To the Members,

Ladies and Gentlemen:

Your Council has much pleasure in presenting the following report of proceedings of the Society for the year 1939.

Permanent Buildings and Works.

The difficulty experienced during the 1938 Show, referred to in last report, was successfully overcome by the erection of a new concrete grand-stand near the Result Board. The accommodation provided under this stand and in the adjoining capacious partly-roofed yard, together with the improved facilities for entrance to and exit from the Arena, enabled the very heavy day and night programme at our recent Show to be conducted without undue strain on arena officials. These improvements were not only appreciated by those taking part in the varied events and by the general public surrounding the Arena, but also by those patrons on the new stand, from which a particularly good view of the programme could be obtained.

In conjunction with the erection of this stand considerable improvement was effected in the immediate neighbourhood.

A new fodder store and dairy cattle sale ring, complete with Agents' offices, were provided in the western end of the No. 2 Pavilion, and on the southern wall several horse boxes were constructed as the initial step in the scheme to convert this building from cattle to horse accommodation—an increase in which is recognized as one of our outstanding requirements.

The fat cattle pens were removed to the western end of the Nicholas Pavilion, thus providing an ideal site for the model dairy erected and donated to the Society by Australian Cement Limited.

The removal of the old dairy cattle sale ring, weighbridge, fodder store and Agents' offices facilitated the straightening of McNab Street and Staughton Parade, thus adequately opening up the approach to the new area on which the Nicholas Pavilion and Centenary Hall were constructed in 1934.

Your Council regretted its inability to carry out in full the original proposal, which included a similar dual purpose concrete stand on the other side of the Result Board, which would have made further provision for the accommodation of the public and underneath, embodied the casualty room, adequate dressing rooms for the ever-increasing number of lady riders and facilities for others taking part in the arena programme.

However, the work done during the year is definitely a part of a developmental plan which can be carried out in sections as finances permit.

The provision of a separate building adjacent to the Horticultural Hall, to house the comprehensive and non-competitive display of the work of members of Young Farmers' Clubs throughout Victoria, met with general approval.

The additional accommodation provided for bacon and pork pigs was

In the Pigeon Pavilion all the extra coops provided were occupied, whilst the new asphalt floor was appreciated by exhibitors and the visiting public.

The construction of new roadways in the Amusement Area actually made more space available, thus increasing revenue, and at the same time

gave satisfaction to the side-showmen and their patrons.

Further development of the lighting scheme included the substitution of unsightly poles in Plummer Avenue and Degraves Street with neat concrete light standards, and improved the appearance of the grounds both by day and by night, whilst extensive renovation of existing roads and footpaths considerably improved conditions for Show patrons on their

tours of imspection of the exhibits.

Having completed the purchase of the property at the corner of Epsom Road and Lang's Road, mentioned in last year's report, your control of the purchase of the property at the corner of the property at the co Council had it suitably fenced and graded for use as a motor park. As anticipated, by virtue of its position, this park speedily became very

popular with Show patrons.

The Exhibition.

The Society's Annual Exhibition, which was held from 21st to 30th September, 1939, was officially opened by His Excellency the Governor (Sir Winston Dugan), to whom an illuminated address of welcome was

presented by your President on behalf of the Society.

The Show was patronized by Their Excellencies the Governor-General and Lady Gowrie; His Excellency the Governor and Lady Dugan, whilst other prominent visitors included the Prime Minister, the Premier and several Federal and State Ministers. All commended your Council's decision to "carry on" despite the war forced on the Empire earlier in the month.

Your Council was more than gratified to find that the support accorded by exhibitors in competitive and non-competitive sections was such that the Show was generally conceded to be the best yet staged in Melbourne, and whilst it is convinced that had it not been for the calamity referred to, a new record in revenue would have been established, it is pleased that revenue exceeded expenditure by more than £14,000, and sees a general endorsement of its decision in the fact that the attendances at the Show totalled 353,000, although weather conditions were unfavourable

on several days.

The Show was outstanding in many ways. The quality of the exhibits in the competitive sections, in which entries constituted an alltime record; the high standard of the non-competitive displays of farm and dairy machinery, motor cars and manufactured goods of all kinds; the Wool Display in the Government Pavilion, staged by the Society with the assistance of the Department of Agriculture, the Wool Board, manufacturers and business firms, and undoubtedly the greatest single attraction; the Central Australian Exhibition; the display in the Young Farmers' Pavilion; and the arena programme, which included new features in the Boy Scouts' Demonstration, the Highland Pipe Band display, and the pale matches at night all of which demand repetition with other items of polo matches at night, all of which demand repetition with other items of

proved popularity with the public.

The Commonwealth Clydesdale Horse Society (Federal Council and Victorian Branch).

Quite the reverse of indications for the immediate future, the droughty conditions which prevailed with more or less severity over practically the whole of the Commonwealth during last breeding season caused a slacken-

ing in the demand for horses during the year.

