Gentlemen,—The Council has much pleasure in submitting a port of the Society's proceedings for the year 1883.

On the acceptance of the site for show-grounds notified in the reort for last year, the Council at once appointed a Works Committee make arrangements for erecting new show-yards. A contour an of the grounds, drawn by a competent surveyor, was first tained, when premiums were offered by advertisement for designs for fencing and building, and for laying out the grounds. even designs were sent in, and the first prize of £50 was awarded that of Messrs. N. Billing and Son, who were appointed chitects to carry out the works. The prize design was afterwards considerably modified by Messrs. Billing, under the direcon of the Works Committee, when tenders were called for the cing and buildings, the main central exhibition hall being itted. Eighteen tenders were received, that of Mr. H. Maxwell, £8,774 9s. 6d., being the lowest. This tender was accepted, Mr. Horsman having been appointed Clerk of Works, the bildings were at once commenced. The Council expected that ficient progress would have been made with the contract to emble the Society to hold the Annual Horse Parade in August, but such was not the case; and, after the date had been fixed and

advertised, the holding of the Parade had to be abandoned. It was also so late in the season before the grounds were fenced in, that the Works Committee was unable to have a system of tree planting in the yards carried out, as was intended, and on which suggestions had been obtained from Mr. Ferguson, of the State Nursery. It is to be hoped, however, that this important feature will not be lost sight of.

As there was no water supply on the grounds, a deputation from the Council waited on the Hon. the Minister of Public Works, to ask the Department to extend the supply to the yards; but the request could not be complied with. Permission was then obtained from the Victoria Racing Club to take a service from the Racecourse main, and the contractor for the yards undertook and carried out the work of laying on the water, in accordance with an approved plan, for a sum of £205 7s. 6d.

At the request of a deputation to the Hon. the Minister, the Railway Department constructed a siding, with a dock and crane, at the corner of the Society's yards; so that exhibits, as well as visitors, may be landed from the trains right at the grounds, ample platform accommodation having been provided for a very large number of visitors.

The Council, for the sum of £50, purchased a strip of land extending from the railway corner to the main entrance gates, and encroaching about 16 feet on the line of the outside boundary beyond the gates. The purchase of the fee simple of this right-of-way, as it was called, enabled the Works Committee to erect the fence along the railway side of the gates in a line with that on the other side, thus making the eastern boundary a straight line throughout.

The whole of the work was completed in time for the Spring Show, which was held on the 7th, 8th, and 9th November. The Council had issued a liberal programme of prizes, which was followed by a supplementary list offering £500 in addition. This sum was obtained from the Hon. the Minister of Agriculture, and was offered as Grand Champion Prizes of Australia, the gift of the Parliament of Victoria. The number of entries for the show was largely in excess of that received in any previous year; so that, with all the increased accommodation of the new yards, extra buildings had to be erected and temporary stalls fitted up for exhibits. The time for receiving entries extended to within ten

days of the opening of the show, and with such a rush of these all being crowded in at the last moment, it was not possible in the time to have them classified and the arrangement made as perfect as desirable. Another year it will certainly be in the interests of all concerned to allow more time between the date fixed for closing entries and the show.

