To the Members.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Your Council has much pleasure in presenting the following report of proceedings of the Society for the year 1935.

Permanent Buildings and Works.

In view of the extensive works programme carried out prior to the Centenary Show, your Council kept expenditure under this heading as low as possible during the year under review.

As usual, a considerable amount was required in connection with the maintenance of the Society's extensive assets in buildings and plant, and, in keeping with the policy adopted in past years, a further section of the roads and footpaths about the grounds was reconditioned.

The development of the new area enclosed in 1934 was further advanced by the proper construction of the former public road known as Watson's Terrace, running from Lang's Road, at the entrance to the Nicholas Jersey Pavilion, round the Centenary Hall to the boundary fence adjacent to the Young Farmers' Camp.

The extension to the Swine Pavilion, erected last year, was floored in brick, and the floors in the new horse stalls and boxes were filled with clay.

The public speech equipment was greatly improved by the conversion of the top of the Casualty Room into a room for the announcer, and the provision of a new underground telephone line from the centre of the arena.

Feeling that, since the erection of the Nicholas Jersey Pavilion, the Society would be able to satisfactorily accommodate all stud cattle likely to be entered for some years to come, your Council proceeded to carry into effect its long-felt desire to provide an all-weather rest area for Show patrons. A large section of the old Carriage Pavilion was adapted to this purpose, and the patronage accorded clearly demonstrated how much the public appreciated the innovation, and prompted your Council to authorise the conversion of a further section during the coming year.

The Exhibition.

The Society's Annual Exhibition, which was held from 19th to 28th September, 1935, was officially opened by His Excellency the Governor, Lord Huntingfield, in a torrential downpour of rain. However, for the remainder of the Show almost ideal weather conditions prevailed, and greatly added to the enjoyment of the Society's patrons.

Your Council keenly appreciated the obvious desire of all interested to ensure the success of the Show, and thereby counteract the Society's unfortunate experience in Centenary year. Standholders improved and extended their displays and, notwithstanding the adverse seasonal conditions, more particularly in dairying districts, exhibitors of stock and produce loyally supported with an entry of outstanding quality in all sections. The following table is published in order that a comparison may readily be made of entries received in the various sections since 1930:—

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It will be noted that, although owing to the adverse seasonal conditions already mentioned, there was a more or less marked decrease in some breeds of cattle, large entries were received in other sections—notably Clydesdale and Light Horses, Sheep, State School Competitions and Dogs—whilst new records were established in the sections for Swine, Fruits and Wines, etc.

Judges, Public and the Press praised the quality of the exhibits generally and remarked on the absence of that "tail" which is usually associated with a particularly large entry in any section.

The appearance of the grounds was greatly improved as a result of the untiring efforts of our Honorary Horticultural Adviser, Mr. C. E. Isaac, who directed the work of the Society's gardeners and supplied, without cost, some 50,000 seedlings and bulbs, and was again responsible for the striking displays presented by the floral clock and floral designs in prominent positions about the grounds.

Another feature of the Show was the arena programme, which was greatly improved as a result of the co-operation of the Mounted Police and Metropolitan Fire Brigade, and the provision of demonstrations of Camp-drafting by experts from Northern New South Wales.

Your Council is pleased that the total attendance was ahead of that of previous years since 1927, and that the revenue exceeded expenditure in connection with the Show by £12,539, the best result since 1929; and, whilst not overlooking the fact that a general feeling of optimism was created by the improved prices for lambs, wheat and butter, regards these results as indicative of improved conditions which augur well for the future. This does not imply any complacent attitude on the part of your Council. Indeed, it is fully convinced of the necessity to strive for further improvement in attendances and revenue and, to that end, has already taken action which will be referred to later on in this report.

The Commonwealth Clydesdale Horse Society.

The Society has made rapid progress during the year. The membership has increased to 1187, and interest in the Society's activities has never been greater.

That Victoria is still the "Clydesdale Stronghold" in Australia is evidenced by the fact that 550 of the members of the Society reside in this State.

The eighth volume of the Commonwealth Clydesdale Stud Book has recently been published, and a gratis copy forwarded to each financial member. The largest volume yet issued by the Society, it contains 1016 pages and includes the pedigrees of 677 stallions, 1374 mares with progeny, together with 708 appendix females and particulars of additional progeny from 1357 numbered mares registered in previous volumes. No greater evidence of the revival of interest in horsebreeding, or of the superiority of the Clydesdale as the ideal draught horse for Australian conditions, could be provided.

