

Annual Report of the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria

To the Members, Ladies and Gentlemen,

Your Council takes pleasure in presenting this Report of Proceedings of the Society for the year ended 31st December, 1951.

The Royal Show

The Royal Melbourne 1951 Commemoration Show, held from 20th to 29th September, was so named when Council resolved to accede to the expressed wish of the Government that the Society would co-operate in the wide-spread celebrations to commemorate the centenary of responsible Government in Victoria; the centenary of the discovery of gold in this State, and the Jubilee of Commonwealth Government.

In view of this fact it is pleasing to record that those competent to express an opinion acclaimed the Show as the best yet staged by the Society, both from the point of view of its comprehensiveness and the quality of the exhibits in all sections.

Manufacturers and business firms co-operated with the Society by making attractive displays of agricultural and dairy machinery and manufactures of all kinds on every available space throughout the grounds.

The officers of the Department of Agriculture more than maintained the high standard set in previous years with the very comprehensive and educational display staged in the Government Pavilion.

The co-operative efforts of members of the Nurserymen and Seedsmen's Association resulted in a very attractive exhibit in the main Horticultural Hall, whilst in the annexe thereto displays staged by the Royal Horticultural Society and suburban horticultural societies were very favourably commented upon.

In the Centenary Hall the display in the refrigerated meat case, staged with the active cooperation of the Australian Meat Board, attracted even wider interest than in 1950.

A new feature in this Hall was a comprehensive exhibit organised by the Murray Valley Development League.

These, with the Save the Forests Campaign display and the competitive exhibits of farm and dairy produce and fruits, made this Hall more popular with patrons than in former years.

With over 1900 individual dogs, the interest of canine enthusiasts was maintained on each of the nine days, whilst the exhibits of poultry, pigeons and cage birds were of the usual high standard and constituted a Show within a Show.

Unfortunately the clerk of the weather was not as co-operative as the Society's supporters, as wintry conditions obtained practically throughout the nine day and eight night sessions.

His Excellency the Governor (Sir Dallas Brooks), accompanied by Lady Brooks and Miss Brooks, visited the Show on Friday, 21st September, and after inspection of a Naval Guard of Honour, His Excellency officially opened the Show from the Council enclosure in the centre of the Members' Grandstand, and then witnessed the first Grand Parade which, despite the rain, was an impressive sight.

Other prominent guests during the period of the Show included His Excellency the High Commissioner for Canada (Mr. C. Fraser Elliott, C.M.G., K.C.); the Moderator of the Church of Scotland (Rt. Rev. Dr. W. White Anderson, M.C., MA.), and the Prime Minister (Rt. Hon. R. G. Menzies, C.H., K.C., M.P.).

Your Council greatly appreciated the compliment paid by the Hon. the Premier and every member of his Cabinet when they officially visited the Show as a gesture in appreciation of the Society's national work.

The excessive rain caused the cancellation of the evening session of the first Friday, but the events scheduled for that evening were catered for before the end of the Show.

The arena programme brought prominently under notice the Olympic type of equestrian events as yet quite new in Australia.

The jumping course, made up of brightly painted obstacles specially constructed on Olympic lines, was confined to the centre of the arena, leaving both ends available for judging of other events.

The appointment of Mr. John Shedden from England, on the recommendation of the Equestrian Federation of Australia, proved to be a particularly fortunate one as not only were his services as Judge of saddle horses, riding competitions and the Dressage tests greatly appreciated by the competitors, but his wide knowledge of Olympic equestrian events enabled him to advise on variations of the course, whilst his explanations over the public address system made patrons fully aware of the method of judging and maintained very keen interest throughout the Show.

In accordance with annual custom, a special luncheon was tendered to Judges, Stewards and Stewardesses, and the President took the oppor-

tunity to express Council's keen appreciation of their honorary services.

He specially referred to Judges from overseas—Mrs. M. L. Griffith (Red Poll Cattle), Mr. Charles McCombie (Aberdeen-Angus), and Mr. John Shedden (Light Horses), from Great Britain; Mr. J. Smith (Jersey Cattle), Messrs. T. Marks and H. Kneebone (Fat Cattle and Export Steers), and Mr. D. T. Sinclair (Dogs), from New Zealand; and his cordial welcome was enthusiastically endorsed by those present, who included Judges from all parts of the Commonwealth.

A comparative statement of entries for this and previous years is published with this report.

It will be noted that an all-time record was established in the section for Home Crafts, thus emphasising the necessity for more adequate accommodation for this very popular feature of the Show, which, for obvious reasons, Council has not yet found it possible to provide.

Lady competitors in the section for horses in action were very appreciative of the special amenities made available for them in the southwest corner of the No. 2 Horse Pavilion, and Council is hopeful that during the coming year it will be possible to make similar provision in other sections for the use of those who perforce have to care for the stock exhibits throughout the Show.

Apart from increased prize money and many valuable trophies special medallions were awarded at this year's Show. These will be valued by successful exhibitors as souvenirs of Commemoration Year.

ASSOCIATE BODIES

Reference has been made in previous reports to the difficulties encountered in securing adequate trained staff and office accommodation to facilitate the carrying out of the continually increasing secretarial and administrative work for the numerous stud stock breeders' societies and other bodies associated with this Society.

During the year under review it has been found possible to increase the staff, and to relieve office congestion, a section has been transferred to the Show Grounds.

In accordance with usual custom paragraphs relating to these associated bodies are included in this report.

The Commonwealth Clydesdale Horse Society (Federal Council and Victorian Branch)

The publication of Volume 15 of the Commonwealth Clydesdale Stud Book, which contains the pedigrees of 279 stallions and 1033 numbered mares was completed during the year and copies circulated to all members and kindred bodies overseas.

Federal Council regretted that in an effort to reduce costs, it was necessary to delete the additional produce section which was included in previous Volumes, and it is hoped that lack of information concerning recorded foals usually published therein will not seriously inconvenience breeders.

Interest in the Society has been maintained and membership at the end of the financial year totalled 225.

The fact that the Victorian Government again renewed the Foal Bonus Scheme under which a bonus of £4 is paid on all foals by certificated sires from approved mares was greatly appreciated by members.

The display at the Melbourne Royal Show was quite up to the usual high standard and the quality of the animals competing was very favourably commented upon by many visiting breeders.

In appreciation of the valued service rendered to the Society by Mr. P. Connell, who was a foundation member and had officiated as President of the Federal Council for 20 years, members of the Victorian Branch decided to donate a trophy in his honour and a silver tray awarded to the best colt or filly exhibited at the Melbourne Royal Show was for the first time competed for this year.

The Australian Pony Stud Book Society (Victorian Branch)

As a result of recommendations made by the Victorian Provisional Committee the constitution of the Society was at the last annual general meeting of members altered to provide for the formation of Branches and a Federal Council to control the affairs of the Society, consisting solely of delegates elected annually by each Branch.

At the general meeting of Victorian members held during the recent Royal Show it was resolved that a Victorian Branch of the Society be formally established in accordance with the provisions of the revised Constitution and a Branch Committee was elected.

Provision was made in the new Constitution and Rules for all Stud Book entries to be forwarded direct to the Secretary of the Society in Sydney. Victorian members felt that this move was not in the best interest of breeders in this State and the Branch has tabled a notice of motion that the rules be altered to provide for Stud Book entries to be forwarded to Branch Secretaries.

Other recommendations to Federal Council from the Victorian Branch are: (1) the deletion of the Foundation Sections in the Shetland Division; (2) the compulsory use of brands for the identification of ponies and (3) that the registration of stud prefixes be made compulsory.

Prior to the formal establishment of the Victorian Branch, business affecting Victorian members was dealth with by a Provisional Committee under the Chairmanship of a member of your Council (Mr. S. A. Greaves). Members have conveyed to Mr. Greaves their keen appreciation of the valuable services rendered by him during his long term as Chairman.

Volume 4 of the Society's Stud Book was issued during the year and contains a good representation of the studs of Victorian breeders. Volume 5 is in the course of publication and entries are now being received for Volume 6.

The Equestrian Federation of Australia (Federal Council and Victorian Branch)

As intimated in the last report, the first Show conducted by the Victorian Branch was held at the Show Grounds at the end of January, and was one of the first events in Commemoration Year.

Excellent entries were received, and despite extremely hot weather the competitions were keenly contested.

His Excellency the Governor—as Patron of the Federation—attended during the evening session and presented many of the trophies. His Excellency was accompanied on this occasion by Lady Brooks and Miss Brooks.

The Federal President (Mr. S. Hordern) during an extensive tour abroad, visited Horse Shows in England and on the Continent, and gleaned much information that will be of service to Branches of the Federation in their efforts to make widely known the style of horsemanship at International Shows generally, and at Olympic Games in particular.

Immediately after the Royal Show the Victorian Branch arranged for a Show Jumping School to be conducted by Mr. John Shedden, and a Dressage School by Captain J. Pearce; both were well supported.

In October the Victorian Branch conducted the first One Day Event to be held in Australia.

By kind permission of the Melbourne Hunt Club this Event took place on the Club's property at Cranbourne, and proved to be greatly appreciated by competitors and patrons alike.

The Committee of the Victorian Branch is now giving attention to the organisation of another Horse Show in the early autumn.

There is a properly constituted Branch of the Federation in each of the States.

The New South Wales Branch is organising a Horse Show to take place on the Sydney Show Grounds in February, 1952, and the South Australian Branch is organising a One Day Event to be conducted in early autumn.

The interest aroused by the jumping events included in the Melbourne Royal Show has resulted in many applications from country agricultural societies for the loan of the specially constructed obstacles to facilitate the inclusion of similar events in their Show programmes.