The membership of the Society suffered, but the decrease was not extensive, and the majority of breeders, realizing the value of registration, continued to keep the records of their stud breeding activities up to date, whilst quite a number, taking full advantage of the opportunity offered, secured, at relatively low cost, mares of good quality to raise the standard of their studs.

During the year, Volume 11 of the Society's Stud Book was published and forwarded to all financial members and kindred bodies overseas. The volume contains the pedigrees of 173 stallions, 771 numbered mares with progeny, together with 103 new Appendix B mares, and particulars of additional progeny from 2,655 numbered mares, 581 Appendix B, and

580 Appendix A females recorded in previous volumes.

Every animal registered therein complies with the new Rules, which came into force on the 1st January, 1937, and is the progeny of registered sire and dam. As a result of this new restriction, it is hoped that a general improvement in type and conformation of all stud book animals will be more readily obtained, with beneficial results to the horse-breeding industry as a whole.

The Society is continuing its efforts to eradicate all unsound and undesirable stallions, and obtain uniform legislation throughout the whole Commonwealth which will provide for the compulsory castration of all

below a reasonable standard.

Insofar as Victoria is concerned, the Horse Breeding Act has been amended to provide for the examination of all two-year-old colts and the refund of the appeal fee in all cases when the appeal is upheld; but, unfortunately, the third recommendation from this Society, regarding the compulsory castration of all rejected stallions, was not adopted.

Persistent appeals will, however, be made for the deletion from the

Persistent appeals will, however, be made for the deletion from the Act of the clause which permits an owner to retain an uncertificated stallion for use with his own mares, as the present condition does much to nullify the improvement of horses generally for which purpose the Act

was specially designed.

Since the outbreak of war it has been found that there is a definite shortage of good types of light and medium horses throughout the Commonwealth, and difficulty has been experienced in obtaining sufficient horses up to the standard required for military purposes.

This important matter calls for immediate action, and some encouragement should be provided to stimulate interest in horse breeding, not only as a defence measure but also to ensure Australia's independence from a commercial and agricultural point of view in times of national conflict

and economic stress.

The Federal Council has already considered the problem, and the attention of Cabinet Ministers having been drawn to the unsatisfactory position obtaining, the Prime Minister has advised that the matter has been referred to the Australian Agricultural Council. It is hoped that this body will evolve a scheme which will have the desired effect.

The display of Clydesdales at the recent Melbourne Royal Show was again one of its outstanding features, and the high standard of exhibits

was quite in keeping with that of previous years.

Australian Pony Stud Book Society.

No actual branch of this Society has yet been formed in Victoria, but the necessary secretarial work in connection with the reception of entries and inspection of ponies owned by members of this State is still being carried out in this office.

The Society retains the interest of Victorian breeders, who supply the bulk of the registrations eligible for entry in the Shetland section, and are looking forward to the publication of the second volume of the Stud Book.

The Shorthorn Society of Australia (Federal Council and Victorian Branch).

The abundance of grass available everywhere since early autumn has greatly facilitated the increased activity in the beef-raising industry consequent on the outbreak of war, the British Government's undertaking to purchase our exportable surplus, and the resolution of breeders to ensure adequate supplies.

Export buyers are active at all markets, and values are showing an upward trend. Breeding is being undertaken on an extensive scale, and the demand for Shorthorns is steadily increasing, as the early maturing characteristics of the breed make it ideal for the production of high-

quality beef equally suitable for both local and export trade.

The Committee of the Victorian Branch has noted with interest the establishment of Shorthorn herds on properties devoted to sheep raising, the improved pastures making it possible for owners to breed and fatten stock and thus be independent of the store market for the cattle necessary to keep pastures in suitable order for sheep grazing. This practice has had a beneficial influence on the membership of the Society, which has not varied greatly over the past few years, and has inspired greater confidence in the future of the breed.

Volume 9 of the Society's Herd Book was published by the Federal Council during the year, and circulated among financial members and kindred bodies overseas. It contained the pedigrees of 248 bulls and 1,133 cows with produce, together with particulars of additional progeny

from 1,447 cows registered in previous volumes.

Included therein were the pedigrees of 22 bulls and 24 cows imported from Great Britain, which demonstrates the enthusiasm of breeders and their keen desire to improve the general standard of their cattle, not only from the type standpoint, but also their general usefulness for trade requirements.

The proposal to alter the Constitution of the Society, mentioned in last report, was not agreed to by the Federal Council, and, as a result, the

Branch in this State will continue to function.

At the recent Melbourne Royal Show, greater interest was manifested in the Shorthorn section, and the entries received were more numerous than has been the case for some years, whilst the display lacked

nothing from the point of view of quality.

During the year the Victorian Branch suffered a great loss in the death of Mr. Archibald Currie, who had been President for the last twelve years. He was keenly interested in the breed, and spared no effort

to further the work of the Society.

