Finally, the judges, Bron, Liz, Jill and Jason who gave generously of their time to watch each of the contestant's videos and decide unanimously on the eventual winners.

From my perspective, I was delighted to be witness to the thoroughness of the deliberations from each of the judges, each presented their opinions and quickly delivered unanimous decisions in all categories.

Congratulations to all juniors who entered and gained an experience that will further their skills and knowledge in the art of judging sheep. Congratulations to the winners and place getters.

Judging is, in the main, a subjective activity and open for personal interpretation, and to some degree can be influenced by objective data. Judging is as much about having the knowledge and skills to know what to look for but to also remember in mental pictures and be able to recall the intricacies of each animal, then verbalise that information to an audience. It is my opinion that one must always first assess each animal before considering any performance data. Any data will usually reinforce what you have already observed about each animal.

To any junior who didn't win or place, use this and other competitions as a learning process, don't be disheartened. When you can, don't be afraid to ask questions of over judges. Often if you have not placed the competition animals in the same order as the over judge, you may be able to score points based on your emphasis on various attributes – this is especially the case when at the show.

Particular thanks to the teachers/mentors/parents who encouraged juniors to enter this competition; without this support and encouragement, students may not have the motivation or confidence to enter. I compliment all juniors who took the time to dress appropriately and select the ideal background to record their videos. Speaking clearly and confidently not only makes it easier for the judges, but it is also a life skill that is extremely important regardless of any eventual career path.

Some contestants knew their message without prompt cards, moved their animal without assistance and only depended on another person to do the video recording. Naturally, this gained the attention of the judges. I understand reading from prompt cards is acceptable and will help progress juniors to the next level of confidence and abilities.

As you will have heard me mention before, shows are not just about showing sheep/cattle and others. It is about providing myriad opportunities to show, promote, meet new clients, meet and socialise with the many demographics that attend the Melbourne Royal® Show.
