust type, and heavy in yolk. The two fleeces weighed 61lbs. 40zs., and were valued at £3/9/8. These two fleeces were the heaviest in the Show. Second prize went to two South Australian fleeces, weighing 44lbs. 20zs., and valued at $£3/7/7\frac{1}{2}$.

The ewes' class, for under 3000 sheep, received four entries, three Victorian and one South Australian. First prize was awarded to Victorian fleeces, weighing 29lbs. 1502s., and valued at £2/16/7\frac{1}{4}; second to South Australian fleeces, weighing 32lbs. 1002s., valued at £2/15/4.

In British breeds, the Lincoln fleeces again came out on top for money value, but, unfortunately, there was a very poor entry, only two in each class. First prize in rams' fleece class was secured by two fleeces weighing 45lbs. 70zs., and valued at $£2/7/1\frac{1}{2}$; and in ewes' class by two fleeces weighing 39lbs. 11ozs., and valued at $£2/3/7\frac{3}{4}$.

In order of value, the Romney class came next (four entries). Two rams' fleeces, weighing 34lbs., and valued at £2/0/11½, were placed first, whilst an exhibit weighing 29lbs., and valued at £1/16/7½, secured the first prize in the ewes' class.

The Border Leicester class received the largest number of entries in the British breeds, and some very attractive fleeces were staged. First prize in rams was awarded to two fleeces weighing 27lbs. 14ozs., and valued at £1/15/3½, and in ewes to two fleeces weighing 28·1bs. 6ozs., and valued at £1/14/2.

Only three entries were received for the English Leicester section. These were all from South Australia. First prize for rams was won by two fleeces weighing 24lbs. 1102s., and valued at £1/9/11, and for ewes by an exhibit weighing 24lbs. 60zs., and valued at £1/10/9 $\frac{1}{4}$.

The Shropshire class seems to be losing favor, only two entries being received, one in the rams' class, and one in the ewes' class. The rams' fleeces weighed 26lbs. 6ozs., and were valued at £1/11/4, and the ewes' fleeces 20lbs. 13ozs., and valued at £1/7/6 $\frac{1}{4}$.

Four entries were received in the Down section, two in each class. First prize in rams was awarded to fleeces weighing 16lbs. 10z., and valued at $\pm 1/2/3$; two ewes' fleeces weighing 16lbs. 150zs., and valued at $\pm 1/3/0\frac{1}{4}$, taking first in that class.

Two classes are made available for Crossbred fleeces, and this was again one of the most disappointing as regards entries. In the open section only one entry was received. Two splendid fleeces of the Corriedale cross showed splendid character, weighing 25lbs., and valued at $\frac{f_2}{4/3\frac{1}{4}}$.

In the class for less than 3000 sheep, first prize went to a Lincoln-Merino cross, two fleeces weighing 18lbs. 40zs., and valued at £1/10/5\frac{3}{4}.

The dividing of the two Leicester classes and the Down classes was a great improvement, and we should strongly advise a division in the Merino class, making a fine-wool class and a strong-wool class. This, we think, would draw some of the best breeders from the Riverina. A few entries from this important district unfortunately arrived too late for competition.

A feature in the Merino and English Leicester classes was the competition of South Australian breeders, who were wonderfully successful. The exhibits were again staged in the new Government Pavilion, with plenty of room and a splendid light. The arrangements for skirting and weighing the fleeces were all that could be desired, and the judges and assistants were given every facility for carrying out their work.

Dalgety & Co., Melbourne, who kindly lent wool tables and baskets; to the Toledo Co., for lending one of their balance scales for quick and accurate weighing; to the Australian Mercantile, Land & Finance Co. Ltd., Melbourne, for assistants; and to Messrs. Dalgety & Co., Geelong, for clerical assistance.

SHEEP SKINS.

Mr. James Kitson, c/o. Goldsbrough, Mort and Company Limited, Melbourne.

The exhibits of sheep skins were numerically small, but the skins were excellent, the flaying, in most cases, being all that could be desired. I would recommend that in future they be hung up with the skin side out, to the better advantage of the general public.

SWINE.

BERKSHIRES.


The Berkshire pigs were a very fine lot, and quite up to the standard of previous years. The aged boar class, especially, showed plenty of constitution and good conformation, as well as being well marked. In the younger boars I noticed a few showing a slight roach in the back, and also a tendency to droop in the shoulder. I would advise breeders to avoid breeding from a pig that is not straight and even on the back. The Berkshire sows, over 15 months, were a fine lot. Being bound by the rules of the Society that provided that sows had to be showing in pig, or have reared a litter, I could not give the prize to the best looking pig. I would recommend the Society to alter that rule, and allow the judge to use his own discretion. I think it would be more satisfactory to the exhibitors if this were done. Berkshire sows, under 15 months and over 6 months, were a very fine lot, but the sows under 6 months were a very ordinary lot, no doubt owing to the price of feed and the bad season.

YORKSHIRES.




The Yorkshire classes were well filled, and contained many typical exhibits, the prize-takers in the principal classes being magnificent animals, which would do credit to any show, while in some instances the merits of the exhibits were very close indeed. The Tamworth exhibits were not numerous, but those penned were a nice lot, and good specimens of the breed.





POULTRY.

LEGHORNS.

Mr. J. W. Sidebottom, Berkely-street, Oakleigh.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 141,)

There was a very fine collection of White Leghorns, the majority of which showed great quality. Some splendid typed males were shown. These had large bodies and profuse feathering, the placed birds being all snow-white. The female classes contained birds of good quality, but it was noticeable that a number of these were out of condition, perhaps on account of being over shown.

