To the Members.

Ladies and Gentlemen,-

Your Council has pleasure in presenting the following report of proceedings of the Society for the year 1923.

### Permanent Buildings and Works

The largest and most comprehensive scheme of improvements ever carried out at the Show Grounds within a period of twelve months was completed during the past year. Most of these improvements had been planned out some time previously but, in many instances, circumstances arose which compelled your Council to put in hand works that would not have been undertaken for some time to come.

The Jubilee Grandstand, which had been financed by donations and the enrolment of Life Members, was erected in time for use at the last Royal Show and proved a great comfort and convenience to the Society's members for whose use this building was entirely reserved. As it is your Council's intention, at some future date, to extend the luncheon rooms to the full width of the grandstand, it has been decided to refrain from plastering the back portion until this extension is carried out.

What is by far the largest and most complete horse pavilion in the Commonwealth, was erected at the corner of Epsom and Lang's Roads, on the freehold land that was purchased in 1912. This pavilion which is constructed of brick with cement facings, is 345 feet long by 105 feet in width. It contains 190 loose boxes and 30 feed stalls. Adjacent to this splendid addition to the Society's property was built a very large shelter for vehicles, the steel roof trusses of which were salvaged from the buildings that were, earlier in the year, destroyed by fire.

Several new horse washes, a copper house, a smithy and horse hospital boxes were erected in the same neighbourhood, as was also a number of loose boxes that were provided for the use of horses engaged in the arena contests.

Another fine building erected on this newly enclosed area is the Hall of Manufactures—a very ornate structure of brick with cement facings. It is 310 feet in length by 70 feet in width and provides space for one hundred displays of manufactured goods. As this building is facing Union Road, which is the main business thoroughfare in the neighbourhood, it is hoped that the Society will, during the periods from one show to the next, derive a certain amount of revenue by leasing this hall for amusement purposes.

Beside the Hall of Manufactures an artistic cement-faced brick building was erected to house a row of turnstiles and several change boxes. This fine entrance, together with the Hall of Manufactures and the new Horse Pavilion; has completely transformed the appearance of the northern end of the Society's property.

The catering facilities at the grounds were further improved by the remodelling of the Carriage Pavilion Tea Room—by the erection of four new liquor bars, and by the provision of additional hot and cold water storages for culinary and scullery purposes.

By arrangement with the successful tenderer for supplying show patrons with light refreshments, six well-appointed little kiosks were erected in various parts of the grounds.

On account of the Electricity Commission changing over from direct to alternating current and making a very much greater supply of electricity available, the Society was put to the expense of erecting a brick transformer house and reticulating the whole ground afresh with bigger poles and heavier wiring. This work was carried out in such a manner that not only the Society's but private standholders' requirements are likely to be met for many years to come.

A gas service also was, for the first time, made available on the grounds. The Hall of Manufactures and the old Industrial Hall were both supplied, whilst gas was also used as an auxiliary to the hot water service in the Alfresco Tea Room.

For many years past a certain amount of trouble was experienced on account of an inadequate and inefficient water supply. By replacing some of the smaller mains with a new 4-inch service and making a complete circuit of the whole grounds with pipes of this diameter, past difficulties have been overcome and much better provision has now been made for coping with any outbreak of fire that may take place on the grounds.

A big sewerage channel from the Jubilee grandstand to the neighbourhood of the general office, was laid down. This now links up a section of the grounds that had not previously been connected.

The arena bank was widened and a stone retaining wall erected near the carriage pavilion.

Several new roads were formed—a number of paths were tar-paved—the old turnstile buildings and clock tower at the Grand National Road entrance were demolished—an area of about six acres was enclosed with an 8 foot galvanisd iron fence—the new motor park was fenced, and, in addition, there were many other works mostly of a minor character, but the total expenditure on permanent buildings and works for the year amounted to no less a sum than £47,958/16/1.

### The Exhibition

The Society's Annual Exhibition was held from the 20th to 29th September. Early in the year the conditions of the various competitions were carefully revised and a liberal schedule of prizes was offered. A record entry was received.

Notwithstanding that nearly six acres had been added to the Show Grounds many exhibitors were unable to secure the full amount of space that they required and in the near future the Society will be compelled to enclose the area that was acquired some time ago at the Bagotville end of the grounds.

For the first time in the history of the Society, the Show was held for nine days instead of six as formerly and undoubtedly the results justified the extension. Almost every possible variety of weather was experienced

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during this period and this undoubtedly influenced the attendances which nevertheless easily constituted a record, the aggregate being 300,075, as against 230,265 which constituted the previous highest attendance.

The gate money, including £2,232/17/6 from the grandstands, amounted to £21,094/13/1, being £3,372/1/11 in excess of last year's record figures.

For the purpose of comparison the following tables are published to show the number of entries in the several sections for the last two years—

It will be observed that there was an increase in the entries for heavy horses and, what is more gratifying, a marked improvement in the quality of the exhibits. This was particularly the case in the Clydesdale Section.

In order to encourage the breeding of a better class of Clydesdales, Captain A. E. T. Payne offered, through the Society, a premium of 100 guineas for a stallion whose owner would be prepared to take him to a selected district for the following season. Your Council considered that Shepparton would be the most suitable district and the selected horse has since been stationed there.

There was another falling off in entries in the breeding sections for light horses and ponies and in several instances many of the exhibits were not up to Royal Show standard.

The harness and saddle horses and ponies were probably, both as to numbers and quality, superior to those exhibited at any previous show.

Beef cattle again made a fine display but a larger entry should be received in these sections.

The restrictions imposed in the dairy cattle sections resulted in a reduced entry but the quality of the exhibits certainly showed a general improvement.

The bad season experienced prior to the Show was reflected in a comparatively small entry in the sheep classes and a lower general standard of quality in the fleeces that were exhibited.

The swine exhibits were, by competent judges, characterised as being of the highest quality that has ever been brought together in Australia. This remark applies particularly to the Berkshires.

The exhibition of poultry, pigeons, dogs and cats was up to the usual standard, but in the produce sections there was a slight falling off in entries. Whilst this was possibly due to the poor season, your Council has taken special steps with the object of securing a more representative display of farm and dairy produce at future shows.

The Agricultural Societies' Competition again created a great deal of interest and the exhibits reflected the greatest credit upon those re-

sponsible for the organising work. It is regretted that there were only two entries and your Council has taken steps which it hopes will result in greater competition in this section at future shows.

