## PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO MEMBERS

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I take pleasure on behalf of the Council to present to you the report of the Society's activities and functions for the year ending December 31, 1971.

Substantial progress has again been made by your Society over the past 12 months in work for breed societies and allied organisations, and in improvements to the Showgrounds.

The improvements, alterations and additions to the grounds may not appear to have been as spectacular as last year but nevertheless essential works such as the new electricity sub-station; the reconditioning of the light towers; the renewing of portion of the arena fence; extensions to a number of toilet blocks; replacement of arena equipment; extensive alterations to the Arts & Crafts Pavillon minor alterations in practically all pavilions, and many big painting jobs, including the Administrative Building and Arts and Crafts Pavilion, had the grounds prepared to the best advantage for the 1971 Royal Show.

#### THE 1971 ROYAL SHOW

The 1971 Royal Show was conducted from September 16 to 25, and although the condition of certain rural industries and a strike of carpenters just prior to the Show caused the Council apprehension, these proved to have little bearing on what was considered a most successful Royal Show.

The overall weather conditions were much more favourable than last year, but rain no doubt reduced attendances on the first Saturday, People's Day and the last Saturday evening.

In spite of this the 1971 Royal Show was still able to create a new overall attendance record of 888,409, which exceeds the 1970 record by 78,176. Individual records were created on both Friday evenings; Sunday, and the last Saturday.

It is of interest to record that this is the fifth successive year in which attendance records have been broken and the fourth year in succession in which the 750,000 mark has been passed.

A break with tradition occurred this year when the Official Opening Ceremony was performed at 8.00 p.m. on Saturday, September 18, in front of the Vice Regal Box on the arena by His Excellency Major-General Sir Rohan Delacombe, K.C.M.G., K.C.V.O., K.B.E., C.B., D.S.O., K. St. J., Governor of Victoria. This function, although streamlined was nevertheless carried out with dignity and was very well received.

The arena programme was a most entertaining one with special features including the Flying Carellas, three members of the Lohtar family performing on high sway poles and a high trapeze; The Precision Car Driving Team; interstate tent-pegging and polo-crosse teams.

More than usual interest was shown in the Three Day Event this year with the selection of the team for the Munich Olympic Games being made following the third phase, Show Jumping, on Monday, September 20.

The Country Show Girl Competition, in its second year of the new format, carried the additional inducement of a South Seas holiday for two to Tahiti, generously provided by the Management of the Southern Cross Hotel.

The winner, Miss Ellen Van Den Einden, representing the Wangaratta Society, carried out her Showtime tasks in a most co-operative manner.

Appreciation is again expressed to the Sun-News Pictorial and the Management of the Southern Cross Hotel for their continued support.

Following the successful re-introduction of the farm produce display last year, the Society continued with a further display this year which was very well received by Show patrons.

#### ENTRIES


Total entries reached an all-time record with 27,453, which is 161 above the previous record created in 1970.

The Horse entry of 5,385 was 79 above that of last year with the entry in riding competitions recording a best ever 1,441 entries. Again lack of accommodation forced the Council to restrict numbers in this Section.

As was predicted last year, the fat cattle and beef cattle classes created tremendous interest. On judging day all judging rings were packed to capacity and judges' comments indicated the standard high and the overall showing excellent.

At the W. Angliss and Co. (Aust) Pty. Ltd., meat works on Saturday, September 18, when the carcases were on display and judges gave their comments, it was not possible to accommodate all those interested.

Five breeds of beef cattle created all time record entries and the Brangus breed was shown for the first time. Santa Gertrudis, Galloways, Murray Greys, Brahmans and Brafords were the record breakers, with minor reductions on last year in other breeds.



Entries in the fat cattle classes again created a record with 243, whilst the Dairy Shorthorn breed also established a record with 243 entries.

Although the dairy cattle section had an overall decrease of 70 entries on those of last year, the Friesian classes continued to make progress with a record of 462 entries.

It was again necessary to impose restrictions in the dairy cattle section to meet the available accommodation.

Under the prevailing industry conditions it was expected that the sheep section would have a poor showing, this however was not the case. Five of the 15 breeds of sheep showed increased entries on last year and the overall entries recorded a minor decrease of only 120.

Another surprise was the increase in entries in the fleeces section with 33 up on 1970.

The pig section entries were the best ever recorded with 835, and dairy produce, apiculture, farm gadgets, poultry, pigeons, caged birds, young farmers competitions, and cats all having entries in excess of those of last year, with the cats creating an all time best figure of 748 entries. Goats, farm produce, photography, arts and crafts and woodchopping contests showed a slight decrease.


Although there was a slight decrease of 68 on the record 1970 dog entry, the 4,827 entries was still a mammoth showing.

#### JUDGES AND STEWARDS

Leading the panel of more than 260 judges were five overseas visitors from the United Kingdom, U.S.A., and New Zealand.

To mark the Golden Jubilee of the Dairy Shorthorn breed, Mr. R. T. Rose, of "Churchill Heath", Kingham, Oxfordshire, England, accepted the Society's invitation to judge these Classes. Mr. Henry H. Stoecker, of Holmdel, New Jersey, U.S.A., led the panel in the dog section whilst three New Zealanders, Messrs. J. Littlejohn, of Wanganui, C. A. Knutson, Otorhanga, and H. J. Andrews, Oamura, respectively judged Galloway cattle, Friesian cattle and Southdown sheep.

