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To the Members.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Your Council has pleasure in presenting the following report of proceedings of the Society for the year 1933.

Permanent Buildings and Works.

As in 1932, expenditure was kept down to a minimum consistent with the necessity for carrying out maintenance work requiring urgent attention. A further large area of road surface was reconditioned, together with footpaths and asphalted approaches to grandstands, etc., whilst the railway entrances, the area around the Wine Kiosk and the arena track were gravelled and regraded. Some new feed boxes were erected and extra washes provided near the No. 2 Horse Pavilion, thus improving facilities for the increasing number of exhibits and exhibitors in the Horse Sections.

The Main Public Grandstand, Poultry Pavilion, Swine Pavilion, Superintendent's Offices and the interiors of the old Sheep Pavilion, Dairy Machinery Pavilion and the Industrial Hall were re-painted. Other minor improvements were effected, and, as considerable trouble had been taken with the arena, grandstand lawns, picnicking areas, garden plots and the floral clock, and exhibitors generally had cooperated by painting and otherwise improving their stands, the grounds presented an appearance, on the opening day of the Show, that was very favourably commented on.

The Exhibition.

The Society's Annual Exhibition, which was held from 21st to 30th September, was one of the most successful yet held. Despite adverse seasonal conditions in most parts of the State earlier in the year, and quite contrary to the expectations of many of the Society's staunchest supporters, a record entry was received, and the exhibits in all competitive sections combined quality with quantity; whilst, for attractiveness of display and variety, the non-competitive exhibits staged by standholders surpassed the high standard set at previous Shows. The Society was again fortunate, in that the weather conditions were favourable, and, as a result of the full co-operation of the press in giving publicity to the outstanding features of the Show and the arena programme, the attendance was considerably greater than in 1932. 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As in previous years, the display of Clydesdale horses was one of the outstanding features of the Show, and these, together with the increased number of light horses exhibited, not only provided further evidence of the greater interest being taken in horse-breeding, but **necessitated** the utilisation of many boxes in stables adjacent to the Showground and emphasised the necessity for increasing accommodation on the grounds in anticipation of even greater entries in the years to come.

The exhibits in the various sections for cattle made a wonderful show, and the quality of the stock was such that several of the judges made very favourable comments in their reports. The extra accommodation made necessary in 1932 had again to be used, though it is hoped that better provision will be possible at future Shows.

The Inter-Breed Competitions for Dairy Cows and Export Steers created a great amount of interest and were well worth the special arrangements made in connection therewith.

In the Sheep Pavilions every available pen was occupied by representative animals from the leading studs in four States, and presented a display which fully maintained the title of the Premier British Breeds Sheep Show in Australia.

Quality was also a feature in the sections for the various breeds of pigs, and the decision not to provide pens for baconers and porkers enabled all the stud animals to be comfortably accommodated.

New records were established in the sections for poultry and dogs, but, whereas the big pavilion made possible the penning of all birds in one great display, the lack of accommodation made necessary the division of the dog exhibits into three sections, each of two days' duration—an expedient that was greatly deplored by canine enthusiasts, who have since expressed the hope that it will, ere long, be possible for the Society to provide for all dogs to be exhibited at the same time.

The Agricultural Hall presented a very pleasing appearance, enhanced by the greatly increased entry of fruits, whilst the outstanding feature was provided by the five Agricultural Societies which staged district exhibits. Practically every electorate in Victoria was represented in the State Agricultural Championship Competition, thus demonstrating the universal support accorded this Society's Show.

A new record was established in the section for women's industries. The work was of a high standard, and the number of exhibits was such that considerable ingenuity had to be used to display them in the accommodation available.

The central feature in the Government Pavilion was a striking display in support of the "Use More Wool" Campaign. The excellence of this and other exhibits portraying all phases of primary production resulted in an exhibition of that high standard which has always characterised the Government's contribution to our annual Shows.

Your Council has expressed its keen appreciation of the exhibits staged by the Department of Agriculture, the Forestry Department and the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission, and also by the general body of exhibitors, realising that such whole-hearted co-operation was largely responsible for the success of the Show.

The inclusion of military events in the usual arena programme, in addition to demonstrations by members of the Metropolitan Fire Brigades and the mounted police, was greatly appreciated by Show patrons, who also showed their approval of the Steady Pull Contests for Draught Horses and the Tug-of-War Competitions, which were again conducted outside the arena.