In addition, the entries received for Volume 9, the closing date for which has been fixed as the 1st March, 1936, already total 252 stallions, 1072 mares and 475 foals. It will, therefore, be seen that breeders all over the Commonwealth recognise the value of the stud book and approve of the efforts the Society is making to improve the standard of usefulness of the breed.

Endeavours are still being made by the various branches of the Society to impress upon the State Governments the necessity for legislation which would eradicate unsound and undesirable stallions, and it is hoped that success will eventually attend their efforts, thus enabling a more rapid improvement in type and quality to be made. Importations during the year created a record, no fewer than fifty-four animals having been imported from the home of the breed, all of which are of a high standard. They have been distributed over practically the whole of the Commonwealth and are certain to exert a very beneficial influence on the breed.

The display of Clydesdales at the recent Melbourne Royal Show, though not quite as numerous as in Centenary year, was very creditable indeed and has been favourably commented on by many. The standard was exceedingly high throughout, and both judges reported that the animals exhibited were the best it has ever been their privilege to have paraded before them.

The Australian Pony Stud Book Society.

In furtherance of its policy to restrict the exhibition of stock to pure-bred animals, your Council resolved that all Shetland ponies entered for the 1935 Royal Show must be registered in the Pedigree Section of the Australian Pony Stud Book, or in an approved Stud Book for Shetlands published outside the Commonwealth. This new regulation debarred from exhibition in the Shetland Section all ponies whose pedigrees could not be traced to imported Shetland stock on their sire's and dam's side.

The first volume of the Stud Book is now in course of compilation, and Victorian breeders will be well represented therein, particularly in the Shetland Section.

During the year a Victorian member imported from Scotland two Shetland stallions. His example will no doubt be followed by other breeders as the demand for Shetland ponies increases.

Several new Victorian breeders have been enrolled as members and have submitted their ponies for registration in the Stud Book. With the increase in membership, the formation of a Victorian branch of the Society will no doubt have to be given consideration in the near future. Pending such action, the necessary secretarial work in connection with the receipt of entries and the inspection of ponies owned by Victorian breeders is still being carried out in this office.

The Horse Association of Victoria.

The annual "Back to the Horse" Procession and Gymkhana, usually conducted by this Association, was discontinued this year, owing to the difficulty experienced in the past in attracting sufficient patronage to enable the event to be conducted without a considerable loss.

However, the Association concentrated on co-operating in the organisation of the annual procession of saddle and harness horses and ponies held on the last day of the Show, which was well supported, the high quality of the majority of the horses attracting the attention of a large crowd as they moved through the city.

At the annual meeting of members, held during the currency of the Show, it was resolved that the Association should continue to function and to endeavour to attain the objects for which it was established.

The Shorthorn Society of Australia.

Members of this Society have maintained their keen interest in the Shorthorn breed, and it is pleasing to note that several have displayed their confidence in the future by importing high-class animals from Great Britain. They have no doubt been actuated by the anticipated improvement in the demand for Australian beef in Great Britain and the Federal Government's decision to appoint an Australian Meat Board with statutory powers to administer the Meat Export Control Act 1935.

The Victorian Branch of the Society is represented on the Meat Advisory Committee recently established in this State in accordance with the provisions of the abovementioned Act.

Entries for the Eighth Volume of the Shorthorn Herd Book of Australia closed on 31st December, and, as those already checked cover 257 bulls, 723 cows and 823 calves, the publication will compare very favourably with earlier volumes.

The Publicity Committee, whose activities are subsidised by the Federal Council and the New South Wales and Victorian Branches of the Society, completed the first issue of the Australian Beef Shorthorn Breeders' Guide during the year, and copies thereof were widely distributed. In addition, the Committee has made every effort, per medium of broadcasting, the issue of pamphlets and advertising in the various pastoral papers, to further popularise the breed and make better known its undoubted ability to produce beef of the highest quality.

A development during the year was the formation in New South Wales of a separate society by breeders of Polled Shorthorn cattle. Though there is a difference of opinion amongst members of this Society as to the desirability of forming a separate association, that action having been taken, it has been decided that both bodies will work in close co-operation to further the interests of the Shorthorn breed.

The Dairy Shorthorn Association of Australia.

This Association has experienced a successful year, several new breeders having been enrolled as members and submitted their herds for registration.

As a result of a recommendation from the Committee which was approved by your Council, a class for pure-bred Dairy Shorthorn Steer will be included in the Prize Schedule for the 1936 Show and, without doubt, will be keenly contested. This action has been taken in order to publicly demonstrate the dual purpose nature of the breed.

Entries for the recent Show did not quite reach record figures, but the animals shown made an excellent display.

