THE SOCIETY'S MISSION

The Society shall promote the progress and pursuit of excellence within all aspects of Victorian Agriculture.

The Society is pursuing this mission via three key strategies

- · competition and education
- maintaining the Royal Melbourne Show as the pre-eminent event in Victoria
- redeveloping The Society's main asset, the Royal Showgrounds, to provide a year- round income stream to help maintain its linancial viability.

Some History Highlights

- 1848 The first competitive ploughing match staged at Moonee Ponds, not far from the present Showgrounds, by the new Port Phillip Farmers' Society.
- 1870 Port Phillip Farmers' Society disbanded and the National Agricultural Society of Victoria formed, modelled on the Royal Agricultural Society of England.
- 1871 The first Show held at Emerald Hill.
- 1883 The first Show at the present Ascot Vale Showgrounds site.
- 1890 Queen Victoria assented to the use of the 'Royal' prefix and The Society became The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria. The motto 'Speed the Plough' was adopted.
- 1910 The first 'Massed Parade' of horses and cattle on the Main Arena at the Show.
- 1913 The Show Day Public Holiday declared.
- 1934 All previous Royal Melbourne Show entry records broken.
- 1934 Violet Murrell and her hack Garryowen perish in a stable fire. The following year the Garryowen Trophy was instituted in her memory.
- 1937 The first night sessions at the Show.
- 1948 The beginning of Main Arena entertainment at the Show
- 1950 Royal Melbourne Diamond Jubilee Show.
- 1960 The Commonwealth Development Bank/RASV Victorian Farm Management Competition started.

- The National Australia Bank Animal Nursery started at the Show.

- 1975 The Commercial Davy Herd of the Year competition started.
- 1976 The Commercial Flock of the Year started.
- 1979 The Share Farmer of the Year competition started.
- 1994 Show Day Public Holiday revoked.
 - Showgrounds incorporated into the City of Melbourne as a site of State significance
 - System of governance changed with a Board of Directors appointed.
- 1995 Introduction of Nature's Way the first animal 'Birthing Centre' at an Australian Royal Show.
- 1996 First stage of the redevelopment completed the Showgrounds Exhibition Centre
- 1997 World Cup Showjumping returned to the Royal Show.
- 1998 Celebration of the 150th anniversary of The Society.



PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I am delighted to be able to present to you the Annual Report and Financial Statements of The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Limited for the year ended 31 March 1998. Documentation in relation to all matters concerning the Company is encompassed in this report, including audited financial statements and accompanying details.

Three quarters of a million patrons through the gates ensured that the 1997 Royal Melbourne Show was a tremendous event. This led to The Society recording one of its most successful years. Our Surplus before Abnormals amounts to \$756,973 (1997 \$345,520) – a record for the Society. The expenditure on Abnormals was largely involved in planning and preparing for eventual major redevelopment of the Showgrounds. The net Surplus after these costs is \$327,268 (1997 \$189,382).

We have been working closely with design and construction consultants and with financiers for some time now. A comprehensive proposal has been assembled that requires balanced support from both public and private sectors. The success of the proposal will provide Melbourne and Victoria with a greatly enhanced Showgrounds facility that will serve the community well into the future. In considering the proposals, the Board and Council are determined that the Show continues to thrive. Unat The Society is able to continue to serve agriculture in all its endeavours, and that the Showgrounds provide year-round quality services to the community.

We are quietly confident that it is all about to come together. What a landmark year 1998 could prove to be. Whilst celebrating 150 years of service to agriculture and the community at large, we could also be celebrating the birth of a massively redeveloped Showgrounds that would allow us to continue the pursuit of our mission with the modernisation that is required.

We have had a year of close co-operation with Government and Government departments. We are most appreciative of the willing assistance we have received at all levels. The Premier placed his imprimatur on the Royal Melbourne Wine Show by providing the Premier's Gold Trophy for the Best Victorian Wine regardless of age or colour. He is also Patron of the Australian International Beer Awards which have gone from strength to strength and now rate third largest in the world.