The second annual Procession of Saddle and Harness Horses and Ponies through the heart of the city to the Showgrounds, in the organisation of which your Council had the full co-operation of the Horse Association of Victoria, was quite successful. This took place on the last day of the Show, when the precedent established in 1932 was followed, in reducing to 1/- the charge for admission to the grounds. Unfortunately, the Football League's final match was played on the same day, and proved such an attraction that the attendance at the Show was considerably below that of last year, and thereby the lead established during the previous eight days was reduced to a disappointing extent. However, after careful consideration from all angles, your Council is very satisfied with the Show, the revenue from which exceeded expenditure by £12,301/4/8, or £1378 more than in 1932.

Wool Ribbons.

As a gesture in support of the "Use More Wool" Campaign, your Council decided that the ribbons and sashes for presentation to prizewinners at the Show should be of wool, instead of silk. Made of wool felt, attractively printed and treated against moths, these proved quite satisfactory, and the action was widely commended. Advice has since been received from the firm concerned that, in ribbons and sashes supplied to this and other Agricultural Societies, it had used material the manufacture of which had required approximately two and onequarter tons of wool, and, in addition, had used two gross skeins of wool for fringes.

Use of Grounds Between Shows.

Buildings at the Showgrounds have been used for the Victorian Dairy Association's Annual Exhibition and Conference, several dog shows, stabling, and for a very successful parade and sale of heavy horses, but there was no demand for space for the storage of wool. As in former years, the arena was availed of for the Third Military District Competitions, the Horse Association's Gymkhana, and for sheep dog trials. It was also let at a nominal rental to various sporting bodies for football, lacrosse and cricket, and was in constant use throughout the year. There being no doubt of its suitability for all classes of sport, your Council trusts that, ere long, it will be possible to derive an adequate revenue from the use of the arena.

The Australian Society of Breeders of British Sheep.

The year 1933 has been a very satisfactory one for the Australian Society of Breeders of British Sheep. Since the establishment of the Society in 1925, to take over the control of the Flock Book that was previously issued by a committee appointed by your Council, the membership has steadily increased, and, notwithstanding the relatively low prices prevailing during the year, the total number of registered flocks to be included in Vol. 26 of the book, which it is proposed to issue in May, is ahead of the record number of 1124 registrations that appeared in the last volume.

Branch committees in the various States are doing good work in the interests of breeders, and the result of their labours is reflected in the continued progress of the Society.

Whilst the principal object of the Society is the registration of sheep and the publication of an annual Flock Register, it has, in recent years, taken a more active interest in other matters affecting sheepbreeders. Branches are associated with Meat Boards and Advisory Councils in the different States, and, by organising sales of registered sheep, conducting export lamb trials, offering prizes at Shows, nominating sheep judges and so forth, are doing work of the utmost importance to the sheep-breeding industry.

The Victorian Branch again donated the sum of £69 towards the prize money offered in the Sheep Sections at the last Show. and at the annual meeting of the branch it was decided to assist your Council to make the British Breeds of Sheep Show at the coming Centenary fixture the best yet, by donating a further sum of 100 guineas. In addition, the Federal Council of the Society has promised a handsome donation of 50 guineas to the prize fund.

The Australian Corriedale Sheepbreeders' Association (Victorian Branch).

It is pleasing to report that, since the secretarial work of this branch has been carried out by the Society's staff, the membership has increased from 84 to 102, and it is now the strongest branch in the Association.

At the annual meeting it was decided to donate the sum of £25 towards the prize money offered in the Corriedale Section at the Centenary Show, and the President of the Association has also offered a valuable trophy for competition. The exhibitions of Corriedale sheep at our annual Shows have the reputation of being the finest in the Commonwealth. Corriedale breeders intend making a special effort for the coming Show, and it is expected that the display of the breed will far eclipse any previous exhibition.

Owing to the death of the Secretary of the Federal Council in November last, the secretarial work is, at the request of the Federal Council, being done by the Society's staff, pending the appointment of a permanent secretary.

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Victorian and Southern Riverina Society of Export Lamb and Mutton Producers.

At the last Melbourne Royal Show, a largely attended meeting of export lamb and mutton producers was held, at which it was decided to form a society of direct exporters of lamb and mutton. The meeting was convened by the Victorian Branch of the Australian Society of Breeders of British Sheep, at the request of a number of producers who export their lambs and mutton direct to Smithfield. A representative committee of fifteen was appointed at the first meeting, and this committee has commenced to put into effect the objects of the Society, which provide for the improvement of lamb and mutton exports, better publicity both here and abroad, improved methods of handling, appointment of an overseas representative and uniform grading.

The purposes of the new Society are practically identical with those of the New Zealand Meat Board, and, as it was formed for the sole purpose of benefiting the producer, your Council agreed to carry out the secretarial work.

The New Zealand Meat Board is doing good work for the producer in that country, and if the Society of Producers of Lamb and Mutton can function as successfully, a better demand for Victorian and Riverina lamb must eventuate.