The Council has reason to congratulate the Society on the grand collection of exhibits brought together at the opening show on the new grounds, a collection not only of Victorian exhibits, but one in which several of the adjoining colonies were well represented. The draught horses made a good show, there being a better turn-out of aged stallions than had been the case for a number of years. The show of draught horses is very much dependent on the grand draught horse produce stakes, which continues to attract numerous entries of yearlings, the colts this year being specially mentioned by the judges as a very superior section. It is satisfactory to report that the nominations of sires for the stakes for 1884 comprise most of the picked stallions of the colony, so that the continued success of this stakes is assured. There was the best show of thoroughbreds the Society has yet held; while the American trotters, which were exhibited in first-class style, as well as the young stock, proved a great attraction. In the shorthorn cattle class almost every section was specially marked by the judges as being of very high merit, while the display of Herefords, Ayrshires, Alderneys, Brittanies, and dairy cattle was the largest yet seen in the colony. Thanks to the efforts of Mr. Hearne in collecting special prizes, there was a large increase in the show of swine; while sheep, poultry, dogs, produce, and the minor classes were well up to the Society's usual standard. In the supplementary prize list prizes were offered for machinery and implements. The entries in this class, together with miscellaneous exhibits, formed a most extensive show, which quite exceeded general expectations, and which was highly creditable to the enterprise of exhibitors. The attendance of the public throughout was good, and exceeded that of the previous year at the old yards. Dissatisfaction was expressed at the Railway Department not running trains to the show on the second day, but it had been previously understood by the management that no trains could stop at the grounds on Race days at Flemington.

Visitors to the grounds were highly pleased with the new site, and general satisfaction was expressed at the great progress the Council had made with the improvements. Still further works, however, are contemplated; and when these are completed, and greater facilities offered to enable visitors to reach the grounds, it is to be hoped that the attendances at the Society's exhibitions will be largely increased. Unfortunately, on the afternoon of the last day of the show, heavy rain suddenly came on, and caused a general stampede, putting an abrupt conclusion to an otherwise most successful exhibition.

The Council has appointed a Show-yards Committee, to make arrangements for letting the boxes and yards for sales and other purposes, and it is expected that the Society will derive a very considerable revenue from this source.

The judges in machinery at the show ordered a field trial of the reaping and mowing and the reaping and binding machines. The trial was afterwards carried out on the farm of Mr. John Kernan, Moonee Ponds, who was good enough to place his crop at the disposal of the Society. The reaping and mowing machines did excellent work, it being difficult to decide between them.

The reapers and binders also did first-class work—that done by the machine which won first prize, a "Woods," exhibited by Messrs. James M'Ewan and Co., was almost perfection, securing 112 points out of a possible 120.

In February a letter was received from Mr. P. M'Farland, of New South Wales, asking the Council to take up the question of the assimilation of the quarantine regulations of the various colonies, with a view of making the introduction or the prohibition of stock a national policy, and suggesting that a conference of the Chief Inspectors of Stock of the several colonies, together with representatives of the various National Agricultural Associations, should meet and discuss the propriety of carrying out this proposal. The Council appointed a committee to deal with the matter, which committee directed the Secretary to write to the Chief Inspectors of Stock of the different colonies, asking their opinion on the subject. This was done, and replies were received containing valuable information, and approving of a conference being held. The committee recommended that a conference of the Chief Inspectors of Stock, together with representatives of the various National Agricultural Associations, be held in Melbourne; when the Council appointed a deputation to wait on the Hon. the Chief Secretary to inform him of the action already taken by the Society, as well as to lay before him the opinions and information received, and ask that the Government should at that stage take the matter up, and call such a conference in Melbourne. The Chief Secretary, however, declined to comply with the request. A deputation was then appointed to wait on the Hon. the Minister of Agriculture, to bring the subject before him. The Minister received the deputation very favourably, but thought the object could be attained by correspondence without a conference. He then promised he would at once open up correspondence with the Governments of the various colonies, and urge the necessity of the establishment of a general system with regard to the introduction or prohibition of stock, as advocated by the deputation.

In March applications were called for a Collector for the Society, and, out of 30 applicants, Mr. George Grantham was appointed. Mr. Grantham resigned his position in October, and another appointment has not yet been made. Although a collector has not been at work all through, it is satisfactory to report that over 90 new subscribers have been added to the Society's list during the year. The amount derived from private donations has, however, fallen off very considerably.

In April the Council was asked to nominate gentlemen to represent the Society on the Calcutta Exhibition Commission; and, from five nominations, Mr. J. Gibb, president, Dr. Plummer, vice-president, and Mr. D. Mitchell, member of Council, were appointed Commissioners. The Council appointed a committee to collect exhibits, which committee was so successful that a letter was received conveying the thanks of the Commission for "the energetic action of the Society and the personal efforts of the Secretary."