The Publicity Campaign inaugurated last year was continued and is helping to make the breed more widely known throughout Australia.

The Red Poll Cattle Breeders' Association of Australia.

As a result of the alteration of the Constitution of the Association to allow for the formation of branches and the election of a Federal Council, breeders in Victoria. New South Wales, Western Australia and Tasmania have formed branches in their respective States. As yet, breeders in Queensland have not established a branch. Members were called together during the currency of the 1935 Brisbane Show for the purpose of discussing the matter, but no definite action was taken owing to the fact that the meeting was not fully representative of the breeders. Further action is, however, contemplated in the near future.

Entries for Volume 8 of the Association's Herd Book closed on the 30th October last, and the fact that it will contain the pedigrees of approximately two hundred more animals than Volume 7, which was the largest previously published, is a sure indication of the rapid progress made by the Association during the past two years.

Several animals have been imported into Victoria, New South Wales and Western Australia during the year. The introduction of this new blood should help to improve the already high standard of the breed throughout Australia.

The Victorian Branch of this Association is represented on the Meat Advisory Committee recently established in this State in accordance with the provisions of the Meat Export Control Act 1935.

The Ayrshire Cattle Herd Book Society of Australasia.

This Society has again experienced a busy year and its various activities have been continued at their usual high standard.

The membership has remained steady despite the trying time through which the dairying industry has passed.

The Federal Council published Vol. XXVII. during the year and again issued a booklet containing particulars of test records and other information of value to the dairy farmer.

The Federal Council last year gave grants to branches for the encouragement of herd testing, and has again offered similar grants for this year, convinced that in this way it can best ensure public demonstration of the capabilities of the Ayrshire as a dairy breed.

Members of the Victorian Branch have long felt the need of a kiosk at the Royal Show at which breeders could meet to discuss their problems and from which publicity matter could be distributed. At the last Annual General Meeting the Committee was asked by members to go into the matter of the erection of such a kiosk, and it is hoped that ere the 1936 Show an attractive building will be erected.

The Friesian Cattle Club of Australia.

The Federal Council of this Club is naturally pleased that the negotiations referred to in last report have been brought to a satisfactory conclusion, and, as a result, the Queensland Friesian Cattle Club has become the Queensland Branch of the Friesian Cattle Club of Australia.

Your Council has noted this development with satisfaction, as it has always been of opinion that one Society and one Stud Book for any breed of stock in Australia is in the best interests of that breed.

It is not the policy of the Club to publish a copy of its Herd Book. annually, but entries already received from Branch Secretaries for Volume 13, which closed on 31st December, indicate that this publication will be larger than those recently issued, and this shows that the Friesian breed ismaking steady, if not rapid, progress.

The Guernsey Cattle Society of Australasia. (Victorian Branch).

The noteworthy expansion of this Branch during the last few years was repeated in 1935 by the enrolment of a number of new members, the establishment of new herds and the introduction of a number of high-class specimens of the breed from New South Wales, where one of the outstanding studs of the Commonwealth was dispersed.

By advertisement, regular weekly press publicity, a representative entry of Guernseys and the conduct of a milk bar at the Show, much has been done for this breed. A definite line of campaign has been adopted, as in other countries, namely, the continued stressing of the value of Guernsey milk to the retail trade, through its quality and its particularly rich colour. Much success has followed this line of action. The greater demand created for the product has been reflected in an extraordinary shortage of Guernsey cattle, creating a ready market for not only females but males of the breed. The campaign has been ably assisted by a striking display in a city milk bar, which is handling Guernsey milk exclusively.

The Australian Illawarra Shorthorn Society (Victorian Branch).

During the year the progress of this Branch has been maintained, which indicates a bright future for this Australian breed in Victoria.

In an endeavour to make the merits of the breed more widely known, an Essay Writing Competition was conducted amongst members of Young Farmers' Clubs during the year. Considerable interest was taken in the competition, which should result in increased knowledge of the breed throughout Victoria.

The breed was well represented at the Show. Although the number of entries was not up to the previous two years, mainly due to the decision. of one of the largest breeders not to exhibit, owing to ill-health, the quality was of a uniformly high standard.

The Australasian Jersey Herd Society (Victorian Branch).

Each year since its inception this Branch has made a new membership record, and once again has exceeded all previous totals.

The Branch continued its valuable publicity work by the publication of booklets, pamphlets, calendars, etc., and applications for copies of the various publications were received from all quarters of the Commonwealth.

The Branch Field Officer, in addition to carrying out inspections and advising members regarding the correct method of keeping their records, etc., delivered many addresses and assisted at various field days and shows.