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The Commonwealth Clydesdale Horse Society. alight atomoby bas she

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At no time in the history of this Society has so much interest and enthusiasm been displayed in its activities as has been the case during the past year.

The return to horse usage, and the consequent revival in horsebreeding, have resulted in rapid progress being made, and not only has the membership increased by over 150 members, but during the last eighteen months two volumes of the Commonwealth Clydesdale Stud Book have been printed and circulated, and a total of 670 stallions and 1322 mares have been submitted for registration, there being entries of 209 stallions and 345 mares already in hand for inclusion in Vol. 8.

The publicity service, commenced some years ago, is still con-ducted, and is greatly appreciated by breeders and horse-lovers generally. Vietning Branch).

Every endeavour has been made by various branches to bring prominently before their respective Governments the necessity for such legislation as will be of assistance in improving the general standard of all breeds of horses, and it is the intention of the Society to persevere in this direction until all States in the Commonwealth have adopted sound measures on uniform lines.

This very commendable desire to improve, coupled with the growing demand for the service of stallions possessing the highest breed qualifications and a Government Certificate of Soundness, augurs well for the future of the industry.

Clydesdale breeders are already displaying great interest in the forthcoming Centenary Royal Show.

The Victorian Branch of the Commonwealth Clydesdale Horse Society has decided to offer 40 guineas in special cash prizes for young stock, in addition to its usual handsome donation towards the prize money in the District Group and Clydesdale Gelding Classes; whilst the Clydesdale Horse Society of Great Britain and Ireland has notified its intention to offer two silver cups, valued at 50 guineas each, for competition. The result will be a memorable exhibition of Clydesdales in 1934. and Matton Producers

The Horse Association of Victoria.

As indicated in last year's report, this Association has extended its activities by the establishment of a branch in the Wimmera, where a strong and enthusiastic committee, consisting of representatives from the surrounding districts, has been elected. As opportunity offers, branches will be established in other large centres throughout Victoria.

In May last the second Gymkhana was held, and, although excellent entries were received in all classes, it failed to attract the public in the numbers anticipated, due, no doubt, to the counter-attractions of football and races. By holding the Gymkhana earlier next year, the Association is confident that it will be well patronised.

On the last Saturday of the recent Show the Association again co-operated with this Society in the organisation of a grand pro-cession of horses and vehicles through the city, which attracted great interest amongst the general public. ducer in that country, and

In an endeavour to secure uniformity in the metropolitan area, the Association has appointed a sub-committee to draw up rules for the conduct of gymkhanas. These will be discussed at a conference between the Association and those bodies which hold gymkhanas, and which will then be invited to affiliate and conduct their events under the rules adopted. y o lov of b. down a second during the second se

The Australian Pony Stud Book Society.

As the result of a resolution passed by your Council, to the effect that at the 1934 Show and thereafter ponies entered for exhibition must be registered in a recognised stud book, several enquiries have been received for information in regard to the registration of animals in this Society's Stud Book.

Quite a number of ponies have been submitted for registration. and have been inspected by Mr. S. A. Greaves, who is acting as Honorary Inspector in this State.

Several Victorian breeders have enrolled as members, and the expected increase in membership should eventually result in the formation of a branch of the Society in this State.

The Shorthorn Society of Australia.

This Society has retained the whole-hearted interest of breeders, despite the unattractive market for beef, and many liave taken advantage of the low prices obtaining to secure stock to raise the standard of their herds. It is also pleasing to note that the animals which are being imported, though not numerous, are of a distinctly high standard and possess the best blood obtainable in Great Britain.

The seventh volume of the Shorthorn Herd Book of Australia is now being compiled, and it is confidently expected that copies will be available in time for presentation at the annual meeting of the Federal Council, to be held in Sydney at Easter.

The volume will include all calves notified up to the end of the year, and the indications are that it will contain more entries than any previous issue.

Arrangements are being made to commence a publicity campaign to bring prominently under notice the natural ability of the Shorthorn to provide beef eminently suitable for both the export and local trade, and a definite scheme will be formulated at next meeting.

Many special trophies are to be offered for competition in the Shorthorn Section at the Centenary Royal Show. The Federal Council has allocated 25 guineas, and the Victorian Branch 20 guineas, for this purpose, whilst several individual members have offered to contribute. In addition to these, the Shorthorn Society of Great Britain and Ireland has donated a valuable silver challenge cup and a gold medal, to be presented to the exhibitor of the Champion Shorthorn Bull.

The Red Poll Cattle Breeders' Association of Australasia.