Supporting the internationals were many skilled judges from all Australian States. On behalf of the Council and Members of this Society, I extend my sincere appreciation to our judges, honorary stewards, stewardesses, and other officials for their outstanding co-operation and contribution to the success of the 1971 Royal Melbourne Show.



#### OTHER ROYAL AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY ACTIVITIES

#### 1. COMPETITIONS

#### a. The Victorian Farm Management, Production & Improvement Competition.

Sixty-seven properties were entered in this year's Competition and 34 Group finalists were inspected by the State judging panel.

With the sudden death of Mr. Cyril Johnson, and Mr. Des Meadley, a tremendous responsibility was imposed on other members of the State judging panel and I record thanks to those members of Council, Mr. Gordon Lambert, Commonwealth Banking Corporation and officers of the Department of Agriculture for the outstanding manner in which they carried through their difficult task.

Again I express the thanks of the Society to the Commonwealth Banking Corporation for its support in sponsoring the Competition, and the Victorian Agricultural Societies Association for its co-operation in conducting the Group judging.

#### b. Farm Competitions Association

The crop competitions were again well supported and District Champions exhibited crops of a very high standard.

#### c. The District Fleece Competition

The District Fleece Competition was very well supported by country agricultural societies and as stated previously resulted in entries in excess to those of last year. The competition was good and the standard high.

As has been the practice in the past, the proceeds from the sale of the fleeces was again donated to the Legacy organisation.

On your behalf I take this opportunity to again express the Society's thanks to all sponsors, judges, and supporters of these competitions. Especially would I mention the officers of the Victorian Department of Agriculture and the country agricultural societies.

#### 2. BREED SOCIETIES

Two new organisations have been added in the past twelve months to the Society's secretarial work, bringing the total breed societies and allied agricultural organisations to 40.

The Society welcomes the formation the Simmental Society of Australia (Victorian Branch) and the Australian South Devon Breeders' Association. In the Annual Report last year it was predicted that breed societies would face increased costs especially those of salaries. However it could not be foreseen that costs would spiral to the present level, and in view of this the Society has reluctantly been forced to increase Secretarial fees. Nevertheless there still remains a large deficit which has to be accounted for by the Society.

#### 3. JOURNALISTS' TOUR

Continuously sponsored by the Shell Group of Companies since 1957, the four day Journalists' Tour this year was conducted through the North East area concentrating on the Wangaratta district.

Held in the first week in August, the tour gave the media representatives an opportunity to meet many Royal Show exhibitors and view some of our top animal exhibits in course of preparation for the Royal Show, besides affording an opportunity to visit some outstanding properties and inspect several industries.

Mr. John Gardiner, R.A.S.V. Vice-President, was the Tour Leader and his intimate knowledge of the area and the hosts, did much to ensure the smooth running of this very important aspect of pre-Royal Show promotion.

#### CHANGES IN COUNCIL

This year marks one of tragic loss to the Council of the R.A.S.V. In this period the death occurred of no less than four of our most prominent and respected Council members — Mr. L. J. Dooling (March); Sir Kenneth Luke (June); Mr. C. C. Johnson (July), and Mr. R. F. Sanderson (August). Each of these Councillors served the Society in an outstanding manner and we will seriously miss each of them.

We have been pleased to welcome to Council Messrs. R. T. Balderstone, M.C., F. J. Lithgow, R. B. Langdon, J. W. Rae and A. H. C. Richards, and congratulate Mr. W. B. Boothby and Mr. C. O. Moore on their elevation to Life Councillor.

#### ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

It would be almost impossible for the Society to function if it were not for assistance freely given by many individuals and organisations, and on your behalf I wish to express sincere appreciation to the Premier of Victoria, Sir Henry Bolte, and the members of his Cabinet, especially the Minister of Agriculture, The Hon. G. L. Chandler, for continued assistance and cooperation.

To the Director of Agriculture, Dr. D. Wishart, and officers of his Department, along with members of the Australian Wool Board, the Australian Meat Board, the Victorian Egg Board, the Chairman and members of the Milk Board and officials of the Meat and Allied Trades Federation — to all these people the Society owes a deep debt of gratitude.

Also, I would express thanks to the many Government and semi-Government Departments and Boards, which have generously supported us throughout the year.

Further, I wish to record appreciation to the Victoria Racing Club, which gave great assistance to us during the Royal Show in car parking facilities and assistance in organising our free bus service.

To members of the Press, Radio and Television who afforded excellent coverage of our Show, I express special thanks.

To our many donors, sponsors, standholders, exhibitors, and public and private bodies, we are most grateful for their continued support, and we wish them to know that such help is invaluable to our Society.

I wish to record my personal thanks and gratitude to the members of Council for their continued service in such an enthusiastic, efficient and unselfish manner, with the sole object of furthering the interests of the Society.

For the loyal and uncompromising support given to me by the Vice Presidents, Messrs. J. M. Gardiner, P. B. Ronald and G. R. Starritt, I am deeply indebted.

My warmest appreciation is extended to the Director, Mr. H. T. C. Woodfull, and to his staff for the co-operative and efficient manner in which the Society's affairs were handled over the past twelve months.

#### FINANCE

Due mainly to our increased attendances we were able to again show a surplus of revenue over expenditure; our revenue reaching an all time high of \$907,663.00. Unfortunately due to circumstances beyond our control the expenditure also keeps rising and the Society is consequently compelled to increase its charges from time to time. We are of course reluctant to do this if there is any other possible alternative. I am pleased to report that the Society's financial position is quite sound.
