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

## The Royal Agricultural Society OF VICTORIA.

To the Members,

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Your Council has much pleasure in presenting the following report of proceedings of the Society for the year 1936.

#### Permanent Buildings and Works.

The works carried out during the year were mainly to ensure greater comfort and convenience for exhibitors and the general public. The new turnstile entrance, erected on the Langs Road frontage between the Horse and Cattle Pavilions, was greatly appreciated by the ever-increasing number of Show patrons who travel by car and use the extensive motor parks in that neighbourhood, whilst other improvements effected in conjunction with this new entrance greatly reduced vehicular traffic within the grounds and provided the necessary increased wash accommodation for beef cattle.

Alterations within the Industrial Hall (re-named Horticultural Hall) proved this building to be eminently suited for a display of horticulture, an innovation which became immediately popular and which will require additional space at our next Show.

Duplication of the space within and improvements of the entrances to the All-weather Rest Area in the centre of the Grounds, the provision of comfortable seats, and facilities for supplying boiling water free of charge, but emphasised the necessity for and the public appreciation of such accommodation.

In addition to the foregoing, considerable expense was incurred in connection with the maintenance of the Society's property and the recon-

ditioning of roads and footpaths throughout the Grounds.

Since the Show a great improvement has been effected by the joint action of the Melbourne City Council and the Essendon City Council in taking advantage of the ground made available by the Society some years ago and widening Epsom Road along the whole frontage of the Show Grounds, from the railway line to Langs Road. This wide thoroughfare will greatly facilitate traffic to and from future Shows.

#### The Exhibition.

The Society's Annual Exhibition, which was held from the 17th to 26th September, 1936, was officially opened by His Excellency the Governor-General, Lord Gowrie, who graciously acknowledged an illuminated address of welcome presented by the President on behalf of the Council. At this ceremony Lord Gowrie was accompanied by His Excellency the Governor and Lady Huntingfield, who had earlier attended the State Official Luncheon in the Council Luncheon Hall, and on the following day, accompanied by Her Excellency Lady Gowrie, he attended the Commonwealth Official Luncheon and subsequently inspected several sections of the Show.

Your Council was particularly pleased with the number of entries received for the Show, and with the quality of the exhibits, not only of stock and produce, but of agricultural and dairy machinery and all classes of manufactured goods, to display which every available stand in the Society's buildings and in the various outside courts was leased by standholders, who spared no expense to maintain the high standard set in previous years. This whole-hearted co-operation with the Society has

been gratefully acknowledged by your Council.

It will be noted that, with the sole exception of Centenary Year, the entry constitutes a record in the history of the Society, and that in some sections, such as Clydesdales, Saddle Horses and Ponies, the entries were even more numerous than in 1934.

In keeping with progressive improvement in recent years, the Grounds presented a very pleasing appearance throughout the Show. This was largely attributable to the co-operation of standholders already referred to, and also to the Society's Honorary Horticultural Adviser (Mr. C. E. Isaac), who, though seriously handicapped by the season, actually increased the number of garden plots throughout the Grounds, in which, under his supervision, the Society's gardeners planted the 100,000 seedlings he supplied without cost and which resulted in a striking display of blooms which improved from day to day.

Undoubtedly the outstanding feature of the Show was the Arena programme, and patrons freely expressed their appreciation of the many and varied items, from the magnificent grand parades to the spectacular displays of horsemanship presented by the troupe of Russian Cossacks and the Victorian Mounted Police. This programme was made the more enjoyable by reason of the decision of the Council to keep the arena clear of all but the plant necessary for the particular event in progress—hence the erection of the accommodation for officials, etc., on the outside edge of the

trotting track previously mentioned.

Your Council has already expressed its keen appreciation of the more than generous publicity given by the Press and the various Broadcasting Stations. This publicity undoubtedly influenced the increased attendances, which in the aggregate were within 7,000 of the record established in 1925, and resulted in revenue exceeding expenditure by £13,564, despite the unfavorable weather conditions which obtained practically throughout the Show. This result does not compare with that of the 1925 Show until the improved facilities now provided, the £1,100 increase in prize money paid out, and other expenses, are taken into account.

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However, your Council is confident that it is your desire that the Society should continue to extend its activities, and as a means to that end, a development of its policy, mentioned in earlier years, designed to increase revenue, is referred to later in this report.