With the interested assistance and advice of the Federation Equestre Internationale, with which the Equestrian Federation of Australia is affiliated, every effort is to be made to ensure that Australia will be worthily represented in the equestrian events at the 1956 Olympic Games.

The Shorthorn Society of Australia (Federal Council and Victorian Branch)

Interest in Shorthorn cattle has increased considerably during the year and the fact that 79 animals have been imported from Great Britain demonstrates how popular the breed has become.

The beef raising industry is now attracting much greater attention than formerly and the Federal Government anticipates that the details announced recently concerning the long term agreement signed in London by representatives of both the British and Australian Governments will have a further stimulating influence on production.

The most gratifying feature of the expansion of the industry is the increased use of better bulls and a very decided improvement in both the quantity and quality of beef produced can be confidently anticipated if this policy is maintained in commercial herds.

The demand for stud Shorthorns continues to exceed the supply but nevertheless, the fact that 27 new studs have been established during the year is most encouraging, particularly as every State in the Commonwealth is represented.

Ever increasing costs of printing Herd Books is causing all Breed Societies much concern and the sub-committee which Federal Council appointed to go into this matter has, after full enquiry, recommended alteration in style and setting which it is hoped will reduce the cost of future Volumes and at the same time maintain the standard of work.

Volume 15 of the Shorthorn Herd Book of Australia, which is now being compiled on the lines recently adopted, will contain the pedigrees of 558 bulls, 1383 cows, 4530 calves, in addition to 2227 transfers of ownership.

The number of entries already received for inclusion in Volume 16 totals 174 bulls, 575 cows, 1646 calves and 698 transfers.

Breeders greatly appreciated the fact that Lord Lovat, of Beaufort Castle, Beauly, Invernesshire, Scotland, adjudicated in the Shorthorn section at the Sydney Royal Easter Show and his visit undoubtedly did much to create greater interest in the breed.

The Dairy Shorthorn Association of Australia

Interest in the Association has been well maintained and another satisfactory year can be reported.

The third annual autumn sale of Dairy Shorthorns, conducted at the Royal Show Grounds in May last, proved successful. Competition for females was keen, prices up to 140 guineas being obtained. Bulls made up to 150 guineas. The

number of cattle entered was below that of previous years but quality on the whole was good. The Association has expressed appreciation of the action of your Council in making accommodation at the Show Grounds available for the sales.

Volume 5 of the Dairy Shorthorn Herd Book was issued during the year. The Volume is the largest yet published by the Association and the growing popularity of the breed in Australia is reflected in the increased number of entries featured as compared with previous Volumes. In view of the increase in the number of Herd Book entries now being received, it has been decided to publish Volumes at shorter intervals.

For the first time on record, classes for Dairy Shorthorns were included in the Prize Schedule of the 1951 Adelaide Royal Show. An endeavour was also made for similar classes to be provided at the Sydney Royal Easter Show, but advice was received from the Royal Agricultural Society of New South Wales that until the Society was able to construct more stalls it would not be possible to accede to this Association's request.

The Royal Melbourne 1951 Commemoration Show was well supported by Dairy Shorthorn breeders in the way of entries. The Association again made a donation towards the prize fund.

During the year Dairy Shorthorn bulls were imported by two members of the Association and their introduction should prove of great benefit to the breed.

The Annual Dinner, held during the Royal Show, again proved a most enjoyable function.

The Red Poll Cattle Breeders' Association of Australia

(Federal Council and Victorian Branch)

On the recommendation of the Committee of the Victorian Branch your Council appointed Mrs. M. L. Griffith—owner of the Hallinbury Stud of Red Polls in Essex, England and Chairman of the Red Poll Cattle Society of Great Britain and Ireland—to adjudicate in the Red Poll Section at the Royal Melbourne Commemoration Show. Comments subsequently made by this well-known judge indicate that she was more than favourably impressed by the standard of the stock paraded for judging. Mrs. Griffiths was guest of honour at the annual dinner to members of the Association held during the Show.

Volume 15 of the Association's Herd Book is nearing completion and should be available for distribution to members early in the new year. A new feature in the Volume is the Standard of Merit for Bulls, which contains the names of 166 bulls that have qualified as a result of the amount of butter-fat produced by their dams or their daughters.

Due to the keen demand for surplus stock "on the farm," the small number of entries received necessitated the cancellation of the annual autumn sale for which your Council had made accommodation at the Show Grounds available.

The English Red Poll Colour Film has now been exhibited in all States and has created a favourable impression wherever shown.

At its last meeting Federal Council appointed a Publicity Committee with power to co-opt the Publicity Officers of the various Branches.

The Ayrshire Cattle Herd Book Society of Australasia

(Federal Council and Victorian Branch)

In common with all other breed organisations, this Society has been forced to adopt measures to offset rising costs particularly in printing, and although entry fees were raised last year it was evident that the extra revenue would not cover commitments unless other steps were taken.

Federal Council therefore reluctantly decided to discontinue the annual publication of the Herd Book, which has been continued without a break since 1918, and to issue Herd Books in future at three-year intervals.

It also decided to alter the method of printing the pedigrees to enable more to be included in each page; to discontinue the publication of transfer lists and to abbreviate the lists of Royal Show awards.

In accordance with a decision of the Federal Council, the Society's Solicitor has thoroughly overhauled the Constitution and Rules and a draft of his suggested revision has been forwarded to Branches for consideration.

A meeting will be held at Easter when it is hoped that the new Constitution will be finally approved.

That the demand for Australian-bred Ayrshires in Kenya is still keen is evidenced by the fact that a further 16 head were shipped during the year bringing the total exported to that Colony since 1946 to 80 head.

Although the financial position of the Victorian Branch is still sound, it also has had to meet rising costs and the Committee reluctantly decided against publishing an annual test booklet. It regarded this as the action least likely to adversely affect breeders, as the information is provided in the Annual Report published by the Department of Agriculture.

The highest producing Ayrshire herd under Victorian Standard Herd Test for 1950-51, owned by Messrs. G. A. Fraser and Son, comprised 18 cows of varying ages, which averaged 481 lb. butter fat with allowances. A member of this herd, the junior four-year-old cow, "Bonnie Doon Hazelette," produced 721 lbs. butterfat and set a Victorian record for the Ayrshire breed for that class.

Competition at "Royal" and country shows throughout Australia has been particularly keen and the standard of cattle high. This reflects the enthusiasm of the breeders in keeping their stock before the public. In this connection it is pleasing to report that after a lapse of many years, Ayrshires were exhibited at the "Royal" show in Western Australia.

The Friesian Cattle Club of Australia (Victorian Branch)

It is gratifying to report that the keen interest shown in the breed last year has been maintained, many new members having been enrolled throughout the Commonwealth. Despite a number of resignations, the Victorian membership has considerably increased.

The breed has been placed well to the fore in Victoria, by the excellent performance of the herd of Messrs. P. W. Goodfellow & Sons, which, for the second year in succession, won Champion Herd under Government Standard Test, with the average yield of 604.5 lb. butterfat with allowances. This is only the fourth occasion on which a 600 lb. herd average has been achieved and this herd has been successful twice.

Several new stud masters exhibited stock at the Royal Melbourne Commemoration Show, where a record entry of 209 was received; also many fine displays were seen during the year at country Agricultural Shows.

The Federal Council met twice during the year, and many matters were dealt with. The Council decided that Appendix 4 of the Herd Book be closed on 31st December, 1951. Mr. P. C. Giles, of South Australia, was re-elected President.

The office of this Club is now situated at the Showgrounds. The staff has been increased and steady progress is being made with the compilation of Vol. 16 of the Herd Book.

Mr. W. T. Smith was re-elected Chairman of the Victorian Branch, the Committee of which has been working assiduously for the benefit of the breed in general. During the year, much thought was given to the publicising of the breed and Mr. T. D. Kennedy was appointed honorary publicity officer. The Branch Annual Dinner was again successful.

Members agree that the progress of the breed in all States augurs well for the future, and look forward to another successful year.

The Guernsey Cattle Society of Australia (Victorian Branch)

The breed has made excellent progress during the year. The demand for Guernseys in Victoria is still increasing and the membership has grown considerably. There are now two hundred and forty-five members.

Dr. F. G. Stephens, who is Federal President of the Society, was re-elected President of the Branch.

During the year, three members of the Committee had leave of absence to visit England and another member also paid a visit and made purchases of cattle in England and Guernsey Island. These importations will assist in maintaining the standard aimed at by members.

Whilst in England, the President called at the offices of the English Guernsey Cattle Society, and the Royal Guernsey Agricultural and Horticultural Society, and affiliated the Branch with both bodies.

A new departure was made by the Committee by holding a sale of registered Guernseys at the Show Ground. The sale held last March proved a success and it is proposed to hold the second annual sale on the 6th March, 1952.

Once again the breed was brought prominently under notice by the excellent performance of "Yarraview Golden Daffodil," owned by Capt. A. E. Payne. Following her Reserve Championship last year, she gained Champion Cow under the Victorian Government Herd Test with a production record of 14,499 lbs. milk and 837.9 lbs. butterfat, thus bringing her aggregate yield for five lactations to 53,439 lbs. milk and 3461 lbs. butterfat.

The Federal Council issued Vol. 17 of the Guernsey Herd Book which contains 6,074 entries.

Quite apart from the high standard exhibit at the Melbourne Royal Show, the Committee reports a number of fine displays in the country. This shows the keenness of members in placing the breed before the public.

The office of this Branch of the Society is now situated at the Showgrounds.

The Australian Illawarra Shorthorn Society (Victorian Branch)

The breed has made satisfactory progress in Victoria during the past year and a slight increase in the membership of the Branch can be reported.