During the year we once again ran several very successful farm business competitions e.g. The Share Dairy Farmer. The Dairy Farmer of the Year. The Flock of the Year and The Farm Management Competition. These events never fail to produce outstanding winners who conduct Field Days and thus share their knowledge and skill with those keen to learn. We are hoping these competitions will, in the future, be conducted with the support and participation of our agricultural tertiary institutions. I must say we are eternally grateful fur the very generous sponsorship that allows us to follow this very important course.

The City of Melbourne is taking an increasing interest in our wellbeing since our inclusion within the city boundaries. The Lord Mayor and his Councillors and staff have offered assistance and help and we are most appreciative.

We are also very much aware of our near neighbours, the City and citizens of Moonee Ponds. We are working closely with them and their Councillors and staff to bring about a redeveloped Showgrounds that will be welcomed by all.

The 1997 Show was opened by our Patron-in-Chief, His Excellency, The Honourable Sir William. Deane, AC KBE. This was the first visit by a Governor General since 1988. We were also honoured that our Patron, His Excellency The Honourable Sir James Gobbo AC was able to open our very much upgraded Horticulture. Pavilion and Lady Gobbo presented the coveted Garryowen Award to the winner Miss Pam Altern.

The Royal Melbourne Horse Show held in January was, once again, an outstanding success. It has grown in popularity since its inception in 1993, enjoying record crowds and entries.

Another very popular event on the calendar is the Sheep & Wool Show, the biggest and most prestigious of its kind held in Australia. It has so much to offer to both the industry it serves and the public at large.

During the year five members of Council were elevated to Life Councillors.

At our September 1997 Council Meeting, seven new Councillors were appointed. These were Jane Allen, Geoff Beard, Rupert Clarke, Lindsay Falvey, Diane Nicholas, Kevin Jordan and Stephen Shelmerdine. All are experts in their individual fields and we welcome them onto the Council.

We record our congratulations to the following Members who received recognition by The Society and were appointed Honorary Life Members for their contribution. They are - Diana Gibson. Joy Johnson, Ricky Kilburn, John Coats, Tom Fitzgerald and Bruce Hamblin. Their continuing work for The Society is much appreciated.

Several people with special skills have been co-opted onto particular Committees and we do appreciate their contribution.

A competition entitled Young Citizens Award was introduced in 1997 in order to recognise excellence in leadership amongst the younger generation. The competition was well patronised and there were 11 finalists from various fields. All finalists have been invited to join a RASV Committee of their choice for 12 months and so far two finalists have accepted and are currently making a worthwhile contribution and taking advantage of the experience of existing Committee. Members. We hope others will follow their lead.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT CONT.

Improvements carried out in the last 12 months include the signing of a contract to install electronic turnstiles. These will be in place for the 1998 Show and should speed access to the grounds and supply accurate statistics on Show patrons.

Two extensive surveys were carried out, one dealing with our technology requirements in terms of delivering services efficiently and effectively, and the other on security which will point the way to a safer environment for all Show patrons.

The Royal Block, which includes Rustlers Restaurant, the Port Phillip Room and the Royal Cafe has been extensively upgraded and air-conditioned and can now be considered a very pleasant area in which to relax, eat and hold functions.

Another covered judging ring was provided for the Show by the erection of a roof over the Jersey Lawn. This was designed and installed free of charge by Blue Frame Buildings of Echuca and is very much appreciated.

The installation of Boom Gates has allowed us to make a nominal charge for parking during the year. Revenue will be channelled into much needed road repairs.

A very generous donation by Diana Gibson has afforded a major upgrade to the Angliss Gallery. We are most grateful.

During the year a Heritage Committee was formed in order to catalogue and record all items of historical importance. This Committee consists of Councillors, Staff and volunteers all with many years experience and love of The Society. This is a massive exercise but the final outcome will enable us to preserve our heritage for future generations and mount an interesting display of Society memorabilia both at the Show and year-round.