There were large classes of Brown Leghorns, but the quality was only moderate. However, the exhibits compared favorably with this breed at other shows. Breeders do not appear to have been able to produce in this breed the golden red hackles, as provided for in both the English and Australian standards. The male birds lack quantity of furnishing feathers.

The Black Leghorns that were penned were only moderate in quality, very few birds being of the correct type. They were also very weak in leg color and ear-lobes.

Some excellent exhibits were penned in the Farmers' Trio classes for White Leghorns. These were suitably mated for breeding. The Brown Leghorns in the same classes were only moderate in quality, and wrongly mated.

MEDITERRANEAN BREEDS (OTHER THAN LEGHORNS).

Mr. A. L. Nichol, "Glen Craik," Moorabbin-road, Cheltenham.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 142.)

Most of the birds in my section were far above the quality of previous years, especially the Minorcas and Black Spanish. In the former, H. Bunneman's team stood right out for type, quality and condition, especially the winning cockerel; and J. King's winning pullet was also a good one.

Black Spanish were strong classes, and all of good quality. G. Devlin's first and second cockerels were particularly good. Anconas provided small but select classes, the cockerels failing somewhat in ticking. A. Tilley's hens were rather heavily ticked, but very even, and they won easily. Andalusians were not up to the usual standard, but this remark does not apply to A. Facey's winning pullet and F. Barnes' hen. Both of these exhibits were of good type, and type and size certainly must come first in Andalusians. Blue Spanish are improving. The winning cock showed a splendid face, but was out of condition. Amongst the hens, the winner was of good type, size and color, but weak in face. Blue Minorcas are at a standstill, no improvement being apparent.

In the Farmers' Trios, I judged the birds, not on their exhibition value, but on their value as breeders of exhibition stock. My reason for this is that many of the trios are claimed by farmers, and prove useless because they are not properly mated. I think it would be wise to insert a clause at the head of this class, instructing all judges to judge on breeding value. Purchasers would thus be far better suited than at present, and a satisfied purchaser is always a future purchaser. Minorca trios found J. King winning with an excellent and properly mated pen. In Andalusians, the second pen was a perfect mating in color, but lost the coveted honor through lack of size and stamina in the male. In conclusion, I must congratulate the Society upon the new pavilion. The light and staging were perfect, making my task a pleasure.

MALAYS AND INDIAN GAME.

Mr. P. A. Mills, "Wyesth," Thorpdale.

Generally speaking, the Malays were only moderately represented, both as regards numbers and quality, and the competition was not at all keen. I am afraid, with the decadence of mining in Victoria, many good exhibitors in all game sections have given up exhibiting. In South Australia, Malays are still strong, and if the "Royal" put up the prize money in these sections on a level with Orpingtons and Wyandottes, I think it possible that South Australian birds might be sent over.

With regard to the Indian Game, I am glad to be able to report that the numbers and quality were good, and competition fairly keen, the cocks and cockerels being really typical. The winning cock gained the champion ribbon for best bird of all breeds in the Show. Although the hens and pullets were good, there is room for improvement, and it is evident that some new blood is now required. Unlike the utility sections, the Indian Game is bred for its fine table qualities, and beauty of markings and shape. It is rather a poor layer, but the best specimens command the highest prices of all. Therefore, to encourage keener competition, I beg to recommend that the prizes be restored to the higher standard of former ears.

GAME (OTHER THAN INDIAN GAME) AND BANTAMS.

Mr. R. Hyde, 927 Mt. Alexander-road, Essendon.

In Old English Game, there was keen competition, there being no fewer than 101 entries. In Black-Reds, there were some exceptionally good birds, the best being shown by E. C. J. Graves, in the white-legged varieties; whilst in willow-legged birds J. N. Williams showed the best. D. C. Morpeth, Junior, won in Duckwing Cock and Hen classes, with good birds, but had not much in the class to beat. In Spangles, T. F. Eddy's cock stood out, and J. A. Wood's hen won easily in her class. In any other color classes, the best birds were shown by E. C. J. Graves, D. C. Morpeth, Junior, and J. Woods.

I might point out that the old English game fowl is acknowledged to be the best table fowl; it lays well, and will protect its young from hawks and other enemies. They are easily kept, and will forage for their own food; consequently they would make an ideal fowl for farmers, but few seem to keep them.

WYANDOTTES.

Mr. G. E. Brown, Puriri Poultry Yards, Linacre-road, Hampton. (Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 146.)

Amongst the Golden Wyandottes, the males were in much greater number than usual, showing a renewal of interest in a variety that has for long been in the background of popularity. Most of the exhibits in both classes were well penned, and the quality much above the average, the first and second cocks being of exceptional merit, while the second cockerel was a gem in type and uniformity of color and lacing, but a "stopped" tail was a bar to his winning the chief award. Golden females were of a disappointing character, lacking the correct shade of color required in exhibition females.

Silver Wyandotte males were not up to the standard of quality or in such numbers as in previous years. This is much to be regretted.

The first and second cocks were of good Wyandotte type, but clearness of top color and quality of lacing were (with one exception) markedly absent in both classes. In Silver females the winning hen, together with the winning pullet, stood out in regularity of spacing; while the shape of the feather was all that could be desired. This is a feature that is very difficult to obtain. More than one female was of indifferent type, and several had a mixture of large and small feathers; and, although open and clear, this irregularity prevented their success.

White Wyandottes provided small classes, and, generally, were of only fair merit, while Partridge Wyandottes appear to be at a standstill, although the winning male and female were creditable specimens. Most of the Blue Wyandottes were typical, but color was far from being uniform.

