SOME HISTORY HIGHLIGHTS

- 1848 The first competitive ploughing match staged at Maonee Ponds, not far from the present Showgrounds, by the new Port Phillip Parmers' Society.
- 1870 Port Phillip Ramers' Society disbanded and the National Agricultural Society of Victoria formed, modelled on the Royal Agricollural Society of England.
- 1871 The first Shew held, at Binerald Hill.
- 1885 The first Show at the present Aseot Vale Showgrounds site.
- 1890 Queen Victoria assemed to the use of the 'Royal' prefix and the Society became The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria. The motto 'Speed the Plough' was adopted.
- 1910 The first 'Massed Parade' of horses and cattle on the Main Arena at the Show.
- 1913 The Show Day Public Holiday declared.
- 1954 All previous Royal Melbourne Show entry records broken.
- 1934 Violet Murrell and her hack Garryowen perish in a stable fire. The following year the Garryowen Trophy was instituted in her memory.
- 1937 The first night sessions at the Show-
- 1948 The beginning of Main Arena entertainment at the Show.
- 1950 Royal Melbourne Diamond Jubilee Show.
- 1960 The Victorian Farm Management Competition started.
 - The Animal Nursery started at the Show.
- 1975 The Commercial Dairy Herd of the Year competition started.
- 1976 The Commercial Flock of the Year started.
- 1979 The Share Farmer of the Year competition started.

- 1994 Show Day Public Holfday revoked.
- 1995 Introduction of Nature's Way the first animal Birthing Centre' at an Australian Royal Show 1998 - Celebration of 150th anniversary of The Society.

Once again it is my privilege to present to you the Annual Report and Financial Statements of The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Limited on this occasion for the year ended 31 March 1999. Our operating profit before abnormal items of \$696,007 (1) \$756,973) is satisfactory considering some of the difficulties encountered. Our abnormal expenditure continues to be high as we further investigate and plan ways and means of bringing the Showgrounds up to modern standards that will enable us to deliver our mission well into the 21st century.

150th Anniversary Celebrations

Of enormous significance during the year was the celebration of the 150th Anniversary of The Society. In August 1848 a gathering of 17 ploughmen competed on the banks of the Moonee Ponds Creek for the honour of producing the straightest furrow and for turning the best sod. They were continuing an old English tradition of improvement through competition. They were our forefathers and from that humhle beginning this Society and its regional colleagues have made an ever-changing but always significant contribution to every aspect of life within Victoria. But always with that single goal of seeking and progressing excellence in agriculture.

On Sunday 16th August 1998 the 150th Anniversary Luncheon was held in the Showgrounds Exhibition Building. It was a wonderful event attended by His Excellency Sir James Gobbo, AC, and Laity Gobbo and other distinguished guests together with 600 friends of The Society – Councillors, Members, Employees past & present, Stewards, Judges, Exhibitors, Competitors, Showies, Stallholders and others. The highlight of the day was an indoor parade of Champions representing almost all the annuals that have been competing for Royal ribbons throughout the history of The Society – magnificent!! All those who contributed to that wonderful day of tribute are to be congratulated.



The 1998 Royal Melbourne Show

The 1998 Royal Melbourne Show once again demonstrated its enormous attraction to the people of Victoria and beyond. It has to be one of the most accessible Royals in the nation. Excellent trains, trains and buses plus vast private parking with our good neighbours the Victoria Racing Club - all this within the City of Melbourne boundaries.

We were delighted to have our Patron, flis Excellency Sir James Gobbo, AC, Governor of Victoria, to officially open the Show on Saturday 19th September 1998. The Show, once again, excelled in the wonderful variety of experiences for which it has become famous – fun and excitement, education, competition, the greatest range of champion livestock and excellent food and service.

The Sheep & Wool Show

The Sheep & Wool Show in July continued its role as the biggest in the nation. It was strongly supported by a vibrant woolcraft competition and high quality produce for sale.

