The Society's Mission

The Society shall promote the progress and pursuit of Excellence within all aspects of Victorian agriculture.

The Society is pursuing this mission via three key strategies:

- competition and education
- maintaining the Royal Melbourne Show as the pre-eminent event in Victoria
- redeveloping the Society's main asset, the Royal Showgrounds, to provide a yearround income stream to help maintain its financial viability.

Some History Highlights:

- 1848 The first competitive ploughing match staged on the Moonee Ponds, not far from the present Showgrounds, by the new Port Phillip Farmers' Society.
- 1870 Port Phillip Farmers' Society disbanded and the National Agricultural Society of Victoria formed, modelled on the Royal Agricultural Society of England.
- 1871 The first Show held, at Emerald Hill.
- 1883 The first Show at the present Ascot Vale Showgrounds site.
- 1890 Queen Victoria assented to the use of the 'Royal' prefix and the Society became The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria. The motto 'Speed the Plough' was adopted.
- 1910 The first 'Massed Parade' of horses and cattle on the Main Arena at the Show.
- 1913 The Show Day Public Holiday declared.
- 1934 All previous Royal Melbourne Show entry records broken.
- 1934 Violet Murrell and her hack Garryowen perish in a stable fire. The following year the Garryowen Trophy was instituted in her memory.

- 1937 The first night sessions at the Show.
- 1948 The beginning of Main Arena entertainment at the Show.
- 1950 Royal Melbourne Diamond Jubilee Show.
- 1960 The Commonwealth Development Bank/RASV Victorian Farm Management Competition started.
 - The National Australia Bank Animal Nursery started at the Show.
- 1975 The Bonlac Commercial Dairy Herd of the Year competition started.
- 1976 The Weekly Times/RASV Commercial Flock of the Year started.
- 1979 The Genetics Australia Share Farmer of the Year competition started.
- 1993 St.George Bank, became the naming rights sponsor for the Royal Melbourne Show.
- 1994 Show Day Public Holiday revoked.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It is my privilege to be able to present you with the Annual Report and Financial Statements for the Society for the year ending 31 March 1995.

The year has seen changes to the Society of very great significance designed to enable us to more efficiently and effectively proceed into the 21st century with confidence for continuing success in our quest for the promotion of excellence in agriculture.

Our financial results for the year are considered acceptable, if disappointing, considering the many changes which have taken place during the year. The net loss for the period after abnormal items was \$252,382 (1994 profit \$229,637) with four key causes:-

- A significant marketing cost in repositioning the Royal Show and reversing the declining attendance despite the loss of the Show Day Holiday.
- The initial cost of preparation of the Redevelopment Plan for the Showgrounds.
- Restructuring of the Society.
- Additional Police Charges over previous years reflecting the Government's "user pays" policy.

It is envisaged however, that next year we will have a better result and that the increase in Show attendances in 1994 will see a further improvement in 1995.

The economic impact of the Show on the State's economy is estimated to be in the vicinity of \$100,000,000 with a direct contribution to farm income of \$9,000,000. These are very significant figures that cannot be dismissed lightly.

The Royal Melbourne Showgrounds must be redeveloped and planned in an orderly manner so that they become recognised as a major educational and community resource of state-wide significance in order to facilitate their usage throughout the year. The task is not easy; it has only just begun, and it will require not only the full resources at our disposal but the support of a great many people in the community to bring it to a successful conclusion.

On 9 May 1994 we welcomed our newly appointed Chief Executive, Mr Peter Payne. He came to us originally trained as an accountant but more recently with extensive experience in marketing both in Australia and Europe, a job which required innovation and

> administrative skill. We wish him well in the challenges facing him, for his role is pivotal to the future of the Society.

Later in May we received a report commissioned from Mt David Crawford of Peat Marwick with recommendations on the restructuring of the Society. A number of recommendations relative to improving the then existing situation, with a view to both streamlining decision making and meeting the requirements of modern business practice, were included.

At a Special Meeting of Council on 27 June, 1994 the report was adopted unanimously and in principle with some minor modifications. A Board of Directors, elected by the Council, and consisting of no more than 10 members, was established. We have been pleased to welcome to the Board and the Council since that time Mr Jack Seymour and Ms Sue Nattrass - both people with very extensive business experience, a keen interest in the future wellbeing of the Society and who will, I am sure, be of great assistance to the Board in its deliberations.