The Royal Melbourne Commemoration Show was well supported in the way of entries and it was particularly pleasing to see a number of breeders who were exhibiting for the first time. The Branch again made a donation towards the prize fund in the A.I.S. Section.

During the year Federal Council completed the publication and distribution of Volume 12 of the Herd Book, in which a good representation of the studs of Victorian breeders appears. Entries for Volume 13 closed on 31st July last.

Federal Council recently amended its regulations to provide for the payment of penalty fees on transfers of ownership not recorded within 60 days of sale.

The Branch accorded its support to an auction sale of A.I.S. cattle at Dandenong in November last. Some good prices were obtained and the advisability of making the sale an annual fixture is under consideration. The fact that only 36 animals were catalogued reflects the keen demand for surplus stock "on the farm."

The Branch Annual Dinner, held during the Royal Show, proved to be a very successful function.

The Australian Jersey Herd Society (Victorian Branch)

With the exception of one or two years during the second World War, the membership of this Branch has continued to increase and has now reached 1,388, which is a new record. As a result of the dispersal of a number of large herds during the year—considered to be due to the shortage of labour—many dairy farmers, who do not find it necessary to engage labour, have joined the Society and more than offset the resignations of the owners of the large herds.

Despite the loss of 10 per cent. rebate of entry fees from the Federal Council to Branches, this Branch still enjoys a sound financial position.

Owing to further increases in printing costs, etc., the Federal Council found it necessary to again increase the charges for registration and transfer of stock which are now as under and become operative on 1st January, 1952:—Bulls, £1/10/-; Cows, 15/-; Calves, 2/6; and Transfers, 10/-.

The lag in publication of the Stud Book has been largely overcome. Copies of Volume 36 were issued to members toward the end of the year and almost immediately after, some members had been issued with copies of Volume 37. Entries to appear in Volume 38 have been numbered and placed in the hands of the printer. Recent amendments to the Federal Council Rules stipulate that calves to be submitted for registration be tattooed within 7 days of date of birth, the breeder's regisered brand to be placed in one ear and the identification number in the other. Breeders are still

required to register calves within 60 days of date of birth but, should application for registration within that period be overlooked, only another 30 days is allowed in which to apply and then only on payment of £1 in addition to the ordinary fee of 2/6, and any expenses which the Branch may charge.

A breeder shall not be deemed to have failed to comply with the Rule if, within 60 days of birth of any live calf, he shall have supplied to the Branch Secretary the essential particulars relating to the calf and provided that, within 30 days immediately thereafter, he shall have lodged with the Branch the prescribed form of notification.

The performance of the breed under Standard Herd Test was, as usual, very creditable, Jersey herds filling fifteen of the first twenty places.

In addition to the Reserve Champion Herd, Jerseys also provided the second highest producing cow.

The Reserve Champion herd was that of Mr. C. J. Jennings, of Rye, whose "Milangil" herd gained a similar award last year.

The highest producing Jersey cow was "Windrest Perfection," owned by Dr. A. R. Haywood of Hastings. Unfortunately, owing to her not recalving within the specified period she was not eligible for the Reserve Championship.

It is interesting to note that the average butterfat production of all Jerseys under Standard Test was 47 lbs. greater than the average for all other breeds combined.

The Committee purposes reviewing the conditions under which the prize of £5/5/ was inaugurated at the 1951 Royal Show, to perpetuate the memory of the late B. A. Barr.

Exhibitors expressed appreciation of the increased prize money offered in the section for Jerseys at the Royal Show.

The Committee confidently anticipates that, in the ensuing year, the Branch will make still further progress.

The Victorian Herd Improvement Association

Council reports with pleasure that continued postwar expansion of herd testing has resulted in new all time records for the numbers of units, members, and cows under test. This is regarded as being the best testimony to the value of testing to the commercial dairy farmer, especially as the expansion has taken place over a period when labour difficulties have had still to be overcome.

State and Commonwealth Governments have sustained their interest in the movement, and appreciation was expressed of the action of the State Government in making an increase in the amount of subsidy available to herd testing members.

During the year under review Councillors were pleased to take advantage of an offer to inspect, in operation, the new recording machinery brought from England and installed at the Department of Agriculture.

Three new members—Messrs. P. F. Pekin, F. J. Leete and W. G. Papworth—were warmly welcomed following their election as Members of Council.

Pleasure was expressed, and congratulations extended to the Secretary (Mr. Louis Monod) when it was learned that he had been mentioned in the Honours List as a recipient of the O.B.E.

Following representations made to the National Service Employment Office, all affiliated Associations were advised that when a Tester is called up for Military Training a deferment may be obtained if he, and he only, lodges an application. The call up will then be made at a more suitable period of the year for the functioning of an Association.

Close co-operation of the Department of Agriculture with the Association ensured the conduct of a successful Dairy Farm Management Competition which attracted many entrants, and proved an unqualified success.

Cash prizes and trophies donated in the three sections of the Herd Testers' Competition were the subject of keen contest, and R.A.S. of V. Production Certificates were issued to the owners of herds which reached the specified standard of production of butter fat under Association test.

The Goat Society of Australia (Victorian Branch)

The interest in goat breeding has tremendously increased and the demand for goats and their milk has been far greater this year. Breeders are finding difficulty in meeting this demand.

The "Salette Stud Goat Farm," imported a buck and two does of the Saanen breed to Victoria during the year.

Numerous enquiries for goats' milk are being received daily at the office of the Branch, which is now situated at the Showgrounds.

The Branch Committee has been working very hard during the year to assist in the distribution of milk to those people whose medical advisors have prescribed it; also to help members in the management and care of their goats, in an endeavour to improve the breed in general.

Keen interest of members is revealed in the many fine displays seen at various shows. This year at the Royal Melbourne Commemoration Show, a record of ninety entries was received.

During the year, two twenty-four hours' milking competitions were held. These competitions show the capabilities of the breed and allow members' goats to qualify for "Q" Stars.

Mrs. V. E. L. Cutter, a very active member, was again elected President of the Branch.

Entries for Vol. 3 of the Society's Herd Book closed during the year and have been folioed only, as publication at the present time would be too costly an undertaking for the Federal Council.

The Australian Society of Breeders of British Sheep

(Federal Council and Victorian Branch)

During the year the Society published the forty-third Volume of the Flock Book, which includes the histories of 1970 flocks throughout Australia.

This Volume also contains the individual pedigrees of over 3,000 rams and ewes.

The members of the Society number 1,682, of whom 747 reside in Victoria.

Despite the increase of £1/1/- in the member's subscription, Federal Council has found that the cost of conducting the Society is such that it decided at the last annual meeting to publish the Flock Book every second year. It also resolved to discontinue the privilege of forwarding each month a free copy of the official journal to members of the Society.

At a meeting of the Victorian Branch Committee, members took a serious view of the fact that a Volume of the Flock Book would not be published in 1952, and steps are being taken to endeavour to call a special meeting of Federal Council early in the year with a view to revising decisions reached at its September meeting.

Realising that a news service is of much value to members, the Branch has resolved to distribute to its members a copy of the "Australian Farm and Home" during the next nine months. To meet this cost and keep the Branch in a sound financial position, it has decided to place a levy of £1/1/- upon the members.

The 1951 series of registered Show Sales conducted by the Victorian Branch proved most successful.

Despite a falling off in the number of rams bred in Victoria, these Show Sales have been strongly supported by members with sheep of an excellent standard. Generally, prices paid for rams were much higher than in the previous year and at the Newmarket (Melbourne) Sale held in December, a record price of 40½ guineas per head was paid for a pen of five Ryeland "Flock" rams.

A careful inspection of all sheep yarded ensures that buyers can obtain rams of a sound type which should prove very useful in the production of quality lamb.

The big decline in the production of both lamb and mutton during the past two years no doubt influenced the Commonwealth Government to make greater efforts for a substantial increase in the price to be paid by Britain for Australian meat during the current season.

The increase in price of 17½ per cent. for lamb and to 15 per cent. for mutton announced prior to the commencement of this season should prove an incentive for greater production throughout Australia.

Any increase of production in this industry should be beneficial to this Society.

The Australian Corriedale Association (Federal Council and Victorian Branch)

Volume 20 of the Flock Book, which will be distributed to members early in the new year, contains the complete histories of 724 flocks. These flocks consist of just over 300,000 registered sheep.

The Victorian Branch is represented by 268 registered flocks and 90,000 registered sheep.

The growing popularity of the Corriedale in overseas countries is reflected in the fact that 58 rams and 562 ewes were exported during the past year to South Africa, United States of America and New Zealand.

At last meeting Federal Council resolved to reprint further copies of its booklet "The Corriedale," which is proving an excellent means of publicity, overseas and throughout Australia.

Breeders, particularly in Victoria, have expressed appreciation of the Registered Show Sales conducted by the Victorian Branch in conjunction with the Australian Society of Breeders of British Sheep in various country centres and in Melbourne. The 1951 series of these Show Sales have been well supported by breeders and sheep offered have sold at very satisfactory prices.

What would be regarded as one of the outstanding events in the Corriedale world was the dispersal, by public auction early in December, of the registered flock owned by Messrs. J. F. Guthrie (Corriedale) Pty. Ltd., of Lara, Victoria,

when some 3,400 sheep were offered and readily purchased by buyers from all States.

This flock was founded in 1911 by Mr. J. F. Guthrie, who was the convenor of the first meeting of Corriedale breeders. At this meeting, held in July, 1914, the Corriedale Association was formed.

