President's report to members

Ladies and Gentlemen,

In this my first year as President, I have pleasure, on behalf of the Council to present to you the report of the Society's activities for the year ending 31st December, 1973.

The year under review has again been a memorable one for the Society in that record entries were received for the Royal Show and the attendance of 913,834 was the second highest on record. The Council is anxious to make more use of the Showgrounds during the year, to improve buildings and facilities and update the whole complex. The Planning Committee elected for this purpose has already met to consider ways and finance available to implement the Council's wishes.

Just on \$150,000 has been expended on improvements, alterations, additions and maintenance. These include new turnstiles on Epsom Road and the Western area requiring new entrances at these points; purchase of new removable cattle pens; additional seating in the Mitchell Grandstand; alterations in the Administration Building, and completing the programme of sewering stock pavilions.

For the second year the Royal Show was conducted over 10 days and 10 nights from September 20 to 29 inclusive.

OFFICIAL OPENING

This year the Official Opening Ceremony was held at 2.30 p.m. on Saturday, September 22, and was followed by the Grand Parade.

His Excellency Major-General Sir Rohan Detacombe, K.C.M.G., K.C.V.O., K.B.E., C.B., D.S.O., K.St.J., performed the Official Opening for the last time as Governor of Victoria.

Nobody has shown more interest and support for the Royal Show than His Excellency and Lady Delacombe, and we sincerely thank them and wish them well when they leave Victoria.

OTHER DISTINGUISHED GUESTS

We were privileged to have amongst our other quests on this occasion. The Right Hon. The Lord Mayor of Melbourne, Cr. A. J. Whalley, and Lady Mayoress; The Prime Minister, The Hon, E. G. Whitlam and Mrs. Whitlam: The Hon Vernon F. Wilcox, Q.C., M.P., Attorney-General representing the Premier; Brigadier D. C. Crompton, O.B.E. - representing the G.O.C. Southern Command, and Mrs. Crompton; His Worship The Mayor of Essendon, Cr. B. T. Bainbridge, and the Mayoress, Mrs. I. Stewart; Air Vice-Marshal G T Newstead, C.B.E., and Mrs. Newstead.

ARENA ATTRACTIONS

A most comprehensive arena programme was presented and featured circus acts from Sole Bros. circus; the Acapulco high divers; the Precision Car Driving Team; Polo: the Australian Gold Cup Tent Pegging series; Dressage demonstrations, and parades of historical horse-drawn vehicles. Besides the main attractions mentioned. 314 horse classes were judged in the main arena.

VICTORIA POLICE JUBILEE

The Society paid tribute to the Victoria Mounted Police: on the occasion of the Jubilee of performing the musical ride at the Royal Melbourne Show, by giving them the honour of leading the Grand Parade.

ENTRIES, NEW RECORD

Total Entries for the 1973 Royal Show created a new record with a figure of 31,385 which was 1,201 greater than that of last year's record.

12 INTERNATIONALS

Twelve international judges accepted invitations to adjudicate at the 1973 Royal Melbourne Show.

Dr. Harlan D. Ritchie, Michigan State University, U.S.A., judged Angus, fat cattle (alive) classes and was a member of the panel in the Beel Cattle Judging Demonstration and Competition.



other R.A.S.V. activities

BREED SOCIETIES:

The R.A.S.V as part of its aims and objects has always endeavoured to encourage and support the formation and activities of Breed Societies.

Secretarial services for these organisations have been provided and to a large extent subsidised by the R.A.S.V. but increased costs, especially those of wages and salaries, continue to cause concern in budgeting.

Loyalty, understanding, and discussion are the three factors which are needed to continue the splendid co-operation which has always been apparent between the R.A.S.V. and these organisations.

We welcome a number of new Societies including the Blonde d'Aquitaine Society of Australia, the Australian Limousin Breeders' Society, the Galloway Beef Cattle Society of Australia and the Australian Stock Horse Society.

COMPETITIONS:

(a) FARM COMPETITIONS ASSOCIATION:

The Crop Competitions continued to attract good support in the 1972-73 season but seasonal conditions lowered overall yields on those of the previous year.

(b) THE VICTORIAN FARM MANAGEMENT, PRODUCTION AND IMPROVEMENT COMPETITION:

in all 26 Group finalists were nominated to compete in the 1973 Competition, this was an increase of four on last year.

Section winners were:

Section A (up to \$140,000 Gross Capital Investment).

R. M. & L. E. Johnson, Neerim South, nominated by the Central and South Gippsland Group.

Section B (over \$140,000 Gross Capital Investment).

K. H. & V. A. Cassidy, Newstead, nominated by the Northern Group,

Again the responsibility for selecting State finalists was left to the V.A.S.A. Groups and the finalists were excellent farmers and managers. I take this opportunity on my Council's behalf to express appreciation to the Commonwealth Banking Corporation for continued support and additional prize money for the 1974 Competition; the judges who travelled the length and breadth of the State; the Department of Agriculture for the services of its expert officers and V.A.S.A. Groups for their excellent cooperation.

(c) THE DISTRICT FLEECE COMPETITION:

Good support was again given by country agricultural societies to the District Fleece Competition, which resulted in 69 entries — an increase of six on last year.

The winning fleeces were again of high quality in an even competition.

PRE-ROYAL SHOW JOURNALISTS'

The 1973 Shell/R.A.S.V Journalists' Tour was conducted through the Central and Wimmera areas of the State.

Held in the first week of August and sponsored by the Shell Group of Companies for the 17th consecutive year, the Tour gave media representatives a rare opportunity to appreciate the revival of the wheat and sheep industries and follow the progress, in the areas visited, of the beet cattle industry boom.

Excellent exhibitions of stock, produce and craftwork were organised by the Bendigo and Horsham Agricultural Societies.

R.A.S.V. Vice-President, Mr. R. T. Balderstone, M.C., was Tour Leader and proved again an outstanding representative for the Society.

Changes in council

The past year has been a sad one for the Council with the deaths of His Honour Judge Norman Frederick Mitchell, C.M.G., in March; Mr. W. C. Greaves, O.B.E., in August; Mr. A. H. Richards, in September, and Mr. A. E. Dahlenberg, in October.

His Honour Judge Mitchell, joined the Council in 1940, was Vice-President from 1952 to 1957 and President from 1957 to 1963 and a Trustee from 1949 until his death. He was the driving force behind the K.C.C., and was Chairman of the Trotting Control Board from 1953 until 1957.

The late Mr. W. C. Greaves, joined the Council in 1936, was Vice-President from 1944 to 1949 and made an Honorary Life Councillor in 1957. An "all-rounder", he was associated with horses, sheep and the build up of the Centenary Hall.

Mr. A. E. Dahlenberg was elected to Council also in 1936, and was created an Honorary Life Councillor in 1960. He will long be remembered for his work in connection with the Horse Section, especially the Clydesdales.

Mr. A. H. Richards was a comparative newcomer to Council having been elected in December, 1971. He served the Society well in the short time we were privileged to work with him.

All those referred to above contributed greatly to the progress of the Society and will be most difficult to replace.

CONGRATULATIONS

We offer congratulations to Mr. J. M. Buchanan, Mr. J. M. Gardiner and Mr. David W. R. Knox, on their election to Honorary Life Councillors, and welcome to the Council, Messrs, J. M. Burston, J. K.
