

The Society's Mission

The Society shall promote the progress and pursuit of excellence within all aspects of Victorian Agriculture.

The Society is pursuing this mission via three key strategies:

- · competition and education
- maintaining the Royal Melbourne Show as the pre-eminent event in Victoria
- redeveloping the Society's main asset, the Royal Showgrounds, to provide a year-round income stream to help maintain its financial viability.

Some History Highlights:

- 1848 The first competitive ploughing match staged at Moonee Ponds, not far from the present Showgrounds, by the new Port Phillip Farmers' Society.
- 1870 Port Phillip Farmers' Society disbanded and the National Agricultural Society of Victoria formed, modelled on the Royal Agricultural Society of England.
- 1871 The first Show held, at Emerald Hill
- 1883 The first Show at the present Ascot.
 Vale Showgrounds site.
- 1890 Queen Victoria assented to the use of the 'Royal' prefix and the Society became The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria. The motto 'Speed the Plough' was adopted.
- 1910 The first 'Massed Parade' of horses and cattle on the Main Arena at the Show.
- 1913 The Show Day Public Holiday declared.
- 1934 All previous Royal Melbourne Show entry records broken.
- 1934 Violet Murrell and her hack Garryowen perish in a stable fire. The following year the Garryowen Trophy was instituted in her memory.

- 1937 The first night sessions at the Show.
- 1948 The beginning of Main Arena entertainment at the Show.
- 1950 Royal Melbourne Diamond Jubilee Show.
- 1960 The Commonwealth Development Bank/RASV Victorian Farm Management Competition started.
 - The National Australia Bank Animal Nursery started at the Show.
- 1975 The Bonlac Commercial Dairy Herd of the Year competition started.
- 1976 The Weekly Times/RASV Commercial Flock of the Year started.
- 1979 The Genetics Australia Share Farmer of the Year competition started.
- 1994 Show Day Public Holiday revoked.
- 1995 Introduction of Nature's Way the first animal 'Birthing Centre' at an Australian Royal Show.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT



It is my privilege and pleasure to be able to present to you the Annual Report and Financial Statement of The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Limited for the year ending 31st March 1996.

The Board believes the financial results for the year are acceptable and satisfactory and will continue its policy of introducing improved practices and accountability.

The detailed statements are contained in this annual report.

It is very pleasing to know that the loss after abnormals of \$ 252,382 has been turned around in 1995/96 to a surplus after abnormals of \$121,838, Before the abnormals the result is even more satisfactory with an improvement over 1994/95 of \$529,224. This was largely brought about by increased gate revenue for the 1995 Royal Melbourne Show.

The result has also resulted in a net cash improvement as at March 1996 which is particularly important as we head into increased funding needs for the new building program.

The increased debt which is necessary to fund the new exhibition centre building as well as the improvements to the Royal Block will enhance the RASV's capacity to carn future income. It is anticipated that this additional revenue will provide the funds to service the increased debt. The Showgrounds are, however, in need of substantial capital injection to a level which is not possible within the financial capacity of the Society, and we will continue our efforts to attract financial input from outside sources to further our redevelopment proposals.

1995-96 has seen the first full year of the Society's operation under the proposals adopted by the Conneil from the Crawford report and whilst fine tuning in some areas may be needed in the future, generally speaking the changes must be seen to have been successful and to have worked very well.

The Directors of the Society have met on a regular basis and now carry full responsibility for the business decisions taken and implemented. The Board has a full complement of ten members and has been very pleased to welcome John Watson during the year. John has had an extensive career with Agriculture and rural organisations and will undoubtedly be an asset to the organisation.

Early decisions during the year were to proceed to build the new complex for the 1996 Show, which is due to be completed in August, and the employment of a consultant to assist with the renewal of our catering contract. Tenders were called and let in both instances, and each of these projects will be important in seeing some very substantial

changes to the forthcoming Show and indeed to greater use of the facilities for the remainder of the year.

Mrs. Diana Gibson sought and was given approval to commission and present to the Society a life size sculpture in memory of her late father David Knox. The Society is indeed grateful for this kind offer. The result will be seen in September this year.

At the instigation of the R.S.L. and at what was a very enjoyable occasion a plaque commemorating the role of our Royal Showgrounds in providing a home to over 60,000 members of the armed forces from late 1939 to 1945 was unveiled and will be a reminder for future generations of that fact.