Corriedale breeders throughout Australia owe much to Mr. Guthrie for his untiring efforts in furthering the interests of this breed which to-day plays such a prominent part in the sheep breeding industry of Australia.

The Australian Pig Society (Federal Council and Victorian Branch)

Copies of Volume 38 of the Australian Stud Pig Herd Book were circulated to all members during the year. Volume 39 is at present being bound and copy for Volume 40 is in the hands of the printer.

Federal Council gave serious consideration to the marking of black pigs for identification purposes. It was eventually decided to introduce a system of ear-notching and the new regulation will apply to all black pigs born on or after 1st May, 1952.

The question was also taken up with the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation in the hope that research would result in the discovery of some suitable fluid with which the ears of black pigs could be satisfactorily tattooed.

The Victorian Branch again co-operated with the Australian Meat Board and the Department of Agriculture in the conduct of pig carcase competitions at the Dandenong Bacon Factory. It also continued to press for the introduction of legislation for the compulsory T.B. testing of all stud pigs.

The Society spared no effort in an endeavour to secure Commonwealth Government recognition of some fundamental requirements of a soundly expanding pig industry, capable of supplying the needs of Australia and making a substantial contribution to the United Kingdom.

The Federal Executive again waited on the Minister for Commerce and Agriculture and placed before him a statement, including figures on the cost of production prepared by this Society, which showed that on the basis of values ruling in June, 1951, the cost of producing one pound of bacon carcase was 1/8.7d. These figures were based on the formula used by the Commonwealth Bureau of Agricultural Economics when

it showed that in June, 1950, the cost of producing one pound of bacon carcase was 1/5.65d., no profit margin being included. In view of the increase of 3.05d. per lb. in twelve months the following recommendations were submitted to the Minister at the Deputation:—

- 1. That the contract price for the sale of pig meat by Australia to the United Kingdom should be raised immediately to a level that would return 2/- per lb., dressed weight at works, to producers for first grade baconer pigs.
- 2. That in view of rapidly changing costs, the contract price be reviewed, and adjusted according to pig production costs, every six months.
- 3. That pig production costing be included in the work of the Joint Dairy Advisory Committee, assisted by a pig industry representative. This was considered necessary in order to procure better information on actual costs of production of pig meat.


The Minister, in reply, stated that the Executive had put a very strong case. The Government recognised the existing problem of Australia's own growing needs, and the possibility of a third world war, which would greatly increase the demand for food stuffs. He said that he would continue to negotiate with the British Ministry of Food for a higher price for pig meats produced in Australia, but he felt that he would have to be in a position to give an undertaking that if a higher price was agreed to a greater amount of meat would be available for export.

The Minister said he was convinced that producers could not be expected to produce pig meats at a loss, and that failing a higher price being granted by Great Britain it would be necessary for consideration to be given to the subsidising of the price by the Commonwealth Government, a policy which had already involved the Commonwealth Government in enormous expenditure.

When thanking the Minister for receiving the deputation the Federal President (Mr. F. Hawtin) stated that if the contract price was raised in accordance with the representations made, the Society would undertake a very definite campaign for an increase in the quantity of pig meats produced in Australia.

Since then of course the cost of production has spiralled as a result of increased wages and the recently announced formidable rise in feed grain prices.

The Branch recently requested the Victorian Minister of Agriculture to give consideration to the formation of a State Pig Industry Committee. This matter is regarded as urgent in view of the extremely difficult situation now facing the pig

industry. Co-incident to the increase in the price of wheat for stock feeding there has been in Victoria a fall of £5 per head in the price of average weight bacon pigs during November and December.

This position may have been relieved had the new price for the sale of pig meat to the United Kingdom been announced. Although the last contract with a price equivalent to 1/6 per lb. to pig producers, terminated at the end of last September and a new price of 2/- per lb. or more, was confidently anticipated by the pig industry, there has been no announcement of the new contract and at present bacon pigs are selling in Victoria at 1/8d. to 1/10d. per lb. How pig raisers and the industry as a whole should act in this critical situation could best be discussed by a joint organisation such as a State Pig Industry Committee.

The Kennel Control Council

The year 1951 was the most successful breeders and owners have experienced. Membership figures total 5,076, and when compared with the total of 185 members in 1929, the excellent progress made since the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria took over canine administration in this State is apparent.

The Annual Conference with Presidents and Secretaries of affiliates was held in the Administrative Building on the Royal Melbourne Show Grounds in November. A buffet dinner preceded the conference, which was attended by 77 representatives and it was most pleasing to note the number attending from country districts. The co-operation of the Executives is most appreciated by the Committee. Many items from the agenda were dealt with at the December meeting, and decisions reached will be published in the K.C.C. Kennel Gazette.

As usual the Annual Dinner was held in the Council Luncheon Rooms at the conclusion of the Royal Melbourne Show. Mr. W. Cockbill presided and the Royal Show Judges, Mrs. J. M. Dickson, Messrs. F. D. David, J. M. Dickson, J. J. K. Dwyer, N. Hawkless and D. T. Sinclair were the guests of honour.

There was an increase in the percentage of litters officially notified. The free insertion of the details of these in the "K.C.C. Kennel Gazette" has convinced breeders that this most effective and inexpensive form of advertising is productive of sales. Authentic information is thus recorded while it is fresh in the minds of breeders, and the ultimate comparison by the staff of the K.C.C. of this information with the particulars supplied when the puppies are submitted for registration later for showing purposes, either by the breeder or the purchasers of the puppies, leads to many serious inaccuracies being corrected and a reliable record being established.

The Annual Championship Stakes for Pointers and Setters, and Spaniels and Retrievers were held at Tarneit and Craigieburn respectively. Entries were satisfactory, and a large gallery attended the trials. The Victorian Gundog Club reported a very successful and busy season.

A total of 180 dogs and bitches gained the coveted title of "K.C.C. Champion"; three the "K.C.C. Field Trial Champion" and one the "K.C.C. Dual Champion." As the titles were awarded, congratulatory letters and certificates were sent to the breeders, as well as the owners. This service enables breeders to keep an accurate record of the successes of stock they have sold. Many letters have been received from interstate and overseas in appreciation of these breeders' certificates.

The K.C.C. One Hundred Guineas Qualifying Class at Championship Shows is still proving very popular with exhibitors and affiliates. In the finals at the Royal Melbourne 1951 Commemoration Show, a record total of 111 dogs and bitches were entered.

In drawing up the 1952 Calendar of Shows and Parades, the Committee endeavoured to finalise this difficult task to the satisfaction of the greatest possible number of Clubs. The increase from 43 in 1950 to 54 Championship Shows in 1951 is causing your Committee some concern, as four of these fixtures were held on the one day. It is felt that in the future some action will be necessary to limit the number on any one day. Agricultural Societies are allotted dates in their districts and it is therefore not possible to space these fixtures in the calendar.

Affiliations were granted the following during the current year:—Benalla A. & P. Society, Berwick A. & H. Society, Colac Kennel, Poultry and Cage Bird Club, Eaglehawk Kennel Club, Hamilton A. & P. Society, Kyabram A. H. & P. Society, Sunraysia Kennel Club and the Warragul and West Gippsland Agricultural Society.

During the year an Obedience Trial Advisory Committee was formed on similar lines to the Field Trial Advisory Committee. This Committee consists of representatives of Clubs and the Kennel Control Council. The revival of the Victorian Obedience Dog Club created much enthusiasm amongst dog owners. Training classes are held regularly and Obedience Tests have been held.

The Committee expresses its appreciation to the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria for extending its facilities to the dog world, thereby keeping its prestige on such a high plane.

The Victorian Working Sheep Dog Association

Keen interest has been shown in the activities of the Association, particularly in the Trials conducted by affiliated organisations. Six additional Societies were affiliated during the year and there are now 45 bodies throughout Victoria conducting Trials under the Rules of the Association.

Council met on five occasions during the year and dealt with many matters of vital importance to members. Several alterations were made to the Trial Rules and the "Official Intimation to Judges" was completely revised. A copy of the new "intimation" was forwarded to each judge on the Association's official panel and it is felt that this move will do much to bring about the desired uniformity in the interpretation of Trial Rules by judges.

The Council again arranged for the conduct of the annual competitions for the "Captain Payne Field" and "Cooper Utility" Trials, the former being held at Woolsthorpe and the latter at Geelong. Good entries were received and keen contests resulted.

The 1951 Royal Show Trials proved popular with competitors. The total number of entries received was 82 as compared with 58 for the previous year. The preliminaries were again conducted concurrently with the annual trials of the Geelong Agricultural and Pastoral Society.

The Trials conducted by the Association at Brenock Park, Ferntree Gully, in December, proved an outstanding success. Ninety-three entries were received and despite inclement weather there was a large gallery on the last day to witness the finals.

The Association lost one of its staunchest supporters in Mr. James L. Moore, whose death occurred during the year. The late Mr. Moore was a foundation member and in expressing sincere regret at his passing, Council placed on record appreciative acknowledgement of the invaluable services rendered by him to the Association.

Poultry Control Council

As forecast in the last report, this Council has extended its activities to embrace country Societies and although only four country bodies have affiliated up to the present, it is confidently expected that the success which attended the Shows of those bodies which did join will influence others to affiliate.

Fanciers have now become educated to the fact when a show is held under the Rules of the P.C.C. they can be satisfied that it will be well conducted and that judges from the Official Panel will give satisfaction.

The affiliation fee for country bodies has been fixed at £2/2/- and this amount is returned in the form of two trophies, which the Council makes available for competition at each affiliated Show. These trophies are always keenly contested and are much appreciated by the successful competitors.

The Committee has for some time been considering ways and means whereby the judges' panel can be extended by inclusion of competent fanciers. It has been confident that many people are competent to act as judges but have no opportunity of demonstrating their ability.