#### The Commonwealth Clydesdale Horse Society.

The progress made by this Society during the year has been remarkable, no fewer than 562 new members having been enrolled, bringing the total membership for the Commonwealth to 1759, and that of the Victorian Branch to 823.

In an endeavour to raise the standard and improve the quality of stud Clydesdales generally, the Federal Council decided to close the Stud Book to all but the progeny of registered parents at 31st December, and consequently the staff has had an exceptionally busy year. Pressure of work has been such that it has not been possible to publish the ninth volume of the Commonwealth Clydesdale Stud Book, though it is hoped that the work will be undertaken at an early date. It is of interest to note that the number of entries for Volume 9 is in excess of the record established in Volume 8, whilst an even greater number has already been received for inclusion in Volume 10.

Among the many importations during the year are a number of animals of outstanding merit which have won honours at the leading shows in Scotland, and these will without doubt have a very beneficial influence on the breed throughout the Commonwealth.

It is safe to say that interest in the breeding of Clydesdales was never keener, and the Society recognises that the pressing need of the moment is uniform legislation throughout the Commonwealth to eradicate all unsound and undesirable stallions, thus permitting rapid improvement to be made in the type and quality of horses generally. When making representations to the Hon. the Minister of Agriculture recently, representatives of the Victorian Branch claimed that the necessity for such action is proved by the fact that in Victoria alone the number of uncertificated stallions used has risen from three in 1926-27 (which was the first season in which it was possible to retain a rejected stallion for use on an owner's own mares) to 342 in 1935-36, thus constituting a serious menace to the horse breeding industry which all true enthusiasts abhor.

The Committee hopes that as a result of its efforts the Society will be successful in having the clause which permits the use of such stallions deleted from the Victorian Horse Breeding Act.

The display of Clydesdales at the recent Melbourne Royal Show was the finest in the history of the Society, and the number of enthusiasts around the judging rings was eloquent evidence of the keen interest being taken in Australia's favourite breed of draught horses.

## The Australian Pony Stud Book Society. (Victorian Branch).

The strength of this Society and the importance of its Stud Book has been increased by neighbouring Royal Agricultural Societies, following the precedent set by your Council and restricting entries in classes for Stud Ponies to animals registered in the Australian Pony Stud Book.

Following representations made by breeders of Shetland Ponies in Victoria, who are responsible for the big bulk of the entries of that breed, the regulations governing registration have been altered to accord with their wishes, and as a result the publication of the first volume of the Society's Stud Book is expected at an early date.

#### The Horse Association of Victoria.

As in former years this Association co-operated in the organisation of the annual procession of saddle and harness horses held on the last day of the Show. The Right Honorable the Lord Mayor took the salute from the portico of the Town Hall, and, with the assistance of the Police and the Tramway authorities, the procession was conducted through the city without having caused any undue interference with ordinary traffic.

#### The Shorthorn Society of Australia.

The Society has experienced a very satisfactory year, and not only have breeders maintained their interest in the breed, but several animals of outstanding merit have been imported.

The eighth volume of the Herd Book (which contains the pedigrees of 277 bulls, 839 cows with produce, and particulars of additional progeny from 1361 cows registered in previous volumes) has been published and circulated throughout the Commonwealth and kindred bodies overseas.

The Publicity Committee, subsidised by the Federal Council and the Branches in both New South Wales and Victoria, has continued to make widely known the natural ability of the Shorthorn breed to produce high-quality beef, and its efforts have met with a considerable measure of success. The second volume of the Australian Shorthorn Breeders' Guide has been issued by this Committee and widely distributed. This interesting publication contains instructive articles concerning the breed, in addition to much valuable information regarding the blood lines and location of the various studs, which will prove of great assistance to prospective purchasers.

Through its representatives the Victorian Branch of the Society has kept in close touch with the activities of the Meat Advisory Committee, which was formed in Victoria to assist the Australian Meat Board in its efforts to effectively control export and to promote the sale overseas of Australian meat.

#### The Dairy Shorthorn Association of Australia.

The membership of this Association is steadily increasing, due no doubt to the fact that the dual-purpose qualities of the breed are becoming more widely known, as a result of the publicity campaign inaugurated a few years ago and continued during the year.