The Royal Melbourne Horse Show

The Royal Melbourne Horse Show held in January is now very well established, and increasing in number and attraction each year. We are well aware that stabling for both Shows – Spring and Summer – is in desperate need of uplifting and will be high on the list when funds are available.

Farm Business Competitions/Field Days

Once again, during the year, we were very proud of the competitors and winners who took part in all our various farm business and value-added competitions. Through successful Field Days and Award Events the message of excellence is being well spread.

Redevelopment of the Showgrounds

My report on the proposed redevelopment of the Showgrounds a year ago was optimistic that finance, both public and private, would be found in the near future. Unfortunately, the Government, (who clearly recognise the necessity of a major uplift of the Showgrounds as the home of the Royal Melbourne Show) has not provided any significant funds via the recent budget. However, they have provided a special grant to further work up the scheme. They - the Government of Victoria - are obviously committed and I know the Board and Council and the Executive who have all worked with such dedication are determined that this great Victorian icon will have a 'state-of-the-art' Showgrounds to enable it to deliver to its members and patrons a future of unequalled Royal Shows and year-round service. We will succeed!

Board Changes

Mr. Bill Forrest - At the end of March this year I had to accept the resignation from our Board of Mr. Bill Forrest who had served the Board well for the past five years and had been on Council for six years. Bill's heavy workload associated with his many other interests made it impossible for him to give his full attention to the demands of Board membership forcing his resignation. We were grateful to have benefited from his vast knowledge and experience.

Mr. John Russell - Having attained the age of 72 years, and in compliance with our Articles of Association, John was required to resign his position on the Board. He has agreed, however, to assist the Board in a consultancy capacity. John has served the Board well for the past two years and we were grateful for the benefit of his excellent business experience.

Mr. Rupert Clarke was appointed to fill one vacancy on the Board and took up his appointment immediately following the period under review. His combination of rural/legal/financial background will be of considerable benefit to the Board and he is a most welcome appointee.

Mr. Barrie Laws was appointed to Council on 17/11/98. Barrie has a background in investment and corporate management. He has rural interests in the beef, dairy & fruit industries. He was appointed to the Board of Directors on 7/12/98.

Life Councillors

During the course of the year Messrs Ern Drinkwater and John Robb were appointed Life Councillors in accordance with The Society's Articles of Association. Mr. John Russell will be officially appointed a Life Councillor at the July 1999 Council Meeting. Our congratulations to all these Councillors.


Appointment of New Councillor

Mr. Peter McMahon was appointed to Council on 21/7/98. He had been co-opted to the Dog Committee for the previous 12-month period. He has a wealth of experience in this area.

Young Citizens Award - These Awards were introduced in 1997 in order to recognise excellence in leadership amongst the younger generation. The competition was well patronised and 12 finalists in various fields were agreed. All finalists have been invited to join an RASV Committee of their choice and so far 5 finalists have accepted and are currently making a worthwhile contribution and taking advantage of the experience of existing Committee members. We hope others will follow their lead.

No report would be complete without acknowledgment of the vast army of people, volunteers and others who help towards the success of the Royal Show and our many other activities — thank you. And thank you to my Board members, Councillors and Staff for the wonderful dedication, wisdom and will to win through. The Society succeeds because of you. The Society will continue to succeed because we have the will.

The Redevelopment of the Showgrounds has been a key focus for the Board, Council and the Executive for many years and for good reason. It secures the long term future of the Royal Melbourne Show, Victoria's biggest, longest surviving and most popular event - and it meets our Vision of creating a World Class Showcase for Food and Fibre.

Additionally, the state of infrastructure within the Showgrounds and its impact on

our resources and operations obliges us to find a way forward. Whilst disappointed that our efforts to date have failed to elicit any significant financial support from the Government, we remain positive that our current work will lead to a decision to proceed in the uear future with a mixture of Private and Public Sector funding.