With the ready co-operation of two affiliated Clubs—the Victorian Poultry and Kennel Club and the Brighton and District Poultry Society—judges trials were arranged during the shows of those bodies and as a result the names of several new fanciers have been added to the panel.

In the last report mention was made of the fact that Mr. Anthony, the English Judge who adjudicated at the 1950 Royal Show, had undertaken to obtain a copy of a new book of Standards which was to be published by the Poultry Club of England. On receipt of this book the Committee intended to finalise and publish its own book.

Unfortunately the publication of the English book has been delayed and now Mr. Anthony is collecting a series of standards from the various specialist Clubs in England. It is expected that these will be received shortly and when they come to hand the Committee proposes to compare them with the standards which it has already drawn up and then proceed to publish its book.

Whilst this delay is regretted the Committee feels that it is correct in not proceeding with publication until it is certain that it is in line with the English Associations.

During the year it was decided to establish a library, books from which would be made available to registered exhibitors. A start has been made and now several books and pamphlets can be loaned. A charge of 2/6 is made on each book and this amount is refunded when the book is returned.

At the March meeting your Council appointed Mr. A. L. Edmonds to the Committee to fill the vacancy caused through the retirement of Mr. W. Tyzack who unfortunately is still very ill.

In October the Committee suffered a severe loss through the sudden death of Mr. Phil Patterson who was one of the original members.

A recommendation of another member to fill the late Mr. Patterson's place has been made to your Council.

The Victorian Young Farmers' Clubs Association

This Association can report a satisfactory year.

Although the policy of the Education Department to develop consolidated and group schools, and also to extend the transportation of senior pupils from primary to secondary schools, has had an adverse effect on the number of Junior Clubs, the year has shown outstanding development so far as Senior Section Clubs are concerned.

The many activities of the Association were continued and consolidated.

A party of Young Farmers visited the Sydney Show as guests of the Royal Agricultural Society of New South Wales, and whilst there took part in judging competitions, and also the winner of the Club Leadership competition in Victoria, sponsored by the Australian Broadcasting Commission, competed for the Australian Championship.

A club Leadership Competition for Girls was again conducted, the final taking place in the A.B.C. Studio at the Show Grounds, at which Miss Jeanette Brooks—daughter of His Excellency the Governor—was the guest of honour.

The Young Farmers' Pavilion had a most attractive display embodying exhibits from clubs throughout the State.

This year for the first time the exhibits were arranged according to districts and staged by club members themselves.

The A.B.C. sponsored Pig Raising Competition was again conducted, and the cured carcases which were displayed in the annexe to the Young Farmer Pavilion were again judged by Mr. L. A. Downey, the Pig Expert of the Department of Agriculture, who congratulated the competitors on having achieved the highest standard yet attained.

The Young Farmers' Pavilion was visited during the currency of the Show by His Excellency the Governor and Lady Brooks; the Rt. Hon. the Prime Minister; the Hon. the Premier and members of his Cabinet, and many other notable visitors, all of whom commended the Association on the comprehensive and interesting display.

The Annual Rally of representatives of Young Farmers' Clubs was held during the year, and Mr. C. N. McKay, in his dual capacity as President of the Victorian Young Farmers' Clubs Association and the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria, brought with him an outstanding visitor—the Rt. Rev. Dr. White Anderson, Moderator of the Church of Scotland—who spoke to those present on their responsibilities as leaders in rural communities and the national life of the State.

The second leadership camp, held at the Toc H Camp, Point Lonsdale, early in the year was well attended and the time was very profitably spent on training in leadership. Arrangements are in hand for the third such gathering to take place in February next.

The present policy of the Education Department, referred to above, has brought about a discussion of the advisability of arranging for selected teachers in different districts, to act as District Supervisors of Clubs in primary schools throughout the State, the idea being that whereever there are children of suitable age attending schools it will be possible to continue the Junior Clubs so as to maintain that interest in the land that is essential if the necessary development is to take place in the rural areas, and Australia assume its responsibility as a producer of food for the hungry nations of the world.

As has been previously stated, these Junior Clubs are looked on as the recruiting ground for the Senior Section Clubs, which are now fifty-six in number with a membership of 2250.

These Senior Clubs are in the main sponsored and fostered by agricultural societies which provide opportunities for club members to act as Stewards at their annual shows, and also provide accommodation in which club members can exhibit their project work and give demonstrations.

The formation during the year of District Councils has led to inter-club visits, discussions, debates and field days, which show great promise in the development of this movement and in the attainment of the aim with which its originators were imbued.

The Chamber of Agriculture of Victoria

The 46th Annual Convention of the Chamber, named the "Commemoration" Convention was held in Mildura on April 10th to 13th, it being the second occasion on which the Convention had been held in that city.

The Convention was well attended and it is considered one of the most successful which has vet been held.

Commemoration reviews of the progress made in four of the major primary industries made a special Convention feature for this commemoration year.

The reviews were made by the foremost authorities in their respective spheres.

Mr. D. T. Boyd, Chairman of the Australian Wool Board, gave an inspiring address on the grand history of woolgrowing, showing how individual energy, initiative, resourcefulness and freedom, had built an industry of national importance.

Prof. S. M. Wadham (Professor of Agriculture at the University of Melbourne) outlined the important lessons to be learned from the history of the Victorian Wheat Industry, particularly emphasising that farming practice had changed, and will continue to change as the research work of scientists becomes a matter for practical application.

Mr. G. C. Howey, Chairman of the Australian Dairy Produce Board, traced the evolution of the dairying industry, and Mr. D. S. Winterbottom (General Manager of the Mildura Co-op. Fruit Packing Co.) showed how the dried fruits industry had risen to its present important status.

Another innovation which attracted Australiawide interest was an Agricultural Brains Trust Session which was broadcast by the Australian Broadcasting Commission.

The chief interest in the presentation was the combined educational and entertainment value of the session; an important attribute of much successful extension work.

In opening the convention the Minister of Agriculture (The Hon. G. C. Moss, M.L.A.) complimented the Chamber on the part it had played in the development of the agriculture of the State over the years, and on the reasonable informed opinion it brought to bear on current problems.

Keen appreciation was expressed of the arrangements made, and the very warm hospitality extended to delegates by the President and members of the Mildura and District Returned Servicemen's Agricultural and Horticultural Society; the hospitality of The Mayor; the Shire President, and citizens of Mildura was also gratefully acknowledged.

A full report of convention proceedings was subsequently published in the form of a Year Book, and this has been distributed to affiliated organizations as well as other interested bodies, and libraries in both national and international spheres.

posed stadium and other facilities for holding the 1956 Olympic Games on the Royal Melbourne Show Grounds.

The letter intimated that as soon as the legal formalities associated with the registration of a company limited by guarantee were completed, this company formed to carry out the holding of the Olympic Games at Melbourne in 1956 would, in consultation with the Council, consider the completion of a legal agreement between the respective organisations.

Your Council immediately took in hand negotiations with State and Federal Governments regarding the provision of the necessary finance to enable the works to be commenced.

In October your Council received information through the Hon. the Premier that the Commonwealth Government could not see its way clear to provide funds to carry out the scheme which had been approved by the Olympic authorities.

Early in November the President communicated with the Rt. Hon. the Prime Minister, and also made a public statement to the effect that the Society was ready and willing to modify the plan submitted if requested so to do. That letter was acknowledged but to date the promised reply has not been received.

There has, however, appeared ample evidence in the press of a concerted effort to have another Ground made available for the holding of a section of the Games, but there are clear indications that the Trustees of this Ground will, as they did on a former occasion, decline the honour. Thus another full year has been lost, and as a result there is a grave possibility that the Games will not be held in Australia after all.

Your Council is of opinion that if authority to hold the Games is withdrawn by the International Olympic Committee it will be a blow to Australian prestige, but that blow will not be as serious as that that will result from the holding of different sections of the Games under makeshift conditions in different parts of the city, whereas if conducted at the Show Grounds in accordance with the Society's comprehensive and compact plan covering every section of the Games excepting cycling, rowing and yachting, they would prove to be the best advertisement Australia could get overseas.

Acknowledgements

On behalf of all members your Council again records keen appreciation of the interest taken by His Excellency the Governor in the activities of this Society.

Your Council also expresses its grateful thanks to Government Departments, Public bodies, Stud Stock Breeders' Societies, the Press and Broadcasting stations (both metropolitan and country) for their interested assistance throughout the year and particularly at Show time; to the Judges, Stewards and Stewardesses whose honorary services contributed so largely to the smooth running of the Show, and to all others who contributed to its success.

The Council

In acknowledgement of more than twenty years' valuable service as members of Council, Messrs.

Hugh McClelland, J. C. Mackinnon, and W. Cockbill were in April last appointed as Honorary Councillors.

The vacancies thus created were filled by the election of Messrs. W. B. Boothby, C. Owen Moore and R. F. Sanderson.

Special leave of absence was granted the President (Mr. C. N. McKay), Sir William Angliss, Cr. H. L. Lyall, and Dr. F. G. Stephens, each of whom travelled abroad; whilst an extension of leave was granted Mr. M. A. Nicholas whose business interests necessitated his remaining in England longer than he had anticipated.

Mr. T. Luxton, Junr., was appointed to represent this Society on the Committee of the Victorian Branch of the Equestrian Federation of Australia.

Mr. G. P. H. Wilson was heartily congratulated on having been awarded a Nuffield Foundation Travelling Scholarship which would enable him to spend not less than six months in Great Britain gaining experience in methods of farming and stock breeding. Mr. Wilson will be leaving in January and expects to return in time for our next Show.