In accordance with a recommendation from the Committee which was approved of by your Council, a class for pure-bred Dairy Shorthorn steers was included in the Prize Schedule for the recent Royal Show, and although only two entries were received it is anticipated that it will in future prove very popular amongst breeders as a means of demonstrating the beef qualities of the breed, as the Champion Butterfat and Milk Test Competition has demonstrated its milking capacity.

During the year Mr. A. C. Fisken, a member of the Committee of this Association, was heartily congratulated on his appointment as Chairman of the Australian Meat Board.

#### The Red Poll Cattle Breeders' Association of Australia.

This Association has experienced another successful year, and several new breeders have been enrolled as members.

The Federal Council published Volume 8 of the Herd Book early in the year, and an indication of the progress made by the Association is the fact that it contained the pedigrees of 1507 animals, an increase of 281 when compared with Volume 7, which was the largest volume previously issued.

In December the first sale to be conducted under the auspices of this-Association was held at Kilmore. Entries were restricted to registered stock, which were inspected to ensure that the animals offered were of reasonable type and properly marked for identification in accordance with the rules governing registration in the Herd Book. It is anticipated that this sale will be the forerunner of many more to be held throughout Victoria.

The number of entries received for the recent Royal Show totalled 146 as compared with 77 in 1935. This excellent entry has only been surpassed by that received for the Centenary Show, and is a true indication of the popularity of the Red Poll breed in this State.

#### The Ayrshire Cattle Herd Book Society of Australasia.

The Federal Council of this Society published the twenty-eighth volume of the Herd Book during the year, and also distributed the fifth regularissue of the Test Record Booklet.

At the Annual Meeting the Federal Council decided to promote an Australia-wide Herd Test Competition to encourage the testing of registered Ayrshires, and it is hoped that this scheme will be in operation very shortly.

To meet the wishes of members who desired to have a place to meet, and from which breed propaganda could be distributed, the Victorian Branch erected a very fine kiosk on the Showgrounds prior to the 1936 Royal Show. This kiosk meets a long-felt want, and many appreciative references were made by members at the Annual General Meeting.

The Branch this year issued a quantity of publicity matter in pamphlet form, and also published an excellent calendar which was widely dis-

tributed.

That this publicity matter is appreciated is evidenced by the fact that applications for the various publications were received from every State in the Commonwealth.

#### The Friesian Cattle Club of Australia.

The year was marked for Friesian breeders by the harmonious re-entry of the Queensland Branch of the Club being put into actual effect with the inclusion of the Branch's entries in Volume 13 of the Herd Book. The volume, which had been delayed for this purpose, has now been compiled and will be ready for distribution early in the new year. As in the past the entries of Victorian breeders predominate. Although the breed generally sustained a slowing-up in its progress, this would now appear to be ended, and the issue will be of increased size. In Victoria particularly this change for the better is noticeable and has been considerably assisted by the excellent records made under official and semi-official test.

## The Guernsey Cattle Society of Australasia (Victorian Branch).

By its continued conduct of a Milk Bar at the Showgrounds, and in other ways, this Society has been able to keep before the public the valuably rich colour and content of Guernsey milk—a double feature to which the breed owes its world-wide popularity and rapid expansion throughout the State.

That the year has been a reflex of others equally important to the breed is evidenced by increased membership and well-sustained demand for

stock.

Victorian breeders were more than ever well represented in Volume 11 of the Herd Book, which was closed by the Federal Council during the year.

### The Australian Illawarra Shorthorn Society (Victorian Branch).

Interest in this Branch has been maintained during the year. The enrolment as members of several new breeders indicated a bright future in Victoria for this purely Australian breed.

As a result of a recommendation from the Committee, which was approved of by your Council, Type and Utility Classes were included for the first time in the A.I.S. Section of the Prize Schedule for the recent Royal Show, and although the entries received did not come up to expectations, it is anticipated that breeders will see to it that better support is forthcoming in the future so that there will be no question of their retention.

The Federal Council published the fourth volume of the Herd Book early in the year, and it is pleasing to note that the Victorian herds were again well represented therein.

### The Australian Jersey Herd Society (Victorian Branch).

This Branch has experienced another fruitful year and maintained its proud position as the largest and most progressive Branch of the Society.

This year the Committee decided to extend its activities by initiating a Classification Scheme to which members were invited to submit their cows. The aims of the scheme are to indicate to members, and to prospective purchasers, those cows from which the best dairy stock can be bred.