The exhibition of wines still creates much interest and wine growers are now taking a keen interest in the official testing which usually takes place during the week prior to the opening of the Show.

There was a much better display of fruit at the last Show than in any previous year. The trophies of apples and pears and citrus fruits were greatly admired by the general public.

The section for Women's Industries is steadily increasing in popularity and it is evident that before next year, additional facilities will have to be provided for the accommodation of these exhibits.

The Mounted Police gave a very interesting display of horsemanship by conducting a musical ride on two days of the Show, and in addition, Mounted Constable Edgar gave displays of horse educating. The Society's Hon. Veterinary Surgeon, Mr. H. Kendall also gave two demonstrations, one on tying and handling horses and cattle and the other on the methods adopted during Veterinary examination. All these displays were greatly appreciated by large crowds who gathered to witness them.

Increased interest was taken in the Judging Competitions and it is believed by your Council that the competitors in these events are being encouraged to take a keener interest in live stock and paving the way to their becoming the Show judges of the future.

The display of industrial and agricultural exhibits, and motor vehicles of all descriptions, was superior to that of any previous year.

The number of working exhibits in the Machinery Section is a continued source of interest to Show patrons, whilst the display of goods in the Hall of Manufactures made a particularly attractive feature, as did also the motor exhibits that were artistically displayed in the pavilions that were specially erected for this purpose.

During the year, many fine exhibit buildings were erected on the grounds. The erection of buildings co-operatively has become quite a feature at the Show Grounds during recent years.

The Creche proved to be of great convenience to mothers with young children. On several days of the Show upwards of one hundred children, ranging in ages from a few weeks to five or six years of age, were left in charge of the Superintendent and nurses while their mothers inspected the exhibits on the Show Grounds.

The Department of Agriculture again arranged a very attractive exhibition of the products of the soil. This display is becoming more interesting and of greater educational value each year, and the whole of the arrangements reflects the highest credit upon the Department.

The transportation arrangements, both for passengers and stock, were conducted most satisfactorily by the Railway Department, and when the proposed subway is constructed at the level crossing in Epsom Road it is believed that, with a direct tram service to the city a very large increase will be made in the percentage of passengers that travel to the show by tram.

The Catering at the Show Grounds has shown steady improvement during the last few years. This has been made possible by the improved facilities that have been provided in the luncheon rooms as well as by the greater experience being gained by those who had secured the tendering privileges at the grounds for several years in succession.

### Flock Book for British Breeds of Sheep in Australia

Volume 15 of the Flock Book, containing the histories and returns of 376 flocks, was published in May last. This volume included 37 flocks that were previously registered in the Australian Shropshire Register, the South Australian Shropshire Flock Book or the Tasmanian Shropshire Register, as well as 34 new flocks of different breeds of sheep.

Volume 16 is now in course of preparation and it is hoped that it will be available for distribution in March next. Other new flocks, that have been registered since the publication of Volume 15, will be included therein.

The annual meeting of owners of registered flocks was held during the show, and items of interest to sheep breeders were discussed and referred to the Flock Book Committee for attention.

The Committee again paid out of the Flock Book funds, special prizes of £5/5/- each to the owners of the winning sires in the four Longwool Sections at the recent Show. A special trophy, valued at £5/5/- was presented to the winner of the Shropshire Sires' Memorial, and the prize money in the Sheep Sections of the Youths' Judging Competitions was also augmented to the extent of £12.

### The Commonwealth Clydesdale Horse Society

The work of compiling the first volume of the Commonwealth Clydesdale Stud Book has been completed and more than half the matter is now in print. The volume will contain the full pedigrees of 500 stallions and 1300 mares with progeny and every effort is being made to expedite its publication.

The renewed interest in the Clydesdale breed of horses, which is shown in the recent importations of high class stock from Scotland, augurs well for the future of the breed and the Society.

### The Ayrshire Cattle Herd Book Society of Australasia

This Society published the fifteenth volume of its herd book during the year and preparations are now being made for the compilation of Volume XVI., entries for which will close on 1st February.

With a view to encouraging the breeding of cattle, combining both type and utility, this Society has set aside a considerable sum to be awarded as special prizes at the chief Inter-State Shows.

The regulations have been amended to provide for the full registration of animals before they attain the age of twelve months.

### The Australasian Jersey Herd Society (Victorian Branch)

The popularity of the Jersey breed of cattle in Victoria is clearly displayed in the ever increasing membership of this Branch which is now

in point of numbers as strong as all the other Branches of the Society put together. In continuance of its propaganda work the Committee of this Branch published two attractive booklets for distribution at the recent Show and also displayed a fine collection of photographs of high producing females of the breed.

The Society published the tenth volume of its herd book during the year, and entries for volume XI. will close on 30th April.

### The Red Poll Cattle Breeders' Association of Australasia

The second volume of this Association's herd book has been published and entries for Volume 3 are now being received.

Financially, the Association is in a sound position, and it intends to engage in more active propaganda work during the coming year. It has also been decided to make the regulations governing registration more stringent in the future.

### The Friesian Cattle Club of Australia

As intimated in last report, the secretarial work of the Federal Council of this Club was undertaken at the beginning of the year in addition to that of the Victorian Branch.

Entries for the fourth volume having closed, the book has been compiled and is now in the printer's hands.

The growing popularity of this breed is indicated by a very satisfactory increase in the number of members of the Club.

### The Milking Shorthorn Cattle Breeders' Association of Victoria

Good progress has been made by this Association during the year and the official inspector has been actively engaged in inspecting and tattooing the stock submitted for registration in the herd book. Returns of additional progeny from registered females have been obtained and with careful checking of the information supplied, it is hoped that the first volume will be of considerable value as a work of reference.

Animals submitted for registration are being classified according to the number of top crosses of bulls that would be eligible for registration in Coates's Herd Book.

### The Berkshire and Yorkshire Society of Australasia

At a recent meeting, your Council agreed to the secretarial work of the Federal Council and Victorian Branch of the Bernshire and Yorkshire Society of Australasia, being undertaken by its staff.

Entries for the fourteenth volume are now being received and this volume will be published during the coming year.

