1988 ANNUAL REPORT TO MEMBERS

I have pleasure in reporting on the activities of the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria for the year ended December 31, 1988.

1988 ROYAL MELBOURNE SHOW

The 130th Melbourne Show was conducted over a period of 11 days and nine nights, commencing on Thursday, September 15 and concluding on the second Sunday, September 25.

It was the first time since the mid-1970's that the Show has included the second Sunday and the result this year was such, that Council has given lavourable consideration to a similar extension in 1989.

Attendances

Overall, attendances were disappointing with 738,437 patrons passing through the turnstiles.

Evening attendances fell away, however, there were a number of days where admissions before 6.00 p.m. exceeded the 1987 figures.

Factors including appalling weather on the first and traditionally biggest weekend, competition from Expo '88 in Brisbane, school holidays and the Olympics telecasts in the evenings, contributed to the unsatisfactory result.

His Excellency, The Right Honourable, Sir Ninian Stephen, A.K., G.C.M.G., G.C.V.O., K.B.E., the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, officially opened the Show on Saturday, September 17.

Theme

The Society expressed its support for the Bicentenary by adopting the theme 'Australia — Showing Our Best' for the Show, which highlighted the achievements of our top stud stock breeders, focussed attention on two major Austalian industries — wool and automotive, and provided an avenue for celebration by presenting a program of free entertainment in the main arena and around the grounds which found favour with all age groups.

Entries

Competitive entries for the 1988 Royal Melbourne Show totalled 39,639 and within this ligure, pleasing increases were recorded in the Clydesdales, Harness ponies, Australian riding ponies, Simmental and Limousin beef cattle, Ayrshire and Jersey dairy cattle; Border Leicester, Romney, Cheviot, Dorset Horn, Ryeland and Poll Dorset sheep sections; pigeons; dairy and farm produce and cats.

National Cheese Show

The National Cheese Show introduced this year, represented a major new initiative for the Royal Melbourne Show and the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria.

The competition, generously supported by Coles New World Supermarkets (Victoria), is the only one of its kind in Australia to give Australian cheesemakers the chance to have their products marketed through one of the country's biggest supermarket chains.

Coles New World provided a \$1.2 million, 12 month supply contract to the winner of the champion cheddar cheese and a 12 month supply contract worth \$150,000 to the winner of the lancy cheese section.

The National Cheese Show highlights the Society's determination to look critically at its Show competitions with a view to amending the existing or traditional format in order to make them more commercially relevant.

Indoor Judging Ring

The Federation Ring, a new indoor Judging facility for sheep and cattle was also introduced this year. It created a new dimension for the exhibiting and sale of livestock at the Royal Melbourne Show.

This facility has tremendous potential during the Show and for major stock shows and sales through the year, which makes it a valuable asset.

With his election to Council on December 10, 1968, Mr. W. McL. Greaves established a unique record in that he represented the third generation of the Greaves family to serve the Society in that capacity.

Mr. Greaves preceded Mr. J. W. Rae as the Royal Show Ringmaster and is presently a member of the Horses, and Show Altractions and Entertainment Committees. He is also the Councillor responsible for the Show's horticultural display and has a special interest in the beautification of the Showgrounds.

New Council Member

Mr. Ern Drinkwater was elected to Council in July to till the vacancy created by Mr. Head's elevation to Life Councillor.

Mr. Drinkwater's election to Council closely followed his retirement as Chief General Manager of the Royal Automobile Club of Victoria.

He and his wife Joan, have had considerable success as breeders and exhibitors of Labrador and Cocker Spaniels and Mr. Drinkwater has a reputation as a very competent judge of Working dogs.

Since 1966, he has been a Royal Show Steward in the Dog Section and for the past 20 years, has served on the committee of the Kennel Control Council.

The Society must consider itself fortunate to have a man of Mr. Drinkwater's calibre on Council.