The Dairy Shorthorn Association of Australia.

The year just concluded is probably one of the most important that this Association has yet experienced, in that it has witnessed the publication and distribution of the first volume of the Herd Book. The volume contains the pedigrees of 1,381 cows and 651 bulls, also produce of registered cows up to December, 1938.

A Publicity Kiosk was again opened on the Show Grounds and proved invaluable as a medium for placing the merits of the breed before the public. The newly appointed Publicity Officer was in charge of the kiosk

for the duration of the Show.

The Dairy Shorthorn breed is rapidly gaining in popularity in other States-purchases having been made for Western Australia and Queensland during the year-and is continuing to gain new adherents in Victoria.

The breed is well represented in the Advanced Register of Merit recently compiled by the Department of Agriculture of Victoria, to qualify

for which a cow must have produced, under Victorian Standard Herd Test (273 days lactation), a mature equivalent yield of at least 400 lbs. butterfat for four consecutive years.

The Committee has been pleased to note that a Dairy Shorthorn herd has the greatest number of animals from any one herd of any breed

appearing in the register.

The Red Poll Cattle Breeders' Association of Australia (Federal Council and Victorian Branch).

The Red Poll breed is continuing to gain new adherents throughout the Commonwealth, and, as a result, the membership of this Association has been further increased during the year just concluded.

Entries for Volume 10 closed recently, and publication will be taken in hand early in the new year. The volume will contain the pedigrees of

males and females born prior to 1st July, 1939.

Provision in the Constitution to close the D Class of the Herd Book to females has now come into force and animals of this class born after

31st December, 1938, will not be accepted for registration.

An Australian price record for a Red Poll cow sold at auction was established at the dispersal sale of the "Northwood Park" stud, when 250 guineas was paid for that well-known Royal Show Champion, "Northwood Ena." Victorian and Interstate stud masters took advantage of the opportunity afforded by this sale to add to their herds animals which, but for the unfortunate fact that health reasons compelled their owner to sell, would certainly not have been available.

Another notable dispersal sale held towards the latter part of the year was that of the "Homebush" (W.A.) stud, which also would not have taken place but for the lamentable death of the owner (Mr. James

MacCallum Smith).

By submitting their herds to Government official test, and competing in Fat Steer competitions at Royal Shows, breeders in the various States are continuing to demonstrate that the Red Poll breed can successfully produce animals balanced in the desired qualities for milk and meat production.

The Ayrshire Cattle Herd Book Society of Australasia (Federal Council and Victorian Branch).

The Herd Test Competition conducted by the Federal Council of this Society was completed during the year, and five prizes were distributed through three States of the Commonwealth.

Although this competition did not induce any appreciable number of members to submit their herds to official test, it did serve a very good purpose in that it brought to light a number of excellent test records which were duly used in publicity matter.

The 31st Volume of the Herd Book and the eighth regular issue of Test Record Booklet were issued during the year, and widely

distributed.

The Victorian Branch has experienced a very satisfactory year, and for the first time for some years has recorded an increase in membership.

Considerable interest was displayed in the importation this year of several animals from the home of the breed, and it is hoped that these will be the forerunners of many more which will introduce new blood to the herds of the State.

> The Friesian Cattle Club of Australia (Federal Council and Victorian Branch).

The members of this Club have been pleased to note the increased interest displayed by dairy farmers in Friesians during the year. was noticeable in 1938, but during the immediate past twelve months it became so general in Victoria that Friesian bulls fit for service became practically unprocurable.

This enthusiasm was reflected in the excellent entry of Friesians at

the Royal Show, when the highest total for 16 years was reached.

The Committee of the Victorian Branch is pleased with the results obtained by a continuance of its publicity campaign to bring the merits of the Friesian breed before those concerned, and demonstrate its importance to the dairying industry in this State.

With a satisfactory number of entries in hand for inclusion in Volume 14 of the Club's Herd Book, the Federal Council decided that compilation

of the volume should commence early in the new year.

It is with deep regret that reference is made to the death of Mr. L. F. Axford. For many years Mr. Axford acted as Secretary of the South Australian Branch of the Club and delegate to the Federal Council. His passing will prove a sad loss to members.

The Guernsey Cattle Society of Australasia (Victorian Branch).

Further satisfactory progress is reported by the Committee of this branch. The outstanding Government test records made by Guernseys during the year and the winning of the Champion Milk and Butterfat Test at the Royal Show gave a noticeable fillip to the breed. The dispersal of two large herds helped to relieve the shortage of females which had been a definite deterrent and brought a large increase in membership.

Volume 12 of the Society's Herd Book, containing a satisfactory total of entries, was issued by the Federal Council.

The Australian Illawarra Shorthorn Society (Victorian Branch).