At its meeting in August Council recorded its keen regret at the passing of Mr. J. F. Bedwell, who, because of advancing years and the state of his health, had resigned in 1949 after having occupied a seat on the Council since 1922.

Council was represented at the funeral and a message of sincere sympathy conveyed to members of the bereaved family.

Hearty congratulations were extended to the Secretary (Mr. Louis Monod) when it was announced at the January meeting that His Majesty the King had approved his appointment as an Officer of the Civil Division of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire.

Finance

Accompanying this report are the customary financial statements which have been duly audited and are set out in such detail as to be readily followed by members.

Adoption of recommendations from the special committee referred to in last report resulted in increased revenue being received from stand rentals and admissions to the Show and materially assisted in meeting the increased cost of maintaining the Society's activities.

Your Council trusts that indications that inflationary tendencies are on the wane will prove correct, and that ere long it will again be possible to operate under what we would regard as normal conditions.

A very material factor in such recovery will, of course, be greatly increased production from the land and members can rely on Council's continued efforts towards that end.





The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria

RULES

1. The name of the Society is "The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria."
2. The objects of the Society shall be to promote the development of all phases of the Agricultural, Pastoral, Horticultural, Viticultural, Stock Raising, Manufacturing and Industrial Resources of the State of Victoria, and in connection therewith:

(a) To hold, promote, assist or subsidise exhibitions, displays or shows of any nature or kind at any time or place, and to offer any kind of awards or prizes thereat if

deemed desirable so to do.

(b) To hold meetings for the purpose of fostering or popularising rural life and disseminating knowledge of methods of agriculture, and for the purpose of discussing and determining methods whereby the interests of persons engaged in any class of primary industry may be best protected or enhanced.

(c) To collect, distribute, publicise and advertise any information or details connected with or akin to the Society's objects.

- (d) To encourage, promote, establish, form or appoint clubs, bodies, councils or committees for the control or betterment of showing conditions or the exhibition of any class of live stock and also for the promotion of any particular breed or breeds of live stock or any section or part of the primary industry, and further to appoint representatives to any body on which it is deemed desirable to have representatives.
- (e) To establish, form or appoint bodies, councils or committees for the protection of primary industry or any particular class thereof, and to take action either separately or through such councils, committees or bodies to protect or promote the interests of any part or parts of the primary industry or any person or class of persons connected therewith.
- (f) To promote or assist in any way whatsoever in the improvement or development of any kind of machinery or process, whether connected with the primary or secondary industries of the State.
- (g) To promote or assist the discovery, investigation or development of equipment for agricultural purposes, construction of farm buildings, improved methods of agriculture and produce thereof, methods for the destruction of pests, methods for the eradication or utilization of weeds, methods for the improvement of stock or animals of any kind or the suitability thereof for any particular purpose, and methods for the prevention or curing of diseases in animals or plants.
- (h) To assist in the promotion of soil and water conservation, and to take such action as may be deemed desirable in connection therewith.

(i) To prepare and publish Flock Books, Herd Books, Stud Books, Journals, Magazines, Pamphlets, Essays or Papers containing information on any matters connected with any of the objects of the Society, and to establish a library or reading room.

(j) To purchase any live stock for breeding purposes and allowing farmers or any person engaged in pastoral pursuits the use

(k) To assist or subsidise competitions, exhibitions or shows in any way relating to the primary production or secondary industry of the State.

- (1) To borrow or raise or secure the payment of money in any manner whatsoever, including by mortgage or overdraft or charge or by the issue of bills of exchange or promissory notes or by borrowing money on "short call."
- (m) Generally to purchase, take or lease or licence (including building lease) or in exchange, hire or otherwise acquire any real or personal property and any rights or privileges which may be necessary or convenient for the purposes of the Society, and in particular any land, buildings, farms, easements, chattels, machinery, plant or stock.

(n) To construct, repair, maintain, alter or demolish any buildings or works for the purposes of the Society.

(o) To invest and deal with the moneys of the Society not immediately required in such manner as may from time to time be determined.

(p) To lend money to such persons or bodies and on such terms as may seem expedient for the benefit of the Society, and in particular to such bodies or organisations having objects or purposes similar to those of the Society.

(q) To sell, improve, develop, exchange, lease, mortgage, encumber, dispose of, turn to account or otherwise deal with all or any

part of the property of the Society.
(r) To do all such other things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the above objects or any of them.

INTERPRETATION.

3. In these presents, unless there be something in the subject matter inconsistent therewith:

'Society" means the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria.
"Year" means calendar year.

"The Council" means the whole or any number of the Council of the Society for the time being assembled at a meeting of the Council in accordance with the rules of the Society not being less than a quorum.

"Member" or "Members" means a member or members for the time being of the Society and where used without qualification shall be deemed to include Honorary Members, Life Governors, Life Members, Ordinary Members and Associate Members.

"Month" means calendar month.

"In writing" and "Written" means and includes printing, lithography and other modes of representing or reproducing words in visible form.

"Auditors" means the auditors for the time be-

ing of the Society.

"Secretary" includes acting Secretary.

Words importing the singular number include the plural number, and words importing the plural number include the singular. Words importing the masculine gender include the feminine gender.

THE SOCIETY.

4. The property, assets and income of the Society whencesoever derived shall be applied towards the promotion of the objects of the Society, and no portion thereof shall be paid or transferred directly or indirectly by way of dividend, bonus or otherwise, howsoever by way of profit to members of the Society. Provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent the payment in good faith of remuneration to any officers or servants of the Society or to any member of the Society or other person in return for any services actually rendered to the Society nor prevent the payment of interest on money borrowed from any member of the Society.

5. The Society shall consist of Honorary Members, Life Governors, Life Members, Ordinary

Members and Associate Members.

MEMBERSHIP.

6. Every applicant for membership of the Society shall, when making such application, state whether he desires to become a Life Governor, Life Member, Ordinary Member or Associate Member, and shall at such time pay the appropriate member's subscription and (except in the case of associate members), the name of such applicant shall be submitted to the Council for election or otherwise. The Council may refuse any application for membership without assigning any reason therefor.

7. (a) The subscription for a Life Governor shall be One Hundred Pounds.

(b) The subscription for a Life Member shall

be Fifty Pounds.

(c) The subscription for each financial year for ordinary and associate members shall as from the first day of January, 1950. be:

For Ordinary Members the sum of Three Guineas.

For Associate Members the sum of One Pound ten shillings.

(d) Annual subscriptions shall be due and payable on the first day of January in each year.

(e) The Council may at any time and from time to time vary the amount of any of the subscriptions for any class of

member.

(f) The Council may at any time appoint any person to be an Honorary Member of the Society in recognition of services rendered in promoting the objects for which the Society was established.

 (a) Only an individual person shall be eligible to be a Life Governor or a Life Member. (b) Any person, firm, corporation, society or company shall be eligible to become an ordinary member or associate member.

9. In case any firm, corporation, society, company or other body (hereinafter called a "body") desires to become an ordinary member, such body may nominate in writing a person who shall be entitled to act as a proxy for the body at all meetings of and in all dealings with the Society. The body may change such nominee from time to time but the Society shall be deemed to have fulfilled all requirements if it addresses notices, ballot papers or communications to the nominee for the time being, care of the body at its address Unless the instrument in the members' roll. appointing such nominee is deposited at the office of the Society not less than one month before the date of the meeting, which the nominee attends, or one month prior to the closing of any ballot the body concerned shall not be entitled to vote. The instrument shall remain in force until the same is changed by the body unless such instrument specifically limits the time of operation thereof. A vote or act done in accordance with or in pursuance of such instrument of nomination, shall be valid notwithstanding the previous revocation of the nomination provided that no written intimation of the revocation has been received at the office of the Society. Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained the decision of the President of the Society or of any other person or persons appointed by the Council for that purpose as to the validity of any instrument appointing a nominee or proxy, and the right of ' the nominee or proxy to vote thereunder shall be final and conclusive.

PRIVILEGES OF MEMBERSHIP.

10. The privileges of an Honorary Member of the Society shall be the right to free admission to the Society's Grounds and grand stands during shows or exhibitions conducted by the Society and also such other rights as may be determined by the Council from time to time, and such rights may vary in regard to different persons.

11. The privileges of a Life Governor, Life

Member and Ordinary Member, shall be:-

(i) Free admission to the Society's grounds and grand stands during Shows or exhibitions conducted by the Society, and such ladies' tickets as the Council may from time to time decide upon provided always that a person who became a Life Governor or Life Member prior to 2nd February, 1939, shall be entitled to two ladies' tickets.

(ii) The right to purchase up to two additional ladies' tickets at the price fixed from time

to time by the Council.

(iii) The benefits of any reciprocal arrangement which the Society has with any kindred Society.

(iv) Such reduced entry fees at shows or exhibitions conducted by the Society as the Council may from time to time determine upon.

(v) The right to vote at general meetings of the Society subject to any rules herein contained, which deal with the right to vote at meetings of the Society.

(vi) The right to a copy of the Society's Journal

free of charge.

12. The privileges of an Associate Member shall be:—

(i) Free admission to the Society's grounds and grand stands during shows or other exhibitions conducted by the Society.

(ii) Such reduced entry fees at Shows or exhibitions conducted by the Society as the Council may from time to time determine.

(iii) The right to purchase up to two ladies' tickets at the price fixed from time to time

by the Council.

(iv) If a firm, corporation, society, company or other body, then it shall have the right to pay more than one associate member's subscription in which event it shall be entitled to as many associate members' tickets as subscriptions paid.

13. The Council may at any time, and from time to time add to or vary any of the privileges of

membership herein set out.