The Government has recognised the desirability of redeveloping the Showgrounds as the home of the Royal Melbourne Show, in keeping with the Conservation Plan prepared by Heritage Victoria in 1997, which stated in part:

"...The continued presence of the Royal Melbourne Show within the Showgrounds demonstrates the importance of the metropolitan area as a focus for ideas in agriculture, and also maintains a fundamental principle of the Show, The provision of access for the urban population to information about the rural areas...."

We will keep Members informed of progress on this matter, which is vital not only to The Society but also to the Victorian community.

Robert (Bob) Potter Farmer

President, Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria 1997-99

Born: 5.11.31 Died: 16.5.99

Bob Potter was a farmer and a man of the people.

To know Bob Potter was to have him personally involved with what you did. To know him well was to have a friend for life.

Ite belied the off-quoted belief that a good manager does not get too close to his people. Bob did get close to his people and because of that he was a good manager.

As President of the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria for the past two years, Bob Potter was dedicated to The Society's goal of achieving excellence in agriculture.

It is vision was to drive The Society into the new millennium with what he described recently as 'the need to evolve to stay relevant to modern agriculture and the broader community'. He urged members of The Society to continue to be flexible in their thinking and to look for ways to promote the activities of The Society as well as its centrepiece event, the Royal Melbourne Show.

He never lost his determination to win financial support from the State Government to assist the proposed redevelopment of the Showgrounds. He was disappointed that the recent budget did not provide funds for the work, but the words he used continually on the subject were "We will succeed!!"

Bob Potter showed a tremendous enthusiasm for the position of President, putting in extraordinary hours to do the work of The Society.

He would drive for three and a half hours each way to get to the Showgrounds and back from his home at Caramut near Warrnambool in the Western District — and think nothing of it, often doing it as a day trip He undertook all his work in a hands-on way. Quite simply, he would make people feel wanted and he inspired them to give of their best.

It was inevitable that Bob Potter went farming because it was very much in the family blood. It is great grandfather came to Australia in the 1850s and was a very capable and successful farmer, owning a number of properties in the Western District of Victoria.

Bob Potter got a bursary to Dookie Agricultural College where he studied for a time and then went jackerooing on a number of properties. He really made his mark at a property called Gundaline in the Riverina where the first signs of his leadership skills emerged together with his progressive approach to farming.

Bob Balderstone, a previous President of The Society, first met him in the early 1970s when Bob Potter was managing a large property in Victoria called Yarram Park for the Western District Pastoral Company.

"You couldn't help but be terribly impressed with the property and the management of it," Bob Balderstone recalls.

In 1982, he nominated Bob Potter to become a Councillor of the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria.

"He took to the work of The Society 'like a duck to water' and served with distinction on a number of Committees, including as Chairman of the Beef Committee. He never missed a Committee meeting," said Bob Balderstone

That dedication continued to the end. The unexpected and untimely death of Bob Potter has left a void that will be difficult to fill.

Thanksgiving service

More than 500 people attended a special Thanksgiving Service for Bob Potter on 20 May 1999 at the Potter property 'Wooriwest' at Caramut in Western Victoria.

Those in attendance included Councillors and staff of The Society, representatives of many agricultural industries and societies, a wide range of business acquaintances and friends.

Simple, moving tributes to the life and work of Bob came in the eulogies delivered with compassion and humor by Bob Balderstone and Bob Potter's son-in-law Tom Guthrie. There were tributes to the work carried out diligently and with little fanfare, to the determination to achieve success and to the devotion to people.

The great loves of Bob Potter which came through clearly were family, farm, work and the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria.

A MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE

The year to 31st March 1999 has been extraordinarily challenging, culminating in a record Operating Profit before Depreciation of \$1.665.759 (LX \$1.607.995).

As Members are aware, we have invested considerably in developing a comprehensive and cohesive Redevelopment Plan of the Showgrounds with the cost included in Abnormal Expenses (\$788,380 - LY \$367,003). As a result we have only reduced our indebtedness by \$265,213 with Total Liabilities of \$5,719,028 - (LY \$5,984,241). This remains a significant issue for The Society especially whilst the all-important Redevelopment remains unfunded and our ability to significantly increase non Showtime revenue is hampered by the current facilities.