Interest in the breed has been stimulated during the year, mainly due to the enterprize of one breeder in making purchases in New South Wales—including a herd of 57 animals—for re-sale in Victoria, where of late breeders have been unable to supply the demand for registered females. Several other breeders desirous of introducing fresh blood into their herds have also made purchases from well-known studs in New South Wales.

The introduction of these New South Wales-bred animals should do much to further popularize this breed in Victoria, and is already resulting

in an increase in the membership of this branch.

Last year your Council intimated that if better support was not forth-coming the A.I.S. Classes would be discontinued.

It is pleasing to report that at the 1939 Royal Show breeders responded to the call and exhibited an entry totalling 70. This entry is the highest since 1932, and represented quite a number of breeders who were exhibiting at the Royal Show for the first time.

After a lapse of several years the breed is again represented in the

Victorian Government Official Test.

The Australian Jersey Herd Society (Victorian Branch).

This branch has had a very active and fruitful year, and its membership, which for some years has been almost stationary, showed a substantial increase.

Registrations of stock are on the up-grade, and excellent figures have

been recorded by females under official Government test.

For the twelfth year in succession the breed produced the Champion

Herd under test, and once again the Champion Test Cow was a Jersey.

The Voluntary Classification System has now been functioning for three years and is well established, and accepted as a forward measure of breed improvement.

The figures of cows classified late in 1939 are not available yet, but to August, 1939, 411 cows were classified, of which 50 were awarded

H.C. and 361 C.

An Advanced Register of Merit was inaugurated in 1939, and the

first list of 103 cows which were included has been issued.

It is interesting to note the close relationship between type and production, as the official test figures of these cows show that the average production of the H.C. cows was 567 lbs. butterfat, whilst the average yield of the C. cows was 509 lbs. butterfat.

In November the branch suffered a severe loss through the sudden death of Mr. John D. Read. Mr. Read was one of the pioneers of the breed in this State, and was highly respected. He was a member of the Committee since the inception of the branch, and had been President on two occasions.

The Victorian United Cow Test Association.

With a season so favourable to dairying and the Imperial Government's contract to purchase Australia's surplus butter and cheese, it is only natural that a greater number of dairy farmers are interested in submitting their herds to test.

The Council of this Association is faced with considerable difficulty in taking advantage of the opportunity to extend the herd-testing move-

ment, which is of such national importance to this State.

Its main problem is to ensure an adequate number of qualified herd The shortage was apparent early in the year, but has become acute since the outbreak of war. It has been suggested that senior Young Farmers might elect to relieve the position by studying for certificates of competency and gaining valuable experience whilst doing a national service.

Having gone thoroughly into the matter, Council resolved to discontinue the Dairy Farm Competition for the duration of the war. This decision was made with much regret, because the competition is widely

recognized for its educational value.

The Annual Field Day, which was held at Warrnambool this year, was well attended, and members greatly enjoyed visiting points of historical interest in the district whilst travelling from one to other of the out-

standing farms scheduled for their inspection.

R.A.S. of V. Production Certificates were again issued to members whose herds attained the specified standards under Association test; and in the annual Herd Testers' Competition, the gold medals and cash

prizes were awarded for reports of a particularly high standard.

The Association has by direct representation maintained its interest in the activities of the Chamber of Agriculture; Pasture Improvement League; Pig Industry Committee; Dairymen's Association, and Cattle Research Association, and, as a result of preliminary discussions late in the year, the Council is looking forward to working in close co-operation with the various societies of breeders of dairy cattle through a series of conferences with their representatives.

At the Annual Conference of delegates from affiliated herd testing associations, presentations were made to Dr. J. Leslie Henderson and Mr. H. E. Keele, who had decided not to seek re-election to the Council, as members of which both had given many years of valuable service to

the Association.

The Australian Cattle Research Association (Victorian Branch).

This Association has continued to finance the scientific investigations into two of the chief problems of the dairying industry—Bang's Disease and mastitis—but its ability to do so in future is in grave doubt.

Because of the effect of the war on public finances, the Association has so far been unable to obtain renewal of certain substantial contriburions to its funds, and unfortunately an appeal to the Australian Dairy Produce Board for an increase in its grant of £2,000 per annum could not be met owing to the action already taken by that Board in reducing its levies following completion of the contract with the Imperial Government to purchase Australia's surplus of butter and cheese.

Insofar as the investigation into mastitis which is being carried out in Victoria is concerned, it is definitely stated that the work to date has defined the problem more clearly than was anticipated, and if it is made possible to continue the investigation, there is very definite promise of valuable practical results being obtained.

Needless to say, the Association is making strenuous efforts to secure the financial support necessary to a continuance of its work, and your Council purposes co-operating with the Victorian Branch Committee in representations to the State Government for a renewal of its subsidy of £500 per annum, which it has contributed during the past six years.

The Australian Society of Breeders of British Sheep (Federal Council and Victorian Branch).