In June the North-Eastern Agricultural Society, Murchison, wrote, asking the Council to issue circulars inviting co-operation in endeavouring to have the "National" show held every year in Melbourne. Circulars were accordingly issued, and 34 replies were received—24 of these being against the proposal and 10 in favour of it.

In the same month plates of the phylloxera were received by the Council. These were framed and added to the library. This Gentlemen, university buildings are added to, colleges are founded. These, however, are limited to the extent of their usefulness, and such noble gifts must be limited to the noble few; but here is the opportunity of every man, according to his means, from the workman, grateful for the blessings he now enjoys, in comparison with his brother labourers elsewhere, to the capitalist, who enjoys nearly every day the blessings of this beautiful climate, each joining in a true and perfect act of pure and unselfish patriotism, and which will cause this period of our history, and the names of the donors, to be remembered hereafter with gratitude, and all over the world with admiration.

I have not dwelt on the great benefit, in a politico-economical view, that the wood would be to this colony, for everyone is cognizant of the rate at which wood all over the inhabited globe is being consumed, and that it is daily becoming scarcer. I do not dwell on the fact that those entering into competition are really increasing the value of their estates, because if they do not gain the prize they have a result in a magnificent quantity of trees, from which they can weed out many young ones, if they are over-crowding, and can sell them, &c., &c.

Moreover, during their growth they will protect their crops and shelter them from cutting winds, and arrest rust spores traversing from one wheat field to another.

There is no fear of our not having plenty of competitors, for many to whom I have spoken on this subject have said that, if the State would present them with a few acres on condition of their planting them with trees, they would do so, so pleasant is the occupation of tree culture. I have now to ask the attention of the public to the enormous consumption of timber going on. There must be at least four million tons consumed in domestic use annually throughout the colony.

I have asked the head of the Mining department to give me a return of the wood used by the miners for fuel and sawn timber. I have written to the Engineer-in-Chief of the Victorian Railways to ask him how much is used for sleepers, for posts and rails, and fencing; how many years they last, and how often they want renewing. This will amount to some millions of tons.

The total destruction of our timber must be something very fearful, and it is certain that in a short time this timber will become very scarce indeed, so that there is another reason, irrespective of heat, and moisture, and climate, to cause us to be anxious for the future of this colony,

I would now ask some gentleman to start the fund by paying into the Commercial Bank, to the credit of the "Forest Culture Prize" account, such sum as to him may seem fit, and a parchment roll be kept of the names of the donors. Doubtless the Government might become also donors, and cause a sum to be placed at interest as a nucleus.

I have purposely abbreviated this paper, because I am not delivering a lecture, and through your Council I am talking to the whole agricultural and pastoral interests of this colony. There are scientific gentlemen who can dilate and enlarge on the great benefits likely to accrue by not only preserving our woods and forests, but also by adding to the same, not only for climatic but for commercial uses.

I append herewith a few official statistical returns kindly furnished me by the heads of the Railway and Mining departments. It will be seen that by the favour of Mr. Robert Watson, the Engineer-in Chief, in from twelve to fifteen years that department will require four and a-half million posts, thirteen and a quarter million rails, twenty-one million cubic feet of timber for sleepers, two hundred and fifty thousand tons of wood for firing. To give an idea of the quantity consumed for mining purposes, the value alone in seven places amounts to £334,615 19s. 5d; and the total cost in these places from 1863 to 1882 reaches £7,698,528. And so great has been the

destruction of timber unaccounted for in the immediate districts, that the Secretary of Mines states that in some cases the timber has to be brought 100 miles to the mines.

Timber used in other mines is not mentioned here. Timber for posts and rails for fencing all over the country; for firewood in Melbourne and large inland towns; for wood pavement, which is just being established in Melbourne; for building purposes—nay, for the thousands of other uses to which it can be applied, such as piles, piers, &c., &c.