Earlier this year I was very sorry to have to accept the resignation of John Watson from the Board. He had served with distinction for the past two years, but other demands on his time were too great. We wish him well. Congratulations to John Fox, Bill Forrest and Robert Lyons on being re-elected as Vice Presidents of The Society. The other members of the Board re-elected are Ian Bucknall, Mike Burston, John Russelt, Jack Seymour and Gary Sheppard.

I take this opportunity to thank Members of the Board, all Councillors and the staff led by Peter Payne, for their continued support and loyalty to The Society throughout the year.

Let us all hope that 1998 is a year of dual celebration, for the wonderful past and an exciting new direction.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Overview

The Society has completed one of its most successful years on record, with excellent numbers of exhibitors and entries at Society events, a further significant increase in attendance at the Royal Melbourne Show, and a record-operating surplus of \$756,973 compared to \$345.520 in 1997.

The results are clear evidence of The Society's on-going commitment to promoting excellence in agriculture, the continuing appeal and success of the Royal Melbourné Show and tight financial controls and management.

Set out on the next four pages are three summaries that I hope will help Members appreciate the range of activities and issues that The Society is pursuing

- · Strategic Review
- . The 1997 Royal Melbourne Show
- Year Round Agricultural Activities

I am confident that we are well on track to being able to fulfil the true potential of The Society.

Members will be interested to note that we received two special awards during the year.

- At the annual Victorian Tourism Awards, The Society was awarded a Certificate of Merit, based on the success of the 1996 Royal Show, in the category 'Major Festivals and Special Events'. The Society has entered the 1998 Awards in the same category, based on the 1997 Show.
- The newly constructed Showgrounds Exhibition Centre received an Award of Merit from the Victorian Chapter of the Royal Australian Institute of Architects in their 1997 Architectural Awards.

Our membership remains a vital support base for The Society's future. The Members' facilities were upgraded for the 1997 Royal Show together with the introduction of a wider range of benefits. With the Redevelopment, there will be significant further improvements. I thank Members for their continued input and support throughout the year.

I would like to mention our Sponsors or Business Partners as we prefer to call them. Large and small, they play a vital role in ensuring the continuung viability of many of the awards and events that The Society runs. Thanks to all of them.

Strategic Review

In September 1994 we presented the outline of a four pronged strategy to the Premier. I am pleased to report to Members on the progress to date.

1. Rebuilding the Royal Melbourne Show

- In the last four years the Show has increased in attendance by over 20% to 748,864 in 1997 with a 3% (22,057) increase over the 1996 Show.
- Refocussed back to its rural roots, the Show has once again won plaudits from the public, media and politicians. It remains by far the biggest Event in the Event State.
- Competitive entries remain very strong (over 32,000) reflecting our focus on ensuring its continued relevance for farmers so that attendance either as a competitor or a visitor is a worthwhile investment.
- Programs to educate the urban community on rural issues continue to be emphasised and grow in importance (eg. Nature's Way, Pigs and People, Horses for Courses, Farriers' Forge etc)

Lastly. I especially thank the staff for their support and effort over the past 12 months, together with the Board members and Councillors for their invaluable input. We have an excellent team capable of taking The Society through this watershed period of redevelopment and into a meaningful future for the benefit of Victorian agriculture.

- Independent research conducted in 1997 on behalf of The Society showed that the Show provided an annual economic impact to Victoria of \$130 million - an increase of some \$30 million over the previous figure researched in 1994.
- In addition the research concluded that the 1997 Royal Melbourne Show generated economic activity that supported approximately 4060 full time jobs; that it ultimately contributed approximately \$15.4 million in State and Federal taxes; and in terms of the rural economy, it had a total impact in the range of \$9.1M to \$10.4M.
- It is worth remembering that the Show is one of 10 Royal Shows held annually in Australia. attracting a total of some 4 million people annually - and that this makes the Royal Show product second only to the AFL (5.2 million) as a product that people pay to go to and enjoy.

Strategic Review cont.