This Association continues to gain new adherents throughout Australia. A pleasing feature of this increase in popularity of the Red Poll breed is the number of new members enrolled in States other than Victoria, which for many years has been the stronghold of the breed in Australia.

As a result of the increase in Interstate membership, consideration is to be given by the Council of the Association to the necessary alteration of the rules to permit the establishment of branches in the various States.

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The publication of Vol. 7 of the Herd Book is now in hand, and when completed it is anticipated that the registrations appearing therein will eclipse in number those published in Vol. 6, which is the largest issued by this Association to date.

During the year several animals have been imported from England. The breeders responsible for these importations are to be congratulated on their enterprise, as the animals in question will undoubtedly improve the already high standard of Red Polls in Australia.

The usual contributions were again made by the Association to the Show prize fund, and, despite the depressed conditions prevailing, the number of entries received constituted a record.

To commemorate the memory of the late Hon. T. H. Payne, the Association has established a Perpetual Challenge Cup for competition at the Melbourne Royal Show.

At the annual meeting of members, held during the recent Show, it was resolved that the committee be given power to spend up to £50^a in trophies for competition at the Centenary Royal Show.

The Dairy Shorthorn Association of Australia.

Due, no doubt, to the wonderful records established by Dairy Shorthorns under official test in Victoria, this Association's membership is gradually increasing.

At the recent annual meeting of members, a publicity committee was elected, with the idea of making the breed more widely known throughout Australia by advertising the undoubted capabilities of the breed as producers of butter fat. As a result of the activities of this committee, it is confidently anticipated that the Association will gain many new adherents.

The recent importation of a bull from England by a member of the Association should not only improve the quality of his herd, but eventually be of benefit to the breed in general, through the purchase of this bull's progeny by other breeders.

The decision to publish in the "Australian Farm and Home"—the official organ of the Association—a short history of each breeder's herd is being taken advantage of by the various breeders, with undoubted benefit to themselves and the breed.

At the annual meeting authority was also given to the committee to spend up to ± 50 in trophies for competition in the Dairy Shorthorn Section at the Centenary Royal Show.

The Ayrshire Cattle Herd Book Society of Australasia.

Despite the trying year through which all dairy farmers have passed, this Society has maintained its membership at a high level, and the applications received for registration of stock in the Herd Book and Calf Register are equal to those received in recent years.

Volume XXV. of the Herd Book was issued during the year, and already a large number of entries has been received for Volume XXVI., entries for which close on 1st February.

The Federal Council again made grants to branches for propaganda purposes, and most of this money was expended in advertising and in augmenting the prize money at Agricultural Shows. Considering that the encouragement of herd-testing is of the utmost importance, the Council at its last meeting decided that, in future, no grants would be made to branches except for this purpose.

The test record booklet issued last year proved a popular innovation, and the Federal Council decided to again issue a booklet this year, bringing the records up to date.

In addition to the prizes usually given by the Victorian Branch for competition at the Melbourne Royal Show, the sum of £100 has been allocated for the purchase of trophies for competition throughout the Ayrshire Section at the Centenary Royal Show.

The Friesian Cattle Club of Australia.

Although no volume of the Herd Book was published during the year, entries for Volume 12 were closed and the work of compilation begun. An improvement in the size of the publication is already indicated, although it is regrettable that the Queensland Club has not yet retaken its place as the Queensland Branch in accordance with the invitation of the Federal Council.

The Victorian Branch, the membership of which still considerably exceeds the total of all other branches, has co-operated to suitably mark Centenary Year by the offer of gold-mounted sashes for competition at selected Agricultural Shows, including our own, and by the expenditure of a substantial sum in the purchase of trophies to be competed for at the Centenary Royal Show, including 25 guineas from the branch funds.

The Guernsey Cattle Society of Australasia (Victorian Branch).

This branch has the happy privilege of reporting remarkable advancement during the year. The membership has increased by 80 per cent. and the number of entries for the Herd Book by 75 per cent.

No volume of the Herd Book was published by the Federal Council during the year, but entries for Volume 11 closed on 31st December, with a substantial Victorian representation.

Importations from Guernsey Island and England to Victoria have done much to relieve the shortage of females, and a bright prospect is before the breed in this State.

The branch has decided to utilise to the utmost its resources, both financial and otherwise, in commemorating the Centenary Royal Show, and the committee contemplates the expenditure of up to ± 100 in this connection.

The Australasian Jersey Herd Society (Victorian Branch).

The membership of this Branch continues to increase materially each year, and during 1933 passed the 900 mark, being 40 above the previous record.

The Federal Council published the nineteenth volume of the Stud Book early in the year, and copies were forwarded to all financial members. Record entries were received for Volume XX., which will be supplied to members in January.