I only ask you to consider that, with these immense demands, how can the supply meet the demand, and at what cost, unless something is done to meet it? This is altogether leaving out the climatic influences.

Gentlemen, I thank you for your attention, and allow me to state, if you do not approve of the plan I have suggested, yet I recommend it to your serious consideration, feeling satisfied that my efforts have not been in vain in bringing before you a subject which is of the most vital importance to the welfare of this colony.

The paper was well received, and an interesting discussion followed its reading. The writer, in acknowledging a vote of thanks passed to him, said he hoped that, now he had broken the ice, other members of the Council would be induced to read papers for discussion, as he believed if this were done it would greatly benefit the Institution.

The Council desires to return since thanks to the donors of prizes at the Spring Show. Separate mention is due to the Hearne, of Swanston-street, who not enty offered a special prize of a silver cup (value £12 12s.) for hams and bacon, but also collected £15 15s. in plate and cups, and £21 in case, to be awarded as prizes in the swine classes.

The Council also begs to thank the subscribers and exhibitors, as well as the general public, for their support, and to express indebtedness to the gentlemen who acted as judges for the satisfactory manner in which they discharged their onerous duties.

Several changes occurred in the Council during the year. Mr. John Robertson did not attend any meetings, and on his seat becoming vacant, Mr. Thomas Brunton was elected in his place. Mr. Thomas Shaw resigned his seat on account of being about to visit England, and the Hon. T. F. Cumming was elected in his place. In December Mr. A. Fiskon resigned his seat, through pressure of business preventing him from attending the Council's meetings. Mr. Fisken, who was an old office-bearer of the Society, had previously held the office of President. The Council accepted his resignation with great regret, and ordered a letter to

be written to him expressing the Society's indebtedness for his valuable past services.

Attention is directed to the annexed statement of receipts and expenditure, which has been carefully audited* (vide report). It will be seen that at the end of the year the Society had incurred an overdraft of £5,166 ls. 7d., for which satisfactory arrangements have been made with the Bank of Victoria, through the intervention of Mr. John Finlay, the chairman of the Finance Committee, to whom the Council passed a vote of thanks for his action on the Society's behalf. The amount of this overdraft will shortly be reduced by about £1,000, which is due from Government as grand champion prizes, and subsidy on prizes awarded during the year. ir growth

RULES

1. The Society shall be called "THE NATIONAL AGRICULTURAL

SOCIETY OF VICTORIA."

2. The objects of the Society shall be to promote the development of the Agricultural, Pastoral, and Industrial resources of the colony:

(1.) By holding Exhibitions, at such places and times as the Council shall appoint; and by offering and awarding

prizes and premiums at all such Exhibitions.

(2.) By holding Meetings, at such places and times as the Council shall appoint, at which Meetings papers may be read and discussed.

(3.) By collecting such information from agricultural publications and scientific works as may be useful in promoting

the objects of the Society.

(4.) By corresponding with Agricultural and other kindred Societies at home and abroad, and collecting from such correspondence all information which, in the opinion of the Council, may lead to practical benefit in the cultivation of the soil and breeding of stock, as well as in the prosecution of other important industries.

(5.) By encouraging the attention of men of science to the discovery of better methods of cultivation, to the improvement of agricultural implements and machinery, the construction of farm buildings, the application of chemistry to the general purposes of agriculture, the destruction of insects injurious to vegetable life, and the eradication or utilization of weeds.

(6.) By promoting the discovery and introduction of new varieties of cereals, vegetables, or grasses suitable to the climate, and capable of being cultivated with profit; and also the introduction of desirable kinds and varieties of live stock.

(7.) By collecting information regarding the management of plantations, live fences, and other subjects connected

with rural improvement.