2. Redeveloping the Showgrounds

- Over the last 4 years, The Society has spent over \$6 million in capital improvements, in particular the first stage of the redevelopment - The Showgrounds Exhibition Centre opened at Showtime 1996.
- In addition, we have invested considerably in developing a comprehensive and cohesive redevelopment plan that can meet the needs of The Society and the Show whilst being able to generate year round income streams.
 These plans prepared by a range of advisers, and in particular Alan Lewis of Lewis McNaughton Pty Ltd, have been drawn up after extensive consultation with stakeholders, Councillors and staff.
- Macquarie Bank has been appointed to develop and implement a structure for funding the redevelopment with maximum private sector participation and minimum government contribution, consistent with the objectives of The Society.
- Discussion with both public and private sectors are proceeding and we are quietly confident of being able to commence work on the redevelopment, between the 1998 and 1999 Royal Shows.


3. Developing year round income, independent of the Show

- As our facilities have improved so has our year round income. The Showgrounds Exhibition Centre is proving to be a great success although it needs the further development and marketing that will come with the comprehensive redevelopment discussed above.
- Events such as these would not have been held or continued at the Showgrounds without the new building: Australian Quilt and Craft Show (10/96); Turf Grass Expo (6/97): Coles Myer Dinner Dance (8/97); Snow and Outdoor Trade Show (10/97); Melbourne University Exams (July and November); LG Pro / Civinex (3/98); ICEX (6/98); etc.
- Our Catering both at the Show and year round has improved dramatically in quality since the appointment of Michael O'Brien Catering Pty Ltd as our Catering Manager and the result has been a significant increase in net revenue.
- Overall improved systems, staff and facilities are starting to pay off with revenue

increasing by some 10.2% in the year to \$12.8 million. The real potential however remains ahead with the redevelopment.

4. Developing and exploiting The Society's brand equity for the benefit of Victorian Agriculture

- As an organisation in its 150th year. The Society has an enviable reputation that needs to be harnessed properly for the benefit of Victorian Agriculture.
- Whilst that reputation has been further enhanced from the successes of the past few years, the real opportunity to exploit it will only come once The Society's financial position has been strengthened by the process, as envisaged by the redevelopment, and The Society can focus on its core activities and develop new business opportunities.

The 1997 Royal Melbourne Show

The key objectives for the 1997 Royal Melbourne Show were to continue to run a professional' and highly popular event to ensure the continuing financial viability of the Show, and to maintain the agricultural relevance of the Show

To achieve these objectives, The Society pursued live major strategies as follows:

1. A powerful marketing campaign

 In 1997, The Society undertook a major Marketing and Public Relations program with the objective of converting extended awareness of the Show into increased attendance. The goal of 750,000 visitors was set for 1997

CELEBRATING ISO TEARS

- Major elements of the Marketing and Public Relations program incorporated the distribution of literally dozens of media releases and information papers (including to key tourist organisations and to the major multicultural media in Melbourne) personal contact with key journalists, appearances on radio talkback programs, TV interviews, special displays in shopping centres, production of colourful Show posters and brochures and a new series of Show Time commercials for television, radio and press.
- A key program was the continuation of a special business partnership with Victoria's largest daily newspaper, The Herald Sun.

The 1997 Royal Melbourne Show

This partnership involved the production and publication of a special Show Guide, detailing all the main features and attractions of the Show, plus the detailed events for every day of the Show. The supplement was published 10 days prior to the Show and reached an estimated 1.2 million people.

Results: The 1997 attendance figure was 748 864 - almost right on the objective of 750 000 and up a total of 128 000 actual visitors over five years. The number of multicultural visitors increased significantly.

2. Enhancing customer service levels

 The Society continued in 1997 the AussieHost trained Ambassador program, which provides pre-Show and at-Show customer service to visitors to assist them to achieve maximum enjoyment at the Show. At the same time, The Society continued its in-house customer service training programs for permanent and casual staff.