The Royal Melbourne Show saw a continuation of direction previously begun emphasising rural activities – all innovations were seen to be successful and none more so than Nature's Way, a first in Australia and which will be further enhanced in 1996.

We enjoyed a much improved weather pattern for the event and this coupled with a greatly improved marketing plan and generally higher standard of exhibition saw an increase in attendance to 712 100, an improvement of more than 50 000 against 1994.

Our thanks are again extended to our Governor. His Excellency The Hon Richard E. McGarvie and Mrs McGarvie. His Excellency officially opened the Show and both he and his wife honoured us with a visit on another occasion. Our appreciation is also expressed for the most enjoyable cocktail party hosted by these two fine supporters at Government House prior to the Show.



I am pleased to report that rural competitions continue to flourish and presentation occasions and field days held in conjunction with these events continue to play an important part in the "search for excellence" in Agriculture and in the activities of the Society. They are a very important part of our work and we should and we will make even more strenuous efforts to taise the prestige and importance of our year round events.

The Sheep and Wool Show was held in July and is to continue as a partnership occasion with the Australian Sheep Breeders
Association (ASBA) with expectations of an excellent event. The Summer Horse Show is continuing to gain in stature and popularity, and was enhanced in 1996 by the addition of the Victorian Agricultural Societies of Australia's Horse of the Year Awards and supported by VASA. There is every reason to believe that these will soon be seen to be the most coveted and prestigious equestrian awards of their type in the State.

Our excellent relationship with our country societies is most important to maintain and we must see it continue and prosper.

The society saw fit to appoint the following as Honorary Life Members during the year in recognition of services rendered:

Ms Colleen Egan; Mrs Carol Mazurek; Miss Jill Hargreaves; Mrs Marion Jones; Mrs Merrill Milne; Mr Marcus Mooney; Mr Bob Bell; Mr John Thompson and Mr John Clifford. Congratulations to Bob Potter, John Fox and Bill Forrest, who were elected as Vice Presidents for the ensuing year and thank you to lan Bucknall for six years as Vice President and the contributions he made in that capacity.

It is with a great deal of sadness that I record the loss of three of our colleagues during the year, Mr. D.W.R. (David) Knox passed away on 8th April, Mr. K.J. (Ken) McIver on 27th May and The Hon. Sir William (Jack) McDonald on 13th September. All are greatly missed and their obituaries are included elsewhere in this report.

On behalf of the Council and the Board, I express appreciation of our Senior Management and our staff and to all who play a part in our many facets of activity. The Society is indeed appreciative of an army of supporters in so many different ways.

Our Mission Statement reads:

"The Society shall promote the progress and pursuit of excellence within all aspects of Victorian Agriculture."

We believe strongly that the mission is a very worthwhile cause but we are constantly aware that it can only be achieved to a satisfactory level with the continuing co-operation of the community at large.

Obituaries

Mr. D. W. R. (David) Knox

David Knox passed away on 8 April 1995. He had been a Councillor since June 1953 and a Life Councillor since June 1973. He was highly regarded as a wonderful ambassador for the RASV and was widely known and respected all over Australia. He worked quietly and tirelessly for the Society with much of his work often going unnoticed and unheralded, His contribution to the Society has been immense and of inestimable value.

Mrs. Diana Gibson is presenting to the Society a life-size statue of a stockman and his horse in memory of her late father which will be located in a prominent position fronting Plummer Avenue. The perpetuation of the memory of David Knox and his contribution which will be greatly enhanced by this very fine gesture.

Mr. K. J. (Ken) McIver

Ken McIver passed away on 27 May 1995. He had been a member of the Horse Committee and well skilled in the designing and building of Show Jumping Courses. He spent some time as President of the Equestrian Federation of Australia where he made a considerable contribution. During his time with the RASV he spent much of his time helping to run horse events both at the Royal Melbourne Show and Summer Horse Show. Ken McIver's contribution to the horse world was considerable.

The Hon, Sir William (Jack) McDonald, Kt.

Sir William passed away on 13 September 1995 immediately prior to the opening of the 1995 Royal Melbourne Show. Sir William first came to the RASV as a Government appointed Trustee, a position he held with distinction for over 20 years and was made a Life Councillor in July 1993. He had a distinguished career in the Victorian Government over a long period of time and made a considerable contribution to the advancement of the Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT



Overview

The Society has completed a successful year, increasing our commitment and focus in agriculture and reinvigorating the Royal Show, whilst promoting the necessary changes and effectiveness to enhance the Society's long term survival.