### Chamber of Agriculture

The 21st Annual Convention of the Chamber of Agriculture was held at Hamilton on the 10th, 11th, and 12th of April, 1923. It was officially

opened by His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria, Sir W. H. Irvine, K.C.M.G., and was attended by a large and representative gathering of delegates from all parts of the State.

The papers that were read and the addresses that were delivered were productive of very valuable discussions and the debates as a whole were of great interest and of high educational value.

Particularly keen interest was taken in the experiments that had been conducted on the effects of a treatment of artificial manure on pasture lands. These were so satisfactory that similar experiments are being conducted during the present season.

At the conclusion of the Convention, facilities were provided which enabled delegates to inspect the fine pasture lands and stock in the neighbourhood of Hamilton.

Your Council accorded a hearty vote of thanks to His Worship the Mayor of Hamilton, and to the President, Secretary and Members of the Committee of the local Agricultural Society for the courtesies extended to this Society's representatives during their stay in Hamilton.

### Fire at Show Grounds

Early in January, 1923, your Council permitted a large body of Boy Scouts from all parts of Australia, to hold their Annual Corroboree on the Show Grounds. On the concluding day a fire broke out in the old draught horse boxes in Thomson Street, and spread right through to the outer boundary at Nyora Street completely demolishing the whole of the three covered ways and half of the boxes in Thomson Street. The total number of boxes destroyed was 167. Through the efforts of the fire brigade the flames were prevented from spreading towards the Royal Luncheon Rooms and to the horse pavilion. The origin of the fire was unknown. The buildings were insured for £2,966 and the Society's claim for the full amount was granted by the insurance companies concerned.

### Extension of the Show Grounds

As indicated in last Annual Report the Show Ground was extended from Nyora Street to Lang's Road and an area of approximately six acres was thereby added to the property.

The Grand National Tower Hotel which was purchased by the Society in 1920 has been de-licensed and arrangements have been made for the demolition of this building early in the new year.

Your Council has also undertaken to shift the Drill Hall back a distance of 10 feet so that the whole frontage along Epsom Road will be increased in width by that amount and facilities will thus be provided for a double row of vehicles on each side of the tram track instead of a single line which is all that is possible under present conditions.

### Motor Park

During the year your Council purchased eleven allotments on the Victory Park Estate so that when the land around about the Show Grounds has all been built upon, this area will be permanently available for

use as a motor park. It is situated almost immediately opposite the entrance that will be erected when the recently acquired land at the Bagotville end of the grounds is enclosed. The motor park was securely fenced and divided up in such a manner that cars could leave at any hour of the day. Competent attendants were provided, a number of fire extinguishers were available and every other precaution taken to safe-guard the property of those patrons who utilised this convenience. Unfortunately it was conducted at a loss this year but it is hoped that as its position becomes better known it will eventually become a financial asset to the Society.

### Subway at Epsom Road

Early in the year your Council convened a conference of all bodies interested in the construction of a subway at the present level crossing in Epsom Road, and the Society's delegates submitted a proposition to this conference which has since been unanimously endorsed. This provided that the whole cost of the work will be apportioned as follows:—The Victorian Railway Department and the Metropolitan Tramway Board each 25 per cent., the Melbourne and Essendon City Councils each 15 per cent. and the Victorian Racing Club and this Society each 10 per cent. As it is estimated that this work, inclusive of widening the road from 66 to 76 feet, will be approximately £20,000, the Society's quota will be about £2,000. The provision of this subway should not only facilitate railway traffic but would enable the trams to be brought right up to the turnstile entrance gates and would also greatly facilitate the ever-increasing road traffic to and from the Show Grounds.

### Horse Parade and Sale

The Horse Parade and Sale conducted under the auspices of this. Society, was held at the Show Grounds on the 17th and 18th of July.

The entries totalled 102 as compared with 125 in 1922. The attendance at the sale was poor but notwithstanding this fact a fair proportion of the animals changed hands and horses that showed quality brought good prices. The profit on the sale amounted to £27/4/3.

### Cattle Sale

The Cattle Sale, conducted under the auspices of this Society, was held at the Show Grounds on 7th March. In 1922 the sale was held in July but as this period of the year was claimed to be unsuitable your Council decided to revert back to March.

The number of entries received showed an increase on last year's figures but the condition and quality of the animals offered was not of the best and consequently very few cattle were sold.

### Membership

Your Council has pleasure in reporting that the total membership of the Society is now 4948. Last year the record number of 4362 members was enrolled and it was expected that the erection of the Jubilee Stand would be the means of increasing the membership to 5000. Although this figure was not quite reached a very substantial addition of 586 was Members very much appreciated the new stand as well as the Luncheon and Refreshment Rooms that were available for their exclusive use.

### Journal

Copies of the "Australian Farm and Home," with which is incorporated the Society's Official Journal, were regularly posted to members every month. The reports contained therein gave a complete record of the operations of the Society during the year. The Journal also was the means of circulating much valuable information on matters relating to the breeding of stud stock.

### The Council

As the nominations for election at the Annual Meeting were not in excess of the vacancies on the Council there was no poll and the whole of the members whose seats had become vacant by effluxion of time were declared re-elected.

It is with extreme regret that the death of Mr. Lawrence Dugdale is recorded. The sad event took place at Ballan on the 24th of November, 1923. Mr. Dugdale had been a Member of Council since 1918 and had occupied the position of Vice-President in 1921, and was, at the time of his death, again occupying that position. Mr. Dugdale had always taken a very great interest in the affairs of the Society and his loss was most keenly felt. Resolutions recording the Council's sympathy with the bereaved widow and family were unanimously adopted.

It was also a source of regret that Mr. James Lang found it necessary to tender his resignation on account of ill-health. Mr. Lang's long association with the work of the Society had endeared him to a large circle of friends, and at the time of his retirement the hope was expressed that he would soon be thoroughly restored to health and strength again.

At the November meeting Mr. J. C. Mackinnon, of Marida Yallock, Boorcan, was elected to the vacancy caused by Mr. Lang's retirement. Early in the year Dr. Cameron (one of the Society's Trustees) was warmly welcomed on his return to the Council table after a most serious illness. Mr. G. T. Chirnside was granted leave of absence during a visit to England, and Mr. W. G. Macalister during a trip to India. Both gentlemen were cordially welcomed on their return.

### Acknowledgments

Your Council desires to express its warmest thanks to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor for officially opening the Show, and together with Lady Irvine for displaying so much interest in the Society's welfare.