The Federal Council published Volume XXI. of the Herd Book early in the year, and entries for Volume XXII., which closed on 30th June, showed that this volume would be the largest ever issued by the Society.

The Victorian United Cow Test Association.

During the year under review, 86 District Associations, with 112 units, testing 79,000 cows, continued affiliation with the Association, which is still one hundred per cent. representative of all Herd Testing Associations in Victoria, and is thus enabled to make strong appeals, when necessary, to the Government and other authorities for support of this truly co-operative movement for greater efficiency in dairying.

It is to be regretted that herd testing in this State has not been more widely developed, but, with the better prices for butter-fat now obtaining, and by means of the educational literature, etc., distributed by the V.U.C.T.A. at considerable expense, anticipations are high regarding the formation of new units during the coming year.

Mention should be made of the earnest body of men constituting the Council of the V.U.C.T.A. and also of the enthusiastic and able support accorded them by officers of the Department of Agriculture, who contribute considerably towards the success of the Field Days and Dairy Farm Competition, which do much to foster interest in herd testing.

As has been previously reported, this Association has received financial support from business firms, in recognition of the value of its work, and during the year under review its Council was greatly encouraged by donations from Stud Stock Breeders' Societies, and also by the donation, made by Captain A. E. T. Payne, of Twenty Guineas for best Nett Return per ± 100 Capital Value in connection with the 1935 Dairy Farm Competition, and whose generous support added a new prize to this very educational competition. The attractively-designed R.A.S. of V. certificates for best and second best farms in each of the ten zones are much sought after by competitors.

The continual demand for books of certificates in respect of the Calf Marking Scheme inaugurated some years ago by this Association attests its usefulness, whilst the fact that R.A.S. of V. Production Certificates are going out in hundreds annually demonstrates the value of the V.U.C.T.A. work in raising production.

Annual Field Days have always been successful, but the outing this year to the Kiewa Valley was, if anything, too well attended, and the local Herd Testing Association is to be congratulated upon the manner in which its members coped with the unprecedentedly large crowd.

In an effort to further the campaign against tuberculosis in dairy herds, the Council of the V.U.C.T.A has urged affiliated Associations to convene district meetings, and will shortly distribute a pamphlet, written, at its request, by Dr. H. E. Albiston and Mr. R. J. deC. Talbot, setting out the ultimate benefits of such a scheme and the lines on which it may be economically and properly conducted in any particular district.

The Australian Dairy Cattle Research Association (Victorian Branch).

Your Council was particularly pleased to learn that success had attended the efforts of this Association to bring about an investigation into Contagious Mastitis in Victoria, and all matters in connection with financial assistance from the Commonwealth and State Governments having been satisfactorily adjusted, and the Commonwealth Council for Scientific and Industrial Research having agreed to carry out the investigation on behalf of the Association, it was possible to commence operations in July last, when a suitable property about thirty miles from Melbourne was taken over and preparations made to establish a milking herd of at least forty animals as soon as possible.

The Committee of Control, which consists of Dr. L. B. Bull (Commonwealth Council of Scientific and Industrial Research), Dr. H. E. Albiston (Director, Veterinary Research, Melbourne University), and Mr. R. J. deC. Talbot (Chief Veterinary Inspector, Department of Agriculture), hopes to obtain donations of unserved heifers from interested persons in the industry so as to reduce expense, but at the same time has announced that, as it is imperative for them to take all precautions against the introduction of disease, all heifers before being introduced into the herd will first have to pass both the Tuberculin and the Abortion Agglutination Tests.

So as to keep those interested in touch with developments in connection with this investigation, arrangements have been made whereby a report will be submitted by the Investigation Committee to the Committee of the Victorian Branch of the Association each quarter.

The Australian Society of Breeders of British Sheep.

The satisfactory progress being made by this Society is indeed very gratifying.

In April last, negotiations for the amalgamation of the Australian Longwool Sheep Breeders' Association and this Society were completed. This amalgamation is, without doubt, one of the most important events in the history of the Society, which is now the sole controlling body and publishes the only Flock Book for British Breeds of Sheep in Australia.

At the end of its last financial year the number of members enrolled was 1132, being an increase of 147 on the total at the corresponding period last year. Just over 500 of these members reside in Victoria.

Volume 27 of the Flock Book, published in May last, included the record number of 1255 registered flocks throughout Australia. This volume, of course, contained the flocks which previously appeared in the Australian Longwool Sheep Breeders' Association's Flock Book. Branches of this Society are situated in all States, except Queensland, and the Committees are doing excellent work in the interests of Breeders of British Sheep.