The Year to 31 March 1996 was highlighted by overall increases in exhibitors and entries at our events, a substantial increase in attendance at the Royal Show, a clarification of our Vision for the Showgrounds and the Society's role, a major financial commitment by the Society to the first stage of redevelopment of the Showgrounds, and a return to profitability.

The Society won three major international awards for the staging of the 1995 Royal Show. The awards are conducted annually by the US based International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE) in recognition of excellence in agricultural education.

The 1995 St George Bank Royal Melbourne Show was our 137th and was highlighted by the number, quality and range of entries in most categories of Show events, attracting some 31 500 entries from more than 8400 exhibitors. The total attendance was 712 100, an increase of 8% on the 1994 Show and up 90 000 over the previous two years. We welcomed our 44 millionth visitor in 1995 and exit polls clearly indicated a high customer satisfaction rating with the Show.

The Royal Melbourne Show continues to be the biggest public-paying event in Victoria with more than 700 000 visitors and providing an annual economic benefit to the State of more than 5100 million.

Of equal significance in 1995-96 was the start of work under the Society's 'Vision 2000' program.

The Society let a contract in March 1996 for the construction of the first new building for 20 years on the Showgrounds site. We have committed more than 53 million to the construction of the Exhibition Hall, a clear indication of the Society's confidence in the future of the Showgrounds site.

The Society is determined to build on its unique Royal Show experience and the site's outstanding logistical advantages to develop the Melbourne Showgrounds as a world class Showcase for Australian Excellence in food and fibre production and processing, creating a focal point for Australian agriculture and attracting business to Melbourne and Victoria.

To help pay for this Vision, a range of commercial activities is being pursued involving substantial investment by both private and public sectors, as well as ensuring that the Society runs its own business in a highly efficient, cost effective manner.

Our membership remains a vital support base for the Society's future. A program of improving their facilities and benefits started at the 1995 Royal Show and I would like to thank Members for their continued input and support.

Lastly, I would like to thank the Board members, Councillors and Staff for all their help and work throughout the year. The change that we are going through is necessary but not easy. Without their support it would be impossible.

The 1995 St George Bank Royal Melbourne Show

Six major goals were set for the 1995 Royal Show and all were achieved or exceeded, as follows:

- Increase attendance to 700 000
- · Reinforce value for money
- Maintain appropriate commercial balance, improve presentation standards
- Strengthen agricultural education demands
- Maintain/increase entries in farm animal events and ensure livestock and produce competitions maintain commercial relevancy
- Enhance customer service levels by all staff

Major marketing activities were undertaken to help achieve these objectives, including direct fiaison with individual exhibitors and exhibitor groups, liaison with government and with commercial and industry groups, promotional advertising, public relations, direct media liaison, and special promotions.

As a result, the 1995 Royal Show achieved:

- An increase in the quality and range of entries in most categories of Show events. In total some 31 500 entries were received from more than 8400 exhibitors for the 1995 Royal Show.
- Following successive falls in attendances since 1990, the Society succeeded in reversing the trend in 1994 when attendances reached 660 000, due to a repositioning of the Show back to its "rural roots". The 1995 figure of

- 712 100 visitors was up 8% on 1994 and an increase of 90 000 over two years.
- The addition of new exhibitions and attractions. Education has always been a core element of attracting both city and country people to the Show, and the Society believes the key to success in

98% of visitors enjoyed their visit to the Show and 72% enjoyed their visit 'a lot' (up from 69% the previous year), an overwhelming majority believed the changes made from the previous year were for the better, and the majority believed it was better than the last time they visited the Show.

this area is to provide eduction in an entertaining way. Proven educational attractions included the Animal Nursery, Pigs & People, the Grand Parade, traditional skills displays such as blacksmithing, horse shoeing, wheel wright and sheep shearing. New attractions on the program included Nature's Way (a 'live' animal birthing' display), Mini-Show to Schools, Natural Fibre exhibitions ('From Paddock to Garment'), and horse dentistry.

- A substantial increase in positive awareness and attitudes towards the Show. Exit polls clearly indicated a substantial increase in customer satisfaction with the Show. In summary.
- Increased value for money and better presentation standards. As part of the program, existing admission prices were maintained for the fifth year in succession, our own RASV Customer Service program was introduced for all permanent and most casual staff, major pavilions were revitalised through the use of attractive facades, and a greater sense of space was created by concentrating the commercial (carnival, retail and showbags) areas and creating more lawn areas for relaxation. There were further improvements to the catering layout and extensions to general Showgrounds sign-posting and traffic thoroughfares.