3. Reinforce value for money

- The Society has undertaken a range of positive programs over the past five years to ensure that the Show provided 'value for money'
- The exit survey in 1997 showed that a majority of visitors (82%) believe the Show provides value for money - despite general admission prices being increased for the first time in seven years (adult prices increased by \$2 to \$14 and children by \$1 to \$7)
- The Show also introduced new, popular attractions and special features:
- One of these was a major coup for our showjumping events. The Show obtained the services of one of the Official Course Designers for the Sydney 2000 Olympic Games, Mr Palacias of Venezueta, who headed an elite design team for a World Cup Qualifier event at the Show. This special event was held under lights – with the audience permitted to sit on the Main Arena, close to the action.
- Also introduced at the Show was a new animal attraction called 'Horses for Courses' which was added to the comprehensive livestock education program.

"Horses for Courses' was aimed at families and individuals who have an interest in horses but who have little or no experience or detailed knowledge of their care and upkeep.

- To further add value for money, the 1997 Royal Melbourne Show continued a totally new concept in food for visitors (introduced in 1996), away from just 'greasy takeaways' to offerings of some of the finest food in the land, centring on a new multi-outlet cafe named 'Paddock to Plate'. Some of Melbourne's highly regarded restaurateurs were part of this 'food revolution' - including Walters Wine Bar, Wallace Cheesery, Chopsticks Affair and other Asian food outlets, and seafood from Top of the Bay.
- Prices for amusement rides and Showbags and for key takeaway food items – were held at 1996 levels to help ensure the Show maintained value for money.
- Another special feature was in Horticulture which created a substantially bigger line up of exhibitors in the Horticulture Pavilion and the adjoining P B Ronald Pavilion, linked at first floor level with a specially constructed pedestrian walkway. The popular Floral Clock again attracted many visitors as they arrived at the Showgrounds by train.

Results: Exit polls showed that 82% of visitors described the 1997 Show as value for money.

4. Strengthen agricultural education elements

- Education has always been a core element of attracting visitors from both city and country In the Royal Show, which is regarded as one way of experiencing 'a little about a lot of country lifestyles'. The Society believes the key to success in this area is to provide education in an entertaining way
- In 1997, the Royal Melbourne Show introduced a web site on the Internet for the first time. The site detailed the major attractions of the Show and is now being developed as a year-round site for The Society, providing information on the wide range of agriculture-related programs and activities conducted in conjunction with the Royal Melbourne Show

 In 1997, the new education attraction at the Show was 'Horses for Courses' which added to the established attractions of 'Animal Nursery', 'Nature's Way', 'The Wonderful World of Pets', 'Walk to the Animals', 'Pigs and People' and 'Farrier's Forge', all of which continued to attract thousands of visitors.

Results: Exit polls showed that all these attractions were among the most popular features of the 1997 Show. The Animal Nursery rated 99% as "entertaining or interesting", Wonderful World of Pets and Nature's Way both rated 96%, while 'Horses for Courses' rated 95%. The Walk to the Animals rated 87%.

5. Maintain/increase entries in farm animal events and ensure livestock and produce competitions maintain commercial relevancy

- Entries across a number of major events had, shown a decline in recent years. The goal was to increase or at least maintain the levels of the previous year because without large entries, the relevance and future of the Show could be at risk.
- The strategy was to encourage a high standard of entries in terms of quality and presentation, maintain the importance of competitions across all categories, and demonstrate that the Show remains commercially relevant by the level and standard of entries
- A specific Business-to-Business campaign was undertaken as a major marketing activity with Exhibitor groups. The campaign commenced some six months prior to the Show, with special newspaper features and a series of meetings to keep exhibitors informed about the Show and its programs, and most importantly, The Society's on-going commitment to the Show as the Showplace for Excellence in agriculture and agribusiness.

Results: A total of more than 32 000 entries were received for the Royal Melbourne Show, which was up compared with the figures for 1996. The key Show areas of beef and dairy cattle had entries comparable with 1996 despite extremely tough seasonal conditions throughout south-east Australia.

Year-Round Agricultural Activities

In January 1998, the Royal Melbourne Horse Show, our annual horse breed event, was staged with great success. It is the biggest horse show in the Southern Hemisphere. A record number of 6,447 entries were received representing 28 breeds including Arabian Horses, Australian Saddle Ponies, Australian Stock Horses, Australian Stud Saddle Ponies, APSB Ponies (all breeds), Competition Horses, Miniature Ponies and Riding Ponies.