The Society is again indebted to the Government of Victoria not only for continuing the annual subsidy and for augmenting the prizes in a number of sections but for arranging the very fine display in the Government Pavilion and also for making available the balance of the loan monies granted by Parliament some years ago.

The best thanks of the Society are due to the donors to the Prize Fund for the liberal support that has again been accorded.

Keen appreciation of the assistance rendered by the Judges and Stewards is again expressed for the efficient manner in which these officials carried but their duties at the last Show.

Grateful thanks is also due to the Press for the great amount of publicity given to the Society's operations. The publicity thus gained assisted very materially towards the success of the last Royal Show.

To all others who assisted in any way in furthering the interests of

the Society, your Council tenders its warmest thanks.

### **Finance**

On reference to the Statement of Receipts and Expenditure, it will be seen that, at the Annual Exhibition, on a revenue of £35,002/9/4, the expenditure was only £15,731/3/6, or 44 per cent., which is regarded by your Council as evidence of economical management.

The profit on the fixture, £19,271/5/10, constitutes a record. In practically every item amongst the receipts there was an increase on last year's figures—the advertising in particular showing a steady progress in each successive year, thus indicating that business people now fully realise that the Society's publications are reaching an ever-widening circle of potential clients.

After allowing for fire insurance money received and other credits, the net amount expended during the year on buildings and improvements amounted to £44,656/19/3; £10,000 of this sum was received from the Government as a final instalment of the original £50,000 loan, and £14,350/17/- was transferred from the Grandstand Trust Account, leaving no less a sum than £20,306/2/3 to be provided out of revenue.

In addition to this large amount, £3386/18/3 was required for the maintenance of the Society's property, £3985/2/4 for interest and repayments on Government loans and bank overdraft. Rates, rent, printing, office salaries, supplying to members copies of the Official Journal, and other items of general expenditure amounted to £7014/14/5 during the year. The aggregate of these items, together with the sum provided out of revenue for buildings and improvements amounted to £34,692/17/3. It will thus be seen that the profit derived from the Annual Show (£19,271.5/10) is not sufficient to meet the Society's annual obligations and provide the funds necessary for the improvements and extensions at the Show Grounds that are essential if the Society's operations are to maintain their present highly satisfactory rate of progress.

Your Council has, therefore, decided to endeavour to increase the Society's annual revenue, one method being to recommend to members that the annual subscription be increased from 25/- to 30/-. In view of the greater privileges now available by reason of the extension of the Show from six to nine days, this increase appears to be one that will be regarded as reasonable and justifiable.

The Financial Statement reveals that the revenue for the year, excluding the £10,000 loan and the insurance claim of £2966/1/11, was £43.475/11/8, which shows an increase of £6493/15/9 over that of last year.

The expenditure, including £6565/6/4 in prizes, and £1201/11/3 in the purchase of land amounted to £66.818/7/7, the bank overdraft being increased from £21,529/12/4 to £31,906/6/4, and the Society's indebtedness to the Government (inclusive of interest) increased during the year from £41,401/15/7 to £50,741/16/4.

Taking the expenditure in permanent improvements and the purchase of land as assets, and deducting the insurance claim and the loan, the working expenses show a profit on the year's transactions of £12,357/5/5, as against last year's profit of £9781/17/7.





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


### HORSES.

CLYDESDALE (MALES).

P. Connell, "Fairholme," Yarrawonga.

Amongst the stallions, eight years and over, were some very good animals, showing typical Clydesdale character, with plenty of weight, quality and action. The condition of these animals clearly proved the wearing qualities of the present-day Clydesdale. The class for stallions from four to seven years of age also had some very fine specimens of the Clydesdale. They were well up to size. The prize-winners in this class were very characteristic of the breed and showed both quality and action

The three-year-old class comprised some very nice colts that should develop into good sires. There were some very good colts amongst the two-year-olds. These were the best I have seen for some years. The first prize colt should develop into a very good horse, having plenty of size and particularly good feet. The one-year-old class was a very large one but several of the colts were not up to Royal Show standard. The prize winners were a nice lot of colts true to type and of fair size.

On the whole the animals shown in the male classes showed, with a few exceptions, a great improvement on the Clydesdales of the last few years. I consider them the best lot I have seen at the Royal for some time.


There is one class, viz., stallion and three of his progeny, that is very difficult to adjudicate upon under present conditions. A prize winning stallion may have to be taken into consideration with three of his progeny which may not be as good as the progeny of another horse which has failed to get a prize, and if the latter group fails to win and the same lot of yearlings can come out again in the next class for three yearlings and win, it might look to some people as a reversal of a decision through forgetting that the stallion has to be considered in the one case and not in the other.

### CLYDESDALE (FEMALES).



Though some of the Clydesdale females were very superior animals, not so many came forward as I expected. The exhibits in the younger classes showed great improvement since I judged the same section two years ago. They were decidedly more uniform in type. It is much easier to award the prizes to animals of the same type in their respective classes than it would otherwise be.




Champion Clydesdale Mare, "Royal" Show, 1923.



This is a very important matter, as some highly strung animals are unable to settle down in the space allotted at last show.




Champion Suffolk Punch Stallion "Royal" Show, 1923.


The Arabs and Thoroughbreds at the last Royal Show, were very poorly represented. In the thoroughbred stallion class four of the five horses shown, were fine specimens and I consider the first prize winner would be difficult to beat in any show ring in Australia. The Arabs were decidedly weak both in quality and numbers. It is a very poor response on the part of Arab stock breeders that there should only be two entries in both the stallion and mare classes.