 Enhanced customer service levels by all staff. The Society's Ambassador program was introduced in 1994 with great success and AussieHost was added to it for 1995 to provide outstanding customer service to visitors.

These results were translated into improved gate takings and thereby the Society's financial results.

International recognition

In addition to the financial results, the business success is best demonstrated by the fact that the Society won three major international awards for the staging of the 1995 Royal Show.

The awards are conducted annually by the US based International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE) in recognition of excellence in agricultural education. The 1995 St George Bank Royal Melbourne Show competed in the section for shows/fairs with attendances between 500 000 and 1 000 000 people against 10 fairs across the USA which included California. New York, Ohio and Kentucky.

The three awards won by the 1995 St George Bank Royal Melbourne Show were:

- Best overall agricultural program for the showgoing public
- Best special agricultural educational event for the showgoing public (won with the Pigs & People exhibit)
- Best video of overall agricultural program

Vision 2000

The Society is committed to developing the Royal Melbourne Showgrounds as a world class Showcase for Australian excellence in food and fibre production and processing, creating a focul point for Australian agriculture and attracting business to Melbourne and Victoria

This objective, called *Vision 2000*, is aimed at enabling the Society to fulfil its Mission

The new Exhibition Hall links two existing buildings, providing a major new trade fair and exhibition complex for Melbourne with total space of more than 7000 square metres, fully-serviced modern catering facilities with access to outdoor exhibition areas, and car parking for up to 1500 vehicles.

into the 21st Century, and at securing the future of the Showgrounds and the Royal Show for future generations.

Developing multi-functional and modern facilities that can attract year-round income streams is vital to the financial viability of this Vision.

In March 1996, the Society started the five year redevelopment program when work commenced on the first new building at the Showgrounds for almost 20 years at a cost of more than \$3 million, funded entirely by the Society. The building will be completed in time for the 1996 Royal Show and will, we hope, provide the catalyst for support and relevant investment by other parties in both the public and private sectors.

At Showtime, it will be a new 'Showease' pavilion attracting larger corporate organisations featuring their products and services.

We are confident that the Showgrounds can become a significant exhibition and commercial venue with features that complement other venues in Melbourne and match the State Government plans for Victoria to be the exhibition and event centre of Australia.

With more secure income streams, the Society can concentrate better on its Mission of pursuing excellence in all aspects of Victorian agriculture ensuring that Show and commercial competitions are relevant and leading edge, and provide improved facilities for exhibitors and their entries.

Aimed at attracting rural-based organisations to utilise the Showgrounds site with its unique logistics and history, these improvements will accelerate the process of creating a Showcase and focal point for Australian agriculture.

Year-Round Agricultural Activities

In January 1996, the Royal Melbourne Horse Show, our annual horse breed event, was staged with great success. A total of 5279 entries were received with record entries in Arabian Horses, Australian Saddle Ponies, Australian Stud Saddle Ponies, APSB Ponies (all breeds), Competition Horses, Miniature Ponies and Riding Ponies. A rodeo was held in conjunction with the Show.

The 1995 Sheep and Wool Show, the largest event of its kind in the Southern

Hemisphere, was conducted in July in partnership with the Australian Sheep

Breeders' Association for the second year in succession. Entries in the stock sections, rain sales and wooleraft competitions remained consistently high in terms of

numbers and quality, and a record attendance was achieved.

The 1995 Royal Melbourne Dairy Show was judged in August, More than 750 entries were received from around Australia for this major industry event. It is the largest competition of its kind in Australia. The Show is supported actively and sponsored proudly by the Australian Dairy Corporation.

The 1995 Royal Melbourne Wine Show attracted record entries with 2614 different wines exhibited. Strong growth in the number of companies entering was experienced with a 5% increase compared with 1994. This is reflective of the development of the Australian wine industry. Entries were judged in August 1995. The coveted Jimmy Watson Trophy was awarded to Leasingham Wines 1994 Classic Clare Shiraz, with the Presentation Dinner sponsored by The St. George Bank.

The 1995 Australian Beer Awards, run by the Society in conjunction with the University of Ballarat, attracted a record 201 entries from Australia and overseas. Entries were received from 12 countries, with judging of exhibits conducted in June 1995. Toohey's Hahn Ice beer was awarded the Grand Champion title, with the Maltese Cisk beer a close runner up.