The Branch again issued its booklets of test records and pamphlets, with scales of points, etc., and that these publications are appreciated is evidenced by the large number of applications which have been received for copies. The Field Officer has kept in personal touch with the members, and has, contributed valuable articles to the press and to the Society's official journal, "The Live Stock Bulletin." He has also delivered many lectures and given demonstrations at Young Farmers' Field Days, etc.

To mark the forthcoming Centenary, the Committee decided to donate the sum of ± 180 , to be allocated as trophies throughout the Jersey section at the Centenary Royal Show.

The Australian Illawarra Shorthorn Society (Victorian Branch).

The Victorian Branch of this Society continues its steady progress, and is gradually increasing its membership.

A pleasing feature is that new herds are being established by the purchase of animals bred in Victoria by the foundation members of this Branch, who are thus reaping the reward for their careful selection and breeding.

An increasing number of breeders are submitting their herds to official test, and are thus demonstrating the capabilities of the breed as producers of butter-fat. The Federal Council has recently published for distribution, as propaganda, a 500-page book containing a brief history of the Australian Illawarra Shorthorn breed, and, in addition to other interesting information, a record of official tests from 1912 to June, 1933.

It is of interest to note that each animal submitted for adult registration must be passed on type by an Official Inspector before being accepted for inclusion in the Herd Book. This regulation ensures that each animal entered in the Herd Book conforms to the type laid down by the Society.

As in 1932, the Australian Illawarras exhibited at the recent Show were all from Victorian herds, and, although the numbers exhibited did not constitute a record, the quality of the animals was very highly commented upon by the Judge.

The Committee donated the sum of $\pm 10/10/$ - towards the prize money at the recent Show, in consideration of the increased classification provided for the breed by your Council.

The third volume of the Herd Book has been published and distributed to members, and, as in earlier volumes, the Victorian breeders 'are well represented.

At the annual meeting of members held during the recent Show, the Committee was given authority to spend up to £25 in trophies for competition at the Centenary Royal Show.

The Victorian United Cow Test Association.

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That the work of this Association is recognised at its true value is evidenced by the fact that, despite the adverse conditions obtaining in the dairying industry, 97 District Associations, representing 136 units, have continued to function and maintained their affiliation with the central body. Of these, 61 Associations have adopted the Calf Marking Scheme, thus demonstrating the growing demand for and interest in "production-bred" heifers. This scheme is also of benefit to dairymen outside the V.U.C.T.A., who are now able to purchase the progeny of tested stock, tattooed for identification.

Statistics and information made available from Field Days held on the farms of members in different districts, and from results of judging in the various zones into which the State is divided for the purposes of the Dairy Farm Competition annually conducted by this Association, have been widely disseminated and much appreciated by members, whilst the practice of forwarding to all members of affiliated Associations printed reports of all meetings, conferences, etc., has been maintained. Data has now come to hand from Branch Secretaries regarding the "Mount Hope" system of determining the value of bulls, and it is hoped that the Department of Agriculture will shortly be able to complete statistics in connection with this index.

Over 100,000 cows were under test during the year, and the everincreasing results being obtained are amply demonstrated in the large number of R.A.S. of V. Production Certificates issued by this Society to Association members whose herds average 300 lbs. butter-fat or over in 273 days. The test year ended on 30th June last, and since then nearly 800 certificates have been issued through Branch Secretaries, who are required to certify that the records are correct.

The Australian Dairy Cattle Research Association (Victorian Branch).

At a meeting of the Federal Council of this Association held in Melbourne early in the year, approval was given to a scheme submitted by the New South Wales Branch for the scientific investigation of contagious abortion. As a result of representations made by a deputation from that meeting, the Australian Dairy Council agreed to make a substantial contribution to the funds of the Association. The N.S.W. Government having promised its full co-operation and made available all facilities at the Glenfield Research Station, together with the services of the Chief Veterinary Officer, the Director of Veterinary Research, and officers of the Department of Agriculture and the Research Station, it was possible to proceed with the N.S.W. Branch scheme, and this was done.

At a further meeting of the Federal Council held in Sydney at Easter, consideration was given to a comprehensive scheme for the investigation of contagious mastitis in Victoria, recommended by the Victorian Branch. It was resolved to adopt this scheme and to put the work in hand as soon as the necessary support, financial and otherwise, was forthcoming to permit of this being done. Some preliminary work in the nature of a summary of existing literature on contagious mastitis has been done.