#### TROTTERS.



I am sorry that I cannot commend the exhibitors for the representation of the breed which they made on this occasion. The only class which was up to the standard of the good horses in Victoria was that for aged stallions. Although there were only six of these horses I consider the class equal to anything that I have seen in Australia. I could only regret that more horses, of the same high character, were not shown. In the other classes the stock was weak and exhibited in wretched condition. In fact the animals were not creditable either to the exhibitors or to the Show itself. This is surely unfair to the Royal Agricultural Society and I cannot see how the breeders of trotters in Victoria can expect the Council to continue to offer them generous encouragement unless they make a much better response. Some of the animals shown would disgrace the smallest


Champion Trotter Mare, "Royal" Show, 1923.

country show. This indicates a disregard not only for the reputation and well-being of the Melbourne Royal Show but also for their own interests by the exhibitors. They should remember that such a show affords them opportunities of gaining friends and admirers for their good horses. breeders should realise that their best friends are the people who keep horses, and use horses, not altogther for making money, but for the pleasure and the sport of keeping them and showing them at agricultural shows. The way to encourage more true sportsmen to take an interest in stock is to bring animals before them well up to the standard of the breed, and to show these animals in tip-top condition. Those who are in trotting for the money they can make out of it and who know all the best times and have all that class of information at their fingers' ends, do not furnish the class whose appreciation is most valuable to the breeders. The man who knows nothing about the fastest times on race-courses and does not care about that sort of thing, is the true horse lover who will go to a show to select a stallion for his good mares, and also to follow up the progeny of various animals and estimate their trueness to the breed.

Knowing something of the trotters and pacers in Victoria, I am confident that if the owners would take this view of the principle of showing stock they could make the classes in the Melbourne Royal Show so strong that the section would be one of the very best in the exhibition.



The exhibits in the Harness section were well up to the average, both in numbers and quality, and included a few exceptionally fine horses. In the buggy horse section there are two classes—light and heavy—but, apparently, there is a difference of opinion as to what these terms really mean, as amongst the light horses there were three big horses which, in my opinion, should never have been entered in that class. I would suggest that in future years the judge should have the power to transfer such horses into their proper classes.




Champion Hackney Stallion, "Royal" Show, 1923. "GWALIA CAESAR" (imp.).




Champion Cob Stallion, "Royal" Show, 1923.

### SADDLE HORSES AND PONIES.

The Saddle Horses and Ponies were, on the whole, up to the standard of former shows. In some of the classes there were very heavy entries—as many as twenty-four in one. The six or eight left in at the finish were very difficult to separate.

The Pony classes were also well filled and particularly amongst the bigger ones some very high class animals were shown. The Champion Pony was only three years old, but I never saw a better one in my life. In addition, he was very well educated. In two or three of the classes for smaller ponies the exhibits were not up to the standard.

In the polo classes some good ponies were passed over owing to their lack of education. The winners had evidently had practice in polo work. It is hoped that in future years the polo ponies will be better educated.

### CATTLE.

#### SHORTHORNS.


As a class this year's exhibition was well up to the standard of the past few years. The young animals made a particularly good exhibit. The aged ones were only fair but the three-year-olds were better and were headed by the champion of the section. The two-year-old bulls were a useful, but small, lot, but in the eighteen months' old class there was a fine entry of a very good type of animal. The yearling bulls were par-

ticularly good. There was a large entry and the leading five were all calves of good quality.

The aged cow class comprised some fine animals. There were but few entries in the classes for three and two-year-old heifers, but in the eighteen months old class the standard was particularly good and the heifers would have been a credit to any show. They were of high quality and this augurs well for the future of the breed. The yearling heifer class had the biggest entry in this section and again comprised many fine animals, showing high quality. They were, in addition, exhibited in excellent show condition.




Champion Shorthorn Cow, "Royal" Show, 1923.

In the Shorthorn steer class there were two entries—one red and white steer, 736 days old, live weight 1552 lbs., and one roan steer, 633 days old, live weight 1379 lbs. The prize was awarded to the former as he was a more mellow handler and carried his flesh further down the ribs than the younger steer. The first prize steer dressed out 975 lbs. and the other steer dressed at 855 lbs., both being 62.7 per cent of their live weight. This class, in my opinion, is extremely valuable and should be encouraged as an object lesson on what can be done in producing early maturing beef. It was noticeable that these steers had not been emasculated young enough. I look for an improvement in this class at future shows.

### HEREFORDS AND POLLED ANGUS. R. Reynolds, Hobartville, Richmond, N.S.W.

The showing of Herefords was not large but the quality and condition was fair, with several exhibits outstanding. Of course one has to make allowances for the low condition on account of the slump in stud stock.



The height of the boom was during the years 1917 to 1920 but since the first big drop in values, towards the latter end of 1920, the decline has been gradual until it has got to a rock-bottom level. It is to be hoped that there will be an improvement in the near future, for, to keep a stud herd up to concert pitch, it requires money and time and the present state of affairs is, naturally, inclined to dishearten new breeders, who came in at the height of values. At the present ruling prices it does not pay to exhibit any animal that is not a bit above the ordinary.

In the aged bull class there were three competitors. The first prize went to Messrs. Yelland & Sons' Brilliant Boy, who, later on, secured the Championship for the fourth year in succession. He is a massive sire. He is very level on top and well filled in between hips and tail, which is well set in. He is starting to go off a bit in the handling, being a little hard to the touch. The second bull was exhibited by Dookie Agricultural College and the third by Mr. J. A. Beattie. Both were just fair bulls.

The three-year-old class only brought forward one entry—Mr. Winter Cooke's "Eaton Orlando," but this animal was shown at a big disadvantage as he had only been brought in from the paddock. Two entries paraded in the two-year-old class. The first prize bull was a son of the Champion, and owned by Messrs. Yelland & Sons. He was easily the most stylish exhibit in the section. Style and carriage are two most important things in show cattle, as they catch the eye immediately. This bull was of good colour, strong head, level on top, tail well moulded in but carried one bad point and that was slackness behind the shoulders. He was placed as Reserve Champion.

The yearling class brought out seven entries—the winner being Mr. J. A. Beattie's "Gisborne Earl"—a compact bull of the right type, tail well set in and quality his main good point. He is by "Gisborne Propellor" and a half brother to the Champion heifer. The second went to Messrs. Yelland's "Treverder Success"—a bull, that in the distance, looked a winner, but closer inspection found him to handle badly. The hair was harsh. and the tail coarse. He was, nevertheless, a very lengthy calf and on good lines. The third bull was exhibited by the Metropolitan Board of Works. He claimed imported parents on both sides. He was, for his age, well grown. He had a grand middle piece, being very deep and well flanked. He stood four square, but this bull had several faults that stopped him from getting higher on the prize list. His horns could have been better, he was "ridgy" over hips and loin and his hair was coarse and straight. In the female classes the aged cows numbered three and first prize went to Messrs. Yelland's "Princess Royal," a big roomy cow, handling well, but a bit patchy at the rump. Second also went to the same owners and third to Mr. Winter Cooke. The three cows all had young calves at foot and this prevented them being in the best condition. There was no competition in the three-year-old class. The two-year-old class was a good. one and the blue ribbon went to Mr. J. A. Beattie's "Olive 12th," which also took the Championship. This heifer was of beautiful colour and carried a coat of fine texture. She was light boned but heavily fleshed—a point that I like to see in all Hereford females. "Olive 12th" carried a good forefront and girth. She was a little "snipy" in the head which detracted from her looks. The second went to Messrs. Yelland's "Tocal" Maritana." This heifer was big, but on the leg a bit, and has a tinge of coarseness through her. Third went to Mr. J. A. Beattie's "Melba"—a. heifer of good quality but rather short. The yearling heifers brought out a good lot and the winner proved, by a very narrow margin, to be Messrs. Yelland's exhibit, got by the Champion bull. She was very well developed for her age, her lines were extra good and she carried herself gracefully when parading.