While the business affairs of the Society will be the responsibility of the Board, the Committee system, which has long been effective in assisting with the putting together of the Royal Melbourne Show, will remain substantially the same and will operate with increased emphasis on agricultural, educational and associated activities.

The role of Councillors and Management will require even greater effort and will become more critical to our future in meeting the changes due to modern technology and practices and the parameters set for financial control, combined with improved competition and exhibition.

During the Spring Session of the Victorian Parliament we were successful in our request to have the Showgrounds Act of 1931 amended. This will eventually allow the Society much greater flexibility in its use of the area and we are grateful to the Government and the Minister for Agriculture, the Hon. Bill McGrath, for making this possible.

In addition, the Showgrounds is now the direct responsibility of the Minister for Planning (at present the Hon. Robert Maclellan) in dealing with development proposals for the site.

The Premier's request for the Society to develop a five year business plan has been considerably progressed and we appreciate the assistance and encouragement from a number of people in this regard, especially from Ministers and Government representatives.

In December we agreed to join with the Australian Sheep Breeders' Association to act as partners in running the 1995 Sheep & Wool Show - this is hoped to be the forerunner of even greater successes with this important event.

The Royal Summer Horse Show was a continuing success in January and is envisaged to become another big event for the Society.

Our thanks go to, our Patron, Victoria's Governor, His Excellency The Hon. Richard E. McGarvie and his wife. His Excellency again willingly opened our Royal Show and extended his hospitality to us and a number of our visitors and overseas judges at Government House.

Mr Colin Kelly was appointed an Honorary Life Councillor in December and the Society saw fit to award Honorary Life Membership during the year to eight people - four members of staff and four stewards - all had given long and distinguished service. Congratulations to them all, and also to my three Vice-Presidents who were re-elected unopposed in February 1995.

I record the Society's sorrow in hearing of the passing of long-serving Honorary Life Councillor Mr Robert Hunter in May 1994. I put on record the appreciation of the Council to the vast army of people who put in so much effort to make the Show the wonderful event that it is. The Show is a great educator - it provides not only education and enjoyment for the urban population but a benchmark from which all who participate competitively have something to learn and to aspire to. It would not be possible without a contribution from so many -Sponsors - Exhibitors - Judges - Stewards - Members and helpers and our hard working Senior Management and Staff.

In addition, there are many other activities held under the umbrella of the Society and we express our thanks to all who are contributors.

In conclusion, I express appreciation to all Councillors and Members who, during the course of the year brought to finalisation the merger of the Royal Agricultural Society Victoria Inc. and R.A.S.V. Limited. This merger, together with the adoption of new Articles of Association, was made reality on 21 March, 1994, at an Extraordinary General Meeting of. R.A.S.V. Limited followed by a Special General Meeting of members of the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Inc. There seems to be no doubt that your decisions taken in 1994/95 will ensure the Society has every possible chance of continuing long term success.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Overview

The Society is at a watershed in its long and proud history, with its two main assets - the Showgrounds and the Royal Melbourne Show - facing considerable challenges.

The 1994 St.George Bank Royal Melbourne Show was our 136th and reversed the downward trend in

attendance despite the loss of Show Day. With an attendance of 660,063 it was our largest since 1990 and reflected new marketing and Show administration strategies, and continued improvement to facilities. An exit poll of patrons indicated that more than 95 per cent enjoyed their day at the Show. And the general media response was highly positive.

The redevelopment of the Showgrounds is now a priority and an integral part of the

Society's continuing financial viability. The objective is to guarantee the future of this important site for the people of Victoria and to provide the facilities and commercial opportunities necessary to create an independent income stream for the Society.

Despite this requirement for upgrading and redevelopment, activity and revenue from year-round sites at the Showgrounds has grown well during the year. We estimate that an additional 1,000,000 people utilise out facilities attending many hundred different events and activities throughout the year representing different aspects of Victorian life.


Our Members have continued to support us and we are working hard to improve the benefits and services available both at Show time and year-round.

