PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO MEMBERS

Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is my pleasure on behalf of the Council to present the report of the Society's activities for the year ending December 31, 1972.

The past 12 months have been outstanding in the history of your Society with a record breaking Royal Show and progress in every aspect of the Society's activities.

Near to \$400,000 has been spent on improvements, alterations and additions to the Showgrounds over the period. The new Cattle Pavilion, situated alongside the Nicholas Jersey Pavilion, was erected at a cost of \$250,000. Other improvements include the reconstruction of the Sir William Angliss Art Gallery (previously the Fleeces Hall); extensive alterations and additions in the Arts & Crafts Pavilion; installation of ticket-selling machines at the western entrances from the V.R.C. car park and at No. 1 Gate (Degraves Street) where new turnstiles were also erected.

Other main works included sewering of cattle pavilions and washes; alterations to sheep pens; construction of additional cooking facilities for exhibitors; renewal of the Pig Pavilion roof; the purchase of a horse ambulance and alterations and improvements in other pavilions.

THE 1972 ROYAL SHOW

The Society adopted an historical theme for the 1972 Royal Show, which was conducted from September 21 to 30. The theme was a combined tribute, firstly to the founders of the National Agricultural Society of Victoria, and secondly, to the Victorian Department of Agriculture which was formed on June 19, 1872. Special medallions were struck, and sashes, ribbons and award cards provided to commemorate the event.

The Royal Show was extended to 10 days and 10 nights for the first time and under ideal weather conditions created a record attendance of 916,730, which exceeds the previous record in 1971 by 28,321. Individual records were created for the first Thursday evening; the first Friday; both Saturday evenings; Sunday evening; Tuesday evening and Wednesday evening.

This is the first time the attendance has passed 900,000 and the sixth successive year in which attendance records have been broken.

The Official Opening ceremony was performed by His Excellency The Right Honourable Sir Paul Hasluck, G.C.M.G., K.C.V.O., K.St.J., Governor-General of Australia and Patron in Chief of the Society, at 8.00 p.m. on Saturday, September 23.

The arena programme was again a most entertaining one with special features including an historical parade of horse-drawn vehicles and early model motor vehicles; the Flying Carellas; The Precision Car Driving Team; The Australian Gold Cup Tent Pegging series and interstate polo-cross competitions. Besides the feature items, 306 horse classes were judged in the arena over the period of the Royal Show.

In keeping with the historical aspect of the Royal Show many stand-holders produced articles with historical significance on their stands and in their pavilions.

The Government Pavilion contained many reminders of past farming practices in the way of equipment and produce. The Society erected a huge exhibition stand and supplied much of the produce for it in the Government Pavilion this year as a tribute to the Victorian Department of Agriculture's centenary.

The Society also continued with its own farm produce display in Centenary Hall.

In conjunction with the 1972 Royal Show the Society conducted the Sir William Angliss Art Competition.

This competition was for a prize of \$5,000 donated by Mrs. Adrian Gibson, granddaughter of the late Sir William Angliss, and resulted in 25 entries being received and a win for Perth artist, Mr. George Haynes.

ENTRIES

Total entries made an all-time record of 30,184, which is 2,731 above the previous record created in 1971.

The Horse entry of 5,402 was 17 above that of last year with new records for Palominos, Stallions and riding competitions.

The Connemaras were shown in competition for the first time and had 21 entries.

Lack of accommodation once again forced the Council to restrict numbers in the Horse Section.

Interest in the Fat and Beef Cattle classes continues to be maintained with entries constantly rising. Fat cattle entries rose to 364 which was 121 above the record created last year.

Three breeds of beef cattle recorded best ever entries; these were:— Santa Gertrudis, Murray Greys and Brangus, whilst Charolais were shown in competition for the first time and South Devons for the first time since 1935.

In the Dual Purpose breeds, Dairy Shorthorns again had a record entry and Red Polls improved on last year's figure.

Overall entries in the Dairy breeds were up 32 on last year with a record entry in the Friesian classes.