FANCY BREEDS (OTHER THAN MEDITERRANEAN AND MALAYS, GAME AND BANTAMS).

Mr. P. Briggs, Chesterville-road, Moorabbin.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 151.)

In reviewing the various breeds of poultry I had the honor of judging, the Hamburgs stood out in both numbers and quality, the winning blacks being of very even quality all round, but certainly deficient in size. Silver Spangles were rather better than of late years, as were also the Golden Pencilled. Houdans and Faverolles were both good, though the latter breed appear to be losing the characteristic shape of this variety, many of the exhibits being too short in length of body and weak in front. They are ideal table birds, and deserve better support. The "Any Other Variety" class produced a good pair of Golden Spangled Polish, and also a White Long-tailed Japanese Cock. This latter bird is evidently very old, and therefore losing the distinctive feature of the breed, as we read of them having, in the land of their origin, long, flowing tails, six feet in length. I desire to congratulate the Society upon having provided such a splendid building for the accommodation of the poultry, and also for appointing so capable a superintendent. Such efforts must result in vastly increased support for the Society in the future.

LIGHT UTILITY POULTRY.

Mr. J. E. Bradley, South-road, Brighton North.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 153.)

Amongst the cocks, the first and second birds were grand specimens, both showing good utility type. They should prove to be good sires. Hens provided a much bigger entry, and they were a fine lot, six of them being equal to anything it would be possible to find in Australia. The winner was a particularly fine business bird. Cockerels were not quite so good, being just a little on the coarse side. This, in a purely egg-getter, is a fault, on account of it tending to fatness, and this characteristic being transmitted to their progeny, with consequent loss of eggs. Pullets were a good class, 80 per cent. of them being real business birds. The winner was one of the best I have seen.

The A.O.V. classes were only fair, the females being a long way better than the males, but still, the classes were small, no great variety being shown. The four classes in White Leghorns were much better than last year, both in number and in quality; and, with a little more education in selection, the small number of medium quality birds shown should be eliminated.

HEAVY UTILITY POULTRY.

Mr. S. Buscumb, "Lauraville," Bell-street, East Preston. (Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 154.)

I must congratulate the Society upon the new poultry pavilion, which was all that could be desired, both by exhibitors and judges. The birds in my section were the most even lot I have ever judged, especially the Black Orpington cockerels and pullets. It was difficult to make the awards in these classes, as the birds were of so even a quality. Cocks and hens were also of a satisfactory type, and showed good stamina and large egg capacity, which is looked for in utility poultry. The same remark applies to the Rhode Island Reds. These birds were of good quality right through, and I was pleased to see such a good entry. As I believe this breed should be encouraged, I intend to propose that the National Utility Poultry Breeders' Association donate a blue ribbon to the Rhode Island Red class next year.

The exhibits in the "Any Other Variety" classes were of very good quality, the females being better than the males; but, taking the section right through, the birds were of a very high standard in type, stamina and conformation. In utility classes we do not judge for type and feather only, but we judge for egg-laying capacity also.

DOGS.

NON-SPORTING DOGS (PART I.).

Mr. E. J. Coyle, 312 Flinders-street, Melbourne.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 169.)

At the Royal Agricultural Show the classes of dogs judged by me were:—Newfoundlands, St. Bernards, Great Danes, Mastiffs, Old English Sheep Dogs, Bull Dogs, Rough Coated Collies, Smooth Coated Collies, Kelpies, and Cattle Dogs. With the exception of one or two in each class, the dogs shown were, generally speaking, not up to expectations.

There was not a single entry for Mastiffs, Newfoundlands or St. Bernards, and it is to be regretted that these Old English breeds have so declined in popularity that few are now to be seen, either at exhibitions or in breeders' kennels.

The Great Danes were weak. The winning dog, "Rajah," stood out. He has a nice head, ears and body, but there is room for improvement in his legs and tail.

With the exception of one or two, the Bull Dogs were weak, the quality being much below the average. "Tommy Atkins," the Challenge winner in dogs, is short and low in body, and wide in front, with a nice broken-up face, well smashed back and wide skull. He moved well, and had good expression. The Challenge winner in bitches—"Championship Princess Patricia"—was well shown, looking fresh, with a big skull, short face, good lay-back, well turned-up under jaw, good bone, and nice ears.

There was very little between the first and second Collies in open class for dogs. The winner is a sweet-headed, under-sized dog, in good coat. He looks like galloping all day. He has nice ears and good body. The Challenge winner in bitches—"Leabrook Mistress"—is a black and white; she is a fine specimen, and won easily.

Only one dog approached the Smooth Coated Collie standard, and he was bad. Breeders of these dogs must remember that the Smooth Collie only differs from the Rough in its coat, which should be hard, dense, and quite smooth. I did not make any award in the puppy or open bitch classes.

Kelpies were a good, even lot. The winning dog was a good black,

and will take a lot of beating.

Old English Sheep Dogs and bitches were shown together. The winner, "Glen Craik Boss," is a nice all-round dog; but the bitch, "Frankston Lorna Doone" (second), was too fat. She would have won if exhibited in show condition.

Cattle Dogs were very poor. Only two were shown that approached the standard. The Challenge winner, "Barney," stood out; the others

should not have been shown in the class.

SPORTING DOGS. 1919

Mr. W. Beilby, 13 Darling-street, South Yarra.