During the period under review there has been a gratifying increase in the membership of this Society, which has reached a record total of 1,867. Approximately 800 of these members reside in Victoria.

Numerous breeders have imported from England and New Zealand sheep of a high standard, which should improve the quality of flocks throughout the Commonwealth. That other countries are taking a keen interest in the type of sheep bred in Australia is indicated by the fact that over 300 rams and 400 ewes of British breeds were exported during the year. To ensure maintenance of a high standard for export, the Society appoints official inspectors to examine all sheep prior to shipment.

Volume 31 of the Flock Book, which was published in February last, contains the record total of 1,776 histories of flocks throughout Australia. As over 350 new flocks have already been accepted for registration, it is certain that the total will be substantially increased

in the next volume.

At a meeting held in June, 1938, the Federal Council requested the co-operation of branch committees in an endeavour to bring about the licensing of all breeders of pure-bred rams, with a view to only allowing pure-bred rams to be sold, and thus ensuring an improvement in the standard of lambs bred for export. Through the Ministers for Agriculture in the different States, this matter was brought before the Australian Agricultural Council, which referred it to the Committee on Animal Production for consideration and report. A Sub-Committee met the Animal Production Committee in November, and placed before it the views of the Society. It is confidently anticipated that some definite action will be taken in the near future. The demand for British breed rams has been particularly keen, and at the three registered sales held late in the year, rams of all breeds sold at most satisfactory prices. Pleasing features of these sales were the increasing interest of buyers of suitable rams for the production of export lambs, and the excellent type of rams being yarded by members. Rigid inspection by officials appointed by the Society ensures that only sheep of a high standard are offered, and enables buyers to operate with confidence.

The 877 entries received for the 1939 Royal Show made one of the most outstanding displays of British breeds ever placed before

the public.

The Victorian Branch again donated £69 towards the prize fund in the sheep section.

The Australian Corriedale Sheepbreeders' Association (Federal Council and Victorian Branch).

This Association has experienced another satisfactory year. There are now 516 flocks registered throughout Australia, 193 of which are in Victoria. This is an increase of 24 on the total number of

flocks registered at the end of 1938.

Vol. XIII. of the Flock Book was published during the year and contained the histories of 497 flocks. It has been the custom to publish the Flock Book every second year, but the Federal Council has decided that it should be published annually. Vol. XIV. will, therefore, be issued during the coming year.

The Victorian Branch makes available sashes for the Champion

Corriedale Ram and Ewe at agricultural shows where the entries are restricted to registered Corriedales, and where the judge is one approved of by the branch. During the year 1939, 34 Agricultural Societies restricted their entries to registered sheep and received the champion sashes.

It is pleasing to record that both the quality and quantity of

Corriedales at these shows have improved on previous years.

The inspection of each year's drop of lambs is being regularly conducted by the various inspectors, and the utmost care continues to be exercised by them in performing this very important duty. It is satisfactory to learn that members accept the decisions loyally as it is realized that, as in all breeds of sheep, it is necessary that type and constitution must be of the highest standard.

The Victorian Society of Export Lamb and Mutton Producers.

This Society has maintained its representation on the Victorian Meat Advisory Committee, which co-operates with the Australian Meat Board in matters affecting the export trade. The members are not only aware of the necessity for maintaining a high standard of quality in the lambs produced for export, but fully realize that this factor will be of paramount importance when normal trading is resumed after the war.

Australian Stud Pig Breeders' Society (Federal Council and Victorian Branch).

The membership of this Society has considerably increased during the past year, and the greater interest now being shown in stud pig breeding is reflected in the fact that Volume 30 of the Herd Book, now being compiled, will contain over 3,000 entries, which is approximately 20 per cent. more than published in the largest volume

previously issued.

With a view to encouraging the breeding of the type of bacon and pork pigs best suited for the export trade, the Committee of the Victorian Branch—being convinced that breeders generally recognized the possibilities for development in this direction—elected as an Honorary Member the Government Pig Expert, and after careful consideration, unanimously resolved to financially support and to co-operate with the Department of Agriculture and the Royal Agricultural Society in the conduct of competitions, which are designed to provide a recording service for pig breeders, based on the economic factors of pig production, and which it is considered will have a greater educational value to pig raisers than the competitions conducted in conjunction with previous Royal Shows.

The Committee also resolved to request the Royal Agricultural Society to support representations to the Government for the establishment of a Pig Testing Station on the State Research Farm

at Werribee.

The Kennel Control Council.

Canine affairs were marked during the year by increased entries and support generally for the fixtures of clubs and societies affiliated with the Kennel Control Council. Stability and impartiality of government by the Kennel Control Council, under the auspices of the Royal Agricultural Society, is directly responsible. Confidence has caused much money to be spent by fanciers in the importation of good specimens of the various breeds, and Victoria is now outstanding among the States of the Commonwealth for the generally high quality of the dogs bred.