The runner-up was an exhibit from Bundoran Estate, and was a heifer of good type and handled well. She was a good deal younger than the blue ribboner and could have carried a little more condition with advantage. All going well next season she will prove very troublesome to this


year's winner. Third went to Mr. Beattie's "Queen Flower 4th."

The groups were between Messrs. Beattie and Yelland. The exhibitors' group went to the latter. The "Frank Reynold's" Memorial trophy, for best pair of yearling bulls, went to Mr. J. A. Beattie, and the "Job Smith" trophy, for the most successful exhibitor in the section, went to Messrs. Yelland & Son.


### MILKING SHORTHORNS. John Williamson, Lochinver, Carisbrook.

In the Milking Shorthorn Section the exhibits were quite up to previous years in point of numbers, but the quality, if anything, was in advance of most exhibitions. Some of the female exhibits, especially, were very good. The champion bull was a very good specimen, with slightly too much beef quality as opposed to the milking. In most of the bull sections this was noticeable and breeders of this class of stock will need to execute care in the selection of sires. In the female classes, and more especially in the aged cow classes, some of the exhibits were of beautiful quality, the Champion and Reserve Champion cows being very typical animals and worthy of any stud. The younger female classes were not quite up to the standard set by these cows and were not all in show condition, the latter fault is one that I would like to urge breeders and exhibitors generally to guard against.

#### RED POLLS.



The number of entries in this section was 40 as against 50 last year, and they belonged to the following classes:—A.A., 21; A., 8; B., 4; C., 7; D., nil.

The quality of the exhibits was of a high order and several of the Australian bred animals would have held their own at the leading British shows.

The dual purpose type was well maintained throughout, which is important seeing that the Red Poll is essentially the breed for the great body of farmers who dairy on the spring and summer pastures and to whom a crop of well-grown steer calves is a useful source of income.

The champion bull was an animal with magnificent hind quarters and the champion cow was an example of almost perfect symmetry of form, though the reserve champion cow exhibited a somewhat better balanced milk vessel. British breeders are devoting much attention to improving the shape of the udder which has, in the past, been rather a weak point in Red Polls, but in this year's exhibition several cows left little to be de-


sired in this direction, though in one or two instances the teats were rather too small and in one case the teats protruded horizontally round the udder.

In the type and utility contest of the 250 and 200 lbs. standards the points obtained for type and those obtained for utility showed a closer resemblance; as the points for type descended the scale so did the points for utility, which latter are based on milk records in the Government Herd. Test.

Most of the animals were dark in colour and in one case in particular a very nice mossy coat was presented.

The animals were in good condition considering the previous drought and the severe winter and none of the exhibitors made the mistake of regarding the terms—a healthy, sleek, show condition and obesity—as synonymous. As activity is one of the great characteristics of the Red Poll, a gay active carriage should always be demonstrated in the Show ring, and this cannot be secured in the older bulls, where they are overladen with fat. In one animal the toes turned in very badly, which point is undesirable.

The exhibits had all been well trained to lead and to stand quietly under close examination. Five animals were absent from the judging ring for various reasons, and there were only three animals disqualified for contravention of the Red Poll standard of type and character.




#### AYRSHIRES.

The Ayrshire section at this year's exhibition was remarkable for the great difference in quality in many of the classes. There were many cattle of outstanding merit, beautiful type, and splendidly shown and a joy to look at. On the other hand there were too many that were not any type at all, small teated, round in the rump and badly shown. It is hard to keep these latter out of the show. It is a matter of education as to the most desirable type of the various breeds. This must rest to a great extent with the Societies controlling the breeds. More might be done by an inspection before finally registering an animal. This works well in some of the Sheep Associations.

It would be hard to find two more worthy representatives than the Champion cow and the Reserve Champion. Though differing somewhat in type they were two lovely individuals. It was pleasing to notice a number of very promising heifers showing plenty of dairy qualities. Again there were too many heifers showing no production points whatever.

There were more good bulls shown than when I had the honour of

judging before, two years ago. This was more marked in the younger The Champion bull, in fact all the winners in the bull classes, were worthy representatives of the breed. Amongst the young bulls there

was a lot of "rough stuff" sent in, no doubt, for sale.

Messrs. W. P. Brisbane & Son are certainly to be congratulated on winning the two Championships.

### E. W. Oliver, Ladybank, Chudleigh, Tasmania.

Taken on the whole I think the high standard which has been set at the "Royal" for very many years, has been maintained. In some instances I noticed animals (although good in type) lacking in size and constitution. I maintain that a good, big Ayrshire will always beat a good little one, as the smaller cannot be expected to stand up to a heavy season's milking as one of a more robust constitution, and if the Ayrshire cattle are to hold their own we must preserve only animals that will produce and reproduce. The aged dry cows were a magnificent lot and the same may be said of the cows in milk. The four-year-old cows in milk made the poorest showing of any class while the four-year-old dry cows were good, and the same may be said of the remaining classes in the female section. The bulls in the aged class made a good show, the Champion being an outstanding one and should be a sire of producers. The Reserve Champion was also a bull of great substance. The winner in the three-year-old was a very stylish animal and carried all before him. In the two-year-olds the winner was quite outstanding and of really good type but gave one the impression of being too advanced for his age. In the yearling bull class there were many entries but nothing very outstanding as to quality.

JERSEYS. W. Carr, "Carlyle," Indooroopilly, Queensland. (Complete awards in this Section will be found on page 32).

