Annual Report of the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria

To the Members,

Ladies and Gentlemen,

The Council of your Society now reports on the Society's activities during the year ended 31st December, 1954.

FLORAL PAGEANT DURING ROYAL VISIT

During the visit of Her Majesty the Queen to Australia, the Society had the honour to be represented in the Floral Pageant arranged in Melbourne. Despite very strong opposition, the float entered by the Society which represented different phases of agriculture was awarded second prize.

DEVELOPMENT OF THE SHOW GROUNDS

During the year, the area of the Showgrounds was increased by approximately 5 acres. This was made possible by the acquisition by the Society of additional land and by the passing of amendments to the Essendon Land Act by the State Parliament. This additional area, together with the return of the two emergency housing areas, assisted the Society in developing the Grounds. During the year therefore, a considerable amount of construction and building activity took place and these included:

- (a) a new dog pavilion capable of housing 800 dogs. This pavilion was named after one of our Councillors, Mr. William Cockbill, who, for many years, has been Steward-in-Chief of the Dog Section and also Chairman of the Kennel Control Council.
- (b) the construction of approximately 300 horse boxes and lockers. This entailed the opening up of an entirely new horse area, and involved the construction of roads and installation of electricity and water services.
- (c) the modernising of a considerable portion of the Pig Pavilion. This necessitated alterations to the roof, construction of new pens, alterations to drainage, painting and other details.
- (d) the construction of new lawn areas for the public, and the use of some of these for the judging and selling of sheep.
- (e) the establishment of several new cafes and the modernising of one restaurant into an up to date self service cafe.
- (f) the conversion of a horse pavilion into a cattle pavilion in which the dual purpose cattle were housed.
- (g) a new electrical sub-station giving increased electrical supply to standholders.

ROYAL SHOW

The Society again presented its Annual Show which took place from the 23rd September to 2nd October.

We are pleased to record that His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, Sir Dallas Brooks, officially opened the Show on the 24th September. He and Lady Brooks who accompanied him, displayed much interest in the Grand Parade and other sections of the Show.

Lady Brooks also attended the Show on the 25th September when she performed the opening ceremony of the new William Cockbill Dog Pavillion.

In view of the great activity which had taken place in the development of the Grounds, it was fitting that the Society should receive an all-time record of 22,531 entries. The details of these are contained in the attached sheet.

Fortunately the Society was favoured with good weather almost throughout the Show, and this no doubt assisted in achieving a record attendance figure of 679,167. This figure was 106,992 greater than in 1953, and 26,507 more than the previous record in 1946.

A comprehensive arena programme was again presented to the public and almost without exception, arena events were conducted on time.

Wood Chopping was again conducted in the special stadium used for the purpose, and proved a decided attraction to the public. Both day and evening sessions took place.

For the first time, an International Fleece Competition was held in conjunction with the Wool Exhibition and Sheep Shearing contests. Entries in the International Fleece Competition were received from all States of the Commonwealth and from England, United States of America, South Africa, Uruguay, Holland and Japan.

We were pleased to have been able during the year to make more space available to standholders and those who were offered space were quick to take advantage of the entre to the Show Grounds for the display of their products.

Practically all standholders embarked on a campaign of improvement to their stands and the general standard of exhibits showed great improvement.

NEW GRAND STAND

Public interest so clearly evidenced at the last Show, greatly encouraged the Council to proceed with plans for a new grandstand to accommodate approximately 8,500 people.

The Council is pleased to report that the design of the stand has been finalised after harmonious conferences with the Trotting Control Board. The stand will provide better facilities for viewing the arena, and also provide amenities for members which have not hitherto been possible.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

Your Council wishes to place on record its thanks to the Premier of Victoria, the Hon. John Cain, M.L.A., the Minister for Agriculture, Hon. C. P. Stoneham, M.L.A., the Minister for Education, Hon. A. E. Shepherd, M.L.A., and other members of the Victorian Cabinet; the Department of Agriculture, and other Government Departments; public bodies, all stock Societies; the Press and Broadcasting Stations; Judges, Stewards and Stewardesses, and those many others who have so kindly offered their services and assistance to the Society. Our overseas judges this year were Mr. W. Gordon Blackstock who judged the Shorthorns, Mr. John Cumber who judged the Dairy Shorthorns and Mr. D. T. Sinclair of New Zealand who judged in the Dog Section. The Council also desires to place on record its appreciation of the splendid work done by the members of the staff during the year.

The Council also desires to thank the co-operation extended by the Minister for Education, Hon. A. E. Shepherd, M.L.A., and the Director of Education, Major General A. H. Ramsay in permitting parties of school children, in the care of their teachers, to visit the Show, the great educational value of which is now so widely recognised.

FINANCE

The financial statements and Balance Sheet for the year ended 31st December, 1954 are attached to this report. The overdraft in the Society's working account with the Bank has been considerably reduced due to the successful year's operations. The Show conducted by the Society returned the highest financial return ever received by the Society. In order to provide capital for its new works, further money was, however, borrowed from the Bank.

THE COUNCIL

At the annual election of office bearers, Mr. T. N. Mitchell was re-elected President of the Society, and His Honour Judge Mitchell, Messrs. J. Bott and L. M. Dugdale were re-elected Vice Presidents.

It is with regret that the deaths of two members of Council during the year are recorded.

- Mr. T. A. Meaklim, who died on July 22nd, had been a member of the Council since 1940, and was a Vice-President in the years 1950, 1951 and 1952. At the time of his death he was Chairman and Steward-in-Chief of the Sheep Section, offices which he had filled very efficiently for a number of years.
- Mr. A. H. Moore, who died on December 12th, was elected to the Council in 1934, and was elected as Honorary Councillor early in the year 1954. Prominent in the dairy cattle and pig sections of the Show, he had been for many years, Chairman and Steward in Chief of the Dairy Cattle Section and had carried out similar duties for the Pig Section.
- Mr. K. A. Drummond, of Talgarno Park, Wodonga, was elected at the September meeting to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. Meaklim.

Leave of absence was granted to Mr. C. N. McKay and Cr. H. L. Lyall who travelled overseas during the year.