The Royal Melbourne Show

The 1998 Royal Melbourne Show was a great success with many highlights:

- The overall number of competitive entries (>32,000) continues to be very strong. Pleasingly, and despite continuing tough seasonal conditions, beef and dairy cattle maintained their high level of entries.
- With more than 3500 exhibitors and some 6500 dogs on show, the Royal Melbourne Dog Show is the biggest in the southern hemisphere and ranks in the top 5 in the world.
- In the Horse section, a highlight that attracted attention and very positive comment was a World Cup Qualifying event, held for the second year under lights, with the audience permitted to sit on the Main Arena close to the action. The Garryowen was won for the second time by Shelley Penny.

- Converting Centenary Hall into the Whisky Hill Woolshed helped us to celebrate our 150th Anniversary by taking Showgoers back to the colonial days of Australia.
- The importance attributed to informing the urban community on rural issues is best reflected by the range and success of the Animal Attractions such as the Animal Nursery, the Wonderful World of Pets, Pigs N People, Ilorses for Courses, Nature's Way and Farrier's Forge. They continue to rate as the most popular with visitors, together with the Horticulture and Rural Pavilions.
- Other new attractions and special features introduced in 1998 included the popular Barn Tours and Horse Walks; Green Day Out, which had a special environmental care and recycling theme; Fabulous Food Friday which focused on healthy, tasty food available at the Show; and the Honey Pot.



- Our exit survey of visitors in 1998 showed that the overwhelming majority of people (94%) said they enjoyed the Show and over (70%) believed the Show provided great value for money.
- The introduction of electronic turnstiles provided greater certainty than in the past on the number attending the Show.
 The 1998 attendance of 660,697 (20,000 down on 1997) will act as a valuable benchmark for the future.
- Showbag sales and revenue to The Society were at an all time high, and we continue to encourage new and innovative product from our suppliers.



Venue Management

We have continued to improve the utilisation of the Showgrounds as a year round venue:

- The Industry acceptance of the Showgrounds Exhibition Centre as a competitive and good value alternative continues to grow.
- Parts of the Showgrounds are again being used for film shoots (*Journey to the Centre of the Earth* in the Meaklin; Blue Heelers on Plummer Avenue etc).
- Big Day Oul on Australia Day was a huge success with 40,000 enjoying a great festival, whilst Oktoberfest returned for its 16th year, continuing to celebrate a wonderful European tradition.

However it is clear that the quantum leap in utilisation and profitability will not come until the facilities are upgraded with the Redevelopment.

Agricultural Activities

We continue to run a very active and full year round program of Agricultural activities including -

- The Royal Melbourne Horse Show, staged with great success in January with more than 2600 horses competing in some 700 classes over the five days. A leading international judge, Mr Jerome Harforth, of Middlesbrough, England, and nine from interstate joined the 19 local judges.
- The 1998 Melbourne Sheep and Wool Show, the largest event of its kind in the world, was conducted in July in partnership with the Australian Sheep Breeders' Association for the fourth year in succession. Ontstanding entries were received in the stock sections, and entries in the ram sales and woolcraft competitions remained consistently high in terms of numbers and quality.
- The 1998 Royal Melbourne Dairy Show attracted more than 780 entries in about 80 classes. This major industry event, which is sponsored by the Australian Dairy Corporation, judges the finest dairy products including cheese, butter, ice creant, yoghurt, chocolate, cheesecake and dairy desserts. The Supreme Cheese Award was won by Fresh Pecorino of Florida Cheese.
- The 1998 Royal Melbourne Wine Show attracted a record 3329 entries. There was again strong growth in the number of companies entering. The coveted Jimmy Watson Trophy was awarded to Katnook Estate Shiraz 97. The Premier's Gold Trophy for Victorian Wine was awarded to Morris Wines-Liqueur (3) Muscat Blend.