The Board of Examiners consists of gentlemen whose judgment will be respected by all, and has already done good work.

Only 18 herds were submitted this year, but it is hoped that in the near future all of the members of the Branch will take advantage of the benefits to be derived.

The Federal Council published Volume XXII. of the Herd Book early in the year, and entries received for Volume XXIII., which closed on 30th June, indicated that this will be one of the largest issued by the Society.

The Branch, through its Field Officer, further continued its extension work by holding Field Days in various parts of the State. Four of these functions have now been held and have proved most successful.

#### The Victorian United Cow Test Association.

The Council of this Association has been very active throughout the year in its endeavours not only to maintain, but to increase, the number of Herd Testing Units throughout the State. For various reasons, both seasonal and otherwise, their task has been a difficult one, but their efforts have been rewarded in that, although the number of Herd Testing Units has not been increased, the number of cows submitted to test increased to over 81,000. Probably the outstanding attainment of this Association during the past year was in inducing the Government to retain to the State the services of Mr. W. J. Yuill, who had been offered a lucrative appointment with a business concern operating throughout Australia.

Mr. Yuill is recognised as the founder of Grade Herd Testing in Victoria, and that his untiring services since 1920 in connection with the expansion of this movement to every part of the State are highly appreciated by progressive dairy farmers throughout Vic-

toria, which is proved by the generous response to a Testimonial Fund, as a result of which, at the Annual Conference of delegates from Herd Testing Associations held in Melbourne during the Royal Show, he not only received a very tangible testimonial, but following speeches most eulogistic regarding his work, he was accorded the best thanks of the delegates and their best wishes for the future.

The Annual Field Day was this year held at Rochester and proved to be one of the most successful yet conducted by this Association. The Dairy Farm Competition was again supported by various firms interested in the industry, and, as a result, the prizes offered were keenly competed for in each of the ten zones into which the State is divided for the purpose of this competition.

The first and second prize certificates issued by the Royal Agricultural Society in connection with this competition are keenly appreciated, as are also the R.A.S. of V. Production Certificates, which are issued to owners of herds the average production of which reaches certain specified standards under Association test.

## The Australian Dairy Cattle Research Association (Victorian Branch).

Scientific investigations subsidised by this Association have proceeded throughout the year and general satisfaction has been expressed at the thorough manner in which the problems, so important to the dairying industry, are being investigated.

It is some years now since investigation into contagious abortion was first undertaken at the Glenfield Research Institute in New South Wales, whilst in Victoria the investigation into mastitis is now well into its second year and proceeding according to plan under the supervision of the Commonwealth Council for Scientific and Industrial Research, under a mutually satisfactory arrangement made by the Association.

#### The Australian Society of Breeders of British Sheep.

That this Society has experienced a most successful year is a tribute to the excellent work being carried out by the various Branch Committees.

The 28th Volume of the Flock Book, published in May, 1936, contained the record number of 1299 registered flocks, and it is confidently anticipated that the next Volume, which is now being prepared for publication, will be even larger.

Three annual sales of registered sheep were held during the year. When the Society commenced these sales in 1930 it was with the object of endeavouring to place before the public sheep of high standard and to give lamb raisers an opportunity to secure rams suitable for the production of ideal Export Lambs.

It is gratifying to report that this object has been attained to a great extent, in that the type of sheep entered for these sales each year has shown a considerable improvement. This is an indication that registered breeders are producing a superior class of sheep.

The growing popularity of the British Breeds in Australia is reflected in the large and numerous consignments of sheep imported each year from Great Britain.

The exhibition of sheep staged at the Melbourne "Royal" is recognised as the premier show of British Breeds in Australia, and the exhibits penned in 1936 were in keeping with the high standard of former years.

It is the custom of the Victorian Branch to issue Champion Sashes for Rams and Ewes to Country Agricultural Societies who restrict entries in the British Breeds Sections to sheep bred in registered flocks. No fewer than 198 of these Sashes were issued during the past twelve months.

During the year the Federal Council made available to each Branch the sum of £25 for the purpose of conducting an Export. Lamb Carcase Competition, and the Victorian Branch has taken, advantage of this generous offer and drawn up conditions to govern competitions for "early" and "late" lambs in 1937.