The 1997 Sheep and Wool Show, the largest event of its kind in the world, was conducted in July in partnership with the Australian Sheep Breeders' Association for the third year in succession. Outstanding entries were received in the stock sections, and entries in the ram sales and woolcraft competitions remained consistently high in terms of numbers and quality. We look forward to developing this event further with the ASBA.

The 1997 Royal Melbourne Dairy Show attracted more than 726 entries in 77 classes. 87 Australian companies entered this major industry event, sponsored by the Australian Dairy Corporation. It judges the finest dairy products including cheese, butter, ice cream, yoghurt, chocolate, cheesecake and dairy desserts and The Grand Champion Cheese of the Year was Kraft's Renmano. The 1997 Royal Melbourne Wine Show attracted a record 3,066 entries. Strong growth in the number of companies entering was experienced which is reflective of the continuing development of the Australian wine industry. The coveted Jimmy Watson Trophy was awarded to Gulf Station Vineyard: DeBortoli Wines Pty Ltd, Shiraz 1996. The inaugural Premier's Gold Trophy for Victorian Wine was awarded to Brown Brothers Pty Ltd - Show Muscat (2)


The 1997 Liquorland Australian International Beer Awards, run by the Society in conjunction with the University of Ballarat, attracted a record 436 entries (up 51% on 1996) from Australia and overseas. Entries were received from 75 international breweries in 24 countries and from 30 Australian breweries. South African Breweries Lion Lager beer was awarded the Grand Champion title, The Premier of Victoria, The Hon Jeff Kennett has become Patron of the Awards.

Commercial farming competitions are run by The Society throughout the year in line with The Society's mission to promote excellence in agriculture. They attract entries from some of Victoria's best farmers and from those who will undoubtedly be the best in the near future. While entrants and winners benefit from the publicity and competition, the public Field Days offer a great opportunity for learning. Panels of expert industry judges are used and the competitions would not be possible without the assistance of the Victorian Agricultural Societies Association (VASA), the Victorian Government through Department of Natural Resources and Environment, and our sponsors. The commercial farming competitions are:

- · The Genetics Australia Dairy Herd of the Year
- The Commonwealth Bank Victorian Farm Management Competition
- The Genetics Australia Share Dairy Farmer of the Year
- The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Commercial Flock of the Year



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CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

The Directors are responsible for the Corporate Governance practices of The Society and are elected by Council, who in turn are elected by the Membership. The main Corporate Governance practices that were in operation throughout the financial year, except where otherwise indicated, are summarised below.

Board of Directors

The Board carries out its responsibilities according to the following mandate:

- · the Board should comprise ten Directors:
- other than the Chief Executive, Directors must be Councillors of The Society and consequently non executive;
- · the Board shall not be paid remuneration,
- the Chairman of the Board is also the President of The Society;
- the Directors should possess a broad range of skills, qualifications and experience;
- the Board should meet on a regular basis, with at least 11 meetings each year;
- all available information in connection with items to be discussed at a meeting of the Board shall be provided in writing to each Director prior to that meeting.

The primary responsibilities of the Board include:

- the establishment of policy in relation to the long term goals of The Socrety;
- · strategic plans to achieve those goals;
- the review and adoption of annual budgets for the financial performance of The Society and monitoring the results on a regular basis;
- the appointment of the Chief Executive and approval of executive remuneration;
- the approval of the annual financial statements; and
- ensuring The Society has implemented adequate systems of internal controls together with appropriate monitoring of compliance activities.

Human Resources Committee

The Board has established a Human Resources Committee, to be chained by the President, consisting of four Non Executive Directors and the Chief Executive and assisted by the Company Secretary

The Committee is also supported by an external adviser. The Human Resources Committee generally oversees The Society's human resources policies and procedures, and in particular reviews the remuneration of the senior executive and makes recommendations to the Board.