Strategic Development

The Society is in the early stages of a comprehensive change in the way it operates in meeting its mission to "promote the progress and pursuit of excellence within all aspects of Victorian Agriculture". The broad strategy is to significantly improve the financial viability of the Society by:



The Show is a unique forum for interaction between City and Country and over the next few years we will continue to improve standards of food, entertainment, customer service, educational opportunities, the physical environment and the commercial

relevance to rural Victoria.

Redeveloping the Showgrounds in stages, to maximise the financial returns from the Society's main asset.

It is an historical site of state-wide significance with unique logistical advantages. We need to enhance its traditional rural use, improve Show time facilities for exhibitors and develop other rural based Shows and, with venture partners, redevelop to provide independent income streams.

- Ensuring year-round use of the Showgrounds. There is significant opportunity for both increased rural focus and non-rural use as a secondary exhibition, functions and sporting facility.
- Strengthening and projecting the market presence and commercial relevance of the Society and the Royal Show.



The St.George Bank Royal Melbourne Show

The St.George Bank Royal Melbourne Show was the largest public event in Victoria in 1994 attracting some 660,063 people over its 11 day period. This was an increase of five per cent over 1993, the highest attendance since 1990 despite the loss of the Show Day holiday, and reflects changes to the Show's marketing and facilities.

In total there were 32,842 entries from 9,315 exhibitors. Record entries were received in the Alpacas; Bacon Pig Carcase Competiton; Beef Cattle - Black Simmental, Maine Anjou, Red Angus, Tarentaise, Welsh Black; the Australian Beer Awards; Horses in Action - Equitation; Sheep -White Suffolk.

> Two new cattle breeds were introduced the Droughtmaster and the British White.

The increased emphasis on animals and rural issues was a clear success and differentiates the Royal from other forms of entertainment. Educational opportunities included the Pigs & People display, Stock & Land Farm Animal Expo, the National Australia Bank's Animal Nursery, Farming the Future, Farriers' Forge, the Meat Promotions Centre, Harvest Hall, even a workshop on the judging of fleeces.

The Dugdale Theatre was used for a celebration of Aboriginal culture never seen before at the Showgrounds with two Aboriginal communities - the Western Desert Walpiri tribe and the Victorian

Koorie community presenting stories, songs, dances and painting.

For the first time, the two Carlton & United Breweries' teams of Clydesdales - the six from Melbourne and the eight from Sydney - paraded and worked together - ensuring that the Royal Melbourne Show remains the largest gathering of Clydesdales anywhere in the world.

Eight outstanding Grand Parades were presented with the generous support of the Rural Finance Corporation; rhe Kubota Farm Sunday gave Melburnians a day on the farm; the Dairy Foods Pavilion showcased Victoria's best; Centenary Hall featured "Our Agriculture on Show"; the Arts & Ctafts competitions continue to be amongst the largest in the country covering crafts from applique to woodworking, cookery to technology.

The Royal Show generates some \$95 - \$100 million of expenditures in Victoria when its direct impact and secondary flow-on effects in the rutal, tourism and transport industries are taken into account.

Horticulture made a welcome return to the Royal with an interesting tisplay in the Hall of Commerce. The interest generated will ensure that this continues and grows in the future.

The Showgrounds was also a friendlier, cleaner and more enjoyable place to spend a day with the family. The 35 Royal Show Ambassadors complemented existing staff in assisting patrons; new directional signage and maps made it easier to get around; more quiet spots away from the hustle and bustle of the Show were created; the Showbags were concentrated into two prime locations for the benefit of patrons; amusements and commercial sites were tidied up and improved in quality; and a considerable investment was made to keep the Showgrounds and facilities clean.

More than 1000 sheep were mustered through the city streets in a memorable launch to the Show, attracting large crowds and publicity.

Year-Round Agricultural Activities

In January 1995 the Royal Summer Horse Show, our annual horse breed event, was staged to great success. A total of 5355 entries were received with record entries set in Arabian Ponies, Australian Saddle Ponies, Breeding Stock (over 15 hands), Competition Horses, Miniature Ponies, Pony Club Events, Shetlands, Standard Breds, Thoroughbreds and Warmbloods.