Mr. Duncan MacGregor retired as Sheep and Goat committee chairman after 17 years and Mr. Royden Gerrand stepped down as chairman of the Dairy Cattle committee, having served in that position since 1971

The prominent status of the sheep and dairy cattle sections at the Royal Melbourne Show is largely the result. of the considerable investment of time and effort on the part of Mr. MacGregor and Mr. Gerrand, and their respective committees.

Also this year, Sir Ian McLennan retired as the inaugural chairman of Council's Management committee.

Since its establishment in 1985 as a result of the McKinsey study, this committee has achieved a great deal in assisting to establish a more streamlined management structure within the RASV's administration.

We have been particularly fortunate to have a person with Sir lan's vast managerial experience to guide the progress of this committee in its initial period of operation.

FINANCE

The land and the buildings of

the Society have been revalued by \$26,773,701 in this year's Accounts. The deficit of \$139,236 is after conducting a major Bicentennial event — ArtCraft '88 — at a net cost of \$123,000 and interest of \$160,000 on the cost of capital works required to be carried out by the Joint MFB/ Essendon City Council Fire Report.

New Appointments

Mr. Hay has been involved with computers since the early 1970's and therefore has a very broad knowledge of and experience within the industry. He also has a background in accountancy.

In his new position, Mr. Hay is responsible for the day to day operation and development environments both batch and on-line systems.

Mr. Fred Bannan was apponited Showgrounds' Foreman in June.

Mr. Bannan's experience includes an extensive involvement with the building industry, security supervision, maintenance supervision and set building for television.

The level of experience and expertise Mr. Bannan brings to the position of Grounds' Foreman will undoubtedly prove to be of great value to the Society.

In September, Mr. Ron Hewett joined the staff of the Marketing department as Sales Executive, responsible for commercial space sales during Show, and the marketing of grounds' facilities outside the Show period.

Mr. Hewett comes to the RASV with very considerable experience in the convention/exhibition and tourism industries.

Previous positions with Ansett Transport Industries and the Australian Tourism Commission have seen Mr. Hewett in senior postings in America, the United Kingdom and New Zealand.

From 1984 to 1987 he occupied the position of Director of the Australian Convention Bureau, in Melbourne.

Temporary Staff Changes

With the decision of Mr. Allan Bruno, the Society's Horse department Registrar, to take long service leave from December 31 until mid-April 1989, two temporary changes in staff positions were decided upon in preparation for 1989.

At its State Conference in June, the Victorian Young Farmers voted to move the organisation's administration from the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria to the Victorian Farmers' Federation.

The decision effectively ended a 55 year association between the VYF and RASV and was prompted by changes to the movement, the most significant of which being the State Government's decision to cease direct funding for the VYF's Area Advisory Officers

At this juncture, mention should be made of VYF Advisory Officers Ian Milburn, Bruce Graham, Phillip Butcher and Noel O'Keete, whose professional attention to the requirements of rural youth in Victoria for a number of years, has been of the highest standard.

The Victorian Pinto Society also decided to alter its administrative direction during the year and will leave the services of the RASV in early 1989 in order to set up its own office.

The RASV began servicing three new breed organisations during the year; the Australian Highland Cattle Society, the Australiasian Dexter Association (Inc.) and the Australian Cashgora Fibre Growers.

In the case of the two cattle organisations (Highland and Dexter), the RASV will handle all animal registrations in addition to providing general secretarial and accounting services.

Computer Services

The upgrading of computer facilities to better accommodate existing and anticipated requirements of the RASV and breed organisations, has been ongoing since March.

Integral to the upgrading program has been the introduction of the MIDAS financial accounting system and the purchase of new equipment; a DRS500 System.

Initially, the DRS500 will allow for the provision of distributed word processing while establishing a basis for the introduction of a higher, more sophisticated level of office automation. It will also allow for the eventual introduction of a desk top publishing facility.