A deputation to the Commonwealth Bank Board resulted in a promise of material financial assistance, when a stipulated sum was secured from other sources. In order to demonstrate its support of the Association, and at the same time expedite a commencement of operations in this State, your Council undertook to subscribe £100 per annum for five years, and by the way in which a very representative deputation to the Minister for Agriculture was received, it is confidently anticipated that the Association will eventually be accorded by the Victorian Government co-operation and assistance at least equal to that given by the Government in N.S.W.

The Australian Stud Pig Breeders' Society.

This Society is in a very sound position, despite the parlous times still being experienced in the industry and the consequent slight decrease in membership.

Volume XXIV. of the Herd Book is now in course of publication, and members will receive their copies as soon as they are available. A very satisfactory entry of pigs was received for the recent Show, a pleasing feature being the record number of exhibits in the bacon and pork classes, which—as a result of a recommendation from the Committee of the Victorian Branch—your Council decided should not be exhibited alive as in former years, but be sent straight to the factory. The usual generous donation towards the prize money in these classes was again made this year.

Another innovation adopted by your Council, and which was commented on favourably by exhibitors, was the provision of judging rings adjacent to the Swine Pavilion.

At the annual meeting of the Victorian Branch held during the recent Show, members gave authority to the Committee to spend up to ± 100 in trophies for competition at the Centenary Royal Show, and advice has been received to the effect that the National Pig Breeders' Association in England has decided to make available a number of its Silver Medals for presentation to the exhibitors of the best pigs in the sections for the five breeds in which it is interested.

The Victorian Working Sheep Dog Association.

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This Association has shown satisfactory progress during the year, several new members having been enrolled.

Many of the thirty-seven bodies affiliated with the Association conducted Sheep-dog Trials during the season. Special mention should be made of the trials conducted at Euroa, at which the 50 Guinea Captain Payne Trophy was competed for, for the third time. A large entry, representing the best working sheep dogs in Victoria, was received, and a very keen contest resulted.

As a preliminary for the Royal Show trials, an Open Sweepstakes Trial and a Drovers' Sweepstakes Trial were held at the Show Grounds in July. The prize money was considerably augmented by cash donations received from stock agents and exporting firms.

With a view to limiting the entries for the sheep dog trials at future Royal Shows, the Committee is to consider the advisability of conducting preliminary qualifying trials, which would ensure that only the best dogs would be seen during the Show.

At the annual meeting held during the recent Show authority was given to the Committee to spend up to 15 guineas as additional prizes for competition at the Centenary Royal Show.

The Kennel Control Council of Victoria.

It is with almost monotonous regularity that this body is able to report the spread of its influence throughout the State. This is most aptly demonstrated by the remarkable increase in its membership. In 1931, its first year, the number of members totalled 402, constituting a record. In 1932 that figure was more than doubled, and this year the membership reached the unprecedented total of 1195.

During the year its affiliated bodies, which also increased in number, combined to hold a Championship Show in aid of the Children's Hospital, and over £96 was realised.

The Council's official organ, "The K.C.C. Kennel Gazette," continued as a useful service to members, and proved not only a valuable medium for spreading the gospel of constitutional government of the fancy, but particularly useful in explaining to the misinformed that all exhibitions held under K.C.C. of V. rules are "open," by which is meant that no exhibitor who is prepared to abide by the decisions of the Executive Committee elected from and by members is debarred from entry.

The first and second issues of "The K.C.C. Annual" appeared during the year. The publications were of a high standard.

During September the Second Annual Dinner of Members and their friends was held. The function was well attended, and the innovation of a dance at the conclusion of the dinner was much appreciated.

Through its affiliation with the English Kennel Club, which is recognised as the most powerful organisation of its kind in the world, the K.C.C. of V. was again able to secure for the Society the exclusive services of a noted English Judge.

Your Council's attitude in supporting the K.C.C. of V. in accordance with its pledge has had a markedly beneficial effect on the entries received in the Dog Section at the Royal Show. Although the entries in that section of each succeeding Royal Show held under K.C.C. of V. rules have been a substantial record, the total of 745 actual dogs at the 1933 Show eclipsed all previous records, and made a remarkable display for the public.

Already the K.C.C. of V. is organising and laying plans generally for 1934, and since its finances, whilst satisfactory for ordinary purposes, do not permit it to commemorate the Centenary Royal Show on the large scale it desires, it has headed a fund among its members and supporters with a donation of $\pounds 20$ for the purchase of trophies. The appeal, though only a short time in existence, has already reached the total of $\pounds 37/6/6$, and should be of material assistance in creating yet another record Royal Show in the Dog Section.

The Chamber of Agriculture of Victoria.