The Jersey section was a very creditable one. Many animals of exceptional quality, and showing marked Island type, were exhibited. Unfortunately others, showing less uniformity in type, but equal dairy capacity, were not, in my opinion, up to the standard maintained in Australia by Jersey breeders. I think this is very regrettable, because we can breed the Island type and maintain constitutions and production, and we should We have in the Jersey breed of cattle the best dairy cow that can be produced.

Why do not our leading breeders continue to keep up the type? Their influence for good in this direction will be lasting and make for continued

success of the Jersey cow in Australia.

The male Champion, "Jessemia's Imperial 5th of King's Vale" is a sire of outstanding merit. Much credit is due to the owners for the

splendid manner in which the bull was shown.


The Reserve Champion bull "Wotton Airman" is a beautiful animal and gives promise of doing splendid service for his owner and incidently the Jersey breeders. Many other excellent sires came before me, but in this report I cannot go into details.

The female Champion "Golden Noble Duchess" is full of type and dairy quality and would, in my opinion, win in any company in Australia.

The runner-up, "Werribee Starbright 9th" is also a beautiful cow. Many splendid females were brought before me and, on the whole, I consider the showing was very creditable.

#### **GUERNSEYS**

There was only one exhibitor in the Guernsey section and in some of the classes only one exhibit. It is a pity that this fine breed of cattle has such little support in Victoria. In New South Wales they are very popular. The first prize bull in the aged class was an animal of high quality. He was also Champion. The three-year-old first prize animal was a fine strong beast likely to produce great milkers. In the female classes the aged cow and the three-year-old stood out above all the others. Both showed good type and quality—the former securing the championship.

#### FRIESIANS.

James Pritchard, Numba, via Nowra, N.S.W.

I have no hesitation in declaring that the Friesians were the best 'I ever saw at a show, and I consider them to be a lot better than those exhibited at Sydney. Mr. Oswald J. Syme's champion bull, "Bolobek Archie," I regard as being nearly perfect, and I was also highly pleased with Mr. R. H. Kerr's "Bolobek Barney"—the runner-up. I was sorry to witness the obvious decline in "Rock Patch," the champion of last year. Messrs. Flack & Sewell's champion cow, the five-year-old in milk, "Dominion Queen Mercedes," I consider one of the best that has come under my notice. She certainly is an exceptionally fine animal, of true dairy type, not too big, active, and possessed of an admirable bag. She led in the senior type and utility division. In reserve, was placed the same owner's four-year-old "Burnbank Woodcrest Segis." The conclusion to be drawn from the results recorded at the Show and in the Government Herd Test is that the Friesian breeders in Victoria are men of the right stamp. They not only are prepared to spend big money in the introduction of fresh blood, but also have, in most cases, the knowledge and experience necessary to enable the most effective use to be made of the importations, as well as of the stock already here. The picturesque and imposing black and whites are steadily forging ahead, and the future for them appears to be rich with promise.

#### FAT CATTLE.

John Robertson, "Ythan," Epsom Road, Kensington.

This year's exhibits were not of a very high standard—there was plenty of weight, but quality was, with a few exceptions, exceptionally scarce. The first prize winners in the class for a pair of oxen—two roan shorthorns—were of splendid quality. The roan ox that secured the first prize in the class for fat ox, five years old or over, was a very level even-fleshed ox—a good butcher's ox with very little waste fat on him. There was only one bullock in this pen. In the class for a pair of fat cows, two white shorthorns of very splendid quality, secured the first award. There were only two exhibits in the class for fat vealers and the quality was only fair. The penning of the fat cattle was rather confusing this year and might easily have caused mistakes.

#### MILK AND BUTTER FAT TESTS.

P. R. Scott, Department of Agriculture, Melbourne; B. A. Barr, Department of Agriculture, Melbourne.

In "The Weekly Times" Champion Butter Fat Test, the competition was between twelve cows, comprising representatives of the Ayrshire, Dairy Shorthorn, Friesian and Jersey breeds. The yields given by the cows placed first and second were higher than any previous yield obtained in this competition.

The four leading cows were, respectively.—

First, a Friesian, "Springfield Dekol," giving a return of 8.89 lbs. of butter fat.

Second, a Friesian, "Dominion Queen Mercedes," giving a return of 7.99 lbs. of butter fat.

Third, a Dairy Shorthorn, "Pearl Beauty 2nd," giving a return of 6.85 lbs. of butter fat.

Fourth, a Jersey, "Silvermist 2nd of Kameruka," giving a return of 5.54 lbs. of butter fat.

This is the first time a Friesian has won this competition, it having previously been won four times by a Jersey and once each by an Ayrshire, a Dairy Shorthorn and a Red Poll.


In "The Weekly Times" Champion Butter Fat and Milk Test, the number of competitors was eleven, and the breeds represented were the Ayrshire, Dairy Shorthorn, Friesian and Jersey. A few of the cows gave fairly good yields, but in the majority of cases, the yields were of no special mention. Probably the most interesting point, resulting from the test, was that the first four places were occupied by competitors from each of the different breeds.

The first place was obtained by a Friesian, "Springfield Dekol," giving 194 14-16 lbs. of milk, yielding 8.89 lbs. of butter fat, returning a production value of  $14/2\frac{1}{2}$ .


The second place was obtained by a Dairy Shorthorn, "Pearl Beauty 2nd," giving 149 lbs. of milk, yielding 6.85 lbs. of butter fat, returning a production value of 10/11½.

The third place was obtained by an Ayrshire, "Excell of Gleneira," giving 136 lbs. of milk, yielding 5.26 lbs. of butter fat, returning a production value of 8/9½.




## SHEEP.

### LINCOLN RAMS.

The Lincoln Rams which I had the honour of judging, were a really good lot of sheep, though the numbers were smaller than I have seen them for many years. The three-year-old class included some good sheep. The Champion Ram was the winner in the two and a half year-olds, and was a very symmetrical sheep, stood well on its legs and carried a good hold free wool, with plenty of character and not too much head covering. The

shorn class would. I think, be better if for ram of any age—to be judged for breeding, appearance, symmetry, thickness of flesh and activity. The pairs—4-tooth class—contained some tip-top sheep. The young sheep were also good. I would suggest giving a prize for a fine-woolled Lincoln 4-tooth ram, as nearly all judges go for the heavy woolled ram from a stud point of view, and many very good woolled rams do not get a chance because they are considered too fine for a stud ram.