- The 1998 Liquorland Australian International Beer Awards, run in conjunction with the University of Ballarat, attracted 425 entries from Australia and overseas. Entries were received from some 80 international breweries in 20 countries and from approximately 30 Australian breweries. Boag's Premium Lager was awarded the Grand Champion title.
- The four commercial farming competitions run by The Society attract entries from some of Victoria's best farmers and the public field days offer a great opportunity for learning. Panels of expert industry judges are used and we are most appreciative of the support from the Victorian Agricultural Societies Association (VASA), the Department of Natural Resources and Environment, and our sponsors.

The commercial farming competitions are as follows:

- · The Genetics Australia Dairy Herd of the Year
- The Commonwealth Bank Victorian Farm Management. Competition
- · The Genetics Australia Share Dairy Farmer of the Year
- The Stock and Land/Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Commercial Flock of the Year
- Other competitions run by The Society include Grains, Hay & Chaff, Fleece, Honey and Mead. Beef Carcase, Lamb Carcase and Bacon Pig Carcase Competitions.
- Our Agribusiness Administration Division manages 27 rural based businesses from acting as Registrar for VASA to the Secretary of many Breed Societies. This is an area of synergy and growth for The Society requiring good service and cost effective systems for long term success.

I would like to thank the RAS Board, Council and Members for their continued support during this difficult period of transition. In particular the Staff have been outstanding and I thank them for their loyalty, commitment and initiative. The future is challenging but rewarding.





The Directors are responsible for the Corporate Governance practices of The Society and are elected by Council, who in turn are elected by the Membership. The main Corporate Governance practices that were in operation throughout the financial year are summarised below

Board of Directors

The Board carries out its responsibilities according to the following mandate:

- · the Board should comprise ten Directors;
- other than the Ghief Executive, Directors must be Councillors of The Society and consequently non executive;
- · the Board shall not be paid remuneration;
- · the Chairman of the Board is also the President of The Society;
- the Directors should possess a broad range of skills, qualifications and experience;
- the Board should meet on a regular basis, with at least 11 meetings each year;
- all available information in connection with items to be discussed at a meeting of the Board shall be provided in writing to each Director prior to that meeting.

The primary responsibilities of the Board include:

- the establishment of policy in relation to the long term goals of The Society;
- · strategic plans to achieve those goals;
- the review and adoption of annual budgets for the financial performance of The Society and monitoring the results on a regular basis;
- the appointment of the Chief Executive and approval of executive remuneration.
- · the approval of the annual financial statements; and
- ensuring The Society has implemented adequate systems of internal controls together with appropriate monitoring of compliance activities.

Human Resources Committee

The Human Resources Committee, chaired by the President, consists of four Non Executive Directors and the Chief Executive and is assisted by the Company Secretary.

The Committee is also supported by an external adviser. The Human Resources Committee generally oversees The Society's human resources policies and procedures, and in particular reviews the remuneration of the senior executive and makes recommendations to the Board

The Committee is also responsible for the identification of prospective participants on Board Committees for recommendation to the Board.

Audit Committee

The Audit Committee consists of Non Executive Directors and is charged with:

- providing a forum for the effective communication between the Board and the external auditors;
- reviewing and recommending the adoption of the annual financial statements by the Board;
- reviewing the effectiveness of management information systems and systems of internal control; and
- assessing the efficiency and effectiveness of the external audit function, including reviewing the audit plans and audit fees.

The Chief Executive and the Chief Financial Officer are represented on the Committee in an ex-officio capacity and the external auditors are generally invited to attend Committee meetings. The Audit Committee also meets with, and receives regular reports from, the external auditors concerning inatters which arise in connection with the performance of their audit role, including the adequacy of key internal controls.

Nominations Committee

Responsible for assisting the Board and Council in identifying and recruiting personnel with relevant qualifications, skills and experience, who are capable of supporting the aims and objectives of The Society, and help in advancing its long term viability and agricultural relevance.