The Kennel Control Council, as the governing body for some thousands of Victorian breeders and exhibitors, and the controlling force in the conduct of a dog show or other fixture almost every week of the year, is always in a state of activity. Under its patronage dog breeding and exhibiting has become an industry in this State with an investment value in foods and other requisites

running into tens of thousands of pounds.

The Committee of ten gentlemen, under the presidency of your President, and the Chairmanship of Mr. W. Cockbill, of your Council, meets regularly, and through the expert knowledge of each member, Victoria's dog world is kept at its high peak of efficiency.

As indicated in the previous report, Mr. George Steadman Thomas, of America, was brought to Australia to judge at the Royal Show as his sole Australian engagement. Mr. Thomas's lifetime experience as an international judge of dogs resulted in his authoritative opinions

being accepted by fanciers with the utmost confidence.

Through its active participation in the negotiations for Mr. Thomas's engagement the Kennel Control Council was again of real service to the Society, and its efficient organization of the fancy only needed such a judge to ensure the Society its ninth consecutive record—the actual figures being 1,001 dogs, making 1,620 entries.

Victorian Working Sheep Dog Association.

The increasing interest being taken in the working sheepdog is reflected in the membership of this Association.

Competitions conducted by Sheep Dog Trial Clubs and Agricul-Societies throughout the State attracted excellent entries.

Probably the most notable sheep dog trials ever conducted in Victoria were held during the year on the Moonee Valley Racecourse, to decide the winner of the ninth competition for the "Captain Payne" 50 guinea trophy.

Keen interest in the final for the Championship was shown by the many people from both city and country who visited Moonee Valley to see the first field trials held in Melbourne by this Association, and as a result of which the Mayor of Essendon's National Emergency Fund benefited by £15/15/-.

The Victorian Young Farmers' Clubs Association.

Imbued with the belief that the national importance of Young Farmers' Clubs lacked only publicity to ensure them the recognition they deserved, the Council of the Association organized a comprehensive display of the work of affiliated clubs during the recent Royal Show. The result constituted an education to the public, disclosing the wide scope and importance of the movement. The Young Farmers' pavilion specially provided by your Council for the purpose was crowded on most occasions, and the display received marked attention from Vice-Regal visitors to the Show, members of the Government, and representatives of other important bodies.

The enthusiastic demand by clurs for guidance in their activities necessitated the Association's two Supervisors travelling over 22,000 miles during the year, and led to the Hon, the Premier again showing his interest and faith in the movement by inducing the Government to increase its financial grant to permit the appointment of a third

Supervisor, who will commence duty in January.

Special attention was paid by the Association's Council to increasing interest in the senior section of clubs, so that the knowledge and practical experience gained by the young people will be retained and developed when they reach the age of 18 years and

are obliged to retire from the junior clubs.

The second of the Association's three-year scholarships at an cultural college was allotted. The Association believes that agricultural college was allotted. through these scholarships it is giving a needed opportunity to outstanding young farmers to fit themselves to take important parts in the development and progress of agriculture in Australia, and it was gratified to learn of the decision of the Herald and Weekly Times Ltd. to make such a scholarship available in 1940.

The usual camp of Victorian, Queensland, and New South Wales Young Farmers was held at our Show, and Victorian teams were sent to camps at the Brisbane and Sydney Royal Shows. These privileges serve as an incentive to Young Farmers in their efforts

during the year.

With the assistance of Agricultural Department officers and others, the Association's annual twelve-day School of Agriculture was held during late May and early June. These schools primarily are for the education of teachers in the work of Young Farmers' Clubs, but realizing the great value of the knowledge to be gained, the Association admitted interested young men and women, as well as school teachers, this year for the first time. The result was gratifying in that thirty-one non-teachers enrolled, bringing the total to 123, as against the record last year of 73.

With the continued help of the Government, the Agricultural

With the continued help of the Government, the Agricultural and Education Department and other bodies, and with the loyal assistance of the school teachers, on whom rests so much of the responsibility for the success or failure of clubs, the movement should go on to greater achievements in the future, fitting increased

numbers of country children for profitable lives on the land.

The Chamber of Agriculture of Victoria.

The Fortieth Annual Meeting and the Thirty-Seventh Annual Convention of this Chamber, held at Warrnambool on 14th, 15th and 16th March last, was officially opened by the Hon. A. E. Lind, M.L.A., Minister for Lands and Forests, and was attended by a large number of delegates nominated by affiliated bodies throughout the State.

A particularly cordial welcome was accorded the delegates, and everything possible was done to ensure that their visit would be an

enjoyable one.

Excellent addresses on subjects of particular interest to primary producers were duly appreciated by delegates, who also seriously considered the many motions included in a lengthy agenda. Resolutions passed were subsequently brought under notice of responsible Ministers by deputation or otherwise suitably dealt with by the Executive.