#### The Australian Corriedale Sheepbreeders' Association.

Membership of this Association continues to grow steadily. There are now 365 Flocks registered throughout the Commonwealth, compared with 293 at 31st December, 1935. Branches are established in each of the States, with the exception of Queensland, and the branch in Victoria is the strongest, having a membership of 154.

Volume 11 of the Flock Book was published during the year and copies distributed amongst members of the Association. A pamphlet, descriptive of the Corriedale, was also published by the Federal Council and widely distributed through the branch offices. The Committee noted with pleasure that this publication has created considerable interest, and the reports received from the various States regarding sales effected prompt it to anticipate that the membership will increase even more rapidly than it has done in the past twelve months.

Acting on a recommendation of the Wimmera District Committee, the Victorian Branch donated for competition at Shows in that district a Challenge Cup to be awarded to the exhibitor who gained the highest aggregate on points. This donation had the effect of considerably increasing the entries in the Corriedale Section at each of the five Shows selected for the competition. In order to secure the Association Sashes for Champion Ram and Ewe, twenty-two Country Agricultural Societies restricted the entries to registered sheep in the section for Corriedales during the year under review.

In order to maintain the high standard of sheep registered in its Flock Book, the Association insists upon each year's drop of lambs being inspected by an official inspector appointed by the various branches. The Victorian Committee was interested to learn from its inspector's report that during the past year some 10,000 lambs of the 1935 drop had been inspected in this State, and that he had found that, in spite of the very dry season, the sheep were well grown and in a much better condition than in the previous year.

Your Council wishes success to negotiations for an amalgamation of the Australasian Corriedale Society with this Association, as it has always maintained that one body controlling one breed of stock in Australia is in the best interests of all concerned.

#### Victorian Society of Export Lamb and Mutton Producers.

Originally formed for the purpose of advocating the establishment of an Australian Meat Export Board with statutory powers, this Society is represented on the Victorian Meat Advisory Committee constituted under the Meat Export Control Act of 1935.

Although with the passage of that Act the main object with which the Society was established was achieved, the desirability of the maintenance of a body through which all interested in the breed-

ing and marketing of Export Lamb could speak with one voice has been very definitely shown by the action of the Victorian Branch of the Australian Society of Breeders of British Sheep in arranging for membership to be accorded to each one of its members.

This action will ensure that at future general meetings of the members of the Society all interested will be able to confer on problems affecting any branch of the industry.

#### The Australian Stud Pig Breeders' Society.

The membership of this Society showed a further satisfactory increase during the year and the registrations received for Volume 26 of the Herd Book exceeded the previous record by 542. The indications are that Volume 27, now in the hands of the printer, will be the largest yet published by the Society.

An excellent entry for Pigs was received for the recent Royal Show, showing a decrease of only seven on last year's record, a total of 552.

The bacon and pork classes subsidised by the Victorian Branch were well patronised by breeders, and the quality throughout the Swine Section was again of a uniformly high standard.

During the year a deputation, arranged by the Victorian Branch Committee, approached the Hon. the Minister for Agriculture, with the request that a sum of money be made available for the purpose of subsidising the purchase of pure-bred boars under a scheme similar to that now in operation under which the purchase of pure-bred bulls is subsidised. Success in this direction should do much to further the development of Stud Pig Breeding and also raise the general standard of commercial pigs in this State.

Mention was made in last year's report of the action taken in connection with the appointment of Mr. R. G. Watson, a member of the Federal Council of this Society, as representative of Pig Producers on the Australian Meat Board. During the year Mr. Watson left for an extended tour abroad for the purpose of studying all phases of the industry, and as he will not return until early in the New Year, the Federal Council is looking forward to receiving much valuable information from him at its Easter meeting.

#### The Kennel Control Council.

The twelve months just ended were remarkable in the canine world as being the first complete year of government by the reconstituted Kennel Control Council. As intimated in the previous year's report, the old scheme of election of the Committee of this body by popular vote had proved so open to the possibility of abuse as to jeopardise ability to function in the best interests of all. Realising this and conscious of its pledge to stand solidly behind proper control, your Council consented to the request of the then existing Committee to take over control. This it did in effect, for the new Kennel Control Council's Constitution provides that the Committee consist of nominees of our Society's Council, acting under the chairmanship of a member of that Council. The system proved an instant success. The number of canine bodies affiliated with the

Kennel Control Council increased from 35 to 40, and the membership, despite a doubling of the annual subscription, easily passed the anticipated total.