- (8.) By investigating the nature of diseases in animals or plants, and taking measures for the publication, at such times and periods as the Council may appoint, of the information thus collected, together with all approved original essays sent in, lectures delivered, or papers read to the Society; besides making provision for the establishment of a Library and Readingroom for the use of Members.
- (9.) By remunerating any person who shall undertake, at the request of the Council, to ascertain by experiment how far such information may lead to useful results in practice, for any loss incurred by such experiments.
- 3. The Society shall consist of a President, six Vice-Presidents, three Trustees, Governors, Members, Honorary Scientific Members (not exceeding six in number), and Corresponding Members.

4 The President shall be elected annually, and not be eligible

for re-election two years in succession.

5. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Trustees shall be elected from the class of Governors, being, or having been, members of Council; and the Trustees may hold office until disqualified, or until they are removed in due form at the Annual or at a Special General Meeting of the Society.

6. Governors shall pay a subscription of three pounds, and Members one pound, annually in advance, with power to compound for life by the payment in one sum of eight annual

subscriptions.

7. Every candidate for admission into the Society, by giving his name and address, with his subscription, to the Secretary, shall be duly constituted a Member of the same, and shall have all the rights of membership till the day after the Annual Meeting then next ensuing: Provided that when any subscription shall be paid in the name of any firm or company, any one member of the same may exercise the rights and privileges belonging to the same, and may be elected to any office.

8. The Council shall consist of thirty-four Members, including the President, Vice-Presidents, and three Trustees, to be elected from the class of Governors only; the remainder to be elected indiscriminately from amongst the Governors and Members of the

Society.

9. One half of the Council, excepting the President and

Trustees, shall retire annually, but be eligible for re-election.

10. The Council is to be regulated in its proceedings by such By-laws as may, and shall, from time to time, be enacted by it, conformably with the Constitution and objects of the Society; but no By-law shall in any case be altered, or new ones proposed, unless notice of such intention has been given at a previous meeting and sent to each Member of the Council.

11. The Council shall have sole management of the income and funds of the Society, and also the entire management and superintendence of all other affairs and concerns thereof.

12. The Council shall have power to appoint and remove all paid officers required for duly carrying out the objects of the

Society.

13. The Council shall have power to elect Honorary, Scientific, and Corresponding Members; notice of such intention having been given at a previous meeting, and a circular having been sent to each member of the Council.

14. All Governors and Honorary Scientific Members may attend meetings of the Council, and take part in discussions thereat, but shall not have power to vote.

15. The Council may fill up any vacancies in its own body created by death, resignation, or occurring in any other way

amongst its office-bearers.

16. The Society's financial year shall end on the 31st of December; and a Preliminary General Meeting shall be held on the third Thursday in January, to arrange the business and receive notices of motion for the Annual General Meeting, to appoint Auditors, and to nominate gentlemen to fill the places of retiring office-bearers.

17. The Annual General Meeting shall be held in Melbourne on the third Thursday in February; at which meeting the Annual Report and Balance sheet shall be read, all office bearers elected, and any other business transacted of which due notice

may have been given.

18. A Special General Meeting of the Society may be called at any time by the Secretary, on direction of the President, or on the requisition of ten Members of the Society; but no business shall be transacted at any such meeting other than that for which it has been called. And a Special Meeting of the Council may be summoned by direction of the President, or of three Members of the Council; but no orders then made shall be valid unless confirmed by the next Monthly Council.

19. The privilege of membership shall consist of power to vote at the election of all office-bearers, of free admission to the Library, Reading-room, Lectures; and, with two ladies, to the

Society's Exhibitions.

20. Any Member guilty of conduct calculated to bring the Society into discredit in connection with its Exhibitions or other objects shall be liable to be brought before the Council, and if found guilty shall be subject to reprimand, or to have his name expunged from the roll of Members.

21. These Rules shall not be altered except by a majority of the Members present at the Annual or at a Special General Meeting of not less than ten Members, exclusive of Members of

Council

GENERAL MEETINGS.