The best classes that came before me were the English Setters. The winning dog in the open class, owned by J. H. Gair, is a remarkably nice dog, good to meet and to follow, where so many fail. In head, ears, coat, style and movement, he is as good as anything I have ever seen, but rather heavily colored for my liking. He was closely followed by a dog on similar lines, but who failed to the winner in head. In the bitches another close contest took place between H. J. Bradford's "Lady B." and Mrs. H. Cousins' "Nancy Stair," both lemon marked; the latter rather heavily ticked, the former almost all white body, with a lovely coat, and quality. "Nancy Stair' is nice in bone and body, and a good, free mover; but she failed in head to "Lady B." There was a number of real good Setters present, and, with the recent purchases from Sydney of a couple of good English sires, I look very cheerfully to these handsome and useful dogs coming well into favor again.

Irish Setters also showed a distinct improvement, some nice quality animals coming forward. The winning dog, B. Pritchard's "Ginger Mick," scored so much in all round soundness that I could not penalise his color to the extent of putting him down to the aged "Marshall Lock," who

excelled in this particular.

Puppies were a very decent lot. Miss Shawcross' "Ch. Caulfield Shiela" is a really typical, good, sound bitch, the color, too, so characteristic of the breed. Mrs. Stephens' "Maori Girl" is also a good representative. This brace is, in my opinion, the best we have had for some years. A couple of good "has beens" were shown in this class, particularly J. H. Toy's "Miss Primrose."

Black Curly Retrievers brought out the best bitch I have ever seen. Indeed, I have never seen such a perfect coat before in either sex. I have placed the bitches first in my report on account of their general excellence. The winner, A. R. A. Clark's "Tartool Doreen," I consider the best animal in my section. C. Langford's "Sly Girl," although not so good in curl and size, is a good all round bitch. The winning dog is good in bone, legs, feet, body and action, and fair in head; but his curl was uneven. J. R. Fiske's "Young Jock" is another good specimen. Indeed, the Retrievers were a very satisfactory lot.

The Field Spaniels were poor.

Cocker Spaniels were fair, a few nice specimens being present, but nothing approaching high-class standards. The winning dog, J. Elliott's "Bonny Bangson," is over-sized. "Malt Baron," who was in poor coat, was placed second. This class made me hesitate a little longer than usual;

but on looking the class over afterwards, I felt satisfied with the award.

"Malt Baron" won in puppies rather easily.

In the open class for bitches, J. H. Egan's old favorite, "Ch. Romping Girl," added to her long list, which must be coming to an end, as she is beginning to show signs of age. J. Elliott's "Bonny Blonde" is one of the most promising young ones that came before me, and, with a little more coat, would have won.

Pointers proved to be the most difficult classes to sort. The entries were above the average, and many good dogs had to be sent out cardless. J. H. Pasco's "Lord Gwyne" has come on well in every respect, except the head, since I judged him last. His great bone, sound legs, good feet, well-sprung ribs and firm hindquarters make him a difficult dog to pass. V. Street's "Marathon Lad" failed to the winner in body and bone, and gained in the head. R. H. Auty's "Ch. Duchess Gwyne," a sister to the winning dog, only just won, her bone, and head properties giving her an advantage over the good quality and well conditioned "Headland Gipsy Queen," whose want of foreface gave the balance to the unconditioned "Duchess."

The puppy class contained a nice lot of promising youngsters, numerically the best I have seen for some time. The balance of my classes were poor in numbers, but good in quality. Miss V. Pearson's Deerhound Was a good, sound, upstanding dog, excelling in size. The winning Borzois Dog, A. N. Marshall's "Ivan," is the best I have seen since the days of "Champion Plevna," and very much like that great dog. He is of good size, yet abounding in quality. Mr. P. F. Daly's "Count Cossack" is a fair one. Mr. Marshall won again in the bitch class with "Olga," another remarkably fine animal, who stood right out from Mr. P. F. Daly's "Fair Beauty." was a good, sound, upstanding dog, excelling in size. The winning Borzois

Greyhounds were few in numbers, as usual, and poor in quality, excepting in the case of the winning dog, G. D. Shawcross's "Flying Colours," which is a very nicely balanced, upstanding fawn.

SHEEP DOG TRIALS.

Mr. M. Baley Bryant, "Cairn Curraw," Baringhup.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 180.)

The Sheep Dog trials seemed to be much appreciated by the public, who were not lacking with their applause when any particularly clever work was done. They clearly showed that they understood the fine points. The dogs were well under control, and showed cleverness and patience to a marked degree. The winner, Mr. T. White's "Wampy" (both days) and Mr. Kemp's "Darky" (on the first day) gave very finished exhibitions, and some of the younger dogs illustrated the careful way they had been bred and handled by their respective owners. The sheep were rather too quiet to allow the dogs to work to the greatest advantage.

PRODUCE.

WHEAT.

Mr. A. E. V. Richardson, Department of Agriculture, Melbourne. (Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 181.)

The standard of the exhibits was well up to that of previous years. Good entries were received in all four classes—Macaroni, Low Strength White, High Strength White, and High Strength Red. The competition was, as usual, keenest in the Low Strength White class. The wheats were judged on points—bushel weight, strength of flour, percentage of gluten, volume and texture of the loaf being taken into consideration. The following table summarises the points allotted in each class:—

The first prize in the Macaroni class was won by Entry No. 5401, a fine sample of Medeah, grown by M. J. D'Arcy, at Berrigan, N.S.W., on grey-red loam. The points awarded were 801. Telford Bros. and M. J. D'Arcy were equal for second prize, with 77½ points.

The winning exhibit was a fine, well-grown sample of Medeah, with an exceptionally high gluten content (14.5 per cent.).