14. A member shall not be entitled to any of the privileges of membership whilst his subscription remains unpaid, provided always that the right granted to Ordinary members by Rule 33 is not hereby prejudiced.

MEETINGS OF MEMBERS.

15. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall normally be held on the last Thursday of February in each year. Every other general meeting shall be called a "Special General Meeting."

16. The business of an annual general meeting shall be to receive and consider the annual report of the Council on the past year's operations and the Balance Sheet, to receive the declaration of the result of the election of Councillors, and to appoint two auditors. No other business shall be transacted at any annual meeting unless notice in writing shall have been given before the hour of two o'clock in the afternoon of the Monday before the second Tuesday in January, immediately preceding such meeting or before such other time as may be determined by the Council.

17. The Secretary shall convene a special general meeting upon receipt of a request made to him by the President or by two Vice-Presidents or by the Council or upon receipt of a request made to him in writing, and signed by fifty members other than Honorary or Associate members.

18. Every such request shall express the purpose for which it is required that such meeting be

convened.

- 19. No business shall be considered at any special general meeting of the Society except the particular business notified in the notice paper convening the meeting.
- 20. Notice of every general meeting of the Society setting forth the purpose for which it is convened, and the time and place at which it is to be held shall be forwarded to every Life Governor, Life Member and every Ordinary Member of the Society at his address in the Members' Roll. In the case of a firm, corporation, society, company or other body being an ordinary member the provisions of Rule 9 in regard to notices shall be observed.
- 21. The accidental omission to give any such notice mentioned in the last preceding rule shall not invalidate any resolutions passed at such meeting.
- 22. Twenty persons qualified to vote at a ballot present personally shall form a quorum for any general meeting of the Society, and no business shall be transacted unless a quorum be present.

23. If within fifteen minutes from the time appointed for a general meeting a quorum is not present the meeting if convened upon such requisition as referred to in Rule 17 shall be dissolved, but in any other case it shall stand adjourned to the same day in the next week at the same time and place, or to such other day, time and place as the President or council may by notice published in at least one Melbourne daily paper appoint.

24. The President of the Society shall take the Chair at every general meeting but if there be no President or if at any general meeting he shall not be present within ten minutes after the time appointed for holding such meeting the Senior Vice-President then present shall take the chair, and if there be no Vice-President present, the members present shall choose another member of

the Council to take the chair.

25. The Chairman shall have control of any general meeting, and his declaration of the result of any show of hands or ballot shall be conclusive.

- 26. (a) No member other than the Chairman shall speak for a longer period than ten minutes except with the consent of the meeting.
 - (b) The meeting may at any time resolve that a speaker be no further heard.
 - (c) The meeting may resolve at any time that the "Question be now put." If such resolution be carried the debate shall thereupon be closed except that the mover of the resolution before the meeting shall have a right of reply.

27. At every general meeting of the Society a ballot may be demanded by the Chairman or by at least 20 persons qualified to vote at a ballot

28. The Chairman of a general meeting may with the consent of the meeting adjourn the same from time to time and from place to place, but no business shall be transacted at any adjourned meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place.

29. At all general meetings when questions of order, procedure or interpretation of the Rules or By-laws of the Society shall arise, the ruling of the Chairman shall be accepted as final.

30. If a ballot be demanded as aforesaid it shall be taken in such manner and at such time and place as the Chairman of the meeting may direct. The demand of a ballot may be withdrawn.

31. The demand of a ballot shall not prevent the continuance of a meeting for the transaction of any business of that meeting other than the question on which the ballot was demanded.

VOTES BY MEMBERS.

- 32. On the determination of any question whether by ballot or show of hands or otherwise life governors, life members, and financial ordinary members present at a meeting shall have one vote each. Associate members shall not be entitled to be present or vote at any meetings of the Society.
- 33. Every ordinary member, who was a financial member for the year preceding the annual meeting, shall be entitled to one vote at such annual general meeting.

34. No person, firm, company, corporation or other body may, by becoming a member after the 31st December in any year and before the next annual meeting exercise any of the rights of mem-

bership at such next annual meeting.

35. Except in the case of a firm, corporation, society, company or other similar body, votes must be cast personally. In the case of a firm, corporation, society, company or other body, votes shall be cast by proxy as hereinbefore set out.

36. In all cases of equality of votes the Chairman shall have a second or casting vote.

TRUSTEES.

37. All the real and personal property of the Society now or hereafter acquired shall be, and is hereby vested in the Trustees for the time being on behalf of the Society.

38. There shall be four Trustees, one of whom shall be appointed by the Governor of the State of Victoria, and the other three shall be appointed

by the Council.

39. The Trustees holding office at the date of adoption of these rules shall continue to hold office as Trustees until their office has been vacated under the provisions of these Rules.

40. The office of trustee shall ipso facto be

vacated:

(a) if he becomes bankrupt;

(b) if he be declared lunatic;

(c) if in the opinion of the Council he becomes from any cause incapable of attending to his duties or unfit to hold office;

(d) if he resigns his office;

(e) if his membership subscription remains unpaid for more than twelve months;

(f) if he dies.

- 41. The Trustees shall deal with the property of the Society as directed by resolution of the Council (of which an entry in the Minute Book shall be conclusive evidence) and they shall be indemnified against any liability, loss, expense or risk out of the funds and property of the Society. COUNCILLORS.
- 42. The members of the Council as constituted as at the date of the adoption of these rules shall continue in office as Councillors until their respective offices be vacated in accordance with the rules.

43. Councillors shall hold office for three years, one-third retiring annually in rotation, but those retiring shall be eligible for re-election.

- 44. Notwithstanding anything herein contained, a Councillor shall ipso facto cease to hold office as such if he:
 - (a) becomes bankrupt;

(b) be declared lunatic;

(c) in the opinion of the Council becomes from any cause incapable or unfit to hold office;

(d) resigns his office;

- (e) absents himself from three or more consecutive meetings of the Council without leave of absence from the Council;
- (f) allows his membership subscription to remain unpaid for more than twelve months;

(g) dies.

45. Should any vacancy occur in the office of Councillor between annual meetings through death, resignation or otherwise, such vacancy shall be filled by the Council and the substituted Councillor so elected shall hold office for the unexpired period of his predecessor's term of office.

46. At each annual meeting of the Society the eleven councillors, who have been longest in office

shall retire.

For the purpose of this rule the length of time a Councillor has been in office shall be computed from the date of his last election or appointment, except as provided in the last preceding clause.

47. At the monthly meeting of the Council held in January or at some other convenient time the Council shall prepare a list of persons nominated by them to fill the vacancies in the Council occurring at the next annual meeting. Every candidate for the office of Councillor (other than those nominated by the Council as aforesaid) shall be nominated in writing by two members other than Honorary or Associate Members, and the full name of every such candidate, together with the names of his two nominators, and his own written consent to stand as a candidate, shall be lodged with the Secretary before two o'clock in the afternoon of the Monday immediately preceding the second Tuesday in January prior to the Annual General Meeting. Every candidate must be either a Life Governor or a Life Member or a financial Ordinary member at the time of nomination.

48. Unless otherwise determined by a three-fourths majority at a meeting of the Council, an election shall, when the nominations exceed the vacancies be by ballot, and the following provisions shall have effect:

At least 14 days prior to the annual general meeting the Secretary or his deputy shall send to all Life Governors, Life and ordinary members at their address in the members' roll of the Society a ballot paper containing in alphabetical order the names of the candidates. With such ballot paper shall be enclosed an envelope addressed to "The Returning Officer," care of the Secretary, and a smaller envelope marked "Ballot Paper." The accidental or inadvertant omission to forward such ballot paper and envelopes to any or some of the aforesaid persons shall not invalidate the ballot. Where a firm, corporation, society, company or other body is an ordinary member the provisions of Rule 9 shall be observed in regard to the posting of ballot papers.

49. Votes shall be recorded by striking out on the ballot paper the names of candidates for whom it is not wished to vote. Every member voting shall vote for as many candidates as there are vacancies to be filled and no more or less.

50. Ballot papers shall be placed in the smaller envelopes sent out by the Secretary and marked "Ballot Paper," and such envelopes, when sealed, shall be placed in the larger envelope addressed to "The Returning Officer." The member voting shall sign his name in the space provided on the larger envelope when a vote is cast by the nominee of a firm, corporation, society, company or other body, the nominee shall sign his own name in addition to the member's name.

offices at least fourteen days before the annual general meeting, and members or nominees entitled to vote may deposit therein the envelopes addressed to the returning officer and containing their ballot papers at any time prior to the close of the poll. The envelopes addressed to the Returning officer and containing the ballot paper may be sent by post or other means, but they must arrive at the office of the Society prior to the close of the poll. All votes so sent to the Returning Officer shall be placed in the ballot box as soon as received.

52. The poll shall close at five o'clock on the Tuesday before the day on which the annual general meeting is to be held or some other conveni-

ent date fixed by the Council.

53. The President, or should he fail so to do, then the Council, shall appoint a returning officer for the purpose of conducting the ballot, taking charge of the voting papers and counting the votes cast. The returning officer shall, on the completion of the counting of the votes, communicate to the President or his deputy, the result of the poll. The Chairman of the Annual Meeting shall declare the result of the ballot at such meeting, and the declaration by the Chairman of the result of the ballot shall be final and conclusive.

54. Each candidate for election may at his own expense appoint another person to be present at the examination of the voting and the counting of

the votes.

- 55. In the case of two or more candidates receiving an equal number of votes the President or his deputy shall have a second or casting vote.

56. The validity of any vote or votes shall be determined by the returning officer whose decision in this regard shall be final and conclusive.