The Thirty-first Annual Convention of this Chamber, held at Kyneton on 21st, 22nd and 23rd March, 1933, was officially opened by His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, Sir William Irvine, K.C.M.G., and was attended by approximately 300 delegates and invited guests from all parts of Victoria, including the Hon. the Premier (Sir Stanley Argyle), the Minister of Railways (Hon. R. G. Menzies), the Minister of Agriculture (Hon. John Allan), and Col. E. F. Harrison, representing the Federal Government.

The addresses were of particular interest, and many matters affecting primary producers were keenly discussed. Delegates much appreciated the arrangements made for their entertainment and the facilities provided to enable them to visit the many places of interest in the district. Your Council accorded a hearty vote of thanks to the people of Kyneton for the many courtesies extended to this Society's delegates during the Convention.

The Executive has been active throughout the year in all matters affecting the "Man on the Land," and evidence is not lacking that the Chamber is fully recognised as the most representative body of primary producers in this State.

Freight Charges on Stock.

Your Council supported a very representative deputation to the Minister for Railways, arranged by the Chamber of Agriculture, following which the freight charges on live stock were reduced by 25 per cent. Your Council has also co-operated with the Chamber of Agriculture in an effort to secure a material reduction in the heavy expenses associated with the importation of high-class stud stock from Great Britain. Detailed costs of actual importations over several years have been collected for the purpose of strengthening a case which, when presented to Federal and State Governments, will, it is hoped, lead to some form of subsidy similar to that obtainable when the Empire Marketing Board's scheme was in operation some years ago.

Farm Labourers' Scheme.

As indicated in last year's report, the conditions being better understood, much greater advantage has been taken of this scheme, which was introduced by the Government as a result of representations made by your Council. To date over 4000 men have been employed for varying periods in land improvements which would otherwise not have been carried out, and thereby considerable national benefit has resulted from this method of expending sustenance money.

Fodder Conservation Competition.

Having given notice of its intention to conduct a State-wide Fodder Conservation Competition, your Council had with regret to abandon the idea, because the Director of Agriculture advised that it was impossible to arrange for officers of his Department to act as judges and otherwise assist in carrying out the competition, and it was deemed inadvisable to proceed without such departmental co-operation.

Victorian Young Farmers' Clubs Association.

With a view to contributing in some way to an extension of the Young Farmers' Club Movement in this State, and thereby demonstrating its interest therein, your Council studied the organisation of similar movements in other States, and considered suggestions as to how the formation of additional Clubs in Victoria could be encouraged and the best possible results obtained therefrom.

It was convinced that before any comprehensive scheme of encouragement could be launched it would be necessary to constitute some Central Council or Authority to bring about some uniformity in constitution and conduct of Clubs throughout the State.

With this accomplished, it would more readily be possible to adopt such suggestions as that this Society should arrange a Camp during its Annual Shows, at which Club members, selected by examination or other approved means, would be the guests of this Society and be afforded opportunities to extend their knowledge by conducted tours through the various sections and short addresses by competent authorities on the subjects in which they are particularly interested.

Your Council was desirous of affording every encouragement to the movement; but, before incurring any expense in this connection, deemed it advisable to afford an opportunity for those interested to frankly discuss the present situation and the future development of Young Farmers' Clubs, and to that end decided to convene a Conference of Club delegates to take place during the Show. Our President occupied the chair at the conference, which was attended by Hon. John Allan (Minister for Agriculture), Mr. H. A. Mullett (Director of Agriculture), Mr. W. Tredennick (representing the Railways Department), and Mr. James McRae (Director of Education) and other officers of his Department, in addition to some sixty representatives of Young Farmers' Clubs.

It was unanimously resolved that a central organisation be formed, and a representative provisional committee was appointed with power to co-opt and power to act in drawing up a constitution and rules, under which the organisation could function, such constitution to provide for the election of divisional representatives on the Committee of Control when the provisional committee had completed its work.

At its third meeting, which is to be held early in the new year, the provisional committee will deal finally with the constitution which has been drawn up, and ere long the Association will be working on sound lines.

Support of the Association has been most gratifying, and arrangements have already been made for a competition between affiliated Clubs for "The Argus" and "The Australasian" shield, which has been handed over by the proprietors to be competed for under conditions drawn up by the Association.

The secretarial work of the Association is being carried out in this office. The Journal.

As in former years, an official report of proceedings at the monthly meetings of your Council and other information of interest has been regularly published in the Society's official journal, which is incorporated with the "Australian Farm and Home," and by this means the activities of this Society have received Australia-wide publicity.

Though still far below what your Council would desire, it is pleasing to record a slight increase in the number of members of the Society. After making allowance for deaths and resignations, the membership totals 3962, as against 3915 last year.

Centenary Celebrations.