In the High Strength Red class, all competitors exhibited Cedar. The first prize was won by Mr. M. J. D'Arcy, with an excellent sample of Cedar, weighing 66.3lbs. per bushel. The flour gave the high return of 14.7 per cent. of dry gluten, and a strength of 50. The strength is defined as the number of quarts of water absorbed by a 200lb. sack of flour to make a dough of a consistency fit for baking. The strength is also roughly proportioned by the number of loaves that can be made from a sack of flour.

The champion wheat this year was found in the High Strength White The winning exhibit in this section was a magnificent sample of Comeback, grown by M. J. D'Arcy at Berrigan, on a rainfall of 14 inches during the growing period of the crop. The wheat weighed 67lbs. per bushel, showed a flour strength of 51, and yielded 12.8 per cent. of dry

gluten.

It is significant that the gluten content, both of Cedar, Comeback and Macaroni varieties, grown at Berrigan, was considerably higher than the same varieties grown at Angle Vale, in South Australia; and these, in their turn, were higher than the same varieties grown in the Wimmera. This is shown in the following table:-

Unfortunately, these three competitors did not all enter for the Low Strength White Class, so that comparisons of gluten content of low strength wheats grown in the three States cannot be made.

Mr. D'Arcy's Currawa gave a gluten content of 12.3 per cent., as compared with a gluten content of 8.5 per cent. in Currawa grown by Telford

Bros. at Gowra (Victoria).

It would seem clear that the Royal competition establishes what has been suspected, namely, that the gluten content of the wheat is largely dependent upon the climate, and in particular by the rapidity of the ripening period of the wheat.

The climatic conditions at Berrigan, N.S.W., last year were unusually

favorable for the production of high quality wheat, with the result that Mr. D'Arcy was able to capture the prizes in all four classes.

Further investigation will be made to find out the monthly distribution of the rain and the temperatures at the three centres last year, to see if it is possible to explain the superiority of the Berrigan wheats over the South Australian and Victorian.

The Low Strength White class, as usual, had the greatest number of contestants. First and second prizes were won by Mr. M. J. D'Arcy, of Berrigan, with samples of Florence and Currawa respectively. The Champion prize of Australia was awarded to Mr. M. J. D'Arcy, with a magnificent sample of Comeback.

On the whole, the entries were not numerous, but the quality of the wheat was very high, and showed a considerable improvement on previous years. A few competitors, however, submitted samples which apparently were not much above f.a.q. standard, and two submitted samples that were decidedly smutted.

BEST SHEAF OF WHEAT.

Only five entries were received in this section. The varieties entered were Federation, Major, Dart's Imperial, and Joffre. As this was the first time the competition was held, standards for judging had to be formulated. The competition had to be decided on the appearance and get-up of the sheaves, and not on the yielding capacity after trial under equal soil conditions.

Under the rules formulated by the Society, the grain from the winning sheaves will be sown under equal conditions at one of the Government Experiment Farms next year. In that way, the real merit of selection

will be tested.

Besides judging the sheaves on their appearance, the type and uniformity of the ears, some tests were made to determine the average length, number of spikelets per ear, and the number of grains per head. This data is summarised in the following table:—

The first prize was won by Bennett Bros., Dookie, with a fine sheaf of Dart's Imperial. A. O. Badman, of Yacka (S.A.), won the second prize with a nice sheaf of Major.

MAIZE.

Mr. James Fisher, Orbost.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 181.)

Although the number of exhibits shown was somewhat disappointing, all of the classes were represented. The maize which obtained the Government Certificate (a Yellow Dent variety) was very similar to what received this certificate last year. It was a very fine sample. There were two distinct kinds of white maize cobs, the first prize being awarded to the variety which is grown principally for its grain; and the second to what is usually grown for green fodder purposes. The three bushels of white maize awarded first prize were an excellent sample. The Yellow Flint was also very good.

FARM PRODUCE (EXCEPT CEREALS AND POTATOES).

Mr. J. George, Mt. Alexander-road, Ascot Vale.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 182.)

There was a very good display of oaten chaff. One exhibit appeared to have had an admixture of grain, and was therefore not judged. The exhibits of wheaten chaff were good, and, I think, better than in 1918,

but still, there is room for improvement. The quality of the lucerne chaff was fair, but could be much better. Trussed manger hay was fairly good in quality, but there were only two exhibits. All the exhibits of chaffing oaten sheaves were of good quality, but it would have been better if these exhibits were shown in two classes—one for oaten chaffing sheaves, and the other for manger sheaves. Some of the exhibits were short and fine, and some were long and coarse.

There were only two exhibits of wheaten hay, and, although the quality was good, this class should be better represented at the Show. The quality of the lucerne hay was fair, but still, there was room for improvement. The linseed was very good, and more should be grown in Victoria, as there is always a good sale for it at a reasonable price—at from £10 to £15 per ton—though during the war period, and up to the present time, the price has been from £20 to £35 per ton, and very

little to be had, even at these prices.

Long mangels were a very fine lot, and the growers deserve great credit for having produced such fine exhibits. Globe mangels were also very good. The pumpkins were good. One exhibit could not take a prize, as the same owner had taken a prize with another exhibit in the

same class.

Sugar Beet.—Prizes were awarded without analysis. The carrots were fine samples, and the exhibitors well deserved the prizes. The onions were beautiful samples, and in good condition. One exhibit was put out on account of the same person having two entries of the one variety.

The class for turnips provided a fine show of sixteen competitors,

and it was a very hard matter to place the first three.