This Society did much to stress the need for a Board to control the export of lamb and mutton from Australia, and was naturally very pleased when the Federal Government decided to establish an Australian Meat Board with statutory powers.

The Victorian Branch of the Society is represented on the Meat Advisory Committee recently established in this State in accordance with the provisions of the Meat Export Control Act 1935, and its representative has been elected Vice-Chairman of that Committee.

Three Registered Flock Sales, conducted under the auspices of this Branch, were held during the year, and the prices realised for the sheep offered were very satisfactory. These sales are of great advantage to members, as they allow them to dispose of their rams at reasonable prices. All sheep entered are officially inspected and breeders of export lambs are given the opportunity of obtaining rams which are true to type.

Your Council has expressed its appreciation of the action of the Victorian Branch of this Society in again donating £69 towards the prize fund. The display of sheep staged at the Melbourne "Royal" is, without doubt, the premier British Breeds Show in Australia, and breeders are to be highly commended on placing such fine exhibits before the public.

The Australian Corriedale Sheepbreeders' Association.

The growing popularity of the Corriedale is reflected in the increasing membership of this Association, which now stands at 293, compared with 257 at 31st December, 1934.

This Association has active branches in New South Wales, South Australia, Western Australia, Tasmania and Victoria. The secretarial work of the Victorian Branch and the Federal Council is conducted in this office.

Members report that during the year the demand for Corriedale ewes exceeded the supply, and that rams were cleared at satisfactory. prices.

The Victorian Branch again contributed to the prize fund of your Society and members entered a wonderful display of Corriedales at the last Royal Show. The exhibits are always well over 100 and are only beaten numerically by one or two of the British Breeds.

It is the intention of the Federal Council to publish during the coming year an illustrated booklet on the Corriedale, and also the Eleventh Volume of its Flock Book, in which it is estimated that the histories of approximately 320 flocks will appear. Volume 10, published in 1933, contained the histories of 237 flocks.

Victorian Society of Export Lamb and Mutton Producers.

One of the main reasons for the establishment of this Society was the recognition of the necessity for some control of exports from Australia, and, therefore, its members were gratified when the Federal Government decided to establish an Australian Meat Board with statutory powers.

The Society, which was originally known as the Victorian and Southern Riverina Society of Export Lamb and Mutton Producers, changed its name and restricted its territory to Victoria when it was learned that the Meat Export Control Act 1935 made provision for separate representation on the Meat Board for producers in the Riverina. It also reduced the amount of its annual subscription to 5/-, believing it to be in the best interests of the industry that all associated with lamb production should be enabled to join the organisation and discuss matters to their mutual advantage.

The Society is represented on the Meat Advisory Committee recently established in this State in accordance with the provisions of the Meat Export Control Act, and is confident that the Meat Board, as constituted under that Act, will be able to render invaluable service to the industry.

The Australian Stud Pig Breeders' Society.

It is pleasing to report that this Society has had a very successful year. The improved prices for stud pigs indicated in last year's report was maintained, and breeders found no difficulty in effecting sales. This improvement was reflected in increased membership during the year.

Volume 25 of the Sociey's Herd Book, published in March last, is evidence of the progress that is being made. It was the largest volume yet issued by the Society and contained the pedigrees of 1950 pigs.

A further indication was the record number of entries in the Swine Section at our last Show, and the uniformly high quality of the pigs of the various breeds. The several classes for bacon and pork pigs were again well patronised and proved to be of great educational value to young breeders. The usual donations towards the prize money in these classes were made by the Victorian Branch of the Society, and your Council has expressed its appreciation of this support.

Having made representations that by virtue of its Commonwealthwide organisation this Society should be permitted to nominate the representative of pig producers on the Australian Meat Board, general satisfaction was expressed when a member of the Federal Council of the Society was elected as Chairman of the Pig Industry Council and was nominated by that body and subsequently appointed by the Minister in accordance with the provisions of the Meat Export Control Act 1935.

The Kennel Control Council.

This Council is the successor to the Kennel Control Council of Victoria. The affairs of that body were finalised during the year and the new Kennel Control Council formed to take its place. The Constitution and Rules of this new body are very similar to those of its predecessor, save that instead of representation on the Committee of Control being decided by members paying a nominal subscription, the Committee is composed of gentlemen nominated by your Council and chosen for their general suitability to occupy such a position. This Committee has as Chairman a member of your Council.

The change referred to imposed no inconvenience on fanciers, and the Kennel Control Council carried on without upset from where the original body left off. The response to this move has been such that it conveys the certitude of a new era in canine affairs.