It is an unquestionable fact that canine government has never before been held in greater confidence than at present.

In return for its patronage, each of the six of our Society's Shows which has been held under the Rules of the Kennel Control Council, or its predecessor, has been an outstanding record. At the 1936 Show the total of 861 individual pedigreed dogs were entered. Although exhibited in four divisions, this record entry sorely taxed the capacity of the Dog Pavilion.

#### The Victorian Working Sheep Dog Association.

Evidence of the progress being made by this Association is indicated by the fact that several breeders in New South Wales have now been enrolled as members.

In July last, the sixth competition for the Captain Payne 50guinea trophy was held at Swan Hill in conjunction with the Swan Hill Sheep Dog Club. A record number of 36 entries was received, and an excellent display of field working provided by exhibitors. The trial was well supported by the public and proved a financial success.

The preliminary trials for dogs entered in the Open and Juvenile Trials at the recent Royal Show were again conducted on the Ascot Racecourse, which in the past has proved a benefit to the Society, as only the best dogs are seen working on the Show arena.

Entries for the 1936 Royal Show totalled 41, which, with the exception of the Centenary Show, was well up to the number received in previous years.

#### The Victorian Young Farmers' Clubs' Association.

Formed at the Royal Show in 1933 for the purpose of furthering in every way possible the extension of the Young Farmer movement in Victoria, this Association has just completed its third and most successful year.

Following strong representations made to the Hon. the Premier and Treasurer, the Association has been accorded such financial support by the Government as has made possible the appointment of an organising supervisor of Young Farmers' Clubs; the securing of greater assistance from officers of the Department of Agriculture, and the printing of literature helpful to Young Farmers' Clubs, etc.

This Government recognition of the Association is the more appreciated in that the Hon. the Premier has indicated that continued financial support may be expected in future years. An Executive, the personnel of which has been approved of by the Premier, has been appointed to ensure that the funds made available will be spent in a manner that will meet with Government approval.

The first organising supervisor to be chosen is Mr. J. J. Keddie, whose work in connection with the Notting Hill Young Farmers' Club is already favourably known throughout the State, and arrangements will be made for him to commence his new duties when the schools re-open in January.

Your Council again arranged for the Young Farmers' Camp at the Show, and twenty members of affiliated Clubs in Victoria, five from New South Wales, and five from Queensland were its guests. As in former years, the Camp was supervised by two teachers whose services were kindly made available by the Department of Education.

The Railways Department again rendered valuable assistance by transporting the Victorian boys to the Camp free of charge, and granting reduced rates to those from other States. Ten boys chosen from the Clubs affiliated with this Association were guests of the Royal Agricultural Society of N.S.W. at its Easter Show Camp, and five others were guests of the Royal National Agricultural and Industrial Association of Queensland at the Brisbane Show Camp in August last.

#### The Chamber of Agriculture of Victoria.

The Thirty-seventh Annual Meeting and the Thirty-fourth Annual Convention of this Chamber, held at Mildura on the 24th, 25th and 26th March, was officially opened by Hon. A. E. Lind, M.L.A., Minister for Lands and Forests, and was attended by an exceptionally large number of delegates representing affiliated bodies throughout the State, as well as many invited guests.

The splendid transport arrangements made by the Railway Commissioners and the warmth of the welcome accorded by the Reception Committee and the residents of Mildura, were keenly appreciated by the 400 visitors to that city.

Many addresses were delivered by experts on various subjects and were keenly appreciated by the delegates, who, during the Convention, passed resolutions regarding items on a lengthy ibusiness-sheet which have since been brought under notice of the responsible authorities by the Executive.

The Hon. the Minister for Agriculture having been convinced that the representation of producers on the Meat Advisory Committee was inadequate, approved of the appointment thereon of four additional members nominated by this Chamber.

It has been decided that the next Convention will be held at Sale on the 6th, 7th and 8th April, and the interest already displayed therein by affiliated Societies is an indication that the 1937 session of the "Farmers' Parliament" will be well attended.

#### The Journal.

Since 1911 the proceedings at the meetings of your Council have been reported each month in the "Australian Farm and Home," in which this Society's official Journal is incorporated, and during that period the publicity given to this Society's activities has annually increased by virtue of the fact that the Journal is circulated not only amongst the members of this and other Agricultural Societies in Victoria, but to the ever-increasing number of members of various Stud Stock Breeders' Societies throughout the Commonwealth.