POTATOES.

Mr. W. H. Maine, 452 Flinders-street, Melbourne.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 135.)

As regards the exhibits of potatoes, I much regret to say that the number submitted was very small, and altogether out of proportion to the quantity produced in Victoria, which, as previously stated, is the leading producing State for this article. It is greatly to be regretted that the farmers do not take more interest in our Show, especially in view of the fact that we have so many Interstate visitors over; and it would be an opportunity of showing them the very excellent quality that can be, and is, produced. I cannot offer any practical suggestion to stimulate growers. It should be to their own interests as a body to forward exhibits; but one would imagine that the Farmers' Unions and the Potato Growers' Association would stir themselves in the matter. I should scarcely think that any increase in the prize money is necessary—patriotic and reasons of self interest should be sufficient.

As regards the exhibits themselves, those that were shown were of excellent quality. Exception might be taken to the Redskins, which were certainly not up to the usual standard, or equal to samples that have been coming forward for sale during the season. No doubt, many of the growers specialise in this particular variety, which are of the class required for export. There is no question, Victoria can, and does, produce in a large way, as good samples as are grown in any part of the world. Unfortunately, I have again to emphasise that, in a general way, the paucity of exhibits did not convey this impression. Growers' interests and their knowledge of potatoes suited for the different districts, teach them the class that they should grow; consequently, it is impossible to offer any remarks or advice of any educational value, as the various classes of land in different districts are suitable for certain classes that

should be grown. But, as regards export, speaking from practical experience, it is strongly recommended that farmers should grow more of the Redskin variety, such as Brownell Beauties, Plunkets, Manistees, Peach Blooms and Brown Rivers, but the latter, unfortunately, seem to have run out, and a fresh importation of seed from European or American countries is required.

TABLE VEGETABLES.

Mr. T. Marriott, McGuiness-road, Bentleigh.

The display was of excellent quality. I have never judged better in this State. I would suggest that a prize be given for the best collection of vegetables to one who has never won a first prize in the collection class, also that jam melons be divided into two classes—one for citron melons, and the other for pie melons; also that beetroot be given two classes for what is known as turnip-rooted beet, as well as ordinary beetroot; and, further, that Turks' caps be given two classes—one to be called Turk's cap, and the other five-crown Turk's cap.

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES' COMPETITION

DAIRY PRODUCE AND FOODS.

Mr. J. Bradshaw, Terang.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 185.)

I have the honor to report that the produce sections of the Agricultural Societies' exhibits at this year's Show were, on the whole, particularly good. The Whittlesea, Bacchus Marsh and Maffra exhibits were of a very high order, possibly as good, or even the best of the kind ever seen in Australasia. The arrangement, design and setting out, together with the decorations, in each of the exhibits, were very effective, the whole display being specially spectacular, each resembling a huge window-dressing design. It may be safely affirmed that these exhibits were one of the chief attractions of the Show, and could not fail to be of great educational value to the crowds inspecting them.

FRUITS, SAUCES, VEGETABLES, PICKLES AND ROOTS.

Mr. John Milburn, "The Grange," Keilor.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 185.)

Since I last judged there has been a gratifying increase in the number of entries in the district exhibits, which must be a great acquisition to the attractiveness of the Show. Generally speaking, most of the exhibits showed to great advantage, and testified to the keenness shown by the people in striving to make their particular district the best at the Show.

The Whittlesea exhibit was well up to the average of former years. The fruit, both fresh and bottled, showed to great advantage. Preserved vegetables were very good, the tomatoes especially so. The honey in the comb was much admired. Fresh vegetables were a good lot right through. The potatoes, both for variety and quality, were excellent. The fresh fruit was hardly up to the standard of previous years.

The Bacchus Marsh exhibit had many excellent features, but in some respects was not up to former years. The fresh fruit, in my opinion, was not shown to the best advantage. On the other hand, the bottled fruits and pickles stand was very attractive, and, for quality and variety, formed quite a feature of the exhibit. The vegetables were a good lot. The potatoes were well grown and good, but had not the great variety of the Whittlesea exhibit. The pickles were up to the average.

The great feature of the Wagga exhibit was the citrus and dried ts. The navel oranges were of good quality. Lemons were equally The dried fruits showed to advantage, both in quality and quantity. Bottled fruit showed good quality. The bottled tomatoes were really first class. The fresh vegetables were very fair, but showed signs of staleness, and must have been a long time on the journey.

A fine display of sugar beet was noticed in the Maffra exhibit. bottled fruit in this exhibit was of good quality and variety, but was not shown to the best advantage, being too near the floor. In fresh fruit, there was a good variety, but it was rather small in size. The potatoes shown were good, but lacked in number of varieties. The fresh vegetables were of fair quality, but showed signs of staleness.

In the Kerang exhibit the citrus fruits stood out prominently. They were of good size, appearance and quality. Bottled fruits were good, but lacked variety. Dried fruits had a fair number of varieties, and the quality also was fair. There was a very good assortment of pickles of

good quality in this exhibit.

STATE SCHOOL COMPETITIONS.

FODDER CROPS, GRAIN AND POTATOES.

Mr. J. H. Refshauge, High School, Ballarat.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 186.)

The exhibits judged by me in the State Schools' section, with the exception of potatoes, which were, on the whole, inferior, were of a type much superior to those exhibited for some years. In addition, exhibitors had, in most cases, arranged their exhibits attractively.

Difficulty in judging was experienced, as one had to step on shelves occupied by exhibits. I would suggest that, if the same type of staging is to be used in future, the exhibits be placed on a flat table, and there judged, and afterwards the exhibits be placed on the staging. If the exhibits were grouped into their several sections on a flat stand or table, it would not take long to place them on the show stand.