### LINCOLN EWES.

There was a very small entry of Lincoln ewes. This is much to be regretted. The day cannot be far distant when the Lincoln, which has been bred for constitution, symmetry, wool and mutton, will again take its proper position amongst the British Breeds. Without this Lincoln, the sheep growing the most valuable crossbred or comeback fleece, together with a carcase of good fleshed mutton that is not tallowy, a sheep that will give

the fat lamb breeder a good return in wool right into old age as well as the best lambs, cannot be bred. Most of the ewes were of good style and substance, with well-fleshed backs well covered with good Lincoln wool. The Champion and Reserve Champion ewes were very good sheep in all respects except that the Champion ewe's feet had grown in such a manner for want of early attention, as to prevent her standing as she should.

The yearlings were more numerous than the older sheep and were well grown with very good wool.


### ENGLISH LEICESTERS.






Champion Romney Marsh Ram, "Royal" Show, 1923.


Champion Corriedale Ram, "Royal" Show, 1923.


Champion Corriedale Ewe, "Royal" Show, 1923.




Champion Suffolk Ram, "Royal" Show, 1923.

#### FAT SHEEP.

In both the classes for Merino and Crossbred wethers, sheep of good quality were shown. In the latter class, the first prize Down crosses were outstanding in quality. The second prize sheep were very nice, but as I gave the prize to the Down crosses, I would recommend the Society to make two classes, one for Shropshire or Down cross, and one for Longwool Crossbred sheep. The Crossbred ewes were all very fine sheep, and of good quality. The first prize pen of Dorset Horns was outstanding in the fat lamb classes, and I congratulate the breeder on his fine exhibit. I consider the first prize lambs perfect, and I have not seen better in Australia or New Zealand. The second and third were also very fine lambs. In the pen of sheep suitable for export as freezers, I gave my decision in favour of the Shropshires, as this is the class of mutton the London market requires. The second prize Corriedale Crosses were fine sheep for the export trade. The remaining exhibits in this and the other class for sheep of the same character, were also fine sheep, but too heavy for the export trade, and, in my opinion, should have been in the butchers' class. There was strong competition in the class for three export lambs, and five of the pens were outstanding. I gave my decision in favour of the short-legged sheep; but the whole of the exhibits were of very finequality, and a credit to any show.

### FLEECES.

Taking into consideration the adverse conditions during the drought period of the past season, it was not expected that the fleeces in the Wool Section would be representative. No doubt many growers who usually contribute were unable to satisfy themselves that their fleeces this season were good enough to send to the Royal Show as a standard from their flocks. This is to be regretted, as the drought has been general throughout most districts of Victoria and New South Wales, and wools from each district were similarly affected by the lack of nourishment. The exhibit proves instructive to both large and small growers, and a keen interest is taken in the result. When one looks round the section taken up by the wool exhibit, and compares it with the sheep and other kindred ones, the small number of entries is realised, more especially as this industry is the largest and most essential to the world. The prospects of good prices for wool are daily being discussed by a large percentage of our population, so that had the number of entries been doubled, or even trebled, many more districts would have been represented, while growers of all styles of wool would be afforded an opportunity of making a reasonable comparison with one or other of the fleeces shown with those of their own clip.

The wool throughout all classes shows a thinness of staple and lack of lustre, as compared with that of last year. The open Merino classes were poorly represented, there being only one ram and two ewe fleeces. The ram's fleece, although of good length and fair style, was inclined to-


be thin of staple. The winner in the open class for ewe's fleece showed fair bulk and style, though running out broad (strong) at the tip. In the class for Merino rams' fleeces, exhibited by owners of less than 3000, only two entries were made. The winner was a soft handling fleece, showing fair style and of 64's/70's quality. In the class for Merino ewe's fleece, grown by owners of less than 3000 sheep, the same owner took first and second prizes. Both fleeces showed good length, style and bulk. In the Longwool classes there was better competition, and the wools were more up to the standard of normal seasons. The Down classes were not well represented, and many of the fleeces showed the effects of the bad season. There was a nice selection of crossbred wools of finer than 50's quality. Some of the fleeces (comebacks) were equal to Merino count, and exhibited excellent length and style, as well as being very soft handling.

### SWINE.

BERKSHIRES, BRITISH LARGE BLACKS AND POLAND CHINAS.

The best collection of high grade, typical, well grown Berkshires ever seen at any Show in Australia, is a suitable description of the exhibits at the 1923 Show. The general average was better. The prize winners were




Champion Berkshire Boar, "Royal" Show, 1923.

all superior quality pigs, as were the "Commended" exhibits. The "tail" was much shorter and smaller than usual; this proves that the exhibitors are realising that they are studmasters first, although the fundamental

object of pig breeding is pork and bacon. A well-fed, well-dressed carcase is always attractive and a good colour. The studmaster, with true ideals of type, is been to avoid every blemish that mars the perfect animal. Breeders who are indifferent to the value of type, markings, colour and conformation, are only pork raisers, and not studmasters. The fact that 24 different exhibitors won prizes and commendation, 19 of which won cash prizes, clearly proves how widely the superior pigs are now distributed, no one exhibitor sweeping all before him.

I am very pleased to be able to report that the keenest exhibitors now realise that only the best are good enough to win at a Melbourne Royal Show, and that a prize won there is the pig's "hall mark." Many choice pigs did not get a prize, because where 57 competed for three prizes, 54 must go without reward.

Including groups and suckers, there were 412 Berkshires entered, and 384 were judged. Mr. John Heard judged the boars over 15 months oid, as one of them—Claremont-Tangye (4560)—was bred by me. In the

class for boars under 15 and over 9 months, the first prize went to a typical, well-marked, even boar. The top of his near ear had been injured, and drooped a little; this, though detracting from his appearance, would not affect his value as a sire. The second prize went to a very neat even pig. The third was of good type and colour, 10 months old, with but a little white hair inside the off ear. The class for boars over 4 and under 9 months provided 61 entries. This was the strongest class in the section, and contained many typical and stylish pigs. First prize was given to a beautiful pig 6½ months old. He also got Reserve Championship. His shoulders were a little wide, but not coarse, the skin being very fine and soft. The second prize boar was a litter brother to the first; he was a very attractive pig to look at, his markings being per-