Work is being undertaken on the development of an integrated facility

booking system which will have very positive benefits for our Show and non Show commercial space sales.

A number of regional agricultural societies have shown interest in the use of the RASV's computer facilities to streamline their membership and general Show data processing.

The potential for the RASV in this area is obvious and therefore resources are being directed toward these organisations in order to provide guidance in the utilisation of computers and computer systems.

Closer links between the RASV and the RAS of NSW have been forged during the year with the result that cooperative development of common systems for membership processing, animal registrations and Show processing is presently being undertaken.

Commercial Usage

Council remains committed to inoreasing the commercial use of Showgrounds' facilities outside the Show period.

Toward this end, a new Committee has been formed under the Chairmanship of Mr. W. R. R. Beggs, to fully investigate and submit proposals to Council on alternate usage of facilities, the prime objective of which is to substantially boost income to the Society.

The Non Show Commercial Space Committee has as its staff support the Marketing Manager and Space Sales Executive whose special expertise is vital in order to accomplish the desired result.

In 1988, this Committee's initial responsibility has been to:

- Identify the most realistic potential commercial uses of the Showgrounds
- Establish a scale of realistic commercial rental rates for facilities.
- ★ Identify those facilities which have the greatest potential for commercial use during the year.
- Commence the planning and production of suitable printed material to promote available facilities.

It is Council's expectation that substantial progress will be made in the effective commercial use of the grounds in 1989.

Grounds Improvements

In accordance with the terms of the Joint MFB/Essendon City Council Fire Report, the installation of a \$1.5 million water main was completed prior to the opening of the 1988 Royal Melbourne Show.

Initial work has also commenced on the refurbishment of the Society's administrative building in Plummer Avenue, a project which is required to be completed no later than August 1989, as stipulated in the above report.

THE SHOWGROUNDS

Other improvement works undertaken during the year included the stage one completion of the Clydesdale Pavilion refurbishment, a project undertaken with the generous support of Bunge (Australia); the laying of a concrete floor in the Hall of Commerce and the completion of stage one of a three year upgrading program for arena lighting.

New dressing rooms and toilet facilities were constructed for woodchop exhibitors at the Epsom Road end of the Boral Stadium and several old buildings were demolished

A number of buildings were either

completely or partially re roofed including the No. 5 cattle pavilion, the Horse Club and other catering outlets.

The interiors of all cattle pavilions were white washed and the exteriors of the Centenary Hall, Royal Block, Horse Club and Hall of Manufactures were painted.

New lawn areas were established on the Epsom Road frontage, adjacent the Main Gate and near the Hall of Manufactures.

Initial planning for the construction of a new creche on the Triangular Lawn at the rear of the Wilson Stand was also completed before the end of the year. This building will have been constructed in advance of the 1989 Royal Show.

ArtCraft '88

ArtCraft '88, Australia's Bicentennial Arts and Crafts exhibition was staged by the Society over four days from February 24 to 27. The biggest competitive exhibition in Australia outside the Royal Melbourne Show, ArtCraft '88 was officially opened by the Governor-General and attracted more than 6,000 entries from exhibitors across the country.

While public patronage was somewhat lower than expected, the exhibition was highly regarded and praised by the professional and amateur arts and crafts communities and succeeded in drawing attention to the state of arts and crafts in Australia, in the Bicentennial year.

Congratulations must go to the organising committee chaired by Mr. W. R. R. Beggs and comprising Mrs. R. B. Langdon, Mrs. L. G. C. Nicholas, Mrs. R. Potter, Ms. Kay Morrissey (Victorian Crafts Council) and Ms. Nancy Hammond (Victorian Ministry of Education) who were involved in the detailed planning of ArtCraft '88 for close to two years prior to its opening.