FORESTRY, FRUIT TREES AND VEGETABLES.

Mr. W. H. Callister, Agricultural High School, Shepparton. (Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 186.)

Improvement was shown in the exhibit in Forestry. Entries were more numerous, and the exhibits were mostly clean, well-grown specimens. It was evident that great care had been taken with them. Competitors should be careful to see that sectional requirements are complied with. In the class for three trees, not native to Australia, natives were Again, in the same class a conifer was shown, although the class is exclusive of conifers.

A good exhibit in forestry came from the Sutherland Home, showing foliage, flowers and fruit, together with sections of the woods. exhibit is of educational value, and every sloyd teacher in the State might reasonably be expected to stage a similar exhibit from his district.

In the class for collections of fruits, there was more fruit shown than last year, but there is still very little competition in this part of the section. In the class for collections of preserved fruits, considerable improvement was shown, but some of the jars had not been properly closed. The syrup, which leaked out, made the jars sticky to handle. This, of course, is fatal to an exhibit of this kind.

The exhibits in the different classes of vegetables were up to the standard of recent years, but do not compare favorably with those of former years, when different inspectorial districts competed with each other, and each district had a separate bay for its own display. In recent years teachers have devoted most of their spare time to raising money for patriotic purposes, by means of concerts, fetes and carnivals, and it is greatly to their credit that they have found time throughout it all to maintain the school competition in agricultural products. Now that the war has come to an end, the competition may be expected to increase, as there will be more time to devote to it.

A non-competitive exhibit from the Bendigo Inspectorial Districts, No. 1 and No. 2, of produce grown under the home projects scheme, attracted attention. These home projects schemes are being developed, notably in the Goulburn Valley and Sale districts, as well as in those above mentioned.

FORAGE AND ROOTS, GRASSES, CLOVER, HONEY AND FLAX.

Mr. J. P. McLennan, School of Primary Agriculture and Horticulture, Burnley.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 188.)

Little comment is needed upon the classes I judged at the last Show. Some of the exhibits were good; others should not have been shown. There were some very good specimens of mangels and swede turnips, and some of the examples of grasses were exceedingly good.

One school has been exhibiting the same collection of flax specimens for two or three years. That, of course, does not indicate what the school is doing year by year in dealing with flax. The Bendigo district displayed a non-competitive exhibit. As there was ample room in the various sections, I think this district should have stood in with the This individual display is not in the best interests of the competition as a whole.

CHEESE.

Mr. G. C. Sawers, Department of Agriculture, Melbourne.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 190.)

The entries in the Cheese classes were more numerous this year than last, but, with the exception of the prize lots, the quality generally was not of the same average standard as in past years. There were two main faults, viz., uncleanness of flavor and excessive acidity. An improvement was shown in most exhibits in body and texture, only one or two makes showing weakness and openness of texture and cracked rinds.

In the class suitable for export, only half a point separated the first and second competitors. The second cheese was clean and well made, but had an insipid taste, termed curdy.

BUTTER.

Mr. P. J. Carroll, The Rialto, Collins-street, Melbourne. (Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 190.)

I regret very sincerely the apathy shown by factory managers in assisting to make the butter exhibit one worthy of the great industry it represents. The same indifference was displayed by Victorian factory managers in connection with the London Dairy Show, held at Islington this year, with the result that most of the principal awards went to New South Wales factories. The three exhibits forwarded by Victorian factory managers were not at all representative of the best factories in the State, and consequently the industry received a very bad advertisement.

In regard to the exhibits at the Royal Show, I have much pleasure in stating that the quality in the factory classes was well up to the

standard, and the only disappointment was the paucity of entries.

Those in the export class were, generally speaking, all of good average quality, the first prize butter being of exceptional merit. It will be noted that even in this State, New South Wales factory managers were responsible for one entry (Barrengarry), the quality of which was also very fine.

Print butter brought forth only four entries, three of which were of

excellent quality, and, in my opinion, above the average.

Local trade butter was represented by five entries, all of which, with one exception, were very fine, and reflected considerable credit upon the factory managers presenting same.

In the class for dairy butter, there were altogether five entries, the quality of which, I regret to say, with one exception, was very poor

indeed.

WINES.

Messrs. W. W. Senior, c/o. Matthew Lang & Co., 57 Market-street, Melbourne; W. E. Lillie, c/o. Curcier, Adet & Co., William-street, Melbourne, and C. W. Simmonds, c/o. John Connell & Co., Bourke-street, Melbourne.

(Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 192.)

A large entry was submitted to the judges in this section, and, generally, the standard of quality was good. With few exceptions, the wines were well made, and those exhibited in the matured classes showed care in preparation and excellent finish.

The 1919 vintage wines were above the average, and it is some years since such an all round lot of good, healthy, young wines have come under the judges' notice. The first prize taker in the Red, Sweet, class was particularly attractive, and the first prize wine in the Full Bodied,

Dry, White class was also full of quality.

Commercially, the most valuable among the matured wines are those representing Port and Sherry types, and the entries showed no falling off, either in number or merit. The progressive improvement in the quality and character of these types during the past few years is noticeable, especially in those of the Tawny Port type, which now leave little to be desired in the way of color and condition. They are still too sweet, in comparison with their European prototype, but, while the public demand is for the sweeter wine, the growers are not likely to make any alteration.