Although there was an overall decrease of 50 entries in the Sheep Section on those of 1971, five of the 12 breeds had increased entries on last year.

Pig entries were the best ever with 928 plus 230 carcase entries, and Trade Lamb, Sheep Shearing, Goats, Poultry, Farm Produce, Floriculture, Photography, Wood Chopping, Young Farmer competitions, and Farm Gadgets all showed increases on entries from last year.

New records were established in Arts & Crafts, Cats and the Dog Section.

For the first time the Dog entry passed 5,000 with the huge total of 5,557 entries making it the biggest section in the 1972 Royal Show.

A comparative list of all entries appears at the back of this report.

JUDGES AND STEWARDS

The Council invited eight overseas judges to officiate at the 1972 Royal Show.

Mr. Frank Young, Castle Douglas, Kirkcudbrightshire, Scotland, judged the Galloway beef cattle and Ayrshires; Mr. T. Fleming, Rangiora, Canterbury, New Zealand, judged the Jerseys; Mr. J. W. Risi, Ngaruawahia, New Zealand, judged Large White pigs; Miss L. A. Moran, Wellington, New Zealand, cats; Miss Ann Hammond, Stretchworth, Essex, England, and Mrs. Gold, Brackwell, Berkshire, England, judged the horse classes.

The record breaking dog classes were judged by Mr. Maxwell Riddle, of Ravenna, Ohio, U.S.A., and Mrs. Carin Lindhe, of Freden, Vallentura, Sweden.

On behalf of the Council and Members of the Society, I extend sincere thanks to the many skilled judges from all States who so ably supported our overseas judges, also thanks to the honorary stewards, stewardesses, and other officials for their co-operation and their huge contribution to the success of the 1972 Royal Show.

OTHER ROYAL AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY ACTIVITIES


1. Breed Societies

In June 1972 the Murray Grey Beef Cattle Society moved its headquarters from the R.A.S.V. This Society has had a spectacular rise in popularity over recent years and much of the credit for its sound financial position must be attributed to the guidance and administration provided by the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria.

The total number of breed societies and allied agricultural organisations now being administered by the R.A.S.V. is 39.

In previous Annual Reports we have endeavoured to alert societies and organisations to the effect that they would face increased costs, especially those of salaries, and unfortunately, over the past year this situation has not been eased.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

1. In recent years the Society has entered into agreements whereby money has been lent to the Society for the construction of buildings and improvements on Society land. Increased rentals have in the past been offset against loan repayments and neither the asset nor the liability was shown in the Balance Sheet. This position has been rectified and all assets, liabilities and past rentals have now been brought into account.

2. The Council have made a revaluation of Land and Buildings to show a more realistic value than that shown in previous Balance Sheets.

We are constantly working to contain costs on breed societies' behalf, but appreciate that the R.A.S.V. in promoting and fostering breed societies will always be required to bear some of the total costs.

2. Competitions

(a) The Victorian Farm Management, Production and Improvement Competition.

Forty-four properties were entered in this year's Competition and 22 Group finalists were visited by the State judging panel.

Section winners were:-

Section A: J. I. & R. M. Saunders, Princetown.

Section B: K. & D. C. Godde, Tallandoon.

With the new approach of the selection of properties by Victorian Agricultural Societies Association Groups for future competitions, it is anticipated that still greater interest will be shown in this competition.

I express the thanks of my Society to the Commonwealth Banking Corporation for its continued support and to the judges, along with the Victorian Agricultural Societies Association and officers of the Victorian Department of Agriculture for their services and co-operation.

(b) Farm Competitions Association

In spite of adverse seasonal conditions in some areas the crop competitions were again well supported with District Champions exhibiting crops of a very high standard.

(c) The District Fleece Competition

Country agricultural societies again gave good support to the District Fleece Competition with a total of 63 entries.

The judges praised the high standard of the winning fleeces in a very even competition.

The proceeds from the sale of these fleeces was donated to the Legacy organisation by the Society.

Again on your behalf I take this opportunity to express the Society's thanks to all sponsors, judges and competitors of the competitions conducted during the past year.