57. Except as herein provided each Councillor shall hold office until the dissolution of the annual general meeting at which his successor is appointed.

HONORARY COUNCILLORS.

58. After a person has been a Councillor of the Society for a period of twenty years the Council shall have the power to appoint him an Honorary Councillor of the Society, and upon the Council so doing, such person shall thereupon cease to be an elected Councillor, and his office as such shall become vacant.

59. All Honorary Councillors of the Society shall be permanent members of the Council, and subject only to termination of their office as provided by the next succeeding rule, and they shall be entitled to all the privileges of a Councillor.

60. An Honorary Councillor shall ipso facto

cease to hold office if he:

(a) becomes bankrupt;(b) be declared lunatic;

(c) in the opinion of the Council becomes from any cause incapable or unfit to hold office;

(d) resigns his office;

(e) allows his membership subscription to remain unpaid for more than twelve months;

(f) dies.

COUNCIL.

61. The business and affairs of the Society shall be under the management and control of a council. The Council may exercise all the powers of the Society and do all such acts and things as may be exercised or done by the Society or which, it considers is necessary or expedient to carry out the objects of the Society.

62. The Council shall have the entire management of the income and funds of the Society and all other affairs thereof, and the members of the Society shall for these purposes be deemed to have constituted the Council their duly authorised

agents.

63. The Council shall have power from time to time to make, amend, enlarge or revoke such bylaws as they deem necessary for effectively carrying out the objects of the Society or any of them.

64. The Council shall consist of:

(a) Thirty-three members, who shall be elected

to the Council from life governors, the life members and ordinary members of the Society in the manner herein provided, and who are in these rules referred to as "Councillors."

(b) The four trustees hereinbefore mentioned.

(c) The Honorary Councillors appointed to such positions in the manner herein provided.

PROCEEDINGS OF COUNCIL.

65. The Council shall hold periodical meetings for the despatch of business and may adjourn and otherwise regulate its meetings as it thinks fit.

66. The quorum for all meetings of the Council shall be ten. If within half-an-hour after the time for which any meeting of the Council is called a quorum is not present, then the members present or the majority of them or the Secretary if no member be present, may adjourn such meeting to a time not longer than 14 days.

67. The Council shall at their first meeting after the annual meeting in each year or as occasion may require, elect out of their own number (which includes Trustees and Honorary Councillors if any), a President and three Vice-Presidents.

68. In the absence of the President the Chair shall be taken by the Senior Vice-President then present, and should none of these officers be present, then by such member as the Council shall choose as their Chairman. The Senior Vice-President shall be deemed to mean the Vice-president, who has been a member of the Council for the greatest number of years in the aggregate.

69. The President or any four members of the Council may request that a meeting of the Council be called to consider any particular matter or matters and the Secretary, upon receipt of such request shall convene a meeting of the Council.

70. Questions arising at any meeting of the Council shall be decided by a majority of votes of those present at such meeting. In case of an equality of votes the Chairman shall have a second or casting vote.

COMMITTEES.

71. The Council may delegate any of its powers to a committee or committees consisting of such members of the Council as it thinks fit, and may, from time to time, alter or revoke any such delegation or alter, add to or vary the members of any such committee. Any committee so formed shall, in the exercise of the powers delegated, conform to any regulations that may from time to time be imposed upon it by the Council, and shall report to the Council as soon as possible any action it has taken or decision it has made in the exercise of such powers. All acts done at any meeting of any such committee shall be valid notwithstanding any defect in the appointment or qualification of any member or any defect in the procedure adopted at any such meeting. casual vacancy occurring in any committee may be filled by the Council.

72. Without limiting the generality of the power contained in the last preceding rule the Council may appoint a Special Committee, which shall have power inter alia to investigate and determine any question or matter relating to the conduct of a member or members and in particular to exercise the power of expulsion of members or to impose any other penalty on any person.

73. The Special Committee may expel from the Society or otherwise punish or penalise any

member whose conduct, in the opinion of such committee, is discreditable or injurious to the character or interests of the Society or renders him unfit to associate with members of the Society or who fails to comply with any direction or request of the Council within a reasonable time or who fails to comply with any rules governing any show or exhibition conducted by the Society or disregards or fails to observe any direction or decision of any official or judge appointed by the Society.

74. Before any member is expelled or otherwise punished or penalised his conduct shall be inquired into by the Special Committee, and he shall be given an opportunity to defend himself and to justify or explain his conduct. If a majority of the Special Committee present when the matter is enquired into are of the opinion that the member has been guilty of such conduct or action as aforesaid then such Committee may expel or suspend him from membership or disqualify, fine or otherwise punish or penalise him. In the event of the member being expelled from membership, or in the event of any member not obeying or complying with any other penalty imposed by the said Committee, then his name shall be removed from the roll of members and he shall thereupon cease to be a member.

75. The Special Committee shall have power to enquire into and determine all questions relating to protests or disputes arising at or in connection with any show or other exhibition conducted by the Society, and to determine the eligibility of any particular person or exhibit for any particular event, class or competition.

76. The Special Committee shall have power to enquire into all matters concerning the conduct of any exhibitor or competitor at any show or exhibition, and after enquiring into such conduct to impose such penalty, suspension or disqualification as to it seems just.

77. Any person being expelled from membership or disqualified from exhibiting or competing by any kindred Society shall, if such expulsion or disqualification is confirmed by the Council, not be allowed to become or remain a member of this Society or to exhibit or compete at any of the Society's shows or exhibitions until such expulsion has been rescinded or such disqualification removed.

78. Any person affected by any decision of the

Special Committee may appeal therefrom to the Council of the Society. Any such person desiring to appeal shall within fourteen days after the decision of the Special Committee lodge with the Secretary of the Society notice of his intention to appeal together with a deposit of £5.

79. On hearing such appeal the Council may vary, alter, increase, reverse or otherwise amend the decision come to by the Special Committee, and the decision of the Council upon the matter shall be final and conclusive. The Council may give such direction as to the disposal of the deposit of £5 as it deems fit.

80. Without limiting the generality of the provisions of Rule 71 the Council may appoint a Finance Committee which shall have the immediate care of the Society's funds, and shall have the power (in addition to any other duties or powers delegated to it by the Council) to pass accounts for payment and to deal with urgent or special matters requiring attention between meetings of

the Council. The Finance Committee shall make a report to each meeting of the Council of the action taken by it between Council meetings.

81. Unless otherwise herein provided the Council shall be the sole authority for the interpretation of these rules and any By-laws or Regulations made thereunder, and the decision of the Council upon any question of interpretation or upon any matter affecting the Society or the administration of its affairs or of the procedure to be adopted in reference to any particular matter shall be final and binding on all members.

FINANCE AND AUDIT.

82. The financial year of the Society shall commence on the first day of January in each year and end on the thirty-first day of December following.

83. At least once in every year the accounts of the Society shall be examined and the correctness of the accounts and balance sheet ascertained and

certified by two auditors.

84. The Society at the annual general meeting in each year shall appoint two auditors to hold office until the annual general meeting in the following year. The Council may fill any casual vacancy in the office of auditor, but while any such vacancy continues the surviving or continuing auditor may act. Every auditor appointed shall hold a licence as auditor issued in accordance with the Victorian Companies Act.

85. The remuneration of the auditors shall be

fixed by the Council.

86. No person, other than a retiring auditor, shall be appointed at a general meeting unless a nomination signed by two life and/or ordinary members, together with a notice in writing, signed by the person so nominated, expressing his willingness to act as auditor, shall have been left with the Secretary of the Society at least 14 days before the holding of the meeting.

87. Every Auditor of the Society shall have a right of access at all times to the books, accounts and vouchers of the Society, and shall be entitled to require from the Council officers and servants of the Society such information and explanations as may be necessary for the performance of the

duties of auditor.

MEMBERS' ROLL AND NOTICES.

88. There shall be kept in the office of the Society a roll containing the names and address of all Honorary Members, Life Governors, Life and Ordinary Members, and Associate Members.

89. A notice may be served by the Society upon any member either personally or by sending it through the post, addressed to such member at his address entered in the members' ron. Notices to firms, corporations, societies, companies or other bodies, who are members, may be served in accordance with Rule 9.

90. Any notice sent by post shall be deemed to have been served on the day following that on

which it was posted.

91. Where a given number of days' notice or notice extending over any other period is required to be given, the day of service shall, unless otherwise provided, be counted in such number of days or other period.

INDEMNITY.

92. Every member of the Council, Trustee, Secretary, Manager or other officer of the Society, shall be indemnified out of the funds and assets of the Society against any risk, expense or lia-

bility incurred by him as a member of the Council

Trustee, or as an officer of the Society.

93. Every person becoming a member of the Society shall thereby indemnify and shall, with every other member be bound to indemnify the Council and the individual members thereof and the Trustees against any action in respect of anything done or purported to have been done in the exercise or purported exercise of their powers or duties hereunder.

MISCELLANEOUS.

94. Every person becoming a member of the Society and the nominee of every firm, society, company or other body, which is a member of the Society shall, when required so to do by the Council or Secretary, give evidence by statutory declaration or otherwise of any facts within his

knowledge or information relating to any particular subject matter before the Council or the Special Committee or any other Committee.

95. These Rules shall not be altered except by a majority of members present at a General

Meeting.

96. Wherever in these Rules the time, day or date is fixed for the doing of any act matter or thing or a time or day is fixed within any act is to be done, then the Council may, without assigning any reason therefor, enlarge, abridge or alter such time, day or date.

97. Where no time or date is fixed in these rules for the doing of any particular act, matter or thing, the Council may fix such time or date as to it is considered convenient.