22. Public notice of the Preliminary, Annual, and Special General Meetings of the Society shall be given in such newspapers as the Council may decide, and by circular through post to every Member; and all matters, except the election of the office-bearers at the Annual Meeting, shall be determined by a show of hands, unless a division be called for. At every Annual General Meeting a Report, together with a Financial Statement from the Council, shall be read, and any Governor or Member present may propose any questions to the Council respecting the matters contained in such report, and comment thereon; or may refer to such other matters relating to the government of the Society and the management of its affairs as to him may seem proper; provided that his remarks have reference to some motion of which notice has been previously given at the Preliminary General Meeting.

23. At the Preliminary General Meeting in January, Notices of Motion for the Annual General Meeting in the following month will be received, Auditors appointed, and gentlemen nominated to fill the places of retiring office-bearers. Previous to the day of meeting, the Council shall have prepared a list of Governors and Members whom they propose to fill the vacant offices of Vice-Presidents and Members of Council; to which list of candidates the names of any other Governors and Members may be added on their being duly proposed and seconded at the

meeting.

24. At the Annual General Meeting in February the election of the President, Vice-Presidents, and Members of Council shall take place by ballot, before the commencement of any other

business.

25. To allow of a ballot being taken, printed lists of the Governors and Members duly proposed shall be given by the Secretary to each Member of the Society present in the room; two scrutineers shall be chosen, and each Member desiring to vote shall hand to the Chairman his copy of the said list, with such names erased therefrom as he may think fit. Any list containing more than the requisite number of names unerased

shall be rejected by the scrutineers.

26. Should it be deemed advisable to remove one or more of the Trustees from office, notice to that effect must be given at the Preliminary General Meeting or one month previous to any Special General Meeting. Governors to fill the vacancies, if any, must also be nominated at the former meeting, and elected at the latter. Extraordinary vacancies amongst the Trustees may be filled up by the Council, or at the Annual General Meeting.

THE PRESIDENT.

27. The President shall, in all official relations of the Society, take precedence of all other Governors and Members, and shall take the chair, when present, having (as well as every other Chairman of the Council) the privilege of a casting vote in addition to his own in all cases of equality in a division on any question. He shall sign all such letters, votes of thanks, and other documents as the Council may direct to be written in the name and on behalf of the Council.

THE COUNCIL.

28. The Council shall hold a Meeting at least every month on such day as the Council may decide, at half-past two o'clock p.m., for the transaction of the business of the Society, and may

adjourn from time to time at their discretion.

29. At the Monthly Meetings the Council shall have full power to originate, discuss, and decide, by a majority of votes, on a show of hands, all questions not involving an unusual outlay of money, brought before it; provided that if any Member present regard any proposition brought forward as too important for immediate decision, he may object, and demand the usual month's notice, whereupon all discussion on the question shall cease.

30. Minutes of the proceedings of every Meeting of the Council, or of any Committee, shall be taken during their progress by the Secretary, or, in case of his absence, by some Member present, whom the Chairman may appoint for the occasion. The minutes shall afterwards be fairly copied into a

minute book kept for that purpose.

31. The Council shall, from time to time, draw up such By-laws as may appear to them expedient for conducting the proceedings of their own meetings, which shall be binding on the Members of Council, for the good management of the Society and its concerns; and all such By-laws shall be binding on all and every the Governors and Members, Honorary and Corresponding Members, officers, and servants of the Society, as well as on all Exhibitors, or their assistants, at the Society's Exhibitions.

32. The Council may appoint Committees to examine into or take action on any special matters relating to the objects or business of the Society, and may dissolve such Committees when-

soever they shall think proper.

33. The Council shall appoint a Banker or Bankers to the Society, to whom all sums of money received by the Secretary or other persons for the use of the Society shall be paid.

34. No money shall be drawn from the Society's Banking account but by order of the Council, after a report from the Finance Committee, and by cheques signed by the Chairman and another Member of the Finance Committee, and countersigned by the Secretary. A book shall be kept in which a consecutive entry shall be made of all such payments.