The Committee is specifically responsible for:

- · the review of Council, Committees and Board structures;
- devising procedures and criteria (including experience, mix of skills, and other qualities and competencies) for Board, Council and Committees membership;
- assessing the effective balance of the Board as a whole, and its Committees.

Risk Management

The Board is responsible for The Society's system of internal controls. The Board constantly monitors the operational and financial aspects of The Society's activities and through the Finance and Audit Committees, the Board considers the recommendations and advice of external auditors and other external advisers on operational and financial risks that face The Society. Where considered necessary, appropriate action is taken to ensure that The Society has an appropriate internal control procedure in place to manage the key risks identified.

In addition, the Board Investigates ways of enhancing existing risk management strategies, including appropriate segregation of duties and the employment and training of suitably qualified personnel.

Principal activities

Review and results of operations

The operating profit of the Company for the year after abnormal items was \$4,321,822 (1998: \$327,268). Major changes were:

- The abnormal gain of \$4,446,000 associated with the transfer of ownership to the Company of the building commonly known as The Government Expo Centre on the 1st July 1998
- An increase in rental income and catering premiums of some \$563,668 reflecting the continued improved efforts in these areas
- The significant cost of preparing and developing comprehensive plans for redevelopment \$788,380 (1998 \$367,003) included in abnormals
- An increase in Depreciation and amortisation costs \$969,752 (1998 \$850,982)

There were no significant changes in the state of affairs of the company during the year other than,

- The decision to value the Crown Grant Land at nil as opposed to a valuation based on a comparable basis to the freehold land. Refer note 6(i).
- Pending a review of financing facilities within the next six months, a \$3,000,000 Commercial Bill facility has been
 expressed as Borrowings (Current). The Directors do consider however that future long term financing arrangements
 will be obtained.

Dividends

As the Company is limited by guarantee no dividend was recommended or paid.

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial report constitutes a general purpose financial report that has been drawn up in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards, the Corporations Law and other mandatory professional reporting requirements.

a) Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with historical cost principles and except where stated do not take into account current valuations of non-current assets

The carrying amounts of non-current assets do not exceed the net amounts that are expected to be recovered through the cash inflows and outflows arising from continued use and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows included in determining the recoverable amounts have not been discounted to their present values.

b) Limited by Guarantee

The company is limited by guarantee, thereby the company has been formed on the principle of having the liability of its members limited by the memorandum of association to the respective amounts that the members undertake to contribute to the property of the company in the event of it being wound up.

c) Inventories

Inventories have been valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value and represent maintenance stock and Show Shop supplies.

d) Revaluation of Property

Revaluation of property is performed in accordance with a policy of regular revaluation on the basis of market value for the existing use. Also see note 6.

e) Depreciation on Property, Plant & Equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment, other than freehold land, are depreciated over their estimated useful lives using the straight line method. Depreciation rates are as follows:

Building and Improvements:	2.5% pa
Plant and Equipment	2% - 33.3% pa

f) Income Tax

Any income derived by the company is exempt from Income Tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act.

g) Leased Assets

A distinction is made between finance leases which effectively transfer from the lessor to the lessee substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased property, without transferring the legal ownership, and operating leases under which the lessor effectively retains substantially all the risk and benefits.

Where assets are acquired by means of finance leases, the present value of minimum lease payments is established as an asset at the beginning of the lease term and amortised on a straight line basis over the period of the lease. A corresponding liability is also established and each lease payment is allocated between such liability and interest expense. Operating lease payments are charged to expense in the periods in which they are incurred.

h) Employee Entitlements

The following liabilities arising in respect of employee entitlements are measured at their nominal amounts:

wages and salaries and annual leave regardless whether they are expected to be settled within twelve months of balance date.
 other employee entitlements which are expected to be settled within twelve months of balance date.

All other employee entitlements, including long service leave, are measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows in respect of services provided up to balance date. Liabilities are determined after taking into consideration estimated future increases in wages and salaries and past experience regarding staff departures. Related on-costs are included.