Following the conference referred to in last year's report, your Council resolved to alter the date of the 1934 Show to accord with the expressed wish of the Centenary Celebrations Council that the Cen-tenary Royal Show should be the inaugural function of the celebrations, and is making every effort to ensure that the Show will be worthy of the occasion.

There have been many demonstrations of appreciation of the assistance given and of the cordial relations existing between this Society and the various stud stock breeders' societies, particularly from those the secretarial work for which is carried out in this office; but none has been more spontaneous or more impressive than that disclosed in foregoing paragraphs in this report, detailing the many valuable trophies to be offered for competition at the Centenary Royal Show, and your Council takes this opportunity to record its keen appreciation of such generous support.

Your Council has placed the Show Grounds at the disposal of the Centenary Celebrations Council to be used for any of the other special entertainments and demonstrations arranged during the period of the celebrations.

Council.

It is with extreme regret that your Council reports the death of two of its members during the last few weeks of the year under review.

Mr. W. D. Leslie, whose death occurred on 2nd December after a long illness, was first elected to the Council in October, 1927, and proved an active worker in the interests of the Society. He had served on the Works, Executive, Reception, Parade, Cattle and Students' Judging Competitions Committees, and had for a great number of years demonstrated his interest in the work of the Chamber of Agriculture of Victoria and the Ayrshire Cattle Herd Book Society. The late Mr. Leslie was greatly esteemed by his colleagues on the Council, and his opinion on any matter was always noted as that of one having great experience and sound judgment.

Dr. S. S. Cameron, who passed away on 31st December, joined the Council as a Trustee appointed by the Government in March, 1915, whilst he still occupied the position of Director of Agriculture in this State. By virtue of his official position and his close connection with various stud stock breeders' societies and other primary producers' organisations, Dr. Cameron proved to be a particularly valuable member of Council, and full advantage was taken of his services by appointing him a member of the Finance, Works, Executive, Reception, Horse, Cattle and Sheep Committees.

Your Council has placed on record its keen appreciation of the services rendered by the deceased gentlemen, and has expressed its sincere sympathy with the bereaved families.

As the nominations for election at the annual meeting were not in excess of the vacancies on the Council,, the whole of the retiring members were returned unopposed, and Mr. C. N. McKay elected to fill the extra vacancy occasioned by the death of Mr. S. McKay.

Extensive leave of absence was granted to Mr. O. J. Syme during his tour abroad, and to Mr. W. Cockbill, who met with a serious accident, from which your Council regrets to report he has not yet fully recovered.

Acknowledgments.

To His Excellency, the Lieutenant-Governor, Sir William Irvine, K.C.M.G., your Council tenders its warmest thanks, not only for officially opening the Show and presenting trophies to successful exhibitors, but for the interest taken in the activities of the Society.

Your Council also gratefully acknowledges the continued support accorded by the State Government in making possible the magnificent exhibit in the Government Pavilion and assisting in other directions; the interested assistance of the Rt. Hon. the Lord Mayor and the Traffic Committee of the Melbourne City Council, more especially in connection with the procession; the painstaking services of the judges and stewards and the co-operation of the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works; the Metropolitan Fire Brigade, the Departments of Railways, Police, Defence and the Tramways Board.

The Society's keen appreciation is expressed at the liberal support given by donors to the prize fund, and the wholehearted co-operation of exhibitors and standholders in the efforts made to ensure the success of the Show.

Your Council especially desire to acknowledge the great service rendered by the Press in keeping prominently before the public the activities of the Society. more particularly at Show time, and also to thank all others who in any way assisted in furthering the interests of the Society throughout the year.

Finance.

On reference to the financial statement it will be seen that the revenue for the year was $\pm 39,112/1/$, which shows a decrease of $\pm 1,330/3/5$ on that of last year.

The expenditure (including $\pm 8,345/3/-$ in prizes and $\pm 223/9/11$ for buildings and improvements) amounted to $\pm 37,355/18/7$, the bank overdraft being reduced from $\pm 39,587/18/11$ to $\pm 37,831/16/6$, and the Society's indebtedness to the Government, inclusive of interest, decreased during the year from $\pm 40,130/7/5$ to $\pm 38,660/7/2$.

Taking the expenditure in permanent improvements as assets, the working expenses show a profit on the year's transactions of $\pm 1,979/12/4$, as against last year's profit of $\pm 4,522/0/1$, which, of course, was largely due to the enrolment of life members.

Your Council is gratified that, in addition to maintaining its annual payments in interest on and reduction of Government loans, it has been possible to bring the bank overdraft down by $\pounds 5,330$ in the last two years and, endorsing the view that the progress of this Society is an index to that of the State, looks forward with confidence to further improvement during the coming year, which will mark the Centenary of this City and State.



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