The Dog Section of five Melbourne Royal Shows has been held under the Rules of the Kennel Control Council of Victoria, and five record entries have been received, with the natural exception that Centenary year exceeded all expectations and made a figure impossible to attain in 1935. The appointment of a member of your Council as Steward-in-Chief in this section at the last Show was an innovation greatly appreciated by exhibitors and other canine enthusiasts. There can be no question but that this Society's interest in canine matters has redounded to its benefit in many ways.

The Victorian Working Sheep Dog Association.

Interest in the Association has been maintained during the year, several new members having been enrolled and many excellent trials having been conducted by affiliated bodies throughout Victoria.

The preliminary trials for dogs entered in the Open and Juvenile Trials for the last Show were again conducted on the Ascot Racecourse, and the Association has suggested that if similar arrangements are to be made for the 1936 Show, details be finalised in time to allow for the information to be published in the Prize Schedule. This suggestion will be considered by the Committee in January, when the 1936 Prize Schedule is under discussion.

This year's competition for the "Captain Payne" 50-Guinea Trophy was conducted in November at Shepparton by the local Agricultural Society in conjunction with this Association, and with a record entry some excellent trials resulted.

The Victorian Young Farmers' Clubs' Association.

Throughout the year everything possible has been done to ensure that the work of the Association will be generally known, and reports of meetings, competitions, etc., have been forwarded direct to each known Club in Victoria, as well as to city and country newspapers.

The Provisional Committee elected at the inaugural conference is still carrying on the work of the Association, and is prepared to continue to do so until the election of a Council in accordance with the Constitution.

At a conference held during the recent Show, the opinion was expressed that certain changes might with advantage be made to the Constitution of the Association, and it was also claimed that holding the annual conference at Show time was not in the best interests of affiliated Associations. It was, therefore, decided that a further conference should be held on a date to be selected during the May school holidays. The Committee hopes that this conference will be well attended and plans laid for such an increase in the activities of the Association as the importance of the movement demands.

The Committee has expressed its appreciation of assistance given in various ways to the Association by Messrs. H. V. McKay-Massey Harris Pty. Ltd.; the Gerrard Wire Tying Machines Co. Pty. Ltd.; and "The Sun News Pictorial."

Your Council again arranged for the Young Farmers' Camp at the Show, and twenty members of affiliated Clubs in Victoria, five from New South Wales, and five from Queensland were its guests in the comfortable quarters provided. The Camp was supervised by two teachers, whose services were kindly made available by the Department of Education. The Railways Department also helped considerably in that Victorian boys were transported to the Camp free of charge and reduced rates were granted to those from other States. Ten boys chosen from the Clubs affiliated with this Association enjoyed the hospitality of the Royal Agricultural Society of New South Wales at its Easter Show, and five lads participated in the Camp at the Brisbane Diamond Jubilee Show in August last.

As has been the case since the establishment of this Association, the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria has borne the expense of the secretarial work, postages, etc., which generous support is keenly appreciated by the Provisional Committee. The competition for "The Argus" and "The Australasian" Shield, which is restricted to affiliated Clubs, was again conducted, resulting in a win for Scotsburn.

There are at present 133 Clubs affiliated, with new ones constantly joining up. It would appear that the Association and its work is now becoming better known and is to receive the wholehearted support of the Clubs in the interests of which the Association was established.

The Chamber of Agriculture of Victoria.

The Thirty-sixth Annual Meeting and the Thirty-third Annual Convention of this Chamber, held at Port Fairy on 12th, 13th and 14th March, 1935, was officially opened by the Hon. John Allan, Minister for Agriculture, in the unavoidable absence, through ill-health, of His Excellency the Governor, Lord Huntingfield.

The Convention was attended by a large and representative gathering of delegates and invited guests from all parts of the State. Many interesting and educational addresses on various subjects were delivered and were greatly appreciated by the delegates. Items on a lengthy business sheet were keenly discussed and the resolutions adopted were subsequently brought prominently under notice of Governments and other authorities concerned.

One of the most important resolutions adopted at the Convention crystallised the opinion that to cope with the altered conditions in England regarding the meat trade, a statutory meat board was necessary to regulate supplies. A sub-committee was appointed to confer with the Executive on this matter and a scheme brought before the Council at a subsequent meeting was approved and forwarded to the Prime Minister with a strong recommendation for its adoption. The Chamber has noted with appreciation the enactment of the Mc Export Control Act 1935, under which the Australian Meat Board is appointed with statutory powers, and it is represented on the Meat Advisory Committee established in this State in accordance with the provisions of the Act above referred to.

The Journal.