The exhibits in the dry classes, of Hock, Chablis and Claret styles, were mostly good, sound wines, of excellent quality and promise; but not one amongst the lot showed the real bottle age which is expected here. These wines contained sufficient acidity to enable them to improve

for many years, and, as the classes are described as for old bottled wines, it is regrettable that merchants will not mature them in bottle long enough to give the character and development required.

The exhibits in the Kiosk classes were good, wholesome wines. The judges suggest that the quantity of each entry should be not less than

two dozen bottles.

An interesting addition to the schedule was in the classes for Australian Whisky and Gin. The quality of both spirits was good, especially the gin. The whiskies, however, were too young to enable a forecast to be made as to how they would develop when given the age necessary to bring out the character of an all malt whisky. The Brandy entries were few, and the quality not above the average. It might be well to give a first prize only for brandy, which would harmonise with the prizes in the other spirit classes.

FRUITS.

Mr. F. W. Vear, Burwood.

I found a general improvement in all the fruit classes staged, and exhibitors evidently appreciate the Society's efforts to make this section one of the best. The district exhibits were staged much more effectively than in the previous year, and the work of the judge was not quite so difficult. I think it would be worth a trial to take the fruit out of the cases and place it on the stands before judging. The cases forwarded for exhibition could be packed firmly by the exhibitors. I do not think that any fruit exhibited in the section for fruit on trays should be more than three-quarters of an inch above the side of the trays.

HORTICULTURE.

Mr. G. Cooper, Alexandra Gardens, Melbourne.

I have pleasure in stating that the display in the Horticulture section, although confined to one exhibitor, was highly satisfactory. The plants, on the whole, were on the small side, but were well grown and healthy.

I was particularly impressed by the show of Aspidistras, three Palms, Cocas Weddelliana, Latania Barbonica, and Rhaphis Flabelleformis. The last named were particularly good; while that of Crotons, Ferns, Cordylines, Window Boxes, Hanging Basket, and a group of plants, made up a most attractive display.

The fact that there was only one exhibitor in the section evidently shows that it was not generally known that there was to have been such a competition, and I would respectfully suggest that the Society make the competition more widely known. The displays would be much larger, and the competitions correspondingly keener.

APICULTURE.

Mr. H. S. Lee, 15 Cambridge-street, Hawthorn.

I much regret that the exhibits were so meagre as to almost call for no comment. The Clear Honey, both light and dark, was of very good quality, but in both these classes there was no competition, all the former being staged by one competitor, and the latter by just two. In Beeswax, again there was but one exhibit, which I might describe as being very fair.

WOMEN'S INDUSTRIES.

PLAIN AND FANCY NEEDLEWORK

Mrs. Harvey-Smith, "Woodside," Upper Beaconsfield. (Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 200)

I have much pleasure in reporting that the exhibits in the Plain and Fancy Needlework compared favorably with those of previous Shows. Every year I can see a vast improvement in the work. The number of the exhibits exceeded any previous Show, and many articles were excellent in workmanship.

The crochet work, in cotton or linen thread, was the finest work of its class that I have ever seen, both for its general excellence of work and beauty of design. Another piece of work which stood out above all others was a hand-made camisole, the sewing being beautifully neat.

Shirts, made in cotton or flannel, were also very accurate.

Great praise is due to the dressmakers. Coats and skirts were well finished, and of good style. The improvement in millinery was also most noticeable.

I was pleased to see more interest taken in the infant's outfit, though there is still much room for improvement. One could hardly call a coat, a hat and a bib an outfit. Infants' bonnets—such easy articles to make were poor in quality and few in number.

Trousseau sets were good in style, and well made.

Socks were good, on the whole, but some exhibitors knitted rather too tightly.

Embroidered photo frames have gone out of fashion. In this class

the entries were few and poor.

The much-favored class for crochet afternoon tea cloths was well filled again, and here some splendid work was shown; and, as there were also some very fine designs, the judging was most difficult.

The eyelet work was also very fine, and competition was keen.

The entries in the class for a tea cosy were numerous, but some of the exhibits were badly made up. There was a great falling off in the quality of d'oyleys in crochet work, although some pretty ones were well worked on linen.

The embroidered handkerchiefs were very dainty, and the initials on handkerchiefs were much improved.

ARTS AND CRAFTS.

Mrs. Theo. Anderson, Temple Court, Collins-street, Melbourne. (Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 204.)

The standard of work in the Arts and Crafts classes shows a steady improvement each year. It is gratifying to note that the entries are also increasing. This, no doubt, is due to the increased amount of prize money that has been offered.

FOODS.

Miss Flora Pell, Domestic Art School, Vere-street, Collingwood. (Comp'ete awards in this Section will be found on page 206.)

The items for competition, on the whole, were of a very high standard, and the number of entries compared favorably with last year's totals. The fact of the exhibits being sent in on Saturday, and not being judged till the Monday, made no difference to the awarding of the prizes.

The scones suffered the most, of course, but every competitor shared the same disadvantage or advantage.

Fruit cakes, sponges and shortbread stand out as being very fine indeed, and the bottled fruits and jams indicated an intelligent knowledge of the principles on which the preparation and preserving of fruits depend. Syrup was of a good strength to preserve color, soundness and shape, and the entries added greatly to the general show of this section. Adequate provision was made for keeping the foodstuffs all under cover in glass cases. The public could view the same in comfort, and with least detriment to the perishables.

The building used for the women's section, to my mind, is anything but ideal. The equipment inside is good, the cases to hold the work being quite satisfactory; but in the annexe that is used these cannot be shown to advantage at all. Nationally, this section is one of the most important, and should have a building in keeping with its position.