#### Membership.

Whilst your Council is by no means satisfied with the number of members on the Society's roll, it is pleasing to record that during the past year the total membership has been increased by 150.

It is known that rumours of the possibility of night sessions at the Royal Show at least partly influenced this increase in membership, and therefore it is reasonable to assume that, with the certainty that the Show will be opened at night, a very material increase in membership can be confidently expected.

#### Night Shows.

As indicated in last year's report, your Council persevered with its representations to the Government for such amendment of existing legislation as would enable the Society to run trotting events at night, without detriment to those authorised during the day.

These efforts were crowned with success when, in October last, a new Act of Parliament was passed in which the Society was granted permission to conduct not more than two trotting races after 7 p.m. on any evening during the Show period, in addition to the two such races which it was already permitted to conduct in the day time.

After serious consideration your Council decided that strong representations should be made to the Government for a special loan to enable the Grounds to be suitably lighted, and whilst confidently awaiting the outcome of these representations, application was made to the Royal Agricul-

tural Society of New South Wales for the services of its Chief Electrical Engineer (Mr. E. Halliwell) to inspect the Show Grounds and submit a report as to requirements. Our sister Society very readily complied with Council's request, and Mr. Halliwell, who has had very wide experience, completed his inspection just prior to Christmas, and his report and recommendations will be available for discussion by your Council early in the new year.

As has been previously reported, your Council is convinced that there is no reason to presume that night sessions of the Show will be any less successful in Melbourne than they have proved in Sydney, Brisbane and Adelaide, and further, that the increased revenue so necessary to a further expansion of the Society's activities may not only be derived from night sessions of the Show, but also from the letting between Shows of such a well-lighted arena so favourably served by both rail and tram.

#### Fodder Conservation.

Mention was made in last year's report that as a result of generous financial support from the Commonwealth Bank Board, and the Commercial Banking Company of Sydney, and donations from Captain A. E. T. Payne, Mr. R. O. Blackwood and Messrs. Mitchell and Co., your Council was enabled to promote Fodder Conservation Competitions throughout the State.

With a sum of £405 available for this purpose, your Council offered twenty-seven subsidies of £15 each, and was pleased to receive no less than forty-five applications therefor. When allocating these subsidies your Council endeavoured, as far as possible, to ensure that any farmer or grazier in Victoria desirous of competing would be enabled to do so.

With this end in view it was resolved that no radius be fixed to define the territory of any competition, but it was made a condition that each intending competitor must make his entry with the subsidised body nearest to his property, and that no competitor may enter in more than one competition. Entries for the majority of these competitions have closed, and judging is to take place in the early months of 1937.

Each competition is to be judged to a scale of points closely resembling that adopted by the R.A.S. of New South Wales for similar competitions in that State, and whilst your Council could not undertake the responsibility of securing judges for the various competitions, it made it a condition that its approval of the gentlemen appointed must be secured.

Your Council has already decided that similar competitions will be conducted in 1937-38, but has deemed it advisable not to issue the conditions to govern such competitions until experience has been gained as a result of the judging of the 1936-37 competitions.

#### The Council.

Changes in the personnel of your Council have been even more numerous than in 1935.

As the nominations for election at the annual general meeting in February were not in excess of the vacancies, all of the retiring members of Council were returned unopposed for a period of three years.

On the actual day of that meeting a vacancy was caused by the death of Mr. Donald Stewart, who had first been elected in 1909 and was a Vice-President in 1914. At its meeting in March your Council elected Mr. W. J. Trevor Clarke, "Devon Park," Dunkeld.

Following a lengthy illness the death took place in April of Mr. Phil. S. Tuckett, who was first elected to the Council in 1913 and was a Vice-President in 1918. At the June meeting your Council elected Professor S. M. Wadham, Dean of the Faculty of Agriculture at the University of Melbourne, to fill the vacancy thus caused.

In September the Society sustained a double loss through the deaths, on two succeeding days, of Messrs. W. C. Greaves and R. I. Argyle. Mr. Greaves was first elected to the Council in 1908 and was a Vice-President in 1915, 1916 and 1931; whilst Mr. Argyle was elected to the Council in 1912 and was a Vice-President in 1914.