Commercial Farmer Competitions

In association with the Victorian Agricultural Societies' Association and with special assistance from the Department of Agriculture and Rural Alfairs (DARA), the Society successfully conducted the following commercial farmer competitions during the year:

- Dalgety Farmers Commercial Beel Herd of the Year Award.
- ★ Gippsland & Northern/Western Star Commercial Dairy Herd of the Year Award.
- Commonwealth Development Bank Victorian Farm Management, Improvement and Production Competition.
- Elders Pastoral Commercial Wool Sheep Flock of the Year Award
- VAB Share Dairy Farmer of the Year Award.

In addition, the Society introduced the inaugural Victorian Premier Wool Clip Competition.

As a result of each of these competitions, the RASV was able to assist in focussing attention on the achievements of Victorian producers and by so doing, creating an opportunity for a broader assessment and understanding of successful farm management practices and techniques.

Royal Melbourne Wine Show

The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria can display justifiable pride and satisfaction in being responsible for organising and conducting Australia's premier wine show.

In 1988, the Show attracted 2436 entries which were judged by a dislinguished panel of experts including,

for the first time, two international judges; Mr. John Avery from the renowned Avery's of Bristol (United Kingdom) and Mr. Peter J. Morrell, Morrell and Company, Wine and Spirit Merchants, Maddison Avenue, New York, USA.

The involvement of Messrs Avery and Morrell provided an important critical international focus on Australian wines, at a time when more attention than ever before is being paid to them in the traditionally hostile and selfcentred overseas markets.

The success of the 1988 Show can be fairly attributed to the work of the Wines Committee chaired by Mr. Adrian Gibson with special acknowledgement of the very considerable support provided by wine show sponsors, the State Bank, Victoria.

Shell/RASV pre Royal Show Journalists' Tour

Another of the Society's annual activities which is worthy of mention in this report is the pre Royal Show Journalists' Tour.

The tour represents a 32 year association and commitment on the part of the RASV and the Shell Company of Australia, to the building of greater understanding between Victoria's metropolitan and rural sectors, through the involvement of the media.

This is achieved by the organisation of a tour of specially selected agricultural and associated rural industry enterprises and operations, within a pre-determined region of the State.

Each year, between 20 and 30 journalists from Victorian, interestate and overseas media organisations participate on the tour, which facilitates the telling of many stories relating directly to the successes, and sometimes failures, of those people behind Victoria's primary production.

This year, the tour covered the state's north central region, centering on Bendigo and during its five day duration, journalists were exposed to everything from a large commercial plggery to ostrich farming; from stud sheep breeding to grain growing and handling.

and handling. Over its 32 year history, the Shell/ RASV pre Royal Show Journalists' Tour has given nearly 1,000 media representatives the chance to visit more than 700 properties and enterprises, across the length and breadth of the State.

JEAN EALES

Over 400 people gathered in the Lilydale Uniting Church on Friday, 6 January, to pay their last respects to Jean Eales, who collapsed and died

on 3 January, aged 73 years. In his Eulogy, David Wilkinson, a member of the Lilydale Show Society said — "When we think of Jean Eales, we think of Agricultural Shows

Jean served the Lilydale Show Society in an Executive capacity for over 30 years. She was Secretary of the Lilydale Horticultural Society for six years prior to the merger with the Agricultural Society in 1953

During her years with the Show Society, Jean served two terms as Secretary and organised the co-operative which bought an acre of land adjoining the Recreation Reserve on which the Society's own building now stands. She was President five years (1978 to 1982), lived for the Society and was devoted to it. A building on the Showgrounds was named the "Jean Eales Pavilion" in recognition of her service over many years. She was made a Life Member prior to becoming President.



Jean was the Lilydale Society's Delegate to the Port Phillip Affiliated Agricultural Societies' Association for twenty years, and was made a Life

Member of the Group in 1988. Jean was a well known and respected VASA delegate; she edited the very successful VASA Journal. and was made an Honorary Councillor in 1977.

Jean was very involved in her local community and in 1981 was the first. recipient of Lilvdale Shire's "Citizen of the Year' award, for outstanding community service.