The proceedings at the meetings of your Council have been reported each month in the "Australian Farm and Home," in which this Society's official journal is incorporated, and considerable space has also been given therein to all matters in which the Society is interested. As a result of the constantly increasing circulation of the Journal, wide publicity has been regularly given to the activities of the Society.

Membership.

It is a matter for regret that the Society's membership could not be maintained at or above the figure reached in Centenary year. There are at present 3,975 active members on the roll, and a determined effort is to be made to materially increase this number during the coming year.

Night Shows.

During the year your Council gave serious thought to ways and means whereby the Society's revenue could be so increased as to ensure a material improvement in its financial position and thus facilitate increased activity in the future. After mature consideration, it was decided that, if the grounds were properly lighted, as are those in Sydney, Adelaide and Brisbane, considerably increased receipts could be confidently anticipated from night sessions during the Show, it being fully realised that many would-be patrons in city and suburbs are prevented from attending during the day. It was also felt that it could reasonably be assumed that such a well-lighted arena, so well served by both rail and tram, would be readily let for other purposes between Shows.

On the other hand, your Council was convinced that it would not be advisable to incur the expense without power to include extra trotting events in its night show programmes. Strong representations were, therefore, made by deputation to the Hon. the Chief Secretary for such amendment of existing legislation as would enable the Society to run trotting events at night, without detriment to those now authorised during the day. Your Council purposes persevering in this matter, in the hope that the Government will, in recognition of the Society's national work and the necessity for its continuance and extension, introduce an amending Bill early in the coming session.

Fodder Conservation.

For years your Council, recognising the importance of fodder conservation, has been desirous of promoting competitions throughout the State, but has been hampered through lack of funds and the inability of the Department of Agriculture to co-operate by providing the necessary judges. However, as a result of promised financial support from the Society's bankers—the Commercial Banking Company of Sydney—and subsequent donations from Captain A. E. T. Payne and the Commonwealth Bank Board, your Council was recently able to offer subsidies to local Agricultural Societies willing to conduct fodder conservation competitions in their respective districts under conditions closely resembling those governing the competitions so successfully conducted in past years by the Royal Agricultural Society of New South Wales.

Applications for these subsidies, which are of ± 15 each, are to close early in February next, and the competitions conducted by the successful applicants will be judged, according to districts, late in 1936 and early in 1937, your Council having resolved, in the event of the services of Departmental Officers not being available, to appoint other competent men as judges.

Campaign Against Tuberculosis.

Another matter of vital importance in which your Council has promised the full support of the Society is the campaign recently commenced with the object of eradicating tuberculosis from Victorian herds. Fully recognising the benefits to be derived, not only from the point of view of the health of the community, but also that of the standard of our dairy products, your Council, at its last meeting for the year, unanimously resolved to encourage the gradual elimination of tuberculosis by voluntary schemes introduced in various parts of the State and to bring the matter before the Annual Convention of the Chamber of Agriculture, with a view to furthering the campaign throughout Victoria.

Council.

Not for many years have so many changes occurred in the personnel of your Council.

As the nominations for election at the annual meeting in February last were not in excess of the vacancies, all of the retiring members of Council were returned unopposed for a further period of three years.

At its meeting in May, your Council received the resignation of Mr. T. V. Cowan, of "Marangan," Benalla. This resignation was accepted with regret, made greater because of the recognition of the fact that illhealth was the reason for Mr. Cowan's severing his connection with the Council, of which he had been a keen and active member since he was first elected in July, 1916. Your Council unanimously resolved to record in the minutes its deep appreciation of the services Mr. Cowan had rendered to the Society, and expressed the hope that he would long continue to be a member, to visit our Shows and to take an interest in the Society's activities. When filling the vacancy thus caused, your Council took the opportunity to elect Mr. A. M. Nicholas, as a further expression of its appreciation of the very generous assistance that gentleman had accorded the Society. At the time of his election Mr. Nicholas was in England, so he was granted leave of absence until his return early in December, when he was cordially welcomed by your Council at its last meeting for the year.

In August, a further vacancy occurred as a result of the lamentable death of Mr. A. V. Hiskens, who, since his electon to the Council in 1929, had been recognised by his colleagues as one who had done yeoman service in furthering the interests of the Society. Your Council has placed on record its appreciation of the services rendered by the deceased gentleman and has expressed its sincere sympathy with his widow and family. To fill the vacancy, a ballot was conducted at the October meeting of your Council, and resulted in the election of Mr. Harry L. Lyall, who was accorded a hearty welcome to the Council table at the succeeding meeting.