At its October meeting your Council elected the late Mr. Greaves' son, Mr. W. C. Greaves, "Caldermeade Estate," Caldermeade, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of his father, and, having been convinced that heavy horse-breeding interests were inadequately represented on the Council, took the opportunity to elect Mr. Alfred E. Dahlenburg, "Dalholme," Winiam East, via Nhill, to fill the remaining vacancy.

Your Council noted with keen regret the death in September last of Dr. W. T. Kendall, who, from 1898 until his resignation was received in 1926, had been Veterinary Surgeon to the Society; and at its December meeting expressed its sorrow to learn of the death of Mr. S. Woodland, who, for more than thirty years, had served the Society as Steward in the section for Wines, and also in latter years as Turnstile Superintendent during the Shows.

In every case your Council recorded its keen appreciation of the long and valued service rendered by the deceased. The funerals were attended by members of the Council and officers of the Society, and the Council expressed its sincere sympathy with the bereaved families.

Extended leave of absence was granted to Mr. C. N. McKay during his tour abroad, and also to Mr. A. M. Nicholas, who, acting under medical advice, refrained from attending meetings of the Council during the year.

#### Acknowledgments.

To His Excellency the Governor-General, Lord Gowrie, your Council tenders its warmest thanks, not only for officially opening the Show and presenting prizes to successful exhibitors, but for the keen interest he displayed in the various sections of the Show and in the general activities of the Society. To Her Excellency, Lady Gowrie; to His Excellency, Lord Huntingfield, and Lady Huntingfield, your Council feels indebted for the patronage accorded and the keen interest taken during their visits to the Show.

To the Prime Minister (Rt. Hon. J. A. Lyons, P.C.); the High Commissioner for Great Britain in Australia (Sir Geoffrey Whiskard), and Hon. A. A. Dunstan, Premier of Victoria, for their attendance at the Show and their good wishes for the prosperity of the Society, your Council records its grateful appreciation; and also to the Melbourne City Council for its assistance in connection with the procession of saddle and harness-horses and ponies through the city on the last Saturday of the Show; to the Rt. Honorable the Lord Mayor, for having taken the salute from that procession as it passed the Town Hall; to the Railways Department and the Metropolitan Tramways Board for the splendid transportation arrangements so efficiently carried out; to the Defence Department and to the various Stud Stock Breeders' Societies which co-operated in every way possible to ensure the success of the Show.

Keen appreciation is also expressed of the support again accorded by the State Government, more particularly in connection with the magnificent display staged in the Government Pavilion during the Show; and to the Police Department and the Metropolitan Fire Brigade for their co-operation in providing such spectacular demonstrations in the arena as more than maintained the high standard set in previous years.

Your Council desires to again place on record its grateful thanks to the Press for the publicity given to the activities of the Society, more particularly at Show time; to the Judges and the Stewards for the manner in which they carried out their responsible, and, in some cases, onerous duties on judging day; to the standholders and exhibitors for their loyal and whole-hearted co-operation in staging what was probably the most comprehensive Show yet conducted by the Society, and to all others who in any way assisted in furthering the interests of the Society throughout the year.

#### Finance.

On reference to the financial statement, it will be seen that the revenue for the year was £45,054/2/7, which shows an increase of £1,676/17/0 on that of last year. The expenditure (including £8,614/19/6 in prizes and £2,548/17/3 for buildings and improvements) amounted to £43,058/10/7, the bank overdraft being decreased from £61,376/2/4 to £59,380/10/4, and the Society's indebtedness to the Government, inclusive of interest, decreased during the year from £35,461/11/6 to £33/741/10/8.

Taking the expenditure in permanent improvements as assets, the working expenses for the year show a profit of £4,544/9/3 as against last year's profit of £2,534/0/2, and after going carefully into the matter your Council is satisfied with the outcome of the year's work. This does not imply that it is satisfied that the profit is sufficient to enable the Society's work to be carried on in the manner which it knows its members would desire, hence its exploitation of every avenue through which the Society's revenue is likely to be increased and its activites extended rather than curtailed in any way.

It is convinced that the lighting of the Grounds will ensure that the Society will benefit financially in many ways, and at the same time its members and well-wishers be afforded increased opportunities for education and entertainment at future Shows.