Commercial farming competitions are run by the Society throughout the year in line with the Society's mission to promote excellence in agriculture. They attract entries from some of Victoria's best farmers and from those who will undoubtedly be the best in the near future. While entrants and winners benefit from the publicity and competition, the public field days offer a great opportunity for learning.

Panels of expert industry judges are used and the competitions would not be possible without the assistance of the Victorian Agricultural Societies Association (VASA), the Victorian Government through Agriculture Victoria, and our sponsors.

The competitions are:

- The Bonlac Commercial Dairy Herd of the Year
- The Commonwealth Development Bank Victorian Farm Management Competition
- The Genetics Australia Share Dairy
 Farmer of the Year
- The Weekly Times Commercial Flock of the Year

Other agricultural competitions run by the Society include the Bacon and Pig Carcase, Grains, Fleece, Honey, and the Steer Carcase.



Indemnification of Officers / Auditors

Significant Changes in State of Affairs

The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Inc. in a Deed of Assignment dated 4 April 1995 transferred its assets and liabilities to the Company on 1 April 1995.

Events Subsequent to Balance Date

No matters or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial period that have significantly affected or may significantly affect the operations of the Company.

Review and Results of Operations

The net surplus of the Company after abnormals was \$121,838 (1995 loss \$252,382). This result has two key causes:

- a substantial increase in attendance at the Royal Melbourne Show and on other events resulting in increased revenue of over \$1,000,000.
- abnormal costs related to the redevelopment programme amounting to over \$ 160,000 and accelerated depreciation of \$195,000.

Likely Future Developments and Expected Results

The first stage of redevelopment of the Showgrounds started in March 1996 when a new building was commenced connecting two older ones and creating an exhibition and trade fair space of 5000 sq metres costing some \$3m and funded by borrowings.

The timing of further stages of redevelopment will depend on the availability of funds from both private and public sectors.



Notes to and forming part of the financial statements

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements constitute a general purpose financial report which has been drawn up in accordance with Schedule 5 to the Corporations Regulations, applicable Accounting Standards and other mandatory professional reporting requirements (Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views).

a) Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with historical cost principles and except where stated do not take into account current valuations of non-current assets.

The carrying amounts of non-current assets do not exceed the net amounts that are expected to be recovered through the cash inflows and outflows arising from continued use and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows included in determining the recoverable amounts have not been discounted to their present values.

b) Limited by Guarantee

The company is limited by guarantee, thereby the company has been formed on the principle of having the liability of its members limited by the memorandum of association to the respective amounts that the members undertake to contribute to the property of the company in the event of it being wound up.

c) Inventories

Inventories have been valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value and represent maintenance stock and consumable supplies.

d) Revaluation of Property, Plant and Equipment

Revaluation of property, plant and equipment is performed in accordance with a policy of regular revaluation on the basis of existing use.

e) Depreciation on Property, Plant & Equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment, other than freehold land, are depreciated over their estimated useful lives using the straight line method.

f) Income Tax

Any income derived by the company is exempt from Income Tax under Section 23(h) of the Income Tax Assessment Act.

g) Leased Assets

A distinction is made between finance leases which effectively transfer from the lessor to the lessee substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased property, without transferring the legal ownership, and operating leases under which the lessor effectively retains substantially all the risk and benefits.

Where assets are acquired by means of finance leases, the present value of minimum lease payments is established as an asset at the beginning of the lease term and amortised on a straight line basis over the period of the lease. A corresponding liability is also established and each lease payment is allocated between such liability and interest expense.

Operating lease payments are charged to expense in the periods in which they are incurred.

h) Employee Entitlements

The following liabilities arising in respect of employee entitlements are measured at their nominal amounts:

- wages and salaries and annual leave regardless whether they are expected to be settled within twelve months of balance date.
- other employee entitlements which are expected to be settled within twelve months of balance date.

All other employee entitlements, including long service leave, are measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows in respect of services provided up to balance date. Liabilities are determined after taking into consideration estimated future increase in wages and salaries and past experience regarding staff departures. Related on-costs are included.

i) Comparative Information

Where appropriate, the comparative figures have been amended to enable a meaningful comparison to be made. The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria Inc. in a Deed of Assignment dated 4 April 1995 transferred its assets and liabilities to the Company on 1 April 1995 and accordingly the accumulated funds of the Society amounting to \$2,235,261 as at 31 March 1995 have been adjusted against retained earnings (refer Cash Flow Note 3).