In November, your Council received a letter from Mr. William McNab, of "Oakbank," Tullamarine, stating that, acting on medical advice, he had very reluctantly decided to tender his resignation. 'Whilst having no option but to accept the resignation, your Council did so with keen regret, as Mr.-McNab, having been first elected in 1889, had been longer in office than any of his colleagues, and during this long period had rendered very valuable service. Your Council felt that some way must be found in which the benefit of Mr. McNab's advice and long experience could be retained, and it was therefore unanimously resolved to take the necessary steps to appoint him as a Life Governor of the Society.

As a result of a ballot conducted at its December meeting, Mr. Robert G. Ritchie, of "Delatite," Mansfield, was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. McNab.

Extensive leave of absence was granted to Mr. R. O. Blackwood during his tour abroad, and also to Mr. Phil. Tuckett, who, unfortunately, has been seriously ill since May last.

Death of Assistant Secretary.

The Society sustained a heavy loss through the untimely death, in May last, of Mr. T. J. Glynn, who had been on the staff since 1912, and who, during that time, had risen to occupy the position of Assistant Secretary. Mr. Glynn, who was only thirty-eight years of age at the time of his death, was a most capable officer of the Society, and, in addition to his duties as its Assistant Secretary, he held the position of Secretary to the Federal Council and Victorian Branch of both the Australian Society of Breeders of British Sheep and the Australian Corriedale Sheepbreeders' Association, as well as the Victorian Society of Export Lamb and Mutton Producers. Whilst carrying out the duties associated with these various positions, he made a great number of friends, who held him in very high esteem.

Your Council placed on record its appreciation of the long and valuable services rendered by the late Mr. Glynn, and expressed its sincere sympathy with his widow and family. His funeral was attended by the President and members of the Council of this Society.

Pending a definite appointment being made, the duties of Assistant Secretary have been carried out by Mr. W. F Craig, who has had many years of experience as an officer of this Society.

Acknowledgments.

To His Excellency the Governor, Lord Huntingfield, your Council tenders its warmest thanks, not only for officially opening the Show and presenting trophies to successful exhibitors, but for the keen interest he has displayed in the work of the Society. Both Lord and Lady Huntingfield inspected the exhibits at the Show, and their appreciative comments were an encouragement to exhibitors and to your Council.

To the Melbourne City Council for its assistance in connection with the procession of saddle and harness horses and ponies through the city on the last Saturday of the Show; to the Railways Department and the Metropolitan Tramways Board for the splendid transportation arrangements so efficiently carried out; to the Defence Department and to the various Stud Stock Breeders' Societies, which co-operated in every way possible to ensure the success of the Show.

Keen appreciation is also expressed of the support again accorded by the State Government, more particularly in connection with the magnificent display staged in the Government Pavilion during the Show.

Your Council also gratefully acknowledges the co-operation of the Police Department and the Metropolitan Fire Brigade, whereby the standard of entertainment in the arena was materially improved by spectacular displays of horsemanship and physical prowess, and reports having accorded Life Membership of the Society to Major-General Sir Thomas Blamey (Chief Commissioner of Police) and Mr. J. T. Wilkins (Chief Officer of the Metropolitan Fire Brigade) to mark its appreciation.

Your Council especially desires to record its indebtedness to the press for the publicity given to the activities of the Society, more particularly at Show time; to Judges and Stewards; to standholders and exhibitors; and to all others who in any way assisted in furthering the interests of the Society throughout the year.

Finance.

On reference to the financial statement, it will be seen that the revenue for the year was $\pounds 43,377/5/7$, which shows an increase of $\pounds 2,951/7/11$ on that of last year. The expenditure (including $\pounds 8,401/16/4$ in prizes and $\pounds 2,132/4/-$ for buildings and improvements) amounted to $\pounds 42,975/9/5$, the Bank Overdraft being decreased from $\pounds 61,777/18/6$ to $\pounds 61,376/2/4$, and the Society's indebtedness to the Government, inclusive of interest, decreased during the year from $\pounds 37,106/15/-$ to $\pounds 35,461/11/6$.

Taking the expenditure in permanent improvements as assets, the working expenses for the year show a profit of $\pounds 2,534/0/2$, as against last year's loss of $\pounds 639/7/10$, a position which appears the more satisfactory when it is remembered that the Society's overdraft was so greatly increased as a result of expenditure during Centenary year.

Bearing in mind the general improvement in conditions which has been apparent since just prior to the Show, and the brighter prospect presented by the seasonal conditions to date, your Council feels justified in adopting an optimistic attitude towards the future, and, with a continuation of the loyal support of members, is confident that it will be possible to extend the Society's national work during the coming year.