A full report on the Convention and all the addresses delivered thereat was included in the second Year Book published by the Chamber. Copies of this publication were widely distributed and

many letters of appreciation have been received.

Members will be interested to learn that Professor S. M. Wadham, this Society's representative on the Council of the Chamber, was elected to a seat on the Executive. It is hoped that Professor Wadham will arrive in Melbourne on his return from an extended tour abroad in time to permit his attendance at the 1940 Convention, which is to be held at Wangaratta on 5th, 6th and 7th March.

The Journal.

The activities of this Society have received Commonwealth-wide publicity throughout the year per medium of the "Australian Farm and Home," in which the Society's official journal is incorporated.

Not only have reports on the monthly meetings of your Council been regularly published in this journal, but considerable space has been devoted to all matters in which the Society is interested. An arrangement has just been made for all available space to be devoted to the publication of matter supplied by the Department of Information in accordance with this Society's acceptance of the invitation to co-operate with that department in carrying out its work.

Use of Grounds Between Shows.

An innovation this year was the use of the old Sheep Pavilion by Messrs. Goldsbrough, Mort & Co., for the sales conducted at the time of the Australian Sheep Breeders' Show, and it is hoped that the arrangement will be renewed annually, as has been the case with the Annual Horse Parade and Sale conducted by Messrs. Campbell & Sons in the Horse Pavilions. As in former years the Dog Pavilion and judging rings were frequently used by clubs affiliated with the Kennel Control Council, and two poultry shows were successfully conducted in the Poultry Pavilion.

Immediately after the Royal Show, the Grounds were taken over by the Defence Department. Your Council was informed that whilst no rent would be paid, the Society would be compensated for any damage to the property and plant, and it was anticipated that the Grounds would again be made available by the end of June to enable preparations to be completed for the 1940 Show.

With the exception of the stock pavilions and horse boxes, in which wool is stored, practically every building belonging to stand-holders and the Society is occupied for one or other military purpose, and at times the number of men accommodated at the Grounds has

exceeded 4 000.

Owing to the necessity to cancel the Military Tattoo, the Arena was only used at night on one occasion other than at Show time. The Sportsmen's Charity Carnival had to be twice postponed on account of heavy rain, and when eventually held, the weather was so unfavourable that the function was not such a success as when first held at the Grounds in 1938. The members of the Carnival Committee—being sportsmen—do not hold the Society responsible for the weather, and have expressed their appreciation of the readiness with which every facility for the successful conduct of their carnival was placed at their disposal.

Fodder Conservation.

As mentioned in last year's report, nineteen societies were unable, because of the drought, to conduct fodder conservation competitions, for which your Council had granted subsidies. These were, therefore, deferred for twelve months, and under ideal conditions judging will be completed early in 1940.

However eleven competitions were successfully conducted by the Apsley Farmers' Association, the herd testing associations at Alexandra, Paschendale, Walwa and Warrnambool, and the agricultural societies at Benalla, Cohuna, Echuca, Mansfield, Tallangatta

and Wangaratta.

As a result, much valuable publicity was given to the importance of fodder conservation.

Wheat Crop Championships.

Following the allocation by this Society of £50 as prize money in the Wheat Crop Championship competition, conducted by the Farm Competitions Association (Victoria) in the Wimmera during the 1938 harvest, your Council, being impressed with the widespread interest created, resolved to provide £100 as prize money in two such competitions to be conducted by that Association in connection with the 1939 harvest in the Wimmera and Mallee. It is anticipated that the results of these competitions will be announced early in 1940.

The Council.

As the nominations for election at the annual meeting in February last were not in excess of the vacancies, all of the retiring members of Council were returned unopposed for a further period of three years.

At the March meeting it was reported that Mr. O. J. Syme had tendered his resignation from the Council, explaining that he did

so with regret and for personal reasons only.

The resignation was accepted with much regret, and your Council recorded its keen appreciation of the valuable services rendered to the Society by Mr. Syme since he was first elected to the Council in 1913.

The vacancy was filled at the April meeting by the election of

Mr. Clive McPherson, C.B.E.

As indicated in last report, Professor S. M. Wadham has been abroad throughout the year, and members will be interested to learn that he expects to be back in Melbourne in March.

Your Council has noted with much regret the inability of Mr. R. O. Blackwood to attend its meetings. His colleagues will know what a disappointment this has been to Mr. Blackwood, who still retains his keen interest in the activities of this Society.

Illness has prevented our Senior Vice-President (Mr. H. A.

Anderson) from attending meetings since August. His absence from the Arena was noted by many Show patrons, who joined with his colleagues on the Council in hopes for his speedy recovery.

Illness has also prevented Mr. Woodmason from attending the last two meetings. Happily the latest advices are that both may be

expected back in the new year.

Early in September last the death took place of Mr. William McNab, who had been a member of Council of this Society from

1889 until he resigned his seat in 1935.