3. Journalists' Tour

The annual Shell/R.A.S.V. Journalists' Tour for 1972 was conducted through the Western and Central areas of Victoria.

Sponsored by the Shell Group of Companies for the sixteenth consecutive year, the Tour placed emphasis on historical aspects as a tribute to the Victorian Department of Agriculture in its Centenary Year.

Held in the first week in August, it gave media representatives an opportunity to record progress made in research over the years by the Department of Agriculture and C.S.I.R.O., and to visit properties and places of historical significance in areas around Geelong and Ballarat.

Further, the tour members were able to meet Royal Show exhibitors and see some of the best stock in the country in course of preparation for the Royal Show.

Mr. R. T. Balderstone, M.C., was the Tour Leader and his knowledge of the area and hosts was of great assistance to all concerned with the Tour.

FINANCE

The almost perfect weather contributed to a record attendance which enabled the Society to increase its revenue to an all-time high. This revenue increase was nearly dissipated by increases in all cost items more particularly wages and salaries. If costs continue to rise the Society will be forced to consider increases in admission charges, space rentals or other revenue items where such increases can be substantiated.

For a number of years the Fixed Assets of the Society have been conservatively valued in the Balance Sheet. The Council recommended that they should be revalued and shown in the Balance Sheet at a more realistic figure. Accordingly this revaluation has been effected. As you can see the Society's financial position is quite sound.

DIRECTOR RETIRES

At the conclusion of the 1972 Royal Show Mr. H. T. C. Woodfull, O.B.E., retired as Director of the Society.

Mr. Woodfull was appointed Secretary in 1954 and Director in 1963. His sound advice and guidance have been responsible for the most progressive period in the long history of the Society.

His assistance to me and those Presidents preceding me has been of the utmost importance to this Society, and although his services will not be entirely lost to the R.A.S.V. we wish he and Mrs. Woodfull a long and happy retirement.

The Council appointed Mr. Harley John Clappison to the position of Director earlier in the year and he had the opportunity to work with Mr. Woodfull over the 1972 Royal Show.

With his excellent background and tremendous drive, Mr. Clappison will prove a worthy successor to Mr. Woodfull and a great asset to the Society.

CHANGES IN COUNCIL

It has been our pleasure to welcome to Council Mr. F. R. I. Stephens who replaces Mr. F. E. S. Scott, M.B.E. Mr. Stephens is the son of the late Doctor Frank Stephens, who was a Vice-President of the Society and a most valued Council Member for many years.

We extend congratulations to Mr. F. E. S. Scott, M.B.E., on his election to Life Councillor after a period of 20 years' service to the Council.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Our Society would find it almost impossible to function without the assistance so freely given by organisations and individuals, and on your behalf I wish to express sincere appreciation to all concerned.

Our sincere thanks are extended to the retired Premier, the Honorable Sir Henry Bolte, and the Premier, the Honorable R. J. Hamer, and Cabinet members, especially the Honorable Sir Gilbert Chandler, for their continued assistance and co-operation.

The Society is most conscious of the help given by Dr. Wishart, the Director of Agriculture, and officers of his Department, the members of the Australian Wool Board, the Australian Meat Board, the Meat and Allied Trades Federation, the Victorian Egg Board, and the Milk Board, and the many Government and semi-Government organisations, which we call on for advice and assistance.

The Society would also like to express thanks to the Victoria Racing Club, which gave great assistance during the Royal Show in providing car parking facilities and in organising our free bus service.

Special thanks is expressed to those members of the Press, Radio and Television services who gave an excellent coverage to the Royal Show.

We are most grateful to our many donors, sponsors, standholders, and exhibitors, without whose support we would not be able to function.

As it is my intention not to seek re-election, I wish to record my sincere personal thanks and appreciation to all members of Council for their support and for the efficient and unselfish manner in which they have served the interests of the Society during my term as President.

I take this opportunity to express my indebtedness to my Vice-Presidents, past and present, for the loyal and uncompromising manner in which they have supported me and their service to the Society over the past nine years.