The Committee is also responsible for the identification of prospective participants on Board Committees for recommendation to the Board.

Audit Committee

The Board has established an Audit Committee consisting of four Non Executive Directors.

The Audit Committee:

- provides a forum for the effective communication between the Board and the external auditors:
- reviews and recommends the adoption of the annual financial statements by the Board.
- reviews the effectiveness of management information systems and systems of internal control, and
- the efficiency and effectiveness of the external audit function, including reviewing the audit plans and audit lees.

The Chief Executive and the Chief Financial Officer are represented on the Committee in an ex-officio capacity and the external auditors are generally invited to attend Committee meetings. The Audit Committee also meets with, and receives regular reports from, the external auditors concerning matters which arise in connection with the performance of their audit role, including the adequacy of key internal controls

Risk Management




In addition, the Board investigates ways of enhancing existing risk management strategies, including appropriate segregation of duties and the employment and training of suitably qualified personnel.

The Company paid a premium in respect of a contract insuring its directors and officers against a liability of a nature that is required to be disclosed under sub-section 309 A(3) of the Corporations Law.

Events Subsequent to Balance Date

No matters or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year that have significantly affected the operations of the Company.

Review and Results of Operations

The operating profit of the Company after abnormals was \$327,268 (1997 \$189,382). Major changes were :

- An increase in attendance at the Royal Melbourne Show resulting in an increase of \$425,000 in admission revenue.
- Increase in rental income of some \$505,000 reflecting the improved efforts in sales and catering.
- Significant abnormal costs (\$367,000) relating to the redevelopment process.

Likely Future Developments and Expected Results

Following the completion of stage one in August 1996 of the Showgrounds redevelopment, significant work on further stages has continued to be undertaken. The timing on this work being executed is dependent on the availability of funds from both the private and public sectors. However, it is envisaged that redevelopment will commence between the 1998 and 1999 Royal Shows.

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements constitute a general purpose financial report that has been drawn up in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards, the Corporations Law and other mandatory professional reporting requirements (Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views).

a) Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with historical cost principles and except where stated do not take into account current valuations of non-current assets

The carrying amounts of non-current assets do not exceed the net amounts that are expected to be recovered through the cash inflows and outflows arising from continued use and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows included in determining the recoverable amounts have not been discounted to their present values.

b) Limited by Guarantee

The company is limited by guarantee, thereby the company has been formed on the principle of having the liability of its members limited by the memorandum of association to the respective amounts that the members undertake to contribute to the property of the company in the event of it being wound up.

c) Inventories

Inventories have been valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value and represent maintenance stock and consumable supplies.

d) Revaluation of Property

Revaluation of property is performed in accordance with a policy of regular revaluation on the basis of existing use.

e) Depreciation on Property, Plant & Equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment, other than freehold land, are depreciated over their estimated useful lives using the straight line method.

f) Income Tax

Any income derived by the company is exempt from Income Tax under Section 23(h) of the Income Tax Assessment Act.

g) Leased Assets

A distinction is made between finance leases which effectively transfer from the lessor to the lessee substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased property, without transferring the legal ownership, and operating leases under which the lessor effectively retains substantially all the risk and benefits.

Where assets are acquired by means of finance leases, the present value of minimum lease payments is established as an asset at the beginning of the lease term and amortised on a straight line basis over the period of the lease. A corresponding liability is also established and each lease payment is allocated between such liability and interest expense. Operating lease payments are charged to expense in the periods in which they are incurred.

h) Employee Entitlements

The following liabilities arising in respect of employee entitlements are measured at their nominal amounts:

wages and salaries and annual leave regardless whether they are expected to be settled within twelve months of balance date.
 other employee entitlements which are expected to be settled within twelve months of balance date.

All other employee entitlements, including long service leave, are measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows in respect of services provided up to balance date. Liabilities are determined after taking into consideration estimated future increases in wages and salaries and past experience regarding staff departures. Related on-costs are included.

i) Non-Cash Sponsorship

Non-cash sponsorship revenue is not recorded in the financial statements of the Company.