Your President and the Secretary officially attended the funeral and Council recorded its deep regret at the passing of one who had

given such long and valuable service to the Society.

Owing to a serious illness, Mr. Geof. Fethers was unable to undertake his duties as Veterinary Surgeon during the last Show. Dr. W. A. N. Robertson—formerly Chief Veterinary Inspector in this State, and but recently retired from the position of Director of Veterinary Hygiene in the Commonwealth Service—readily agreed

to give what time he had available to assist the Society.

Shortly after the Show your Council was shocked to learn of the sudden death of Dr. Robertson, and expressed its sincere sympathy

with the bereaved family.

Acknowledgements.

Your Council has pleasure in recording its appreciation of the interest displayed in the activities of this Society by Their Excellencies the Governor-General and Lady Gowrie, and His Excellency the

Governor and Lady Dugan.
Shortly after his arrival in Victoria, Sir Winston Dugan accorded his patronage to this Society. He demonstrated his approval of your Council's decision to proceed with the Show by attending the annual visit of inspection early in September, and subsequently visiting the Show on several occasions.

He attended the official luncheon, after which he performed the official opening ceremony and graciously accepted an illuminated address of welcome embodying an expression of the loyalty and devotion of members of this Society to the Throne and Person of

His Majesty the King.

In his capacity as Chief Scout in Victoria he also took the salute on the occasion of the impressive demonstration given by 4,500 Boy Scouts on the Arena, and during their visits to different parts of the Ground both he and Lady Dugan commented with

approval on the various exhibits inspected.

To the Rt. Hon. the Prime Minister, who attended the Commonwealth Luncheon and in his speech encouraged the Society to continue its national work, your Council tenders its warmest thanks, for attending the Show and taking an interest in the welfare of the Society. Also to the Hon. the Premier, who officially opened the Young Farmers' Pavilion, thus further demonstrating his already well-known personal and official interest in the Young Farmer Movement in this State; to the Hon. the Minister of Agriculture, who officially opened the Model Dairy, and to other Ministers both Federal and State, who attended the Show and displayed keen interest in the exhibits.

Your Council desires to gratefully acknowledge-more particularly in view of the circumstances then prevailing—the co-operation of the Victorian Polo Association, which made possible what proved to be a major attraction at several of the evening sessions of the

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Show; also that of the Boy Scouts' Association; the Victorian High-land Pipe Band Association and the Victorian Football League, all supporters of the Society. At the same time it no less appreciates the co-operation of the Police Department; the Metropolitan Fire Brigade; Melbourne City Council; Railways Department; Metropolitan Tramways Board; Waverley Riding School and the various Stud Stock Breeders' Societies.

Keen appreciation is also expressed of the assistance given in connection with the Wool Display by the Department of Agriculture, the Australian Wool Board, and the other organizations and firms interested in Australia's major industry; also Mr. Oswald Gration and those who co-operated with him in staging the Central Aus-

tralian Exhibition.

Your Council desires to again place on record its grateful thanks to the press and the various broadcasting stations for the publicity given to the activities of the Society throughout the year, and more particularly at Show time; to the judges, stewards and stewardesses for the manner in which they carried out their responsible duties on judging day; to the standholders and exhibitors for their loyal and wholehearted co-operation in staging the Show, and to all others who in any way assisted in furthering the interests of the Society throughout the year.

Finance.

On reference to the financial statement it will be seen that the revenue for the year was £55,486/10/7, which shows a decrease of £301/4/5 on that of last year.

The expenditure (including £10,469/1/3 in prizes, £8,510/7/1 for buildings and improvements, and £1,650, balance of the purchase of the new property) amounted to £57,969/14/10, the Bank overdraft being increased by £2,483/4/3 to £63,030/7/2.

The Society's indebtedness to the Government still stands at £33,366/3/3, this being the last year of the special arrangement suspending repayments referred to in previous reports. Interest pay-

ments were, however, made as usual.

The special loan, to finance the lighting of the grounds, has been further reduced to £4,750, and interest thereon has been paid

to the end of the year.

Taking the expenditure in permanent improvements as assets, and allowing for the £600 received from the sale of portion of the motor park in Elliott Street, the working expenses for the year show

a profit of £7,077/2/10, as against that of £9,651/4/6 last year.

Whilst this result is not as satisfactory as your Council had justification to hope, when planning the year's work in the light of the conditions prevailing after the breaking of the drought, and the apparently more settled state of world affairs, it is comforting to know that we have considerably increased very serviceable assets to assist us in carrying on the work of the Society which, in encouraging primary production, is more than ever a national duty under existing conditions.

Your Council trusts that with the loyal co-operation of members it will be possible for this Society to render signal service to the Empire in its supreme effort to ensure that men may in future live without fear of totalitarian tyranny, and second only to the valiant and self-sacrificing services of our armies, success depends on adequate supplies of foodstuffs and other necessities which Australia can, and

will, produce.