35. If any office-bearer, with the exception of the Trustees, shall be absent from three consecutive Monthly Meetings of the Council without leave having been obtained, his seat shall be

declared vacant.

36. The Secretary shall notify to the Council, on the Agenda Paper, any vacancy which may have occurred in the list of Vice-Presidents, Trustees, or Members of Council, at the Meeting of Council next after the happening of such vacancy; and such vacancy shall not be filled up until the Monthly Meeting of the Council which shall take place next after such notice.

37. In the absence of the President, the chair shall be taken by a Vice-President; and should neither of such officers be present, then by such Member as the Council shall choose as

their Chairman by a majority of votes.

38. The quorum of a Monthly or Special Council shall be five.

39. At every Monthly Meeting of Council the business shall be as follows:—1. Reading and confirming minutes of previous meeting. 2. Election of officers, and nomination for vacancies.

3. Finance Committee's Report. 4. Postponed business. 5. Correspondence. 6. Motions. 7. Notices of Motions.

40. All minutes and reports read at, and adopted by, the

Council shall be signed by the Chairman.

41. The report from the Council to the Annual Meeting in February shall be prepared at the Council Meeting first in that month, or at some adjournment thereof.

COMMITTEES.

42. The Council shall elect such Standing Committees at the Monthly Council Meeting in March as they think fit, which shall remain in office until the Annual General Meeting in the ensuing year. Such Committees to consist of not more than five

Members, two to form a quorum.

43. Each Committee, at its first meeting, shall elect its own Chairman for that year, and in his absence a Chairman shall be elected by the Committee for the occasion; and any Member of any such Committee who shall absent himself from three consecutive meetings without leave shall thereupon cease to be a Member of such Committee, and the vacancy so created shall be filled up at the next Council Meeting ensuing.

44. All Committees may make or adopt Rules for the conduct of their business, and shall make a report of their proceedings to the Council, and shall sit until they have made their respective reports; but in case such reports shall not have been made previous to the third Thursday in February next after their appointment, their powers shall then cease.

THE SECRETARY.

- 45. The Secretary shall be immediately responsible to the Council for the discharge of his various duties. He shall attend the sittings of all meetings of Council, and shall conduct the correspondence of the Society, and keep letter-books, in which copies of all letters on the business of the Society shall be entered.
- 46. Under the direction of the Finance Committee, he shall be responsible for all moneys received, paying such sums into the hands of the Society's Bankers, and producing at each meeting of the Finance Committee receipts for the same; and, excepting the amount allowed him for petty cash, he shall not retain in his hands any money belonging to the Society, but shall pay it over forthwith to the Society's Bankers. He shall have charge of the expenditure of petty cash.

47. He shall have the custody of all books, models, and papers belonging to the Society. All books, pamphlets, &c., becoming the property of the Society, shall be stamped with the

Society's stamp at once.

48. He shall have the immediate superintendence over the clerks and servants of the Society, and shall be required to report to the Council any instances of misconduct on their part which he thinks of such a nature as to require the consideration of the Council.

49. He shall find, if required, approved security to the amount

of £500, the premium to be paid by the Society.

50. The Secretary shall not exercise any of the privileges of a Governor or Member of the Society.

FINANCE.

51. The Finance Committee shall have the immediate care of the Society's Accounts, and shall meet on the first Friday in every month, in order to prepare a report for the Council on the state of the Society's funds, which they shall present to each Monthly Meeting and lay before it in the following form:—

52. All receipts for money received on behalf of the Society

shall be out of a book with counterpart.

53. All moneys received and paid shall be entered daily in a

general cash book.

54. Once in every year, not later than two weeks after the Preliminary General Meeting, there shall be an Audit of the Society's accounts by a professional accountant, before whom a balance sheet shall be laid by the Secretary, which audited account shall be presented at the Annual Meeting.