The Royal Melbourne Dairy Show was judged in August 1994. A record 808 entries from around Australia were received for this major industry event. The largest competition of its kind in Australia, it is supported actively by the Australian Dairy Corporation.

The Australian Beer Awards, run in conjunction with the University of Ballarat, were judged in May 1994 attracting a record 196 entries from Australia and overseas.

Commercial farming competitions are run by the Society throughout the year in line with the Society's mission to promote excellence in agriculture. They attract entries from some of Victoria's best farmers and from those who will undoubtedly be the best in the near future. While entrants and winners benefit from the publicity and competition, the public field days offer a great opportunity for learning.

Panels of expert industry judges are used and the competitions would not be possible without the assistance of the Victorian Agricultural Societies Association (VASA), the Victorian Government through Agriculture Victoria, and our sponsors.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT NOTES





Notes to and Forming Part of The Financial Statements for The Financial Period Ended 31st March, 1995

1. Notes on Auditor's Report

Mr. J.A. Court (Chartered Accountant) and Mr. J. Pasias of Pannell Kerr Forster, the Auditors of The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Inc. and Pannell Kerr Forster, the Auditors of The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Limited, have audited the financial statements of the respective entities for the period ended 31 March 1995 and those audit reports accompany the statutory financial statements of the respective entities. The Auditors advise that the respective financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Associations Incorporations Act of Victoria and applicable Accounting Standards and where appropriate the Corporations Law and comply with the rules of The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Inc. and The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Limited.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted by the economic entity comprising the chief entity. The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Inc. and its controlled entity, are stated in order to assist in a general understanding of the financial statements. These policies have been consistently applied except as otherwise indicated.

a) Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical costs and except where stated do not take into account current valuations of non-current assets. The currying amounts of non-current assets do not exceed the net amounts that are expected to be recovered through the cash inflows and outflows arising from continued use and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows included in determining the recoverable amounts have not been discounted to their present values.

b) Consolidated Balance Sheet & Consolidated Revenue Account

The Consolidated Balance Sheet as at the 31 March 1995 and the Consolidated Revenue Account for the period ended 31 March 1995 are the consolidations of the financial accounts of The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Inc. and The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Limited. These consolidated financial statements are prepared for the members of the Society to give them a better understanding of the financial affairs of the two entities.

c) Depreclation and Amortisation of Property, Plant and Equipment

Items of plant & equipment are depreciated over their estimated useful lives using the straight line method. Land, buildings and improvements have been revalued on the basis of estimated current marker values. The balance of provision for depreciation existing at the time of revaluation have been credited to the asset accounts and the amounts restated to revalued amounts. Future depreciation charges will be based on the revalued amount.

d) Income Tax

Any income derived by the Company is exempt from Income Tax under S $23({\rm h})$ of the Income Tax Assessment Act.

e) Inventories

Inventories have been valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, and represent maintenance stock and consumable supplies.

f) Employee Entitlements

The amount expected to be paid to employees for their pro-rata entitlements to long service and annual leave are accrued annually at current wage rates.

g) Leased Assets

A distinction is made between finance leases which effectively transfer from the lessor to the lesser substantially all the risks and benefits incidential to ownership of the leased property, without transferring the legal ownership, and operating leases under which the lessor effectively retains substantially all the risk and benefits.

Where assets are acquired by means of finance leases, the present value of minimum lease payments is established as an asset at the beginning of the lease term and amortised on a straight line basis over the period of the lease. A corresponding liability is also established and each lease payment is allocated between such liability and interest expense.

h) Comparative Information

Where appropriate, the comparative figures have been amended to enable a meaningful comparison to be made.

i) Non-Cash Sponsorship

Non-Cash sponsorship is not recorded in the tinancial statements of the Society.

j) Revaluation of Property, Plant and Equipment

Revaluation of Property, Plant and Equipment is performed in accordance with a policy of regular revaluation on the basis of existing use.

k) Employer Superannuation Contributions

Pursuant to an actuated review of the RAS Superannuation Plan performed during 1993, company contributions to the Plan have been suspended for a period of one and a half years. The contribution suspension arese as a result of a surplus of funds within the Plan due to the earnings of the Plan and previous years funding levels.
